Plan Now for Winter Storage

WHEN planning your victory garden, remember to include fruits and vegetables that can be preserved in their natural form. Beets, late cabbage, carrots, celery onions, potatoes, salafy, turnips, apples and winter pears are foods that can be stored with very little work and practically no expense.

Vegetables from a small garden may be kept in the basement, garage or underground. If large quantities of late foods are grown, it is advisable to build permanent storage facilities of wood or masonry. A storage room or box may be placed in the basement, garage or outdoor cellar. A hot-bed, trench, ground-pit, or underground barrel is easy to construct.

Pick crops for storage on a clear, cold day in September or later (just before freezing weather). Do not wash or bruise produce. Leave one-half inch of stem attached.

Sandbox

Vegetables that are not injured by slight freezing may be kept in a cool (45° F. or below), moist place. These are white potatoes, cabbage, celery, beets, carrots, parsnips, and rutabagas. Pack in layers in boxes of sand. Use sand just as it comes from the sandbox, but not too damp. Do not use seashore sand for winter storage. Root crops will keep in sand for three to six months.

Attic Storage

Vegetables requiring cool (45° F. or above), dry, ventilated conditions may be placed in a cool attic or outside wall cupboard. Such foods as garlic, onions, squash, sweet potatoes and pumpkins will keep in this manner for approximately six months.

Green tomatoes picked just before frost may be wrapped separately in several thicknesses of newspaper and spread on the attic-floor or shelf. Slight humidity and a temperature of 45° F. to 55° F. is ideal. The layers of paper will delay the ripening of the tomatoes for several months. Sort frequently and use as fruit ripens.

Tomato vines containing green fruit may be hung by the roots in a

cool attic, garage or entry-way to basement.

Storage Room

Winter apples and pears can be preserved in covered crates or baskets in a cool moist storage room.

Brussels sprouts and cauliflower harvested late in the season will keep for three months when planted in a sandbox in a storage room.

Cellar Storage

Food storage is not possible in a heated cellar. Successful preservation of most vegetables requires a maintained temperature below 45° F. The room should be dark and well ventilated. A window is important but this should be covered with a burlap bag or blackout curtain. Store vegetables in crates, boxes, or baskets and place on shelf or slatted floor. To control the humidity in the cellar, cover the floor with three inches of sand and lay a slatted floor directly over the sand. The sand must be kept damp by sprinkling two or three times a week.

Warning—the odors of onions, turnips and cabbage stored in a cellar may penetrate through the house.

Barrel Storage

Place the storage barrel on its side in a bank of earth. Use a box-end for a cover and protect it with straw.

Hothed

A small hole is easy to make with flat boards. Straw or leaves are best for a protective covering.

Outdoor Pit

Pit or trench storage will furnish high humidity but there is no temperature control and the contents are accessible to rodents.

To make a pit for storage, dig a shallow trench or hole five feet wide and as long as necessary. Line the bottom of the trench with straw or leaves. Fill with loose vegetables or crates of food and cover with clean straw.

Throw soil over the straw. Do not pack firmly or there will be difficulty in opening the trench. Large quantities of vegetables may be stored in a well ventilated pit.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINNAMINSON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON PROVIDING THE RUNNING AT LARGE OF DOGS BETWEEN THE FIRST DAY OF APRIL AND THE FIRST DAY OF NOVEMBER OF EACH YEAR, AND ESTABLISHING CERTAIN OTHER REGULATIONS FOR THE CONTROL OF DOGS; AND PREScribing PUNISHMENT FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE TERMS AND PROVISIONS THEREOF BY PERSONS OWNERS, HARBORERS, KEEPING OR HAVING CHARGE OF DOGS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Cinnaminson in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

SECTION 1: That hereafter each and every person owning, harboring, keeping or having charge of any male or female dog in the said Township of Cinnaminson shall:

(a) Prevent such dog from running at large upon any public highway, street, alley, park or other public place in the said Township or at other time between the first day of April and the first day of November of each year;

