For many years Lincoln H. Lipp Needlework Guild cott, national secretary of the "Not Over 50" Club, and a consulting safety engineer, has travelled widely over The Riverton Branch of Needle-work Guild of America will hold its 50th ingathering this year on Octo-

He has spoken on this subject more than a thousand times in the past few years, and last Thursday evening addressed the local Rotary Club, choosing as his subject, "Frontiers of Freedom.

"Our boyhood frontier," Mr. Lippincott recalled "was Chicago or out West. Today we think of our frontier as being on Guadalcanal or the Aleutians, but in reality the frontiers of freedom are right here, in our backyards and in our minds."

Developing this thought, Mr. Lippincott suggested as the basic requirements for frontier life self-reliance and conservation. Whatever is used on the frontier must be rep ished. Frontiersmen are independent, but they are also interdependent, They have to look out for each other.

Today there is not quite as much automobile traffic as there was two years ago, but drivers can not afford to be less vigilant because of that fact. Last year, in spite of the lower flow of highway traffic there were half as many people killed in New Jersey as were lost altogether in the taking of Tunisia.

No Complacency

We cannot afford to be complacent. We cannot disband our safety councils just because there are no accidents in the particular town in which they function. When the record is good in any town, that is the time for the safety council to become more vigilant than ever.

The Visiting Nurse Society

Even greater demands will be made upon our Visiting Nurses during the coming year. Hospital services have been curtailed because of the shortage of doctors and nurses. More babies are being born at home and less serious illnesses are treated at home. This condition increases the responsibility of the Public Health Nurses and they carry the burden of keeping their Community up to standard.

The Visiting Nurses have carried on health programs in the local schools, established a Baby Clinic in Palmyra and assisted in a Venereal Disease Clinic at Zurbrugg Hospital.

Public health is of vital importance and a community's responsibility. With the pressure of war activities it is easy to forget the existing organizations which have served us for many years.

The Family Service Council of Riverton and
