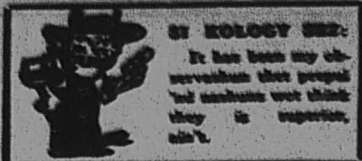

SUMMER ROUND-UP

The annual Summer Round-Up of the children will be conducted from May 6th to May 12th. The Summer Round-Up is a major health project of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and its purpose is to send children to the entering grades of school in good physical and mental condition. In this State it is sponsored by the New Jersey Congress of Parents and Teachers and the Medical Society.

The Round-Up group includes all children from two years of age to those eligible for school in September.

Names of children who will enter school in the fall for the first time have been secured through the school census.

Parents will be visited by a member of the local committee and will be advised to take their children to their family physician for examination.

A standardized examination is used and each child's form is turned over to the school authorities to serve as the initial unit of the child's permanent health record.

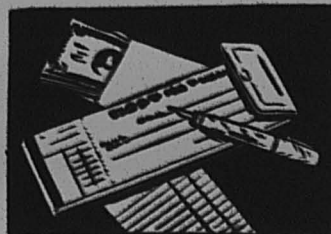

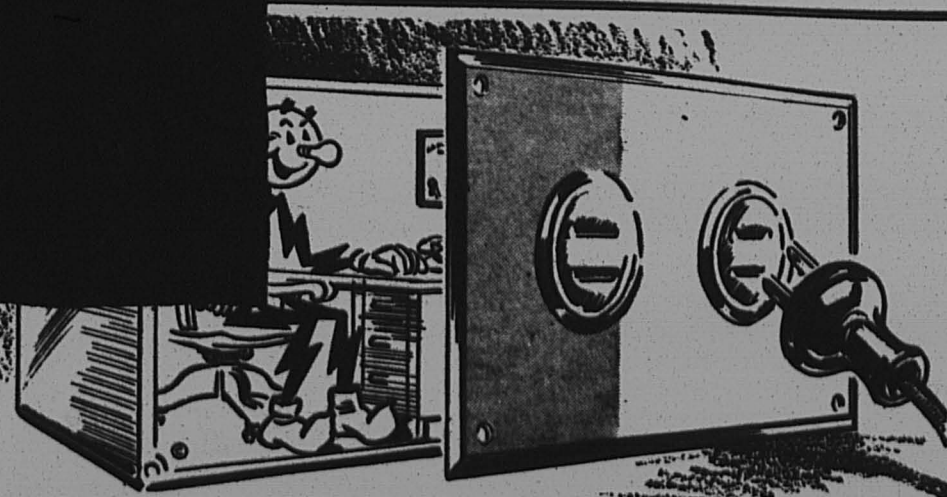

TIRE INSPECTION RECORD IS NEEDED

T. Curtis Flynn, Chairman of the Local Rationing Board, made the following statement concerning the confusion resulting from the discontinuance of periodic tire inspection: Car owners need no longer have their tires inspected at regular intervals, i.e., every six months on "A," every four months on "B" and every three months on "C" rations. However, every car owner must present his tire inspection record, showing current inspection, with any request for gasoline ration or replacement of tires.

Commercial Vehicles will continue to have their trucks inspected every 5,000 miles or every six months, whichever is first, as required on ODT form OVN-17 (feet) or

CWN-17-A (feet) inspection report. Car dealers are required to submit to the Board Tire inspection record, after proper inspection for replacement of tires on any automobile held for resale.





Plan Now for Winter Storage

WHEN planning your victory garden, remember to include fruits and vegetables that can be preserved in their natural form. Beets, late cabbage, carrots, celery, onions, potatoes, saffron, turnips, apples and winter pears are foods that can be stored with very little work and practically no expense.

Vegetables from a small garden may be kept in the basement, garage or underground. If large quantities of late foods are grown, it is advisable to build permanent storage facilities of wood or masonry. A storage room or box may be placed in the basement, garage or outdoor cellar. A heated, trench, ground-pit, or underground barrel is easy to construct.

Pick crops for storage on a clear, cold day in September or later (just before freezing weather). Do not wash or bruise produce. Leave one-half inch of stem attached.

Sandbox

Vegetables that are not injured by slight freezing may be kept in a cool (45° F. or below), moist place. These are white potatoes, cabbage, celery, beets, carrots, parsnips, and rutabagas. Pack in layers in boxes of sand. Use sand just as it comes from the sandbank, but not too damp. Do not use seashore sand for winter storage. Root crops will keep in sand for three to six months.

