RIVERTON BUDGET HEARING SLATED

The proposed 1957 Budget of the Borough of Riverton is published in full in this issue of The New Era. A public hearing on the budget will be held in the Borough Office, Riverton Fire House, at 9 p.m. on Thursday, March 7

The explanatory statement accompanying the budget is as follows:

"Each item of revenue and appro-priation has been carefully considered and it is anticipated that the tax rate for local municipal purposes will be \$2.22 for each one hundred dol-lars of assessable valuations, which is \$.03 higher than the 1956 rate.

"The preparation of this budget is closely integrated with the proposed issuance of the sewage disposal plant bonds planned for early spring, and every consideration has been given every consideration has been given to that fact. An appropriation of \$20,000 is included in this budget to reduce the present bond anticipation notes of \$250,000, which will then make it necessary to permanently fund only \$230,000. "Through careful planning and fi-pancing it is one anticipated that

nancing, it is now anticipated that the final bond issue will amount to only \$230,000, compared to the \$340,-000 as originally authorized for this purposes. Current operating surplus funds have consistently been applied to this end".
