Put Up to Voters

Police Petitions Ask Pay Boost

Thirteen Cinnaminson Policemen began circulating petitions last week to obtain the signatures of 20 per cent of the 1965 registered voters to place the issue increased salaries for the dispatchers and police department on the ballot at the Nov. 8 general election.

According to Sgt. John W. Peters, the police action has been taken with the approval of Chief Thomas Adams, on vacation until Aug. 22. Each man will try to obtain 175 signatures.

Members of the police department met Friday at 10 a.m. to discuss each officer's feelings regarding of the salary schedule sought. All agreed on the salaries designated on the petitions.

The petition, addressed to the chairman and members of the Township Committee of Cinnaminson, states that, "We, the undersigned legal voters of the Township of Cinnaminson, County of Burlington and State of New Jersey, request that there be submitted to the legal voters of the Township of Cinnaminson, at the next General Election to be held on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, 1966, the question of fixing the annual salaries of the members of the Police Department and the amounts herein after stated, payable semi-monthly, commencing January 1, 1967." Radio dispatchers, pre-

sently receiving \$1.65 per hour, will ask for \$2. per hour flat hourly rate. Petitions call for a patrolmen's starting salary, now \$5500, to begin at \$6600; patrolmen, first year men to be paid an annual salary of \$6850, patrol-

Cinnaminson Tp. Police Salaries Among Area Best

A salary survey shows Cinnaminson Township police department and other township personnel ranks among the highest paid in the South Jersey area, John Karakashian, Director of Public Safety, announced in an interview this week.

"As head of the department, I was aware the petitions would be circulated. It was not done over my head, he said, I feel it's certainly their prerogative. But earlier in the year, at the end of 1965, the

men, second year men, \$7100, representing an increase of \$1000 from \$6100.

Also patrolman, three-year men, to be paid an annual salary of \$7350, an increase of \$950 from \$6400; patrolmen, fourth year man, \$7600, an increase of \$1000 from \$6600; sergeants, with three years as patrolmen, \$8100, an increase of \$1200; sergeants with four years as patrolmen, \$8350, an increase of \$1450; sergeants with five years as patrolmen, \$8600, an increase of \$1750.

All sergeants now receive an annual salary of \$6900. The petition calls for the chief to be paid an annual salary of \$10,000, an increase of \$1500 from \$8500.

Sgt. Peters said that the men have all received increment salary increases of \$200, according to seniority. They included Peters and Chief Adams.

"The basic reason for applying for salary increases," Peters said, "is because the men must be residents of Cinnaminson Township. A house cannot be bought for less than \$14,000. If he's married, he can't live here especially if he has children. He must operate on a close budget to raise a family.

"There is no overtime pay and no paid holidays. We are supposed to get compensatory

Council Rejects Plea to Remove 7 Horn Siren

Riverton Borough Council on Thursday night remained firm in refusing to relocate the new fire siren from a pole located at Broad and Thomas st., despite another appeal by a Riverton residents.

Mrs. James Fitzgerald, of 605 Thomas av., was spokesman for six residents living within a short distance of the siren located near her back yard. She petitioned Borough Council in June to return the siren to the original position atop the Riverton Fire house.

Site for the recently purchased siren was selected by the Federal Siren Co., of New York, in the latter part of May. It was placed at its present location as the most central point within earshot of the volunteer firemen.

The new signal, consisting of seven horns, can be heard in all sections of the borough, while its predecessor had two horns. In many cases, firemen were unaware of an alarm because they claimed they didn't hear the siren.

As a test of operation the siren is blown daily, all but Sunday, at 5 p.m. According to a state requirement, an alarm must be sounded for a drill once a month. The Riverton drill is scheduled the first Thursday of the month at 8 p.m.

In other business, Borough Council advised a contractor, representing Edward Leszcynski, of Woodside and Beachwood ave., in applying for a swimming pool variance, to obtain approval of property owners living within 200 feet of a proposed swimming pool.

The applicant appealed to the governing body for a variance to construct a pool 10 feet from the next property line instead of 20 feet as required by ordinance.

