LONG DISTANCE

Interesting and enlightening facts were presented before the local Rotary Club last Thursday evening by G. R. Ottinger, lecturer for the Bell Telephone Company. His subject being "Long-Distance."

In the last two years the volume of telephone business has doubled, which means that in this brief period sixty-five years of normal business growth has been added. In Monmouth County twenty-five years ago there were 300 to 500 long-distance calls daily; today there are 6,000 to 7,000 daily, plus 27,000 toll calls. This abnormal increase, added to the difficulty in obtaining materials constitutes one of the great problems that Bell Telephone Company is trying to solve.

In spite of the tremendous increase in service demand a remarkable standard of efficiency has been maintained. Long-distance calls make the circuit unavailable for local users, yet only eight percent of all calls are at present subject to delay. Ninety-two percent go through as they did in peace time.

Experienced and trained operators are not so plentiful as they were in normal times and consequently the average time for putting through a call has increased from the all-time low of one and three-tenths minutes to the present average of two and eight-tenths minutes. This is not so good in comparison with the Bell Company's own past record, but it does compare favorably with the rest of the world.

Mr. Ottinger described in detail the manner in which a long distance call operates, and indicated several reasons for delay in making connections. All circuits may be busy, the telephone you are calling may be busy, or too many calls may be coming in for the capacity of the office. "If the operator says all circuits are busy," the speaker suggested, "then if at all possible, cancel the call." The operator under such circumstances, if the call is not cancelled, will try for ten minutes and will then turn the call over to the "delayed call" operator, who will complete the call.

The speaker paid tribute to the fine work being done by the present operators, all of whom are serving under tremendous tension. "On an average day," he declared, "operators are handling twice as many calls as on the busiest days of past years." In some army camps (in which the populations is as great as in a big city) telephone centers, with switchboards, have been installed. Naturally, the service installation is not comparable with that of the city and often the soldiers have to wait for hours to get their calls through to their homes. To meet this situation the Bell Company has provided waiting rooms with lounges at these camps. An announcer, with loud speaker equipment lets the soldiers know when their turn arrives. "Don't use the telephone between seven and ten p.m. any more than necessary. That is the time when the boys and girls in the service call their homes."

An interesting glimpse into the future is provided at the Dial long-distance switching center in Philadelphia—the only one of its kind established at the present time. By the use of this new invention the Philadelphia office can dial the office at New Orleans, while individual calls can be dialed up to 250 miles. In the world of tomorrow it will be possible to do these things everywhere.

DONATES NEW FLAG

Through the kindness of Powell Thatcher, 426 Linden avenue, Riverton, a new flag is now flying from the municipal flagstaff, Main and Howard streets, Riverton. The new banner replaced one which had been in use for some time and was badly worn.

The ceremony of hoisting the new flag took place at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning and was witnessed by municipal officials and others.

The flag was raised by Wendell Habern, of Riverton, apprentice seaman, U. S. Navy, who is home on furlough prior to leaving to attend midshipmen's school.

ELECTION RESULTS

The General Election on Tuesday failed to arouse any great amount of enthusiasm on the part of voters in this section and inclement weather during the afternoon and evening also contributed in keeping many voters away from the polls.

The Republican ticket carried Riverton, Palmyra and Cinnaminson, a total of 11 election districts.

Cinnaminson

In Cinnaminson there was a surprising strength of Democratic votes in the second and third districts, especially for the Governor and Assembly positions. Edge barely won in the second and lost to Murphy by nine votes in the third. Lewis lost to Perry by four votes in the third, while the Republican Freeholders held a scant majority. The first district remained staunchly in the Republican column.

Earle B. Harder was elected member of the Township Committee with a total vote of 395.

Revision was approved by nearly four to one.

Riverton

The election in Riverton ran according to expectations, the vote being light in all districts, with the Republican candidates receiving a heavy majority. There was some cutting of Edge in favor of Murphy, the latter running about 50 votes ahead of the rest of the Democratic slate.

J. W. Sylvester was elected Mayor and George T. Becton and David F. Gould members of the Borough Council. All were unopposed. Becton was high man on the entire ticket.

The vote was overwhelmingly in favor of constitution revision.

The third district completed the count shortly before 9 o'clock, and was the second district to report, the first being Medford Lakes where only a handful of votes were cast.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE MUST CONTINUE

The latest information from the United States War Department on Civilian Defense Activities was reported by Mayor John F. Ward, Coordinator, to the Palmyra Defense Council at its regular monthly meeting held recently.

