## CHRISTMAS MAIL FOR SERVICE MEN

The Christmas shopping season is here—even though the weather is still warm.

Mailing of gifts for Army and Navy personnel overseas must begin by September 15, if many of the men and women in our armed services are not to be disappointed; and September 15 is less than a month away.

Christmas gifts may be mailed by parcel post to Army men and women overseas only between September 15 and October 15. After the latter date, such parcels may not be mailed unless a written request from the soldier for the article is presented with each parcel. No soldier should have to ASK for a Christmas gift; so gifts must be mailed on time. The Navy also urges that gifts be mailed between September 15 and October 15.

Reasons for the early mailing dates are: The vast distances that the parcels must travel to reach our men at war fronts and stations the world over; frequent transfers of thousands of men from one location to another, which means forwarding of the mail and consumes additional time; the necessity for giving preference to reinforcements, arms, munitions, medicine and food in allotment of shipping space, which often means that the shipments of gifts must wait. And it is most urgent that gifts be delivered to the men IN TIME FOR CHRISTMAS, to keep their spirit high.

The only way to insure against disappointment for the fighting men is to buy at once and mail early—mail your gifts as soon as possible after the September 15 starting date.

### In Many Countries

Those who have relatives or friends in the service should remember that we have fighting men in Alaska, Greenland, Iceland, England, Sicily, far-separated regions of Africa, the Near Eastern countries, Australia, many of the South Pacific islands, India, China, South America, and other areas.

Weeks are required for a ship to reach many of these stations. There can be no assurance, of course, that the first ship sailing for any of these locations will have space available to carry Christmas parcels. Gifts may have to wait until vitally needed supplies and equipment have been shipped, to assure victory and to save the lives of our men. If the parcels are not mailed early, that delay may prove to be just enough to prevent their arrival by Christmas day, with consequent disappointment to the men who are offering their lives for their country and ours.

Mail of all kinds is vital to the spirit of fighting men. Every officer who has inspected our Army and Navy postal facilities overseas has reported that thousands of fighting men disregard mess call when it conflicts with mail call, and get their letters first. Officers at our large military and naval stations report that the spirit and efficiency of their men receive a distinct lift when mail is distributed, and that a delay in mail service caused a decided decline in spirit with a consequent letdown in efficiency.

A disconsolate soldier or sailor who thinks he has been forgotten at Christmas obviously is not at his best. So the gifts MUST be mailed on time so that they can arrive on time.

Rules for Christmas mailings to the fighting forces overseas are available at the post office.

## WACS PREFER OVERSEAS SERVICE

America may be, and no doubt is, a wonderful country in which to live, but the girls who constitute the Women's Army Corps would much rather be in England at the present time. This was one of the many interesting "inside views" presented to the local Rotary Club last Thursday evening by Lt. Ella R. Oberholtzer, Commander of the Recruiting Station for WACS in Camden, N. J.

Lt. Oberholtzer, who seemed to be far more interested in the wives and daughters of Rotarians than in the Rotarians themselves, painted a glowing picture of the work that could be done for Uncle Sam by the women of America who are qualified to take their place in the ranks of the WACS.

"Women can take the place of married men," she declared, "and at present they are doing so." She then indicated how important it is that the places of men be taken, not only in civilian life but also in the army, by the wives and daughters and sisters of America's men.

### Do Many Things

In the Army, women can displace men in secretarial positions, as typists, telephone operators, and even as air corps mechanics. They can drive trucks—even the two-and-a-half-ton variety, and serve as parachute riggers. Officers will soon be taking over operating jobs such as that of quartermaster, and will be filling many important positions at all army camps.

In a concise and businesslike way Lt. Oberholtzer summarized the qualifications for enrollment in the WAC. Wives as well as "bachelor girls" are eligible. The age limit embraces those between the ages of 20 and 49, but those who are under 21 must have the consent of their parents. Every "WAC," before acceptance, must pass a mental alertness test and a physical test; she must have had two years of high school or its equivalent, must have no children under 14 years of age and no dependents, and must be able to furnish high character references.