The variance for swimming pools is appealed directly to council and is the only ordinance that does not require a recommendation of the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

The solicitor was authorized to investigate the advantages and benefits in contracting with the Burlington County Health plan for consideration.

No date was set for a special meeting to consider awarding of bids for maintenance of road construction postponed Thursday for an obvious mis-

Aimed at Savings

Water Co. Manager Cites Methods of Metering

Kenneth T. Wrang, manager of the Delaware Valley Water Co., Palmyra, a private utility, advises there are several methods of metering water used for other than sanitary purposes.

If residents plan to use present outside faucets for irrigation and pool purposes without much expense, Wrang suggests have a meter installed to meter only that water which does not enter the sewerage system.

This meter, he explained, would be installed to measure the water after the water has passed through the water meter. The second meter would not be supplied by the water company since the existing meter has already been installed by them for that purpose. It is necessary to purchase the new meter from a plumbing supply house, or have a plumber supply it making the necessary changes in the house piping.

"This arrangement," Wrang stated, will have to be discussed with the Cinnaminson Sewerage Authority when a resident desires to avoid

paying a sewerage charge for water not entering the sanitary disposal system. It will therefore be necessary to have some arrangements to supply meter readings from the second meter to the Sewerage Authority."

A second method, he said, is to have a separate water service line installed with an outdoor meter setting placed at the curb. From this point a line can be extended under the sidewalk and into a small pit with a suitable cover. In this pit, a house connection can be used in irrigating the lawn or filling a pool.

The third alternate would be to have a separate service line installed and extend a line from the outside meter setting, underground, to a point midway between the front and rear of the property to avoid long runs of hose to fill the pool.

Wrang pointed that "the Water Company is only responsible for the service line installation from the main to the curb line, the piping beyond that point is the responsibility of the property owner."

There is a \$25 installation charge and a \$2 fee for the street opening permit for the service installation, he advised.

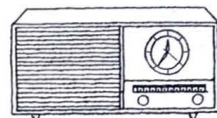

Dr. Benjamin Lee Buried Today

Dr. Benjamin F. Lee, 54, chief attending surgeon at Zionsburg Memorial Hospital since 1955, and former president of staff, was buried this morning, in Lakeview Memorial Park, Cinnaminson. He died Saturday, at his home, 323 Mt. Vernon av., Haddonfield.

In addition to the local hospital, Dr. Lee was attending surgeon at Cooper Hospital, Camden; attending surgeon at the New Jersey State Hospital, Ancon; an instructor in surgery at Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, and South Jersey area physician for Public Service. He was a member of the Haddonfield Methodist Church.

The widely known surgeon was graduated from Bridgeton High School, Ursinus College, and the University of Pennsylvania Medical College. During World War II, from 1942 to 1947, he served with the United States Army Medical Corps as a lieutenant commander.

A member of the Medical Society of New Jersey and a member and past president of the Camden County Medical Society, Dr. Lee was also a member of the American Medical Association, a fellow of the American College of Surgeons and a diplomate of the American Board of Surgery. He is survived by his wife Jane, and a daughter, Eleanor, at home.

The last baptismal ceremony in St. Stephen's Memorial Episcopal Church, Riverside, before "Operation Demolition" is initiated next week, was performed Monday night by the Rev. John J. Evans, rector.

Richelle Yvonne Schmieder, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Schmieder, 208 Paine st., Riverside, was baptized Monday evening in a final church rite to be performed in the 80-year-old edifice.

Demolition will get underway this week to make room for a new structure expected to cost \$135,000 when completed in May, 1967.

The old building first showed the effects of time by cracking walls due to settling of the foundation 12 years ago. Construction was completed in August, 1886.

Father Evans said that "at the recommendation of three builders, the building will be torn down, a decision made two years ago. Cracking plaster walls could crumble with the least shock loosening the windows. Pews are not in line with the modern comfortable appointments," he added.

The old church stands on the triangle corner of Bridgeboro and Webster sts., adjoining the parish house which was built in 1905.