The report stated that it is urgent that Civilian Defense activities not only continue but that they should be improved and increased.

There is still danger that the Axis nations may make an attempt to terrorize or injure the morale of the American people by a bombing raid or by sabotage. Fires, wrecks and other catastrophes may occur at any time and civilian defense units may be called on, at a moment's notice. All citizens should be on the alert for anything.

It should be remembered that the personnel of all civilian defense units are still on twenty-four hour call and will continue so indefinitely.

The best philosophy for all citizens to follow is "Hope for the best, prepare for the worst and be on the alert at all times."

WARD ELECTED

Mayor John F. Ward, of Palmyra, was re-elected to that office in the General Election this week, defeating his democratic opponent, Howard Powell and James Weart, who ran on a sticker.

The count was Ward, 876; Weart, 288, and Powell, 275. Ward carried all five districts. Powell ran best in the first and Weart had his greatest strength in the third.

Arthur Wright and Joseph L. Stack were elected Republican members of the Borough Council.

Richard Wilson, Republican, received 1,005 votes for Justice of the Peace.

Revision Approved

Revision of the State Constitution was approved nearly four to one.

All the county and State Republican candidates received substantial majorities in all districts except the first.

Arthur W. Lewis, Republican Assembly candidate, was accorded a vote of 1,026 as compared with 385 for Perry, Democrat.

Forty-four percent of the registered voters took the trouble to go to the polls.

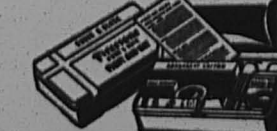

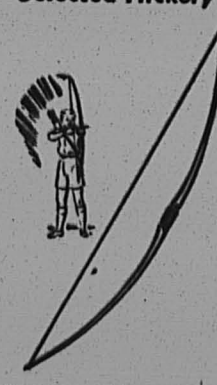

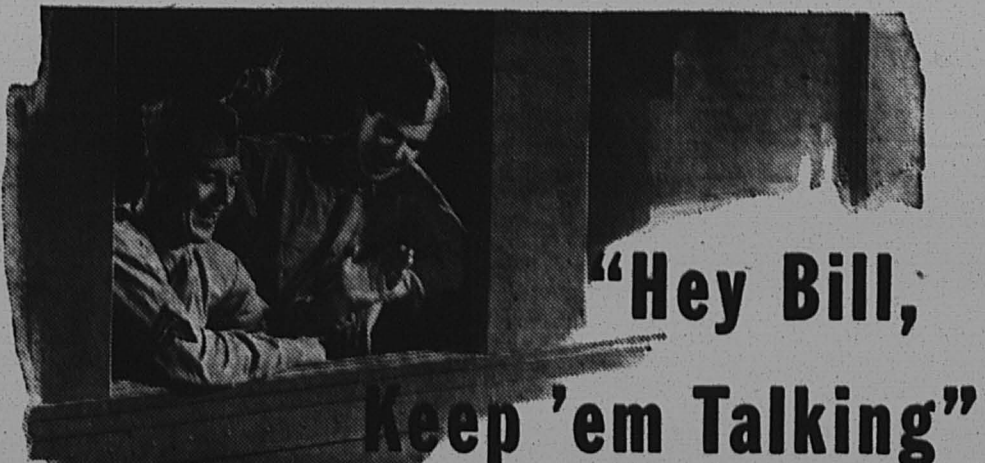

LECTURES HERE

A lecture on Christian Science en-
titled "Christian Science: The Re-
ligion of Joyous Attainment," by
Earl McCloud, C.S.B., of San An-
tonio, Texas, Member of the Board
of Lectureship of The Mother
Church, The First Church of Christ,
Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts,
was presented last Sunday in the
Broadway Theatre, Palmyra.

Mr. McCloud pointed out that ev-
erybody is seeking to attain some

Following this they are sent to institutions where the highest trained specialists give particular attention to the particular malady or injury from which the soldier may be suffering. The speaker paid high tribute to the men of the medical service. He said that hospitals are now located immediately in the rear of combat areas and men are brought in for treatment within a brief period after they have been wounded. He asserted that there are few fatalities from wounds because of this excellent and efficient care.

Following the talk a most informative movie was shown regarding the War Fund Campaign.

Here from Greenland

The Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club observed Armistice Day last Thursday by singing a number of songs popular during World War I. The speaker was Technical Sergeant Edward C. Mundy who is stationed at Fort Dix. Sergeant Mundy, who is a native of Boston, Massachusetts, gave a most interesting talk of his experience in Greenland from where he has recently returned after being there 15 months.

