### **ARMISTICE DAY PROGRAM**

Captain Victor Guinness, of the erick M. Rodgers American Legion Post 156, of Palmyra and Riverton, on Sunday afternoon in the Palmy-ra High School auditorium. The affair is expected to attract a large gathering, in observance of the ending of the last war, for the safe return of those who fight for our country in this war, and for a restoration of peace. According to the commit-tee in charge, headed by George M. Durgin, every home and family should be represented at the affair which will start at 3 p.m.

"Vic" as almost everyone in the newspaper world knew him prior to his joining the U.S. Marines, is William Henry Victor Guinness, art dfrector of the Marine Corps Publicity Bureau. His job includes the creating of service posters for the corps, and the painting of the service portraits of the general officers.

He entered the last war in 1917, going to France as a camouflage expert and observer. The Germans captured him in No Man's Land while he was making observations from a disabled German tank. He escaped the Germans twice, and was caught twice. Following the Armistice of the last war, it took him 18 months to recover from the injuries. He assisted Frank Godwin, the famous illustrator, in teaching drawing to disabled veterans. He has been employed on a Philadelphia newspaper staff, illustrating his own theatrical and sports writings; a member of the art staff of magazines and several daily newspapers.

The Republicans swept to an impressive victory in the 11 election districts of Palmyra, Riverton and Cinnaminson at the general election on Tuesday of this week, when all G.O.P. candidates received a fine maiority in this section.

Albert Hawkes, Republican candidate for the United States Senate, captured every district except the Palmyra 1st, from his Democratic opponent, William Smathers. The vote was close in two others.

The remainder of the Republican slate won by majorities that went as high as 7 to 1 in several districts. The county vote was Hawkes-17,-627; Smathers-11,504.
