## 50th Anniversary

Although few people realized the fact, December 18 was the fiftieth anniversary of the incorporation of Riverton as a borough. This fact was recalled at the final 1943 meeting of the governing body of the community by Daniel M. Clifton, borough clerk, who also presented some very interesting information regarding those who have held office in the municipality.

## THE DANGER OF PRAYER

Read St. Mark 10:32-45

There is no danger in the prayer of loving adoration, nor in the prayer of humble penitence, nor in the prayer of heartfelt thanksgiving. There is danger in the commonest prayer—that of request—a danger the Lord Christ demanded that the sons of Zebedee face: 'Ye know not what you ask.'

First, we are ignorant of ourselves. We often do not know what we really want, nor are we willing to pay the price. Lips say one thing, the heart another—and God pays more attention to the heart. Second, we are ignorant of what is involved in what we ask. Third, we are ignorant of God and His ways—He always answers, but many times in unexpected, unpredictable ways, better than any we could imagine. A human father's answer to his child's pleading is sometimes 'yes'—but as often 'No' or 'Not yet.' Is not our Heavenly Father wise and loving enough also sometimes to say 'Yes'—but as often, 'No' or 'Not yet'?

Shortly before midnight last Thursday, Palmyra police found a car abandoned on Market street and identified the vehicle as belonging to Nathan Lane, of Riverton.

Officer John Robinson, of the Riverton police, upon investigation found that the machine had been stolen from in front of a local service station where it had been undergoing repairs. The keys had been left in the car, since it had no generator or radiator.

Those who committed the theft, however, failed to notice such minor items, with the result that the motor became overheated and they were forced to leave the auto after a brief journey.

## BEGLEY SOLICITOR

Appointment of two Burlington men to important county positions, a rearrangement of departmental directorship and initial steps in a county post-war program, marked the organization of the Board of Freeholders last Saturday.

County Treasurer Thomas D. Begley, Burlington, resigned, and a few minutes later was appointed county solicitor to succeed Lester A. Drenk, Riverside. Recorder Alex Denbo, Burlington, was appointed county treasurer to succeed Begley.

Philip S. Irons, Jr., Clerk of the board, was reappointed for a three-year term, while reappointments were made, with one exception, to minor county official positions. The exception was a membership on the board of managers of Fairview Sanatorium at New Lisbon, which was given to Dr. Emlen Darlington, Browns Mills, a former board member. He succeeds Dr. George T. Tracy, Beverly.

Church Re-elected Director  
Freeholder LeRoy Church, Bordentown, was reelected director of the board by unanimous vote. In appointing department directors for the year, Church reshuffled the list, voluntarily giving up directorship of the departments of highways, bridges and engineering, to which he appointed Freeholder Stanley I. Russ, Delanco. Church took Russ' former department of public buildings and grounds. Freeholder Clarence G. Price, Beverly, was named director of public affairs, and Freeholder Louis T. Klauder, a new member of the board, was given Price's former directorship of the department of finance. Freeholder John M. Chant retained the directorship of institutions and agencies.

## Appointments

Reappointments included that of former Senator Emmor Roberts, Vincentown, as a member of the County Free Library Commission; William J. Smith, Bridgeboro, county fire marshal; Elmer Gares, Burlington, assistant fire marshal, and Samuel A. French, Mt. Holly, superintendent of soldiers' and sailors' burial. Church reappointed Chant and Russ as members of the county welfare board.

Indicating that postwar planning will be a keynote of the board's activities in 1944, three members spoke on plans for county improvements after the war. Chant, in nominating Church for the directorship, called attention to the fact that one of the important functions of the board during the coming year will be to plan a postwar program that will provide jobs for returning servicemen.

## Cite Improvements

Church cited possible county improvements that might be included in the program, calling attention to the need for a county jail addition, annexes to the Fairview sanatorium and Hospital for the Insane, a central heating plant for the county

## WET DRIVER

J. A. Hogan, 36, of Newportville, Pa., had the dubious distinction of becoming the first person to be admitted to the Mt. Holly jail in 1944.