Attic Storage

Vegetables requiring cool (45° F. or above), dry, ventilated conditions may be placed in a cool attic or outside wall cupboard. Such foods as garlic, onions, squash, sweet potatoes and pumpkins will keep in this manner for approximately six months.

Green tomatoes picked just before frost may be wrapped separately in several thicknesses of newspaper and spread on the attic-floor or shelf. Slight humidity and a temperature of 45° F. to 55° F. is ideal. The layers of paper will delay the ripening of the tomatoes for several months. Sort frequently and use as fruit ripens.

Tomato vines containing green fruit may be hung by the roots in a

cool attic, garage or entry-way to basement.

Storage Room

Winter apples and pears can be preserved in covered crates or baskets in a cold moist storage room.

Brussels sprouts and cauliflower harvested late in the season will keep for three months when planted in a sandbox in a storage room.

Cellar Storage

Food storage is not possible in a heated cellar. Successful preservation of most vegetables requires a maintained temperature below 45° F. The room should be dark and well ventilated. A window is important but this should be covered with a burlap bag or blackout curtain. Store vegetables in crates, boxes, or baskets and place on shelf or slatted floor. To control the humidity in the cellar, cover the floor with three inches of sand and lay a slatted floor directly over the sand. The sand must be kept damp by sprinkling two or three times a week.

Warning—the odors of onions, turnips and cabbage stored in a cellar may penetrate through the house.

Barrel Storage

Place the storage barrel on its side in a bank of earth. Use a board for a cover and protect it with straw.

Hotbed

A small hotbed is easy to make with flat boards. Straw or leaves are best for a protective covering.

Outdoor Pit

Pit or trench storage will furnish high humidity but there is no temperature control and the contents are accessible to rodents.

To make a pit for storage, dig a shallow trench or hole five feet wide and as long as necessary. Line the bottom of the trench with straw or leaves. Fill with loose vegetables or crates of food and cover with clean straw.

Throw soil over the straw. Do not pack firmly or there will be difficulty in opening the trench. Large quantities of vegetables may be stored in a well ventilated pit.

SGT. CARHART GETS
SILVER STAR MEDAL

Sergeant Robert W. Carhart, son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Carhart, of Lippincott avenue, Riverton, has been awarded the Silver Star Medal and a Citation for conspicuous bravery in action. He also received the medal of the Order of the Purple Heart.

The presentation was made in a hospital in Australia, where Sergeant Carhart is recovering from wounds. Major General W. H. Rupertus, commanding general making the award.

The citation reads as follows: "For distinguishing himself by conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action against forces of the Japanese Army. In the vicinity of an unnamed river, in dense jungle undergrowth, over difficult and unfamiliar terrain and against a determined and well entrenched enemy firing from concealed pillboxes, Sergeant Carhart advanced in front of his squad to determine the position of an enemy machine gun which was slowing down the advance of his company. He directed fire toward the position and continued the advance, encountering a platoon scout from an adjacent unit who had been wounded. He assisted the scout, under enemy fire, back to his own lines and killed two of the enemy in doing so. Shortly after, Sergeant Carhart was wounded in the neck and while at the aid station was again wounded in the right leg. His distinguished conduct, inspiring leadership and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the Navy of the United States.

ADAMS ACCUSES EASTWOOD OF MISSTATEMENTS
County Clerk Palmer L. Adams, candidate for re-election at next Tuesday's primary election, today accused State Senator Eastwood, Harmony leader, of misquoting facts in his attacks on Adams during the current campaign.

"At the Moorestown Republican meeting Tuesday evening," Adams said, "Eastwood declared I had received \$1500 additional yearly salary as county clerk for 11 months, and that I had promised to return this amount to the county, but had never done so."

This is an absolute falsehood. At no time have I ever received from the county any more than the regular county clerk's salary which is fixed by law and has not been changed during my term of office.

"Eastwood also said I had never returned any part of my salary as Freeholder to the county. This is another falsehood. In accordance with my promise to the voters of the county, I returned \$1,000 of my first year's \$4,000 salary as Freeholder and tried to persuade the other Freeholders to make this a regular practice, but they refused. The county's financial records will show the receipt of this \$1,000."

"I am sure the public is well enough acquainted with my public record to know I have consistently fought for economies in county government and lower tax rates," Adams continued.