For a clear and accurate picture of "WAC" life, Lt. Oberholtzer suggested the reading of the book, "Yes, Ma'am" by Elizabeth Park.

Preceding the address of the evening, Dr. Charles S. Mills inducted Robert S. Fowles into membership in the Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club under the classification of "Variety Stores."

Blood plasma, obtained from civilian donors, is credited as being one of the most important factors in saving the lives of the wounded of our armed forces.

## LOCAL MAN APPOINTED TO MILITARY ACADEMY

Mercer and Burlington Counties split honors in Congressman D. Lane Powers' appointments to West Point for the Fourth Congressional District of New Jersey. Congressman Powers announced today from his office in Washington that the two young men who won his Principal appointments were J. Robert Taylor of Trenton, and J. Robert Lilley, of Riverton. J. Robert Taylor won with a mark of 83.00 in the Civil Service competitive examination and J. Robert Lilley won with a mark of 76.00.

The Alternates appointed to J. Robert Taylor were Alan Cooper of Palmyra with a mark of 73.75 as First Alternate, Robert J. Klatzkin of Trenton with a mark of 65.00 as Second Alternate. The Alternates appointed to J. Robert Lilley were William B. Gibbs of Trenton with a mark of 68.50 as First Alternate, and Raymond Leroy Eggert, Jr., of Trenton with a mark of 62.75 as Second Alternate.

The Congressman has sent all appointments to the War Department in Washington. The candidates will take mental entrance examinations next spring for entrance to the military Academy in July.

All the competitive examination papers corrected by the Civil Service Commission for Congressman Powers will be held in the Congressional office at Washington for a period of thirty days where any and all may be examined by any competitor or his representative.

## PALMYRA PILOT

KILLED IN ASIA  
Lieut. William Van Sant, 22, Army Air Corps, son of Councilman and Mrs. W. Paul Van Sant, of 417 Garfield avenue, Palmyra, has been killed in action in the Asiatic theatre, the War Department has notified his parents.

Van Sant was the pilot of a transport plane. A telegram was received Thursday notifying his parents that he was missing. The second telegram was received Sunday.

Van Sant entered the service June 22, 1942, and received his wings last March at Napier Field, Ala.

He was a graduate of Palmyra High School and attended the Wharton School, University of Pennsylvania. In addition to his parents he is survived by a sister, Mary.

## PALMYRA RESERVE POLICE ACTIVE

One of the most active units of the civilian defense organizations in this section is the group comprising the Palmyra Auxiliary Police, with 25 members doing regular duty at frequent intervals.

So keen is the interest in the unit, according to Captain Joseph Rodgers, of the regular police force, that the auxiliaries have a waiting list of prospective members.

Every night several members of the reserves go on duty with the regular force and perform such tasks as patrolling, traffic direction, etc. Since June 20, target practice has been held each Sunday morning.

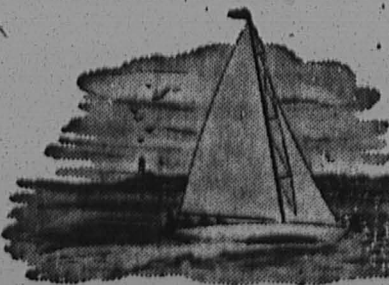

right where they have been planted for as long as five years. When they are finally dug for replanting, they will have increased considerably and the gardener will have many more bulbs than he started with. Since narcissus make root growth early, fall is the time to provide them with a moderate amount of fertilizer. This is one of the best seasons of the year to transplant woody ornamentals, particularly broadleaved evergreens such as rhododendrons, azaleas, and Mountain Laurel, and narrow leaved evergreens such as hemlocks, pines, spruces, and retinosporas. Of course, the soil must be moist, so that the plants can be moved with a ball of soil about their roots, and moisture must be present to enable them to establish themselves. Evergreens should have at least six weeks between the time they are planted and the time the soil freezes to become established and prepared to withstand the winter. They should be mulched after they are planted.