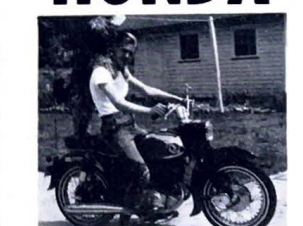

Something Added

Cinnaminson Township, along with one of its neigh-
boring towns, seems to be the place where the action
was. The neighboring town is Delran Township, where
just recently, the voters had an extra added attraction,
the settlement of the big issue—a proposed change in
the form of local government.

Cinnaminson Township's added attraction isn't any-
thing comparable to the gravity of the move demanded
by a segment of the Delran population—except to the
people involved; in this case the police.

The police force, with the knowledge if not the con-
sent of the Township Committee and its public safety
director, is doing what many other employees, for such
they are in the strict sense of the word, are doing:
asking for more money in the paycheck.

Fortunately for the police and other government em-
ployees on the local level, there are procedures to be
followed. They are, of course, direct application to the
people who can approve the request, the local govern-
ing body, or, secondly, by appealing directly to their
"employers," the voters of the community.

The local police force chose the latter method.
This plan has one benefit for the Township Com-
mittee—it takes them "off the hook." In modern jargon
that means taking the need for making the decision out
of their hands.

That's good in an important election year, such as
this one.

There is much to be said for adopting the referendum
method of resolving the issue. The voting public, often
prone to be critical when actions that may contribute
to tax increases, will have the last word on the subject.
It can approve or reject the request.

The police now have to sell the idea to a critical
"board of directors," in the main people who do not
know the extent of their work, the experience required
and acquired, the training talent, even the hours put
into the job on a day-to-day basis. The voting public—
usually all taxpayers or contributors to the tax treasury
in one way or another—holds the purse strings and given
an opportunity can be as stingy as the toughest straw-
bloss.

Police, like every other public employee, are worthy
of their pay, for, in the final analysis, they stand be-
tween the law-abiding citizen and the lawbreaker, the
ruly and unruly, the orderly and the disorderly. There
is an occupation that carries with it great hazards on
many occasions.

The voters they ask to support their petitions for
added income are generally aware of the policeman's
duties but must be presented with the details.

Proper presentations of the scope of the department's
duties and importance could well win the salary in-
creases sought. The police have a scant eight weeks
to "sell" the idea to the voters—and show the need. A
job well done in that direction should pay off in success
of the venture. A public generally is willing to pay for
what it gets—and the better the job, the higher the pay.

Ask Your Broker

(Q.) Our home is over 30 years
old and after a heavy rain the
corner of the basement leaks
and remains damp for several
days. We understand that ours
is the only house on the block
with this condition. Can my
husband correct this situa-
tion?

M.M.D.

(A) Of all the old homes—thirty
years or more—in the coun-
try, 10 per cent have wet base-
ments. Of the millions of new
homes completed since 1945,
an estimated 80 per cent have
had wet or damp basements at
one time or another. Mil-
lions of home owners, after
weighing the estimate of pro-
fessional waterproofers rang-
ing possibly up to \$1,000, have
found that the cost of water-
proofing was beyond their
means and have settled back
to tolerating the condition.

Few of them have dared
tackle the job themselves,
fearing that nothing could be
done. The most important sin-
gle thing to know in order to
correct the condition is the
cause or causes of the leaks.
Remember, all stone, rock,
brick, concrete and other ma-
terials used for foundations of
homes is porous—yes, even
natural stone, such as field
stone used for homes, churches,
wells and other structures. The cause of your
trouble could be downspouts
flooding the foundation walls,
wall cracks or cracks at the
cellar floor-wall joint, side-
walks close enough to the build-
ing to serve as water traps,
removal of topsoil, or on rare
occasions, an underground
stream. If your husband is
handy, studies the problem and
gets the right advice from your
hardware dealer, he may cor-
rect the situation.

(Q) We are a young couple with
a growing family and are ser-
iously thinking of adding a
room to our present house.
It is sensible to do some of
the work ourselves?
A.T.P.

