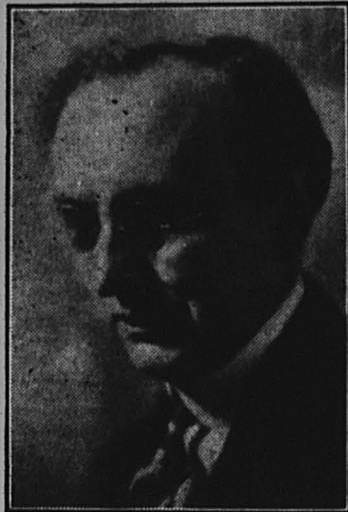

ROLLO F. MAITLAND, Mus. D. of Philadelphia, one of the country's leading organists, who will give a recital in Calvary Presbyterian Church, Riverton, on Tuesday evening, October 26, at 8:30 o'clock.

Mr. Maitland, who is also a pianist, composer and teacher, was born in the country, near Williamsport, Pa. He gave evidence of musical talent early in life. His father was his first teacher and under his tutorage the boy first appeared in public, playing on a small reed organ at an educational gathering held near his home.

Young Maitland derived much pleasure from playing on the reed organ that stood in his home. A number of instruction books contained ideas on tone coloring by means of combining various stops. He imagined wonderful musical effects and longed to play on an instrument that could give expression to these ideas.

When thirteen years of age he enrolled in a private school in Philadelphia to continue his general education and music studies. David D. Wood, noted organist and teacher, and one of the pioneer interpreters of Bach in America, was in charge of the music department, and with him the young man studied piano, organ, harmony, and composition. He studied violin with Henry Hahn and later with his son, Frederick E. Hahn, acquiring proficiency adequate to the public performance of the difficult Mendelssohn and Beethoven Concertos.

Located in Philadelphia

After graduation Dr. Maitland located in Philadelphia, where he became active in the musical profession. In 1901, while still at school, he assumed the regular duties of a church organist. He is at present organist of the Church of the New Jerusalem, (Swedenborgian), in Philadelphia, where a large four-manual organ, designed by him, was installed to meet his needs. He is also at present organist and director of music pro tem at St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Philadelphia, filling the place of a pupil of his who is in the service.

In 1905 he won the degree of Fellow of the American Guild of Organists, the highest degree conferred by that organization, and in 1937 the same body awarded him the choir-masters' Certificate. In 1930 the Philadelphia Musical Academy conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Music.

He played and taught the violin for a number of years but abandoned this activity to devote his time to piano, organ, and composition.

In 1911 Dr. Maitland took a special course in piano technique with D. Hendrik Ezerman and has given several successful piano recitals. In 1920 he came under the influence of Dr. Frederick W. Schlieder, and gave successful recitals in England and Switzerland. He has played publicly many of the largest organs in this country, including the two great Wanamaker organs in Philadelphia and New York, the great organs in the Philadelphia and Atlantic City convention halls, the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York, Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh, and Medinah Temple, Chicago. SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

At the meeting of the Riverton Board of Education held on Monday night of this week, the supervising principal, Miss Caroline M. Staman reported that the enrollment to date was 198, a slight decrease from last year.

It was also reported that 124 students from the community are enrolled at Palmyra High School. The tuition this year, according to William H. Bottger, district clerk, will be \$137.86 per pupil as compared with \$127.43 last year.

Bond Sales Top Quota

Riverton went over the top in the Third War Loan Campaign which closed last Saturday, exceeding its quota by several thousand dollars, the final total in sales amounting to \$108,963 according to a report issued this week by Howard B. Conover, local chairman of the drive.

Of this amount, the Cinnaminson Bank and Trust Co. sold over \$94,000, while the Riverton post office sales were over \$14,000.

The bank also sold bonds in the amount of \$16,420 to Palmyra residents and these sales were credited to that community.