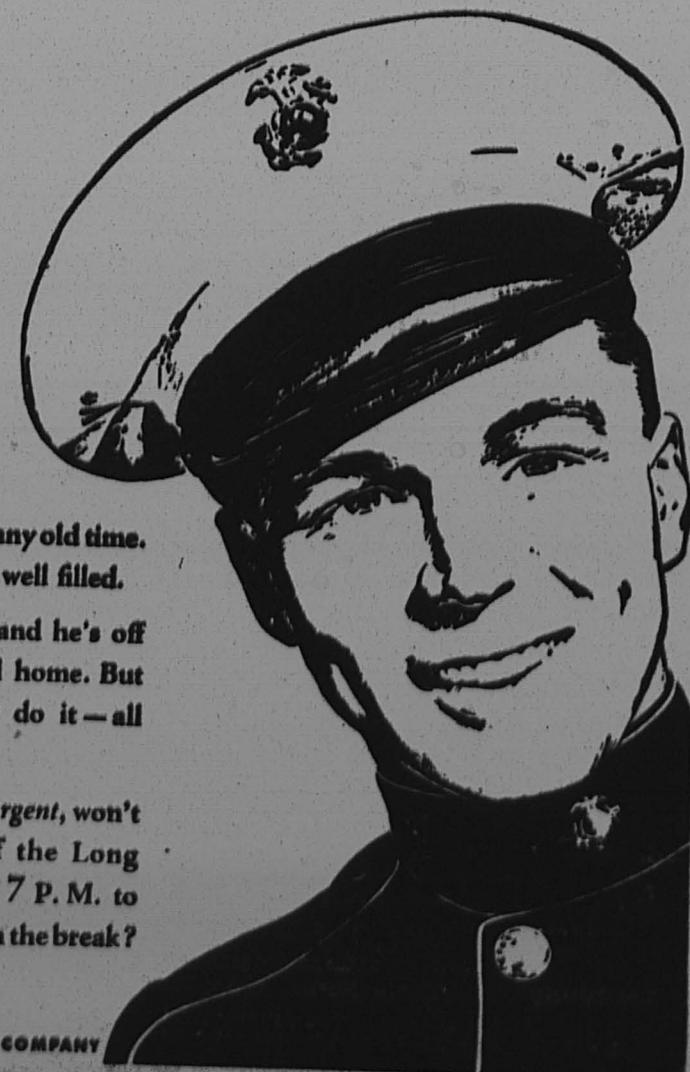

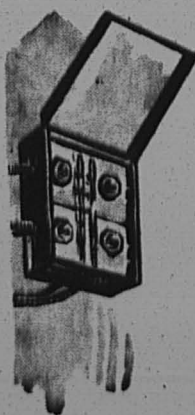

### State Constitution

"The electors of New Jersey are now facing the most important question with which they have been confronted since 1844—whether or not they shall authorize the incoming legislature to submit at the 1944 general election for adoption or rejection as a whole, a new Constitution."

This was the categorical assertion of Mr. J. Matlack Stackhouse, member of the New Jersey bar, in his address to the local Rotary Club last Thursday evening on the subject of Constitutional revision.

The speaker came out very definitely in favor of a new constitution for the State of New Jersey, and furnished a variety of carefully thought out reasons to justify his position.

Adopted in 1844

Recalling the nature of the political and social background that influenced the character of the existing Constitution, adopted in 1844, Mr. Stackhouse pointed out that at that time there were two distinct schools of political thought, the Hamiltonian and the Jeffersonian. Extreme emphasis on individual and property rights won the day, with the result that in the Constitution as adopted legislative and judicial powers were strictly limited, so that they might not interfere with the liberties of the people. To amend the Constitution became almost impossible, as it took two years to amend, and a new amendment could only be added once in five years. In fact, there have been only two amendments to the Constitution in nearly a century. The Governor does have the power of veto, but his veto can be overridden by a simple majority. Because of these limitations, and of other factors of a similar nature, the speaker concluded and declared that the Constitution was outdated in many respects, so much so that more than amendment was needed. We ought to have a new Constitution, completely revised, but still retaining as a safeguard the Bill of Rights and the legislative representation as prescribed by the present Constitution.