(A) Adding a room is as varied
as the construction of a house
and in essence should not be
taken lightly by the amateur.
It will probably pay you in the
long run to call in a re-
putable contractor who can ad-
vise you on the proper dimen-
sions, finish construction de-
tails and so on. Whether or
not to have a basement un-
der the new room, what wall
construction to use, and how
to tie the new walls in with
the original house walls, are
questions that a builder can
solve by considering your
needs and examining your pre-
sent house construction. All
this will help you add a room
which fits in well with the rest
of the house and grounds and
which will be a useful addi-
tion and not just a nailed on
lean-to. On the other hand, if
you wish to do part of the
work yourself, you can hire
help for such jobs as the
foundation, framing, roofing
and plastering, reserving for
yourself the painting, floor

finishing and other tasks that
can proceed at a more leisurely
pace once the room is un-
derfooted, these increases
would not cause an increase
in 1967 taxes.

(Q) We now have a young, ag-
gressive force which doesn't
lack experience," Peters said.
"Three officers are
pushing forty, the others are
from 34 to 45 years of age.
All are of good calibre with
good police records including
commendations from state,
county and local officials.

"We feel that residents should
be aware of the most
modern equipment in their
police department. We have
four police cars, but because
of a manpower shortage, only
two men are assigned to
each shift. Although, occasion-
ally there are three men on a
shift."

"During the evening
hours," Peters continued,
four men should roam the
township. The ideal assign-
ment would be to assign two
men to each car. The chief
supports the proposed raises.
As chief, he's one of the most
knowledgeable men in the
county. He was instrumental
in organizing the County Po-
lice Training School in Marl-
ton and gives his men all pos-
sible modern school and teach-
ing techniques.

"Police dispatchers do a
terrific job but we need one
new one. There are three
shifts a day, seven days a
week. Two relief dispatchers
are on duty during the week-
end. Mrs. Doris Naylor is on
duty Monday through Friday;
Jerry Callin and William Ber-
ker work ask-day week. John
Orner and James Sullivan are
shift ends at 8 a.m.; second
ends at 4 p.m.; third con-
cludes at midnight.

"The department consists
of several specialists; Pa-
troman William Adams, no
relation to the chief, is a pro-
fessional photographer. Long,
O'Connor and I are SCUBA
Divers when needed.

"It boils down to the fact
that an officer in Burlington
County today, must be a spe-
cialist. He is constantly with
professional people, attor-
neys, judges and must be pre-
pared to present and win his
cases. Again this points up why
a high caliber man would apply
for a well-paying career job.

police department. We have

supports the proposed raises.

"Police dispatchers do a

ker work ask-day week. John
Orner and James Sullivan are
shift ends at 8 a.m.; second
ends at 4 p.m.; third con-

It rained most of the week of July 30, although they say this has been the best summer Sweden has experienced since 1959. It may be a compensation for an unusually severe winter from December to March, last year.

On Wednesday, July 24, I left the Noorhth family at Strandbaden and will live with the Olson family 10 miles from Hoganas. Mr. Olson owns a 600-acre grain farm and lives in the most luxurious house I've ever seen, either in Sweden or America.

Mr. and Mrs. Olson have two daughters Marie Margeretta, 16, Marie Brigetta, 13, and a son, Gordon, 11. It has been a lot of fun driving the tractors, combines and running the grain processor and elevators.

I spent a week at the home of Gunnar Cederberg at their winter home in Sodertalje, 21 miles west of Stockholm. I became acquainted with Gunnar in Strandbaden. They thought I would enjoy seeing Stockholm.

With the permission of the Rotary Club, of which Mr. Olsson is president, we packed the car and drove 360 miles northeast to Sodertalje. This is a city of 30,000 people within easy train distance from Stockholm. While visiting the city Aug. 8, Gunnar and I boarded a touring boat sailing up and down the Baltic Sea and through the Stockholm canals. They say many as 90 per cent of the residents live in rented apartments.
