BIG ALLOTMENT FOR RIVERTON

Major improvements in the Riverton Public School building can be expected after the war it was learned by the Riverton Board of Education at a meeting held on Monday night of this week, when the district clerk, William H. Bottger, notified the members that Riverton's initial allotment of the State's post-war public works program would amount to \$64 (sixty-four dollars).

This initial fund of \$500,000 is divided among the counties, municipalities and school districts, the latter being granted \$160,000. This is divided on the basis of pupil enrollment. Trenton, for example, with 12,469 students will get \$4,096; Riverton, with 187 pupils thus gets a proportional share.

The board took no action regarding the disposal of the funds.

Much Activity

The school auditorium promises to be a busy place this winter as the board approved requests for three organizations to meet there one night each week. These are the Girl Scouts, the Apache Y.M.C.A. group and the local basketball league.

Members were advised that the tuition at Palmyra High School this year would be \$150.95 per pupil.

Eight of these pupils besides those in the Kindergarten are new to the system this year.

O'Neil Wounded Again

Mrs. John O'Neil, of Parry, received word last Friday that her husband, Pfc. J. W. O'Neil, had been wounded again and was in a hospital in France.

Private O'Neil, a member of the famous First Division, was first wounded in the shoulder on D-Day. After recovering from this injury at an English hospital, he was awarded the Purple Heart Medal and rejoined his outfit which has been in the thick of all major engagements.

According to the letter, his latest injury was in the foot and sustained while fighting near the Siegfried line.

His wife is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Erich Veitenheimer, of Cinnaminson.

Citation For Sgt. King

Sgt. Thalberg King, Jr., 22, of 404 Main St., Riverton, has been awarded a blue and gold Distinguished Unit Citation ribbon. He is a crew chief in the top scoring P-51 Mustang fighter group in the Mediterranean theater under the command of Lt. Col. Yancey S. Tarrant of Brownwood, Texas.

The Mustang Group was cited for its outstanding performance of duty against the enemy on April 21, 1944. Despite having nearly reached the limit of their endurance after having flown over five hundred and eighty miles through almost insurmountable weather conditions, the P-51's fought off a total of sixty enemy fighters, in two groups of thirty each, which threatened the bomber formation. By destroying sixteen and probably destroying or damaging a number of others, the Mustangs enabled the seven groups of 15th Air Force heavy bombers, which had not received the recall signal sent out because of the adverse weather conditions, to complete a highly successful mission against the important enemy installations and production centers in the Ploesti-Bucharest area of Rumania.

The latter, according to Private Smith, had never jumped from a plane. "Nevertheless, they were tough fighters," he said.

District Governor Here

Palmyra-Riverton Rotarians were host to District Governor Esmor Roberts of the Marlton-Medford-Vincentown Club last Thursday. Mr. Roberts, who is well known locally through his service as state senator, gave an inspirational talk on the meaning of Rotary. Another feature of his visit was the induction by him of two new members, Mr. Robert J. Finney and Robert Kennedy. The former will fill the classification of oil refining and the latter that of lens manufacturing.

Governor Roberts introduced his remarks by pointing out that American Rotarians are spared the suffering which is commonplace in other lands. We take our freedom as a matter of course but clubs in the distant parts of the world and in the occupied countries meet only under the greatest of difficulty. As examples, Mr. Roberts cited the continued growth of New Zealand clubs even though every man up to forty-two years of age has been called into government service. He pointed out that Rotary in India was spreading rapidly and that three of the sixteen new clubs which were formed in the month of July were located in that much discussed country. The Calcutta Club has achieved international commendation because of its work with famine sufferers. It is not a rich organization yet has contributed very much of its own money to help others. After congratulating the past and promising future of the local club he spoke particularly of the example it was setting by sending nine copies of the Spanish edition of the Rotarian to schools and other places where it would be appreciated. Commenting upon the growing size of the local club he called attention to the fact that there were 113,000 new members in Rotary International last year and that the world wide attendance average was over 85 per cent.