Those who assisted in the campaign and those who purchased bonds can feel proud that the borough has again demonstrated its whole-hearted support of the war effort.

was one of Philadelphia's leading theatre organists, but now devotes his time to church and recital work, also the teaching of organ, piano, and creative musical expression. He has also made a study of choral work, having been associated with leaders in this field.

For two weeks in July, 1942, and also two weeks this past August Dr. Maitland played daily recitals on the Wanamaker organ in Philadelphia, rated as the greatest organ in the world. He has played there also many times during the last winter, and also broadcast a series of recitals from the Columbia Broadcasting System's Frequency Modulation Station in Philadelphia. He has also lectured frequently on musical subjects before the National Association of Organists, the American Guild of Organists, and other organizations.

LOCAL CHURCH HAS TOWER CHIMES

The newly installed tower chimes at Calvary Presbyterian Church, Riverton, were played for the first time last Friday evening and were again used Sunday before the morning service.

The admirable tone of the equipment and its extensive range caused much favorable comment from residents of the community who listened to the various selections.

When all installations have been completed the chimes can be heard not only from the church tower but also in the church school auditorium and in the gymnasium where separate amplifiers have been placed. In addition it will be possible for the choir to broadcast anthems or Christmas Carols from the tower for the benefit of those who are confined to their homes. Hearing aids will also be installed in the pews and will be individually controlled.

The chimes will be formally dedicated when all installations and tests have been completed.

The new equipment together with the beautiful new pipe organ completes the J. Paul Roney Memorial given by Mrs. J. Paul Roney, of Riverton. The organ was dedicated last June.

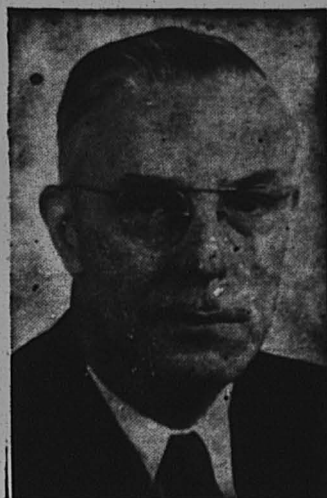
The Mobile Canteen newly donated to Burlington County was on display on the grounds of the Porch Club and everyone was invited to inspect it.

ROTARY SPEAKER



For many years Lincoln H. Lippincott, national secretary of the "Not Over 50" Club, and a consulting safety engineer, has travelled widely over the United States, trying to convince all Americans of "the glamor of safety."

He has spoken on this subject more than a thousand times in the past few years, and last Thursday evening addressed the local Rotary Club, choosing as his subject, "Frontiers of Freedom."

"Our boyhood frontier," Mr. Lippincott recalled, "was Chicago or out West. Today we think of our frontier as being on Guadalcanal or the Aleutians, but in reality the frontiers of freedom are right here, in our backyards and in our minds."

Developing this thought, Mr. Lippincott suggested as the basic requirements for frontier life self-reliance and conservation. Whatever is used on the frontier must be replenished. Frontiersmen are independent, but they are also interdependent. They have to look out for each other.

Today there is not quite as much automobile traffic as there was two years ago, but drivers can not afford to be less vigilant because of that fact. Last year, in spite of the lower flow of highway traffic there were half as many people killed in New Jersey as were lost altogether in the taking of Tunisia.

No Complacency

We cannot afford to be complacent. We cannot disband our safety councils just because there are no accidents in the particular town in which they function. When the record is good in any town, that is the time for the safety council to become more vigilant than ever.

In concluding, the speaker stressed the value of leadership on the part of adults. It is not enough to tell children what to do in order to promote safety. They must be shown, by example. Our big task is "to sell people the glamor of safety."

Many will recall that Mr. Lippincott, who is now nationally known in safety circles, and who is a forceful and eloquent speaker, graduated from the Palmyra High School in 1916. A few of his former classmates were present to meet him and hear his address.

REV. ROBERT B. STUART NAMED MODERATOR

The Rev. Robert B. Stewart, pastor of the Calvary Presbyterian Church of Riverton was elected Moderator of the Presbytery of Monmouth at the Fall meeting of Presbytery held in Hightstown, New Jersey, September 28.