His incarceration came as a result of being found guilty of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor on Friday afternoon of last week. Hogan was observed driving in an erratic manner by Chief William Gootee and Officer John Carhart, of Riverton, who arrested him after a short chase. He was pronounced intoxicated by a doctor given a hearing before Recorder William H. Bottger.

Upon being found guilty, he committed to the jail in lieu of paying a fine of \$200 and costs.

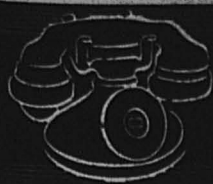

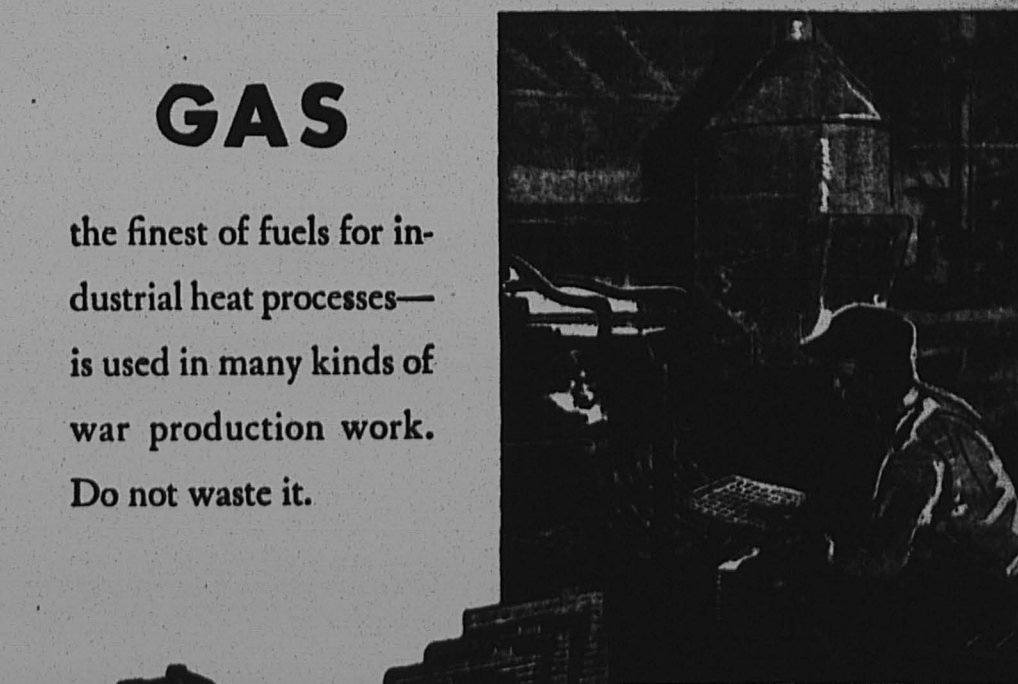

While a member of Riverton's Bradley Post, Colonel D'Olier was elected the First National Commander of the American Legion and was largely responsible for the swift growth of the Legion during the early days of its development in 1918. The Riverton Memorial Post feels highly honored to know that this outstanding Legionnaire has become a charter member of the new Post just as he was a charter member of the Riverton Post of twenty-five years ago.

## LIPPINCOTT NEW COUNCIL MEMBER

Mayor J. W. Sylvester, of Riverton, presided over the first 1944 regular meeting of the borough council in that community last Thursday night and appointed Richard Lippincott to fill the vacancy as councilman caused by his resignation to become Mayor.

The appointment, which runs until the next election, was approved by a unanimous vote. Mr. Lippincott has been prominently identified with various civic projects and has served for the past two years as chairman of the fuel panel of the Palmyra Ration Board.

Nathan Lane, chairman of the finance committee, was elected president of council.

**Budget Discussed**  
Discussion of the 1944 budget occupied a large portion of the evening. The budget was approved after careful consideration of the various items and is published in full in this week's issue of The New Era. The public hearing will be held in the council chambers on Thursday, February 10.