Founded on Fellowship

Rotary, said Mr. Roberts is founded on fellowship. It is not a political group but it does encourage critical thinking on civic problems by its members. Neither, he stated, is it a religious group but it encourages every Rotarian to be a loyal church member. Rotary standards in business are high and no true member places personal gain before the service factor.

Finally, the District Governor stressed two problems in which Rotary is greatly interested for the future. The first of these was youth work and the second the promotion of a lasting peace. Rotary International is greatly concerned about what will happen after the war. It regards an efficient reconversion policy as vital and is working with all agencies to bring this about. On the matter of post-war relationships, Rotary definitely possesses the international viewpoint. In closing Governor Roberts quoted Colonel Carlos Romulo, Philippine soldier and author, a former Manila Rotarian, who stated that thinking people of the Far East anticipate a great expansion of Rotary there because they feel it has so much to offer as a service organization. Rotary, however, will be no better than its individual clubs, and spirit and achievement can form a mighty structure of international good will and understanding.

Rotarians were greatly interested in a letter from Dr. Dean LeFavor who is still in Africa. His remarks about the increasing demands upon their organization is in line with the great military operations in Western Europe. The club was saddened to learn that Sgt. Warren Lamon, son of Rotarian Walter Lamon had been reported missing in action.

The speaker for next week's meeting will be Dr. Fred Griffin, pastor of the First Unitarian Church in Philadelphia, who will speak on the "Patriots' Dream." Dr. Griffin is one of the outstanding speakers along the Eastern seaboard.

Total Federal appropriations for all except direct war purposes are 9.847 million dollars in general and special accounts. ble on all highways, in flagrant violation of the 35-mile wartime speed limit. Their usefulness can be prolonged for vital transportation needs only through extraordinary care both in maintenance and operation.

The great majority of American motorists must of necessity get along with what they have until automotive production has been in full swing for two, or perhaps three years. Even the miracle workers who are grinding the Axis into dust with production of war materials can't fill the automotive wants of America without ample time.

"The problem, therefore, is one for each individual car owner to solve. He can shorten his car's life by dipping into the black market and piling up illegal mileage. He can ruin his tires by neglect of a few fundamentals in tire care. He can wreck the motor and other irreplaceable parts by lack of proper maintenance. Or, he can prolong the usefulness of his vehicle by taking all steps necessary for its upkeep and driving only when necessity demands."

Only one person in every 419 in New Jersey was on relief during the second quarter of 1944, according to Department of Economic Development statistics quoted by the New Jersey Taxpayers Association.

MASON MEMBER OF P-51 MUSTANG GROUP Private Robert W. Mason, of Riverton, New Jersey, is a member of an Eighth Fighter Command P-51 Mustang group which recently passed the 450 mark in victories over Nazi planes, becoming the third American fighter group in the European Theater of Operations to make such a record.

Private Mason is serving with a refueling unit in a Mustang squadron here and his work contributed to the group's high record of combat efficiency. As a part of the organization which enables the fighter pilots to devote all their time and energy to the pursuit and destruction of the Luftwaffe, he is helping to keep American fighter planes in combat against the enemy over every corner of occupied Europe.

This fighter group, commanded by Colonel William J. Cummings, Jr., of Lawrence, Kansas, established a record for American units in this theater when it destroyed 44 enemy planes on the ground and seven in the air on one mission. And in four low-level attacks, the group destroyed 118 German planes on the ground, an average of more than 29 per mission.

LICENSES REVOKED

License revocations in New Jersey were 12 per cent fewer during the first eight months of the year than in the corresponding period of last

year, Motor Vehicle Commissioner Arthur W. Magee reported recently. This year's revocations to date total 6,524 as against 7,459.