The Presbytery of Monmouth, which extends from the Delaware River to the Atlantic coast and contains more than fifty Presbyterian churches, is in area the largest Presbytery in the State of New Jersey.

This high honor is notable in view of the fact that Mr. Stewart has been a member of the Presbytery of Monmouth only since September of last year.

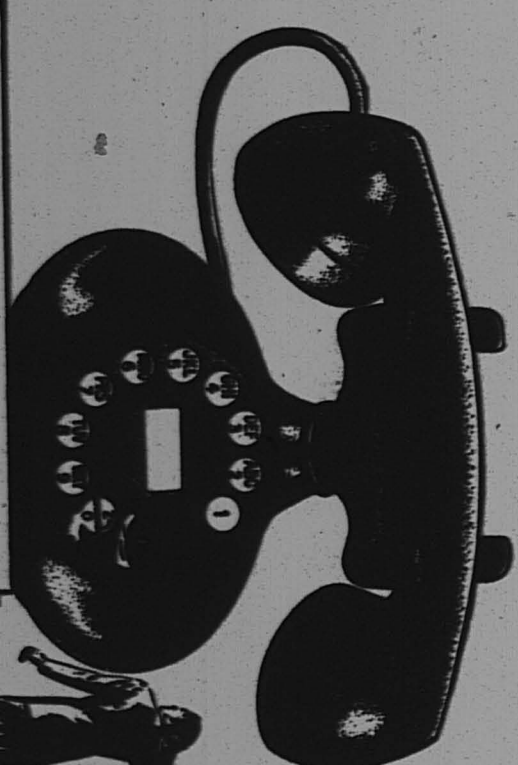

ORGAN RECITAL

Dr. Rolfo F. Maitland, Fellow of the American Guild of Organists, an organist of international reputation, who will play a recital in Calvary Presbyterian Church, Riverton, Tuesday, October 26, has made a special study of the art of improvisation, creating a composition in form at the instrument on the spur of the moment. When but a boy of some eight or nine years he was on one occasion playing on the small reed organ near his home. After he had finished his father said, "That was good, what was it?" The boy, knowing that it was no piece he had heard or learned, was at a loss for a reply. His father asked him to play it again but this proved impossible. Young Maitland had improvised the composition. He has developed this talent until at the present time his ability along this line is recognized both in America and Europe, and he frequently receives requests for improvisations on his recital programs. He has many times improvised symphonies in three and four movements.

Comments

Samuel L. Laciar commented as follows in the Evening Ledger: Mr. Maitland's improvisation was a masterly one, working the themes into an elaborate and finely balanced composition in strict sonata form with relation to tonality, repetition of the thematic material, et cetera, and employing almost every device of composition as well as making the work entirely original in every detail. It was a splendid piece of work.

Dr. Herbert Sanders wrote in the Ottawa (Canada) Journal: "Mr. Maitland's musicianship was further demonstrated by a clever and telling improvisation... He brought to his difficult task all the factors of true musicianship as well as all the elements of a subconscious virtuosity." The recital will begin at 8:30. A free-will offering will be taken.

CONSTITUTION REVISION

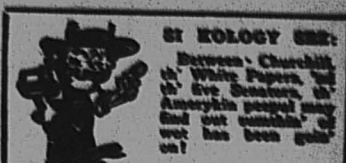

DR. KASER IS ROTARY SPEAKER

Dr. Louis J. Kaser, Superintendent of Schools in Burlington County, told Palmyra-Riverton Rotarians about the local development of transportation as applied to schools. Burlington County, he related, was one of the pioneers in the use of horse drawn vehicles for the purpose of carrying children to school, which fact was featured in the Philadelphia papers in the year 1897. The Club was honored by the presence of Sergeant Louis Gillingham of the Air Corps, who is stationed in Miami Beach, Florida, but whose home is in Riverside. Former Long Branch Rotarian, Rev. Neil Kaser, who is now the Methodist pastor in Palmyra, was also a welcome guest. William G. Seither, many years a Palmyra resident, was inducted into membership under the classification Plumbing and Heating Supplies—Distributing.