#### Cumbersome

Supporting his contention that the existing Constitution is cumbersome, inefficient and altogether too expensive to the taxpayer, the speaker cited several rather startling facts pertaining to the judiciary. The State of New Jersey has the largest court (16 judges) of any corresponding area in the English-speaking world. It has six lay-judges in addition and this makes legal procedure cumbersome. It still has separate courts, such as the old medieval Court of Chancery which has long since been discontinued in England, the place of its origin. Its justices are more highly paid than any in the United States, with one exception. The entire court costs \$250,000 per year; twice that of New York State, which has four times the judicial business, and one and a half times that of Pennsylvania which has twice the judicial business. (These figures refer to salary costs alone.)

In the legislative branch, Mr. Stackhouse also pointed out many weaknesses such as the requirement that many non-political positions must be confirmed by the State Senator, a provision that permits personal prejudice to take precedence over State interest.

"After the war," the speaker concluded, "we are going to pass into an era of democracy—and democracy means 'individual enrichment.' Americans are reaching for that enrichment. During the last year the best-sellers were the Bible, five million copies, 'The Robe,' two million copies, and 'One World.' This fact alone indicates what the people of America want. A new Constitution will raise us to a higher level of spirituality. It must be simple, understandable, efficient and economical."

On Saturday, August 28th, Mr. Taylor, Sectional Fire Warden, gave a demonstration to the campers on methods of fighting forest fires. The Boy Scout campers put on a fire drill for him and Mr. Taylor spoke very highly of the fine demonstration they put on. He was very much impressed.

The Camping and Activities Committee had a meeting at the Boy Scout Reservation on Friday evening, August 27th, at which time plans were developed for 1944. The Committee made an unofficial inspection of the Camp.

Without the semblance of a contest for any local offices and little competition for the county and state Republican slate, the quietest Primary election in years is forecast for Riverton and Cinnaminson. The situation in Palmyra should be somewhat livelier, since a spirited battle for municipal posts is anticipated.

In that community, Mayor John F. Ward, candidate for the Republican nomination for Mayor, is opposed by George N. Wimer, a former Sheriff of Burlington county and also a former Mayor. The Republican candidates for Council are Wesley P. Huyett, John C. Noone, Joseph L. Stack and Arthur P. Wright. Two nominations are to be made.

Republican party leaders, however, are appealing to the voters to go to the polls, become permanently registered and cast a vote for the unopposed Harmony Group ticket.

Walter E. Edge, the Republican candidate for Governor, while Assemblyman Arthur W. Lewis, of Riverton, is unopposed for renomination to the Assembly. There are three candidates for the Coroner nomination, the aspirants being Joseph D. Weber, Max Kaye and Robert F. Myers. Louis T. Klauder and Stanley I. Russ are the Freeholder candidates.

For the State Committee, Pearl M. Bridgeum and Norman F. S. Russell are unopposed.

Democrat Vincent J. Murphy is the Democratic candidate for Governor, while Edwin B. Perry for member of the General Assembly. The party has no members in the field for Coroner or Freeholders.

Howard E. Powell, George M. Hillman and James Kenney, Jr., are in the field for male member of the State Committee, while Helen M. Rahn and Mabel E. Murphy are the female contestants.

In Riverton, J. W. Sylvester is the Republican candidate for Mayor, while David F. Gould and George T. Becton running for the councilmanic nominations. All are unopposed.