The number of convictions for driving while intoxicated, which carries a mandatory two year revocation, was 396, a four per cent decrease under last year. While declines were reported in most of the revocation causes, there were two violations outstanding for the gains made during the eight months period. Drivers involved in personal injury accidents as the result of traffic law violations rose from 98 to 211 while drivers twice convicted of speeding (a war emergency measure), total 709 as against 434 last year.

dates for state and county office, is dedicated to a speedy victory, a lasting peace and an efficient and economical governmental administration."

Lewis pointed out that all citizens of the United States, twenty-one years or older by November 7, 1944, who have lived in New Jersey at least one year and in the county for five months directly preceding November 7, and who, at the time they register, are residents of the voting district where they expect to vote, are eligible for permanent registration.

Citizens can register by going to their registration office and signing the permanent registration blank. If a citizen moves within the county, he must have given notice by mail or in person to the County Board of Elections or the municipal clerk if he did not live in the countyseat before September 28. Persons who moved after September 28 may vote in the district from which they move on signing the proper affidavit provided by the district board of elections at the polls on election day. Citizens who move to another county within five months before November 7, cannot vote.

A woman who changes her name by marriage or divorce should re-

register at once. If she has not done so on or before October 10 and has not voted since the change of name, or if the change of name is made after October 10, she may vote after signing her former name and her present name on an emergency ballot provided by the district election board at the polls. She must later re-register in order to be eligible to vote at future elections.

"Voting is not only a right but it is a solemn duty of every American citizen. The privilege to vote, to select our own public officials is a part of the democracy for which our

boys are fighting overseas." Assemblyman Lewis said, "We must not fail them by failing to cast our ballot on November 7. To vote the Republican ticket will be to insure good government for the county, state and nation, and the perpetuation of our American way of Life."

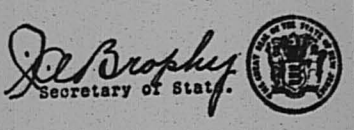

ARTICLE V—Sections IV and V (with part of Schedule*)

Revised Constitution FOR THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY

To Be Voted Upon as a Whole by the Voters of New Jersey at the General Election, Nov. 7, 1944

ARTICLE V JUDICIAL SECTION IV

Appellate Divisions 1. There shall be established in the Superior Court two or more appellate divisions as prescribed by rules of the Supreme Court...

Appeals: Appellate Division 2. An appeal to an appellate division may be taken from any final order, judgment or decree of the Superior Court...

Appeals: Supreme Court 3. Appeals to the Supreme Court from any court may be taken only: (1) In capital cases and cases involving a question arising under the Constitution of the United States...

Appeals: Final Determination 4. The Supreme Court and the appellate divisions of the Superior Court, in addition to their other powers, may set aside judgments at law, wholly or in part, where the finding of fact is against the weight of evidence...

The run-in side headings are not in the official text of the Revised Constitution. They appear above for your convenience.

SECTION V

Judges: Appointment 1. The Governor shall nominate and appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, the Chief Justice and Associate Justices of the Supreme Court...

Justices: Qualifications 2. The Chief Justice and each Associate Justice of the Supreme Court and each Justice of the Superior Court shall, prior to his appointment, have been an attorney-at-law of this State in good standing for at least ten years...

Justices: Impeachment 3. The Justices of the Supreme Court shall be appointed to hold office during good behavior without limited terms except as to age as provided in this Constitution. The Justices of the Superior Court shall hold office during good behavior without limited terms except as to age as provided in this Constitution...

Justices: Age Limit 5. No Justice of the Supreme Court or of the Superior Court shall continue in office after he has attained the age of seventy years; but, subject to law, he may be assigned by the Chief Justice to temporary service in the Supreme Court or in the Superior Court, as need appears.

ARTICLE XI—SCHEDULE—SECTION IV

*The "Schedule" provides for orderly transition from the old to the new Constitution. In the official text it appears as a single Article (XI) at the end of the Revised Constitution. For ready reference, however, the Schedule is being printed in appropriate parts with the articles to which it relates.