"Despite the greatly increased work which the war has entailed in the county clerk's office, this year's requested appropriation is several hundred dollars less than the annual sum which was spent for the office before I became county clerk."

"In addition to reducing the expenses of the office, the salaries of all employees have been brought up to a decent living figure, representing an average increase of almost 50 percent. The equipment of the office has been modernized and efficient machine methods have been introduced, all without extra cost to the taxpayers. At the same time the work was brought up to date and kept up to date."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINCINNATION IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON PROHIBITING THE RUNNING AT LARGE OF DOGS BETWEEN THE FIRST DAY OF APRIL AND THE FIRST DAY OF NOVEMBER OF ANY YEAR AND ESTABLISHING CERTAIN OTHER REGULATIONS FOR THE CONTROL OF DOGS AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE TERMS AND PROVISIONS THEREOF BY PERSONS OWNING, HARBORING, KEEPING OR HAVING CHARGE OF DOGS. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Township Committee of the Township of Cincinnati in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

(e) Prevent such dog from running at large in the said Township upon the lands of any person, other than the person owning, harboring, keeping or having charge of such dog, without the consent of the owner of such lands;

Police shall promptly serve written notice upon such person that such dog has been taken and impounded under the provisions of this Ordinance, which notice shall be sufficiently served if the same be delivered to such person, or be left at such person's usual or last known place of abode, or be forwarded by mail with prepaid first class postage to such person at his usual or last known place of abode, and such dog meanwhile shall remain impounded for not less than seven days next after the service of said notice, unless such dog be sooner claimed and released as hereinbefore provided.

SECTION 3: That, except as otherwise indicated by the context, a corporation shall be deemed to be a person within the meaning and operation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: That any person who shall

violate any of the terms or provisions of this Ordinance, or do any act or thing herein prohibited, or neglect, fail or refuse to do any act or thing herein required to be done, shall, upon conviction thereof before the Township Recorder or other magistrate, forfeit and pay such fine, not exceeding the sum of \$50.00 for any subsequent offense, as shall be imposed by the Township Recorder or other magistrate in his discretion, or (if the party so convicted be a natural person) be imprisoned in the Township jail or County Jail for such term, not exceeding ten days for the first offense and not exceeding sixty days for any subsequent offense, as the Township Recorder or other magistrate in his discretion shall determine; provided, however, that the Township Recorder or other magistrate shall have power in his discretion to impose sentence of both fine and imprisonment not exceeding the maximum limits hereinbefore fixed.

SECTION 5: That this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its final passage, adoption and publication in the manner prescribed by law.

ELECTION RESULTS

Although voting was not heavy in this section at the Primary Election on Tuesday, boards worked far into the night tallying the votes on the ballot which was complicated by the large number of delegates of both parties. The Edge combination had a big lead for delegates-at-large to the National Convention of the G.O.P.

Smith, for the U. S. Senate, won handily over Witteich and Powers for the House of Representatives and Lewis for General Assembly received large votes. Both were unopposed.

Good Government Strong
The Good Government candidates took all 11 districts in this section in respect to the county clerk and freeholder nominations. Adams led Johnson, the totals being 1132 and 545 respectively.

The vote for Price was 1,091 as compared with 497 for Beyer. Leslie W. Reeves, of Cinnaminson, was far the lead over the other six candidates for Sheriff.

Riverton

With no opposition, Albert C. Farrow and S. Robinson Coale were nominated for the full council term on the Republican ticket and Richard Lippincott was named for the unexpired term.

There was no contest for members of the county committee with the exception of the third district where no petitions were filed by the Republicans. There a lively battle ensued in a write-in vote with James R. Wright of Linden avenue winning over Hilton Smith. The count was Wright, 29; Smith, 23. Wright's majority would have been considerably larger but for the fact that many of his supporters failed to put a cross before his name. Cornelia Murray was elected to the county committee in the same district receiving nine write-ins as compared with eight for Mary Alloway.

Other Candidates

In Palmyra, Wesley P. Huyet and T. Curtis Flynn were the Republican nominees for Borough Council and Edwin A. Griscorn for Collector.

All were without opposition. Maurice Corrow was nominated for member of the Township Committee in Cinnaminson.

The local Democratic vote was so light that it failed to give an indication of the general trend. Dewey for President was written in on many ballots as was Franklin D. Roosevelt on the Democratic ticket.

There were the usual scattered votes for justice of the peace that did no good except to make work for the election boards.