Dr. Kaser pointed out in his interesting talk, that it was the development of transportation which made better schools possible. The whole movement for the consolidation of small rural schools was greatly accelerated by the perfection of the auto bus. Cinnaminson Township, he said, was one of the first districts in Burlington County to close schools for consolidation and they used a horse drawn carry-all to transport the children.

1916-1929 was the period during which great strides were made in consolidation and practically all one-room rural schools were eliminated. This last spring saw the last two-room school discontinued in Burlington County.

Dr. Kaser described the gradual development of bus transportation, starting with the open auto truck until the present day modern type of bus was designed. The latter seats from 50 to 55 children. Burlington County has 85 school buses of which 36 are owned by the school districts themselves; they travel approximately 530,000 miles a year.

A Pioneer

Dr. Kaser has been one of the pioneers in New Jersey on school bus transportation and has been influential in making certain that essential factors were always kept before the bus builders. School buses, for instance, are painted yellow because careful experimentation by the nation's railroads showed that yellow could be seen better than any other color in foggy weather. Dr. Kaser said that unfortunately many safety appliances on buses came only as a result of accidents. The National Safety Council when it became concerned with the matter of school transportation took over New Jersey's rules for the safety of school buses almost verbatim.

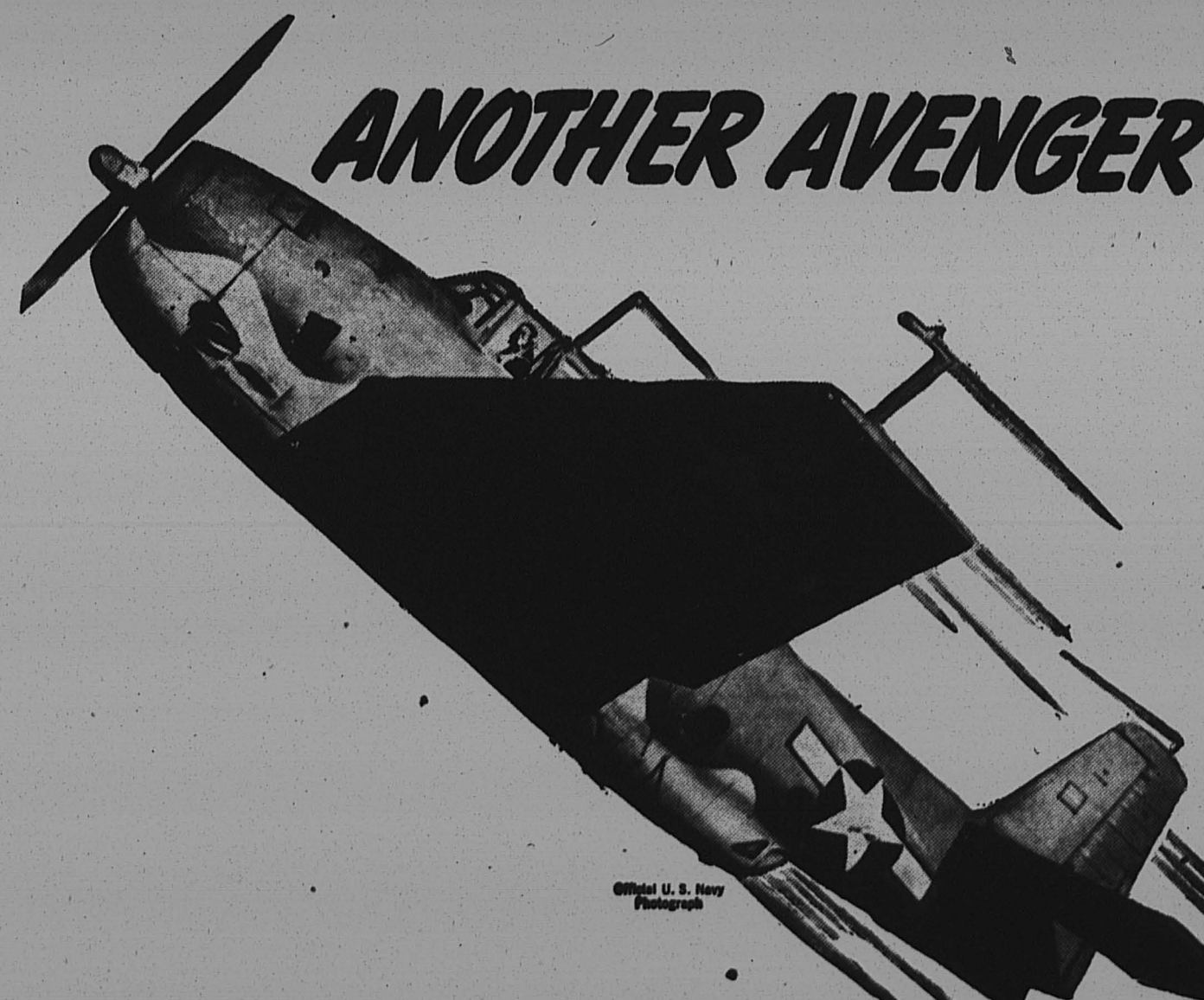

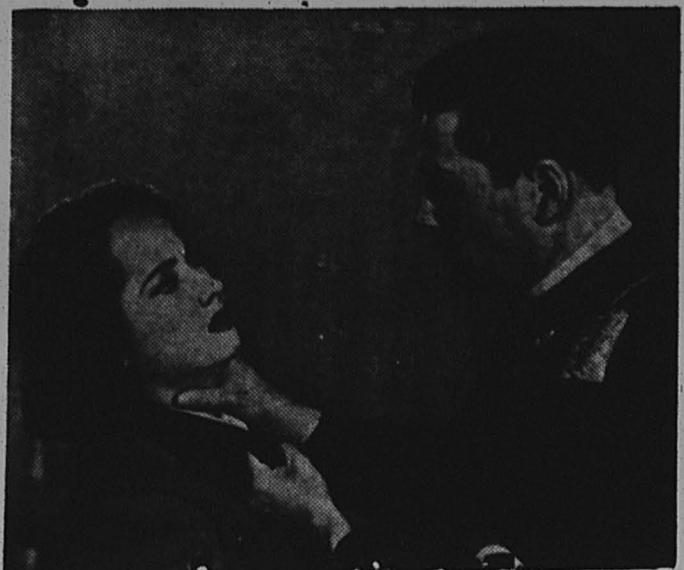

CARELESS DRIVER

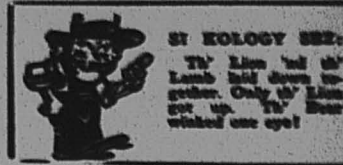

Campaigns Combined

Due to the fact that the National War Fund Campaign and the annual drive for the Riverton-Cinnaminson Community Chest are scheduled for the same period, officials in charge of both projects have agreed to combine their efforts in one campaign which will start November 1.

The application for War Ration Book No. 4 must be filed in by an adult member of the family for whom application is being made. Only one application form is needed for the entire family. The family includes all persons related by blood, marriage or adoption who regularly live in the same house. It also includes members of the family who are temporarily away from home but who expect to return within sixty days. They should bring War Ration Book No. 3 for each person for whom they desire to make application for War Ration Book No. 4. Anyone who was serving overseas and does not have War Ration Book No. 3 should apply at their local rationing board for Book No. 3 immediately. If Book No. 3 has been lost an application for a replacement should be made at your local board immediately. Book No. 4 will be begun beginning Monday, November 1st, for buying rationed processed foods and sugar.