(b) Prevent such dog from being on any public highway, street, avenue, park or other public place in the said Township at any time between the first day of April and the first day of November of any year unless such dog be accompanied by a person over the age of twelve years and be securely confined and controlled by an adequate leash not more than six feet in length;

(c) Prevent such dog from running at large in the said Township upon the lands of any person owning, harboring, keeping or having charge of such dog;

(d) Prevent such dog from worrying, woodchewing or killing any sheep, lamb, domestic animal or poultry of any person other than the person owning, harboring, keeping or having charge of such dog;

SECTION 2: That no male or female dog that shall be found running at large upon any public highway, street, avenue, alley, park or other public place in the said Township between the first day of April and the first day of November of any year, or that shall be found at any time within the time of the ordinance and which the person owning, harboring, keeping or having charge of such dog, has failed to prevent, shall forthwith be taken and impounded by the Police of the said Township and shall be kept and confined for a period of seven days at a time thereafter shall then be humanely destroyed or otherwise disposed of according to law; provided, however, that within ten days of the time of the ordinance and which the person owning, harboring, keeping or having charge of such dog, has failed to prevent, shall forthwith be taken and impounded by the Police of the said Township, so long as the person owning, harboring, keeping or having charge of such dog, has failed to pay the sum of \$10.00 for the first offense and not less than \$10.00 for each subsequent offense, as shall be imposed by the Township Recorder or other magistrate in his discretion, or (if no party so concerned can be found) by the Clerk of the Township jail or County jail for such term not exceeding ten days for the first offense and not exceeding sixty days for all subsequent offense, as the Township Recorder or other magistrate in his discretion shall determine; provided, however, that the Township Recorder or other magistrate shall have power in his discretion to impose sentence of both fine and imprisonment not exceeding the maximum limit hereinbefore fixed.

SECTION 3: That this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its final passage, adoption and publication in the manner prescribed by law.







FUEL OIL RULES

Householders under Palmyra Rationing Board were urged today by T. Curtis Flynn, Chairman of the local OPA War Price and Rationing Board, to return their next season's fuel oil renewal forms as promptly as possible.

The forms were mailed out this morning by the board to all fuel oil users in this area, Mr. Flynn said. "The sooner these forms are filled out and returned, by mail, to the board," he added, "the sooner we can begin processing them and issuing oil ration coupons. We would like to have the forms returned within seven days."

"The earlier these coupons are issued, the better," Mr. Flynn said, "because it is necessary for consumers to order part of their next season's supply of heating oil immediately. When dealers make their first deliveries during the summer, they are able to give consumers better delivery service throughout the heating year because it will help them solve their pressing manpower and delivery problems. More important, filling consumers' tanks early will add appreciably to dealers' storage capacity and thereby allow more oil to be brought in now for use next winter."

Only Six Questions

The new re-application form contains only six simple questions which the board needs answered in order to renew rations for private dwellings for next year. The questions can be answered in a few minutes and the completed form put into the return mail. Persons who wish to renew rations for promises other than private dwellings, such as apartment houses, and hotels should answer only the first 3 questions, the board chairman said.

The renewal application is to be filled out only by those persons whose oil ration last year was for the same address as this year, Mr. Flynn said. These may be persons who either are living at the same address for which last year's ration was issued or who control the burning equipment at that address (as in the case of a landlord). Other oil users not included in these categories will be given a chance to fill out another application later.

While the questions may be answered without difficulty by most householders, there may be some special circumstances in some cases which a consumer would want to clear up in order to be sure he is answering correctly. In any such cases, consumers are advised to call Riverton 1435 where all questions will be gladly answered, the chairman said.

"We in the local board would certainly appreciate it if all householders in this District would make a special effort to return the forms within seven days from now," Mr. Flynn said. "It would help us; it would help the fuel oil distributors here and it would also benefit all fuel oil users."

The Field Day program this year will be in the form of a county fair, with booths exhibiting the best work of the school children during the past year. There will be a white elephant sale proceeds going to the Library Fund.