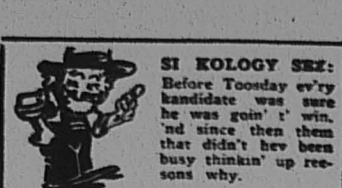

At the regular meeting of the Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club held last Thursday evening the members were presented with three things which

were both pleasant and enjoyable.

First, Paul Jones, Chairman of the Tri-Borough Youth Fund, announced that it had gone over the top in its drive for funds for the Community Center, Y.M.C.A. and Boy Scouts. This was particularly gratifying since the club was the sponsor of this drive.

Second, a letter from Captain Dean H. Lefavor, a member of our club, was read. In his letter he said that he had been able to get moving pictures of some of the scenes of his travels and that they would take about two and a half hours to show so we are anticipating several enjoyable hours reviewing these with Dean when he gets home.

Third, but not least, we were privileged to have as speaker a former resident of Riverton, Captain Robert Coward, Chaplain Corps, Army of the United States. Captain Coward is now stationed at the Air Base, Fort Dix. He spoke on some of his experiences and duties as a chaplain.

Letters

He said that we at home should be extremely careful of what we write in our letters to men in the

armed forces. Many items that seem of small consequence to us are mis-

constructed by the men because we do not go into detail. We should write every letter so that the men will not have a feeling of being left out of things. The men are disturbed inwardly because of the dangers involved and minor things that we in civilian life would pass over are of great consequence to them.

Captain Coward said that in his class at Chaplain School there were over 300 clergymen representing Protestant, Catholic and Jewish religions. There was always a Catholic and Protestant as roommates because they wanted to have the men iron out any differences of ideas before they got into the field as close cooperation is essential when in the camps and on the field.

The chapels in the camps are so arranged that by opening a couple of doors and moving some furniture they can be used by all denominations and sects. At Fort Dix he holds his service on Sunday between Masses held by the Catholic priest.

Each chaplain is issued a field communion set, organ, desk, and flag

for use where there is no regular chapel building.

Joseph J. Burns, Seaman, first class, USNR, of 405 Howard street, Riverton, has returned to his base at the New Orleans Armed Guard Center after spending the past 6 months at sea as a member of the Naval gun crew of a merchant ship.

The 35 year old seaman is a veteran of 12 months sea duty and has visited England, Scotland, many ports in Central America, the Caribbean and along the eastern coast of the United States. His wife, Anna, and their daughter, reside at the Howard street address.

Prior to entering the service, he was employed by the Sherman-Williams Paint Company at Gloucester, N. J.

On September 25, 1942, Burns joined the Navy. He took his 'boot training' at Great Lakes, Ill., and was assigned to the Armed Guard as a merchant ship gunner.

In this war a chaplain does not have any other duties aside from his regular religious work. In World War I a chaplain was likely to be assigned to any duty.

There are over 7,200 chaplains in

the Army. They are the third in line of officer casualties. Thirty

three chaplains are prisoners of war and thirty of these are prisoners of the Japanese. On a number of occasions the Germans have returned a captured chaplain to his own lines under a white flag of truce. Over seventy have received citations and awards of merit for exceptional bravery which proves that the chaplains are with their men when they are needed.

Captain Coward said that for the men in the Chaplain Corps the work was enjoyable and a challenge because they had many opportunities for worthwhile work with the men. The men have many problems which the chaplains aids in solving. The training which the men received as youths has a great bearing on how they accept Army life. He complimented the chap on the job they had done in raising funds for youth work in the three communities.

He said that the war was proving to be a great mission field and might have a great bearing on breaking down the barriers between the Protestant, Catholic and Jewish faiths so that mankind would be more nearly united.

FUEL OIL RULES

Householders under Palmyra Rationing Board were urged today by T. Curtis Flynn, Chairman of the local OPA War Price and Rationing Board, to return their next season's fuel oil renewal forms as promptly as possible.

The forms were mailed out this morning by the board to all fuel oil users in this area, Mr. Flynn said. "The sooner these forms are filled out and returned, by mail, to the board," he added, "the sooner we can begin processing them and issuing oil ration coupons. We would like to have the forms returned within seven days."

"The earlier these coupons are issued, the better," Mr. Flynn said, "because it is necessary for consumers to order part of their next season's supply of heating oil immediately. When dealers make their first deliveries during the summer, they are able to give consumers better delivery service throughout the heating year because it will help them solve their pressing manpower and delivery problems. More important, filling consumers' tanks early will add appreciably to dealers' storage capacity and thereby allow more oil to be brought in now for next winter."

