Proposal to Require That All Canines Be Vaccinated Meets Approval

The Boards of Health, town officials and police officials of River-Cinnaminson, met at the office of Dr. Harry L. Rogers Monday evening of this week to see what could be done about the nuisance of dogs running loose, not registered or vaccinated against rables and endangering the lives of other dogs and people. known that the second issue of Haiti the perforated stamps of 1882 pro-vide a number of interesting forgervide a number of interesting forgeries which were made not to deceive collectors, but to defraud the government of he time. They are fairly close copies of the genuine stamps and they seem to have been used over a peroid of about four years—from 1886 to 1890. At first it was considered they were perfectly legi-timate stamps produced locally but eventually a Mr. Moens was able to prove their proper status conclus-ively. These fraudulent labels were produced by lithography, the design being transferred to the stone on its entirety, so that there were no varties in the numerals and shield such as found on the genuine stamps.
The perforations are also different. Those of the genuine stamps are 12½ while the forgeries are either 14 or 15½. Once in a while one finds these

The term "high speed," so freely used in discussing the project, means nothing.