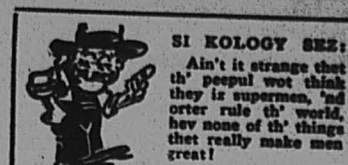

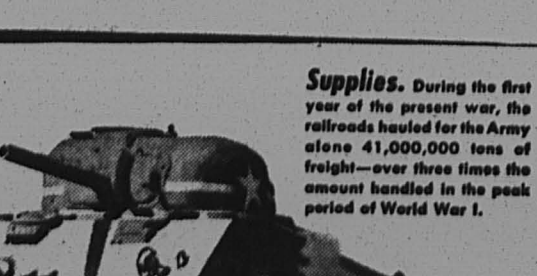

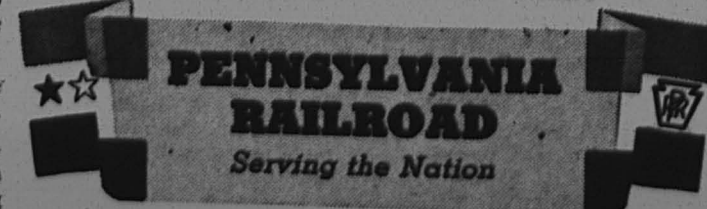

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## LEGISLATIVE HOKUM

There is pending before the Congress which will soon reassemble a measure called a "Grade Labeling" bill. This description fools many consumers. The proposed legislation for more complete governmental control of canning goes far beyond compulsory designation of the quality and contents of cans, which every sensible, disinterested person would approve. It is in fact a Brand and Trademark Destroying Bill.

Over a long period of years the buyer of canned goods has come to associate brands and trademarks with uniform quality. The brand is a guarantee that the article which appeals to the taste of the consumer is always up to his expectations in excellence and in flavor. He relied upon it last year; he will rely upon it next year; and he won't be fooled. Some other titling it to grade as tops, but it won't be the same—it won't be exactly what the consumer is used to and wants.

Step outside the field of canning a moment and see what the brand name means. Mr. A owns a canoe. Mr. B owns an Oldtown canoe. Mr. A's canoe may be very good, but you would rather own Mr. B's. Why? Because of the reputation and experience for which the brand stands. Many processors have spent over the years vast sums educating the public as to what their particular brands stand for. Now the Government proposes to step in and destroy this investment under pretense of aiding the consumer. This is neither a square deal nor common sense. It would rob the consumer as well as the processor of an asset.

Certainly the consumer is entitled to know what he is buying—whether Grade A, Grade B, Grade C or sub-standard according to Government ratings. But he is also entitled to know all about the qualities for which the brand name with which he is familiar stands.

Congressmen who support the misnamed Grade Labeling bill in its present form will be doing their constituents a distinct disservice.

## REQUESTS RETURN OF EXCESS GAS COUPONS

T. Curtis Flynn, Chairman of Burlington County War Price and Ration Board No. 2434 today requested all holders of B and C gasoline rations to return to the Board any excess allotment of gas stamps issued to them as a means of offsetting the recent order received by the Board.

Mr. Flynn says our Board has just been ordered to reduce the allotment of gasoline to B and C holders by 14,278 gallons per month.

This is in keeping with a National movement to cut down on the consumption of gasoline. If the saving cannot be effected by this means, then it will be necessary for the Board to arbitrarily cut B and C holders to affect this 14,278 gallon per month saving.

The stamps should be returned as soon as possible to the Board, with the name of the holder.

August 24th, six canteen members prepared and served refreshments at Tilton General Hospital, given by the Grey Ladies for convalescent patients.

September 13th, Made sandwiches and coffee and served fire fighters in cranberry bogs near Tabernacle, where ground fires threatened this year's cranberry crop.

September 14th, Canteen served regular weekly luncheon at Chapter House—serving 19.

Camp and Hospital Council

Mrs. F. W. Metzger, chairman, reported that two radios and several articles of furniture had been offered for Recreation Rooms at Fort Dix.

## Home Nursing

Mrs. John P. Abell, Chairman. Plans are being made for new classes in Home Nursing, in Cinnaminson Schools No. 2 and No. 4, also in Riverton Public, with Mrs. Charles F. Stewart as instructor.

## Home Service

Mrs. Charles Yost, Chairman, spends all Fridays and one Saturday morning at Beverly Chapter House. She has made 20 calls and given 44 service hours this month.

## Hospital and Recreation

Mrs. Harold N. Sheble, Chairman. Five workers gave 41 and a half service hours. Riverton Grey Ladies go to Station Hospital at Fort Dix each Monday. They visit the boys in the wards, taking them magazines, books, cigarettes, sometimes candy. Some teach the boys to make leather belts, wallets and picture frames. Others play games or just talk with the boys, whatever is wanted in the different wards.

## Junior Red Cross

She explained the plan worked out by the Riverton School to assist in the waste fat salvage. It is hoped that the talk assisted the rest of the County in organizing their waste program.

