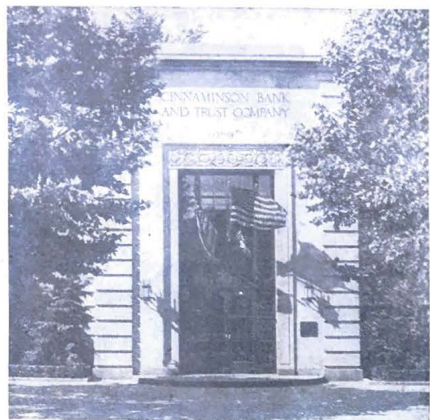

## 50th ANNIVERSARY OF LOCAL BANK



February 4th marked the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Cinnaminson Bank & Trust Company, of Riverton, the institution having been founded in 1907. From a modest beginning, it has had a steady and impressive growth and today is the only bank located in the Cinnaminson, Palmyra, Riverton area which has a population of over 14,000.

The first banking house was located in the store of Joseph M. Roberts, Riverton, for several months after the organization had been completed. In October of the same year, however, the institution moved into its own quarters on Main street.

The structure contained the latest facilities known at that time and was considered to be one of the finest in the state.

#### Occupied Until 1928

The bank was located at this point until May, 1928, when a new banking house was constructed at the corner of Main and Harrison streets, Riverton.

In 1948 a modern branch office was opened in the Harder Building, Broad street and Garfield avenue, Palmyra.

The business was begun with a capital stock of \$25,000 and the organizers were Samuel Slim, J. Lawrence Lippincott, Dr. L. L. Sharp, E. E. Compton, D. H. Wright, John H. Lewis, William Rudduck, Joseph M. Roberts, Samuel MacMullin, Alfred Smith, C. T. Woolston, F. G. Brown, Dr. Alexander Marcy, Jr., Robert F. Garwood and Joseph Morgan.

#### First Officers

The first officers were: Charles W. Nevin, president; Dr. Alexander Marcy, Jr., and Joseph Morgan, vice presidents; E. L. Williams, cashier. On the death of Mr. Nevin, on November 14, 1908, Mr. Morgan succeeded to the presidency.

The original board of directors was composed of Charles W. Nevin, Dr. Marcy, Joseph Morgan, Samuel F. Fingold, George C. Frank, Samuel Slim, J. Lawrence Lippincott, Charles A. Wright, J. Otto Thilow, Edmund Holmes, Joseph M. Roberts and Collins H. Haines.

#### Senior Employees

Morris H. DeCoursey, presently serving as secretary-treasurer, joined the staff of the bank on January 10, 1910 and is the oldest employee in

terms of years of service.

Howard B. Conover, executive vice president, became a member of the staff in February, 1925.

At the present time the bank has 25 employees at its main office and in the Palmyra Branch.

#### Presidents

Mr. Morgan served as president until his death in 1917. He was succeeded by Dr. Marcy, who occupied that post through 1921, when he was compelled to resign because of ill health. From that date until his death in 1939, E. L. Williams was president of the institution. He was succeeded by Dr. Charles S. Miller.

Dr. Mills passed away in 1954 and Harry B. Williams succeeded him. Mr. Williams died late in 1955 and Arthur W. Lewis was elected president at the annual meeting in 1956.

From a modest beginning in 1907, when the initial deposits were \$4,068.75, the business of the bank has increased rapidly from year to year. In 1917, deposits amounted to \$555,577.92; in 1927 to \$1,126,274.97.

As of December 31 of 1956 deposits amounted to nearly \$7,000,000. Total accounts number 2,147 in regular checking accounts; 2,237 special checking accounts and 3,441 savings accounts.

## REPORT FOR LOCAL LIBRARY

Harry F. Jones, president of the Riverton Free Library Association, presented the following report at the Annual Meeting of the organization held last week.

"In presenting the Annual Report for 1956 it seems fitting to mention, first of all, that 1465 Readers Cards are now actively in use. 484 new books have been acquired, bringing our total available for circulation to 14,000 volumes. In addition 687 Juvenile and 512 Adult books are constantly revolving through the County's Library effective and helpful operations. Issues of practically all prominent weekly and monthly magazines are regularly on our racks. These facts will reveal the up-to-dateness and sufficiency of the service we are fortunately equipped to give to the Tri-Borough residents of Cinnaminson, Palmyra and Riverton.

"Even though we had fewer Contributing Subscribers in 1956 than in 1955 it is reassuring to state that total dollar Membership Income increased 5% or 49 cents per capita. "It is hoped and believed 1957 will bring reinstatement from those members who most likely mislaid the renewal reminders mailed to them. This would be particularly important to us inasmuch as the Treasurer's Report will show the slim balance of \$60.91 in our Operating Account as of December 31, 1956.

"Grateful acknowledgment is made of the financial support given through the Governing Authorities of Cinnaminson, Palmyra and Riverton, as well as the Porch Club's continued approval, co-operation and helpful aid.

"Mrs. Dickinson's determination, in October, to retire from her active responsibilities, despite our high appreciation of her long years of faithful and efficient service, made it necessary for Mrs. Barclay, Librarian, to readjust the operations of her Staff. The addition of Mrs. Charlotte Olney has been most fortunate and helpful; her Children's Story Hour, so successful in November and December, will be renewed in February. Miss Tabor's duties have been expanded. Certainly our Librarian is to be congratulated!

"It is with regret I must report unexpected delay has occurred in construction of the new room for children, which we hoped would be ready at this time. This is attributable to what may be termed a technical civic problem. The difficulty has now been overcome and, as soon as weather permits, new drain pipes will be set and then construction will proceed rapidly. Unforeseen charges for this work, as well as for strengthening of floor supports installed last week, will further complicate our financial problems this year.

"Walter Croft, who so generously contributed plans for the Children's Room, has been following these re-construction and new building activities and we are extremely grateful for his interest and assistance.

"We are hopeful that many of our friends will voluntarily give generous recognition to our needs by making a special contribution to our Building Fund.

"Active interest has been shown in the Library's facilities by Parochial School and Riverton Public School Instructors who brought various classes to our Building during Book Week Celebration.

"Mr. Capehart, Mr. Rogers and Mrs. Chalmers have been especially active and importantly helpful in our affairs throughout the year. House Committee Chairman, Mrs. Lueders and Publicity Chairman, Mr. Metzger, have handled their responsibilities effectively and efficiently. So I want to thank all of you, Members of the Board, our Librarian, Mrs. Barclay and her Staff for thoroughgoing interest and support."