Greenland, the largest island in the world, belongs to Denmark. It has an area of 827,000 square miles. Like the northern part of North America generally, Greenland is colder than the corresponding latitudes on the East side of the Atlantic. In June and July, the ice on the coast is broken up and floats South, forming icebergs. One iceberg was estimated to weigh one million tons. The ice is constantly moving and makes a noise like a large caliber gun. The high interior is uninhabited and about five-sixths of the entire surface is covered with a thick ice-cap. All of the towns and villages are located on the outer edge of the island, mostly in the southern edge as the northern edge is above the Arctic Circle. There is very little snow on the northern part as it is principally ice.

The inhabitants are largely dependent on hunting and fishing. The fishing is excellent and bait is not necessary as all necessary to catch plenty of fish is a plug and the fish fight to be caught. The hunting is very good. The animals found on the island are the Eskimo dog, reindeer, the polar bear, the blue and white fox, the ermine, the Arctic hare and the musk ox. In the summer supply of food. Whale oil and seal oil are used as fuel. The inhabitants are chiefly Eskimos with a few Danes who total about 15,000.

Wooden barracks constructed by the Army are constructed of wood. They have to be lashed down to keep them secure as the wind, at times, reaches a velocity of 170 miles an hour. The barracks are heated with oil as coal costs \$42 a ton. The barracks were quite comfortable except when it was necessary to put out the oil fire on account of the high wind. When this happened the men crawled into their bed rolls fully clothed, wearing their fur caps, and were still cold. The temperature goes to 70 degrees and more below zero and a balmy summer day the thermometer will register 50 degrees above zero. The most important articles of clothing were the parka and goggles of singlass. The goggles had leather edges to prevent them freezing to the face.

Food Good
The food in the camps was of the best, in fact, better than in some camps where he had been in the States. They had turkey and chicken with ice cream for dessert two or three times a week. During his entire time in Greenland he did not have any milk. A cow was brought to the island but it only lived two days.

Due to the climate most of their recreation was indoor games which consisted of table tennis, billiards, and pin ball. Movies were shown several times a week. U.S.O. shows started to be shown at the camps on the island about the middle of summer. The natives are great skiers but some of the Army men became quite proficient in the art. The camp did not have a chaplain for about three months and the men missed the religious atmosphere. Lutheran is the prescribed religion of Greenland.

The natives have very large families and the children soon learned to sing American popular songs in Danish. Sergeant Mundy thoroughly approved of the idea of single women wearing red hair ribbons, married women wore blue hair ribbons and

Because of the route taken, Sergeant Mundy was 23 days gone from Greenland. Ordinarily the trip can be made in 10 days.

SCRAP COLLECTION

The Burlington County Salvage Committee has appointed the Boy Scouts as the official collection agency in the County in cooperating with the Nation-wide scrap drive now under way.

The Scouts of the Riverton Troop (No. 50) will begin making collections early Saturday morning, November 20th. The Borough Council has graciously given the Scouts the use of the Borough truck every Saturday.

Because of the small number of Scouts and the large area they must cover, the community will be divided into five sections or routes. Collections will be made in one section every Saturday. Desirable scrap material is as follows: iron, brass or copper; tin cans which must be properly flattened out; newspapers folded flat and tied in bundles about 12 inches high; magazines tied in bundles about 18 inches high.

This policy is necessary because of so few Scouts covering so large a territory. SERVICE PHOTOS TO BE COLLECTED BY COUNTY CLERK

A county-wide collection of pictures and service records of Burlington County men and women wearing the American Uniform in World War II is planned by County Clerk Palmer L. Adams.

Adams is sending out the following request to parents, relatives and friends of all those in the armed services:

"Please bring or mail to County Clerk Palmer L. Adams, Palmyra in service, date of discharge from graph or Snap Shot (in uniform if possible) of each person now serving in the United States Armed Forces. The size nearest 3 1/4 inch by 3 1/4 inch is preferred but any size you now have will do. Please print the name of the person's picture being submitted on the back of same. No picture will be returned as they are for a Burlington County Honor Roll."

Also requested is the full name, serial number, branch of service, date of birth, dates and details if killed, wounded, captured, missing, or died soldiers could be fed with the result-service (if discharged) and employment prior to entering service.

In addition the full name and address of father and mother, wife or next of kin is desired.

Records and details of citations and medals awarded is asked to complete the record.