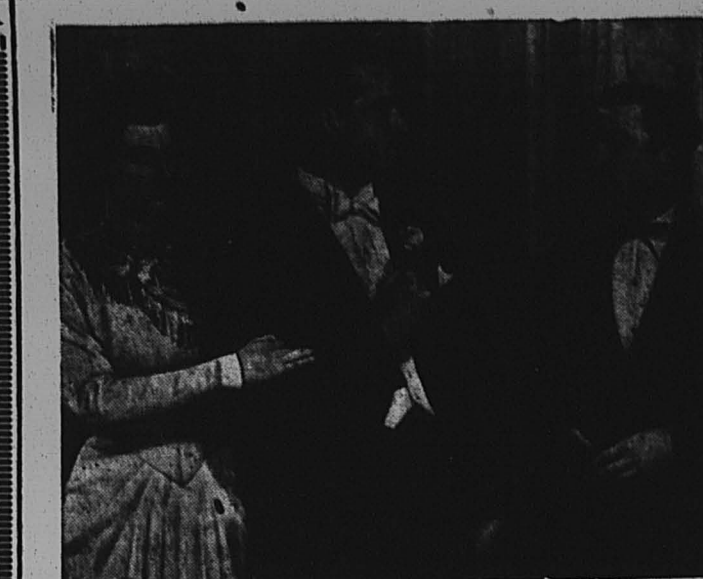

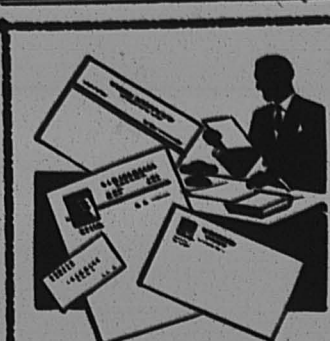

RAESLY RESIGNS AS
POWERS SECRETARY

Congressman D. Lane Powers announced today that he has accepted "with deepest regret" the resignation of Leon Raesly as his Congressional Secretary.

The Congressman stated that Mr. Raesly resigned so as to devote his entire attention to his private business. Mr. Raesly is President of Leon Raesly Organization, Inc., a public relations, publicity and advertising organization, with offices at 710 Colorado Building, Washington, D. C.

The Congressman announced that Mr. Raesly's resignation took effect October first.

Mr. Raesly went to Washington with Congressman Powers when he first took office on March 4, 1943, and has been Secretary to the Congressman ever since. Mr. Raesly is a resident of Burlington and formerly was associate editor of the Burlington Daily Enterprise and a sub-editor on the Camden Courier.

"Leon and I both regret sincerely that the pressure of his private business makes it necessary for him to surrender the management of my Congressional office," the Congressman said today. "I can understand very well how it has been necessary for him to take this step and his leaving me will, in no way, affect the very warm friendship that has developed between us during our eleven years of close association. I wish him every possible success in his business."

Speaking of his resignation, Mr. Raesly said today:

"It was the most difficult decision we ever had to make. Lane Powers is, in my opinion, one of the most valuable Members of Congress, and I wish it had been possible for me to so arrange my affairs that I could continue to work with him in the interests of the Fourth District of New Jersey. Because I am no longer on the Congressional payroll does not mean, in any way, that the Chief will not have in the future, as he has had in the past, my entire support. I predict that Congressman Powers will have a future in service to the public which will be as brilliant as has been his splendid record as Representative of Burlington and Mercer Counties. I hope to have the opportunity, when he campaigns, to be closely affiliated with his campaign as a volunteer worker. I treasure the Congressman's friendship most highly. I know that the decision, which my own business has forced upon us, will in no way affect the warm personal friendship that has always existed between us."

BREAD CONTAINS PROTEIN
RICH SOYA FLOUR

Recognizing the high nutritive value of soya flour, one nationally known baking company conducted experiments in its wartime kitchens until it evolved a method of blending soya flour perfectly with the other ingredients. The company's bread had already been vitamin-enriched and had already contained needed elements that in an earlier period of the baking industry's history had been lost in the milling of wheat flour. With soya flour incorporated with the improved wheat flour, the result is an enriched food product that helps greatly in supplying energy and body building proteins.

