### FIRE DAMAGES **BISHOP HOME**

The first bad fire that Riverton has experienced in many months caused extensive damage to the residence of William B. Bishop, corner Linden avenue and the south side of Broad street, early Saturday after-noon of last week. Practically the entire roof was off and there was also heavy damage caused by fire and water on the second floor. The first floor was damaged by water

Of unknown origin, the blaze probably started on shingles and burned quickly into the interior. It had gained tremendous headway be-fore being discovered. The Riverton Fire Department, after a quick run following the alarm, found the entire south side of the roof a mass of flames and within a minute or two this entire part of the structure was enveloped in a roaring mass of fire

#### Four Hose Lines

The blaze was fought with three lines of 21/2 inch hose and a 11/2 inch line from the booster tank of the ladder truck. One pumper was located at the hydrant at Harrison and Linden, while the other was stationed at Harrison and Thomas, the plug next nearest to the fire. The heavy stream of water soon knocked down the flames, but the firemen remained on the scene well into the afternoon before the last embers were extinguished.

So rapid was the spread of the fire that little furniture could be removed from the dwelling.

Shortly after the recall from the Bishop fire the Riverton Company

also answered a call for a grass fire off Thomas avenue, near Pourth.

The Palmyra firemen were also out extinguishing a field fire at the same time as the major blaze in Riverton.





Offier gave the annual report of the work of the Social Service Department for 1941.

"The number of new patients coming to us for help was about the same as the preceding year and the total number of visits made to the clinic remained about the same. I feel the reason for this very definitely is the fact that most everyone is working who is employable and practically every family has bettered their earnings in one way or another. With this increased income, the family physicians are called in attendance and frequently we are only called upon for specialized treatment or diagnostic examinations.

"During the year two additional clinics were added to our list. The Venereal Clinic, which had been discontinued in 1940, was re-established under the supervision of the State Health Department. This is one of five Venereal Clinics set up in the county.

"The other clinic, more recently established, is the Tumor Clinic. Heretofore Burlington County Hospital had not the necessary facilities for the treatment of such cases. Now that deep x-ray therapy has been installed, and radium made available, we are able to treat as well as diagnose malignant tumors.