Only Six Questions

The new re-application form contains only six simple questions which the board needs answered in order to renew ration cards for private dwellings for next year. The questions can be answered in a few minutes and the completed form put into the return mail. Persons who wish to renew ration cards for promises other than private dwellings, such as apartment houses, and hotels should answer only the first 3 questions, the board chairman said.

The renewal application is to be filled out only by those persons whose oil ration last year was for the same address as this year, Mr. Flynn said. These may be persons who either are living at the same address for which last year's ration was issued or who control the burning equipment at that address (as in the case of a landlord). Other oil users not included in these categories will be given a chance to fill out another application later.

While the questions may be answered without difficulty by most householders, there may be some special circumstances in some cases which a consumer would want to clear up in order to be sure he is answering correctly. In any such cases, consumers are advised to call Riverton 1435 where all questions will be gladly answered, the chairman said.

"We in the local board would certainly appreciate it if all householders in this District would make a special effort to return the forms within seven days from now," Mr. Flynn said. "It would help us; it would help the fuel oil distributors here and it would also benefit all fuel oil users."

Helpful Hints for Leftovers

Leftover meat, poultry or fish may be combined with potatoes to make wholesome filling for bread patties.

IT is the patriotic duty of every homemaker to conserve food. Use every crumb—every drop! Leftovers should not be thrown away. These can be transformed into appetizing dishes.

Here are several excellent recipes that were planned to use leftovers. They have been tested and adopted by home service consultants who are food experts.

Frankfurter Dinner
(Using Leftover Frankfurters and Sour Milk)
2 tsp. short., 2 frankfurters, sliced thin
2 medium onions, 2 cups tomatoes, sliced
1/4 cup diced green 1 tsp. salt
1/2 cup 1 tsp. pepper
Melt shortening, brown onions and green peppers slightly. Add frankfurters, tomatoes, salt and pepper and bring to boil. Pour into 8"x8" baking pan. Cover with Cornbread Batter.

1/4 cup sifted flour 1 tsp. salt
1/2 cup yellow 2 tsp. shortening
1/2 cup cornmeal 1 egg, beaten
1/2 tsp. soda 1/2 cup sour or sweet milk
1/2 tsp. baking powder
Sift dry ingredients together, cut in shortening. Add egg to milk and stir into dry mixture. Spoon carefully over meat mixture. Bake at 425°F. for 25-30 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

Stuffed Pancakes
(Using Leftover Meat or Poultry and Cheese)
2 cups sifted 1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 cup flour 1 1/2 cups chopped cooked meat or poultry
1/2 tsp. salt 1 cup leftover gravy
1 beaten egg 1/4 cup grated cheese
Sift dry ingredients. Stir in egg, milk and shortening. Melt enough

shortening in skillet to cover bottom. Makes 6 large thin pancakes about 5" across. Brown on both sides. Mix meat or poultry with gravy.

Scalloped Potatoes with Corn
(Using Leftover Potatoes)
4 medium sized 1/2 Dash pepper
cooked pota- 1/2 tsp. paprika
atoes, sliced 1/2 tsp. shortening
1 cup corn 1 cup milk
1 tsp. salt
Place a layer of potatoes, then a layer of corn in greased baking dish. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika. Dot with bits of shortening. Repeat the layers until all ingredients are used. Pour milk over the top. Bake at 375°F. for 45 minutes. Serves 6.

Baked Fruit Custard
(Using Leftover Canned Fruits)
2 eggs 1/2 cup diced left-
over canned over canned
fruit fruit
1 tsp. vanilla Dash cinnamon
2 cups milk
Beat eggs slightly; add sugar, salt and vanilla. Scald milk and add gradually. Stir just until blended (do not beat). Drain fruit. Place in 6 individual greased custard cups. Pour custard over fruit. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Bake in pan of hot water at 325°F. for 1 hour or until a knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serves 6.

Civil War Pudding
(Using Leftover Bread)
2 egg yolks 2 cups bread
cubes
1 pt. milk, scalded Currant jelly
Beat egg yolks slightly. Add sugar and milk. Strain over bread cubes which have been placed in greased casserole. Bake at 325°F. for 1 hour in pan of hot water. Remove from oven, spread with jelly and top with meringue.