## Motor Corps

Mrs. Herbert M. Kieckhefer, Chairman. Motor Corps has answered practically all service requests. Clinic patients are taken to Burlington County Hospital and each Tuesday at least one member is on duty at Beverly Chapter House. Some have helped with Blood Donor days in other communities of the County. Home Service workers have been taken on their calls. Production and materials have been carried to and from the Chapter House. Staff Assistants are taken regularly to Mt. Holly where they are met by a representative from Fort Dix who takes them to the Field Directors office for special work. Canteen workers have

been taken to their assignments and on several occasions special trips have been made at the request of the County.

Mr. Dwight Tuttle, Scoutmaster of the Riverton Troop, has suggested that the boys take care of washing, polishing and cleaning the Riverton Red Cross Station Wagon. His plan has been accepted with gratitude and once a week a group will be assigned that work. During August, 8 workers gave 131 and three-quarter hours and made 97 calls. Mileage for August, Station Wagon—1134 miles; Private cars—127 miles.

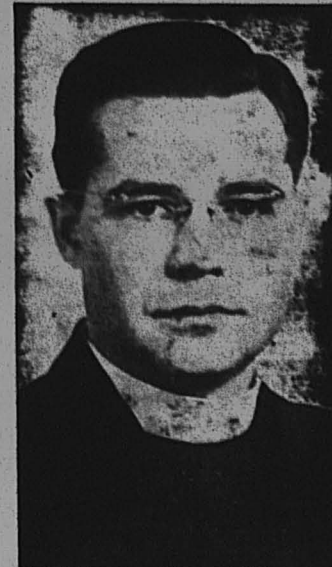
**ALFRED J. WILKINSON, JR.**

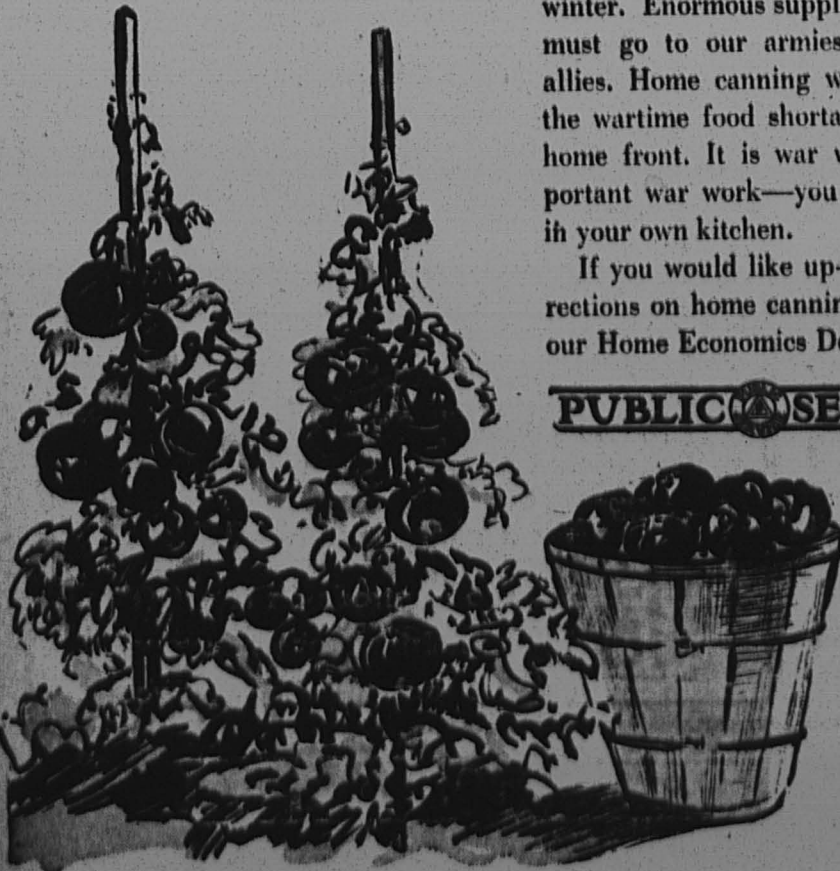