The statement accompanying the budget is as follows:  
The Borough of Riverton maintained its very good financial condition during the year 1943. The Borough Officials appreciate the continued co-operation of the taxpayers in paying their taxes promptly, so that this financial condition of the Municipality is maintained.

The Mayor and Council have deemed it advisable to appropriate a sum of \$12,000.00 from the Borough's cash surplus, in order that the amount of taxes to be levied for local purposes will not be increased over the 1943 amount.  
If the final 1944 rate is larger than the 1943 rate, it will be due to losses in valuations and increases in State and County tax levies.

**NURSES' AIDE**  
Mrs. Katherine P. Snover, of 313 Broad street, Palmyra, New Jersey, was among the first group of 12 Nurses Aides from Burlington County to report for duty at Station Hospital, Fort Dix, New Jersey.

Mrs. Snover, who, during the year and a half in which she has been a Nurses Aide has completed the initial 60 hour course, plus the Red Cross First Aid Course for Civilian Defense, also has credit for 150 hours work in a civilian hospital.

The Nurses Aides will assist the nurse in charge of a ward in such duties as the preparation of foods, bedside care, and the application and removal of bandages, casts and slings.

The Red Cross established the Nurses Aid Course in 1940 when they became conscious of the seriousness of the growing shortage of nurses.

**ELWELL ON COUNCIL**  
Due to an oversight, the name of Francis B. Elwell was inadvertently omitted from the list of those who served as members of the Riverton Borough Council.

Mr. Elwell took the oath of office on January 1, 1930 and was a member of the governing body for two full terms.

## LOCAL FIRES

Shortly after 6:30 on Thursday and Friday mornings of last week the Palmyra Fire Department answered calls for grass fires along the railroad. No damage resulted.

The Riverton Company extinguished a chimney fire at 213 Thomas avenue, last Friday evening, and was called Monday morning for a small blaze at 307 Seventh street.

This was in a bathroom and was believed to have been started by children playing with matches. The fire was extinguished by a neighbor before the apparatus arrived.  
Damage was slight.

## MARKETING

Some interesting facts and statistical figures were presented before the local Rotary Club last Thursday evening, when Rotarian Jere G. White gave a vocational talk on the subject of "Fruit-Cooperative Marketing."

Following a rather cryptic definition of Cooperative Marketing as "the grouping of farmers acting together to sell their fruits profitably," Mr. White presented a graphic picture of the present agricultural situation in the United States.

In 1930 farm income represented seven percent of national income; today, with the number of farmers very definitely reduced, the farm income of the nation is equal to eight percent of our total income. This would indicate an improvement in the financial condition of the average farmer. All told, farm produce last year was worth about 17½ billion dollars, two thirds of which total represented the grocery bill of the American people. On a percentage basis, Americans spend each year about one dollar out of every five for food.

**Old Type**  
Farmers in general had a difficult time under the old form of marketing. Produce was sent to the commission house, or the so-called "terminal market." There it was sold on consignment, with the seller getting a percentage commission on sales. However, there were many irregularities and abuses, most of which resulted in the farmer getting much less than a fair and equitable return for the produce he had sent. The present form of cooperative marketing has not eliminated all previous evils, but it has reduced them very noticeably. In New Jersey, for instance, The Cooperative Marketing Association has eliminated the old "pooling" method of selling produce, and now sells each consignment of the farmer on its own merits.

Mr. White closed his address with a rather humorous, but no doubt accurate description of the many agencies that "hit" the farmer in turn, generally ending with the sheriff.

**WAR DEPARTMENT MOVIE**  
"War Department Report," a U.S. Official picture, will be shown in the Palmyra High School auditorium on Wednesday, January 26, at 8:15 p.m. There will be no admission charge, but children below high school age must be accompanied by their parents.

The film includes scenes from the landing in Sicily, the battle on the Salerno beach and attacks on Japanese strongholds. The picture itself helps America to meet the test by showing exactly "what the score is."