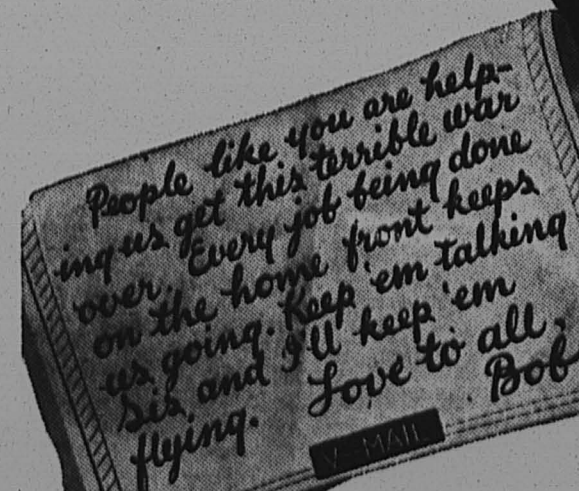

Report Of Visiting Nurse Society

The annual report of the Visiting Nurse Society as submitted by Mrs. Elizabeth M. Ritschard, chairman, is as follows:

With war conditions affecting the people of the entire world, it is extremely important that the civilian population guard its health. Every effort to maintain Public Health organizations should be made. So many doctors and nurses are serving the Armed Forces that civilians are faced with the realization that only a few doctors remain to care for them. In addition, hospitals are short of doctors, nurses and employees in general. Consequently, patients who need hospitalization cannot always receive such.

These conditions place an extra burden on the doctors and nurses who remain on the home front. More babies are born in war times and more, of necessity, will be delivered in homes.

Our Nurses, Miss Blair and Miss Cook, have made 2,810 nursing visits in the past year. They have given bed-side care, made pre-school visits and school examinations, taught preventive measures and home-nursing courses under the Red Cross, continued our baby clinic in the Palmyra Borough Hall and sent patients to hospitals when necessary.

Motor Corps Helps

Since gas rationing has eliminated the volunteer transportation, we greatly appreciate the cooperation of the Red Cross Motor Corps.

The Nurses have found living in an apartment satisfactory and the Committee is relieved to have no responsibility of property. Again we are grateful to the Borough of Palmyra for the use of the Town Hall for our Board Meetings.

We regret that Mrs. Perry has left the Family Service Council of Riverton and Cinnaminson. She has been most helpful and cooperative with our nurses and they will miss her assistance. We also regret that Mrs. Milton Klotz has resigned from our Visiting Nurse Board on which she has served so faithfully for many years.

In facing the future, let us each give our best to our community. If we are healthy, we are more certain to think clearly and act wisely and it will take a great deal of wisdom to guide this country through the period (Continued on Page 7)

GENERAL ELECTION NEXT TUESDAY

Qualified voters of Burlington county who fail to go to the polls and cast their ballots at the General Election next Tuesday, will not be fulfilling their war-time responsibility, they are warned by Assemblyman Arthur W. Lewis and other county GOP candidates in a joint statement.

Republican candidates pointed out that failure to be permanently registered does not disqualify a voter from balloting, provided his name is on the house-to-house canvass register, list made before the primary election. If a voter's name is on this list, he can become permanently registered and vote next Tuesday, it was pointed out.

All of the Republican candidates this week issued a final appeal for voters of Burlington county to amass a big majority for Walter E. Edge, the party's gubernatorial candidate, and the entire ticket. It was pointed out that this year's election gives voters the opportunity to insure a capable administration of the state and county government for the next three years.

"Walter E. Edge is eminently qualified for the position of governor of this state," Assemblyman Lewis said. "With his experience as New Jersey's governor during World War I, he had a fund of knowledge that will prove of value to the taxpayers of the state during the next three years. He has formulated a comprehensive post-war program, also, which fully takes into consideration the adjustments that will have to be made by government. Service men and women and their welfare when the war is over, are of first consideration to Mr. Edge. The voters will make no mistake if they elect him next Tuesday."