It is planned to display the pictures at the county clerk's office in Mount Holly and also at other points throughout the county when the occasion warrants.

Citizens of Riverton, N. J., who own any property in foreign countries were notified by Postmaster Mervil E. Haas today that they must file reports of their holdings with the Treasury Department before December 1. The notice was given by means of a poster placed on display in the post offices.

Dress-Up That Hamburger Meat

WHEN is a hamburger not a hamburger? It's easy to answer that riddle, for ground meat may be used in many ways other than as the ordinary fried patty. Hamburger meat can be combined with other foods to stretch the meat-flavor for more servings. These combinations may be broiled, baked or even simmered.

Here are four recipes that will present hamburger-meat in new, interesting dishes. Try them when ration points are low.

Mock Drumsticks

1/2 lb. ground raw 1 tsp. salt
1/2 lb. ground raw 1 tsp. grated onion
1/2 lb. ground raw 1 egg
1/2 cup quick cook- 1/2 cup milk or
ing oatmeal 1 tomato juice

Mix all ingredients until well blended. Shape into oblong cakes to resemble drumsticks. Insert a wooden skewer into each cake. Roll cakes in dry bread crumbs or flour. Brown in hot fat. Add 1/2 cup water. Cover. Simmer about 10 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

Baked Hamburg Loaf

1 1/2 lb. beef 2 tbsp. minced green pepper
2 slices bread 3 hard cooked eggs
soaked in water Salt and pepper
1 small onion 1 tbsp. butter or other fat

Chop meat fine. Add bread which has been softened in water, one minced onion, green pepper and seasonings to taste. Arrange meat mixture in baking pan with the hard cooked eggs in center end to end. Bake 1 hour in a moderate oven, 350 degrees. Serve hot with Tomato Sauce.

Cheese-Hamburger Toasties

1 1/2 lb. bottom 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
round of beef 1 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cups grated sharp cheese 10 small canned
1/2 cup minced onion pineapple rings
5 buns

Combine all ingredients except the pineapple rings and buns and blend thoroughly. Form into patties 1/2 inch thick and of the same diam-

eter as the buns. Place on broiler pan together with the pineapple rings which have been brushed with butter and dipped in flour. Turn once. Just before the hamburgers are done, place buttered split buns on broiler pan and brown on cut side. Serve on each split bun a pineapple ring topped with a hamburger. Makes 10 Toasties.

Tomato Sauce

1/2 can tomatoes 2 slices onion
1 cup water 1/2 cup flour
2 cloves 1 tsp. salt
3 allspice berries 1/2 pepper-corns
1 tsp. fat

Allow tomatoes, water, spices, onion and herbs to simmer 15 minutes. Melt fat, add flour and salt, then the tomato mixture which has been strained.

Hamburger Corn Patties

1 cup soft bread crumbs 1/2 tsp. grated pepper
1 cup cooked or canned whole onion
kernel corn 1/2 cup milk
Salt 1 lb. ground meat

Combine all ingredients except meat and mix well. Add meat and mix lightly. Shape into 6-8 patties and broil for 15 minutes, turn, continue broiling until brown. Serves 6.

OF THIS COUNTY WOULD
SUPPLY MANY SOLDIERS

Burlington County's 25,329 households could feed 6,574 soldiers for a year with the food wasted annually in homes of the county, an official of the county's leading food distributor estimated today.

This amazing figure is based on accurate government statistics which indicate that at least 12,790,029 pounds of food are wasted annually in Burlington County homes, according to Harvey A. Baum, head of A & P Tea Company's produce-buying operations.

"Food is a munition of war and everyone must fight waste of it now," Baum pointed out. "Efficient food producers, processors and distributors have worked for years to reduce waste. Our company, for example, has cut waste and spoilage on perishable fruits and vegetables by 50 per cent during the past 20 years," he added. "Now the government is urging a similar war on food waste in the home."

Kitchen efficiency, Baum suggested, should include three points: (1) Buy as nearly as possible just the required amount; (2) serve moderate helpings, and (3) use all left-overs. Baum said that although housewives have eliminated much food waste since Pearl Harbor, over eight percent of all food bought for home consumption is still wasted. While it is obvious that waste cannot be prevented entirely, he added, care-

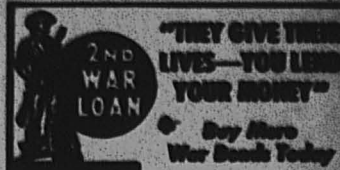