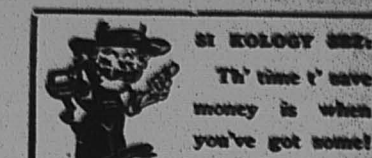

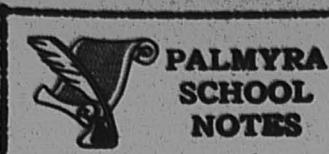

## LEGION PLANS HONOR ROLL FOR COMMUNITY

AIR RAID WARDENS  
STAGE DISTRICT DRILL

District 5 of the Palmyra Air Raid Wardens staged a practice blackout drill in their district on January 10, 1944.

District Leader Bartholomew led

the group which had a turnout of 23 members out of 30.

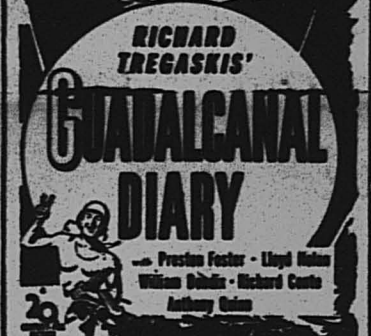

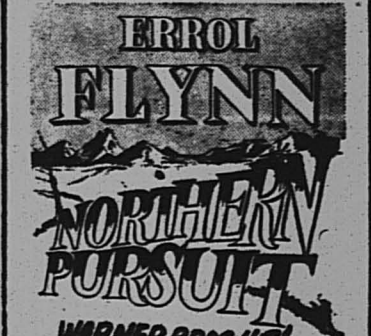

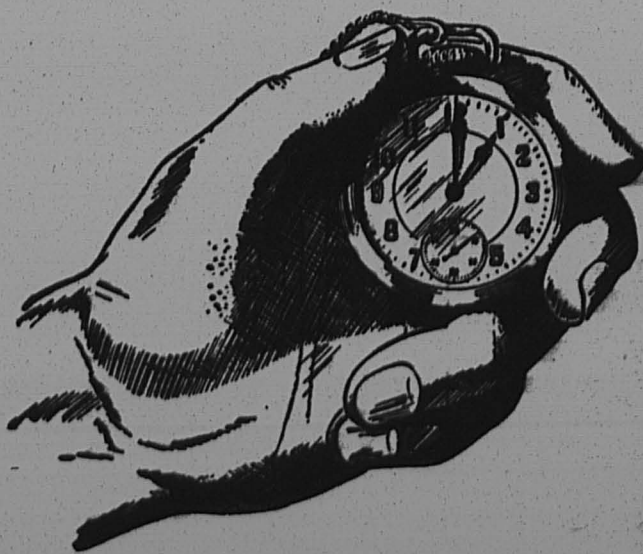

O God, Thou didst hear Solomon when he cried for wisdom—hear me and save this nation.' God heard, and He answered him then and there." Will He not answer today? Our fervent earnest prayers are needed today to help God give us a righteous and just victory, and peace. May we go to our knees and pray, Pray, PRAY! "The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." James 5:16.

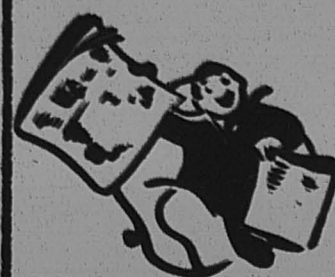

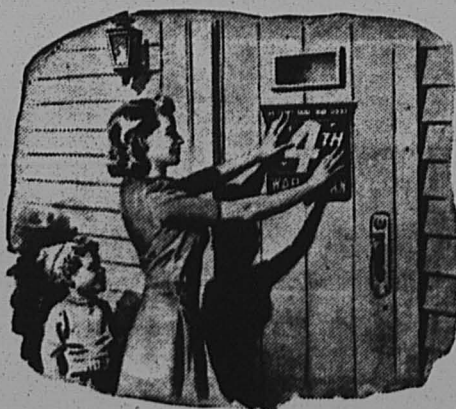