Even greater demands will be made upon our Visiting Nurses during the coming year. Hospital services have been curtailed because of the shortage of doctors and nurses. More babies are being born at home and less serious illnesses are treated at home. This condition increases the responsibility of the Public Health Nurses and they carry the burden of keeping their Community up to standard.

The Visiting Nurses have carried on health programs in the local schools, established a Baby Clinic in Palmyra and assisted in a Venereal Disease Clinic at Zurbrugg Hospital.

Public health is of vital importance and a community's responsibility. With the pressure of war activities it is easy to forget the existing organizations which have served us for many years.

The Family Service Council of Riverton and Cinnaminson

which provides "family service" that operates in advance of relief, supplements relief and follows relief, in order that the need for relief may be deferred or avoided; that in deserving cases the arbitrary standards for relief may be supplemented, and that the job of maintaining morale and economic independence may be wisely supervised after relief is withdrawn. This is an insurance that is necessary to our Community.

Burlington County Hospital

The emergency of war has greatly increased the difficulty of hospital administration. Doctors and nurses have been called to the colors in growing numbers and the challenge to such institutions as the Burlington County Hospital to hold the quality of service unimpaired, is indeed a serious one. It is a matter of pride that the challenge has been well met this year, in spite of the fact that the greatest number of patients in the institution's history have applied for and received care.

It is vitally important that our citizens shall be aware of the necessity of helping to uphold, through their contributions, the service standards of this life-giving force in the Community. National defense and public morale require it.

The Cinnaminson Home

The Cinnaminson Home has a record of fifty-two years of valuable service in our Community. Sixty-four hospitals and social agencies, as well as doctors and ministers have learned to turn to The Home when problems of convalescent care or spiritual and physical rehabilitation for women and girls confront them. It is more than ever important, at this time, to render this service, which returns these people to their homes as useful members of society, and we hope that the generous support of our friends and neighbors will not fail us now.

The Zurbrugg Memorial Hospital

For nearly 30 years this hospital has served the needs of Riverton and Cinnaminson. Being situated closer to these communities than any other similar institution, it receives a large number of emergency cases each year and is ready night and day to care for those who are in need of its services. Many people who have been referred by other local social service organizations are treated at Zurbrugg each year. The equipment and facilities are considered above the average for an institution of its size and are constantly being improved. The hospital plays an essential role in restoring health to our citizens—health, the most prized of all human possessions.

HUMAN SALVAGE

A widow with four children and an aged father... sudden illness... an emergency the worried mother could not meet... a young mother deserted... three small children to be cared for... a crisis too complex for the mother to cope with... a shy sensitive boy... unhappy home life... unexplained behavior... then stealing... how could the lad be helped?

Just three examples typical of the sixty-six families, involving two hundred and twenty people, who came to the Family Service Council for help here in our community during the past year.

... and among them few indeed could be called "relief" or justified the term "welfare" as commonly understood.

The work of the Riverton-Cinnaminson Welfare Association throughout depression years was so closely associated with the administration of relief for the community that its primary function of family service was eclipsed. Many people forgot family service was and always had been the principal purpose of the Association.

So in 1943 the name of the Association was changed to the Family Service Council of Riverton and Cinnaminson.

What is "family service"? What need exists for it today? Briefly, it is social work whereby those mental, moral, physical, social and economic maladjustments that exist in every community in good times and bad may be found and remedied before they become liabilities—before they become costly centers of infection. Through competent sympathetic and understanding personal attention, these people are enabled to resume a useful place in society or are given the institutional attention their case merits.

The limitations of space forbid an attempt to list the wide range of family service rendered during the past year. Our patrons may find interest, however, in the three typical examples briefed in the introduction.

Sickness Brings a Crisis
A mother of four children with an aged father came to the Family Service Council for help when her father was taken sick. Mrs. S. had no one to care for her father for when she stopped working her income for the (Continued on Page 7)

WAR FUND DRIVE