4. When the Judicial Article of this Constitution takes effect:

(a) All causes pending in the Court of Errors and Appeals shall be transferred to the new Supreme Court for determination; (b) All causes pending on appeal in the present Supreme Court and in the Prerogative Court and all causes involving the Prerogative Writ shall be transferred to an appellate division of the Superior Court...

(c) All causes pending in the present Supreme Court sitting at circuit shall be transferred to the law section of the Superior Court of the appropriate county; and all causes pending in the Court of Chancery and all other causes pending in the Prerogative Court shall be transferred to the equity and probate section of the Superior Court of the appropriate county; (d) All causes pending in any other county or State Courts, which are superseded by the taking effect of the Judicial Article of this Constitution, shall be transferred to the Superior Court...

5. The files of all causes pending in the Court of Errors and Appeals shall be delivered by the Secretary of State to the Clerk of the new Supreme Court and the files of all causes pending in the present Supreme Court, in the Court of Chancery and the Prerogative Court shall be delivered by the Clerk of the Supreme Court, the Clerk in Chancery and the Register of the Prerogative Court, respectively, to the State Clerk of the Superior Court, and all other files, books, papers, records and documents and all property of the Court of Errors and Appeals, of the present Supreme Court, of the Prerogative Court and of the Court of Chancery or in the custody of said Courts shall be disposed of as shall be provided by law...

6. The Court of Errors and Appeals, the present Supreme Court, the Court of Chancery and the Prerogative Court shall be abolished when the Judicial Article of this Constitution takes effect and all their jurisdiction, functions, powers and duties shall be transferred to and divided between the new Supreme Court and the Superior Court according as jurisdiction is vested in each of them under this Constitution.

7. The Circuit Courts, Courts of Common Pleas, Courts of Oyer and Terminer, Courts of Quarter Sessions, Courts of Special Sessions and the Orphans' Courts shall be abolished when the Judicial Article of this Constitution takes effect, and all their jurisdiction, functions, powers and duties shall be transferred to the Superior Court. Causes pending in such superseded Courts shall be heard in the Superior Court sitting in the same county.

THE PORCH CLUB

The Revised Constitution for the State of New Jersey, to be voted upon as a whole by the voters of New Jersey at the General Election, November 7, 1944, will be discussed by Spencer Miller, Jr., State Highway Commissioner, from South Orange, N. J., at the Porch Club on Tuesday, October 17, at 2:30 p.m. Immediately after Mr. Miller became Highway Commissioner, in May, 1942, through appointment by Gov. Chas. Edison, he was delegated to act as the Federal Government representative in the construction of military access and strategic road network required by the Army and Navy.

Fifty-two of these projects were completed under his direction within eighteen months, through awards of the work to low bidders. Commissioner Miller also filled various other important posts in the war-time emergency, including those of Chairman of State Traffic Advisory Committee, State Snow Removal Co-ordinator, President of the New Jersey Constitution Foundation. Last October special distinction was conferred upon him when he received an official invitation from the British Ministry of Information with the good offices of the U. S. War Information office and the approval of Gov. Chas. Edison to make a study of Post War planning in Great Britain. Reports of his observations included those made to the United States Office of War Information, Gov. Edison, Commissioner of Education John H. Bossart and to the State Highway Department. Rutgers University conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters on Spencer Miller, Jr., at its Commencement Saturday, May 1, 1943.

This will be an open meeting at the Porch Club in order that as many voters as possible can take advantage of Mr. Miller's knowledge of the issue to be voted on Election Day, November 7, 1944. It is suggested that everyone make a special effort to attend.

Even greater demands will be made upon our Visiting Nurses during the coming year. Hospital services have been curtailed because of the shortage of doctors and nurses. More babies are being born at home and less serious illnesses are treated at home. This condition increases the responsibility of the Public Health Nurses and they carry the burden of keeping their Community up to standard.

The Visiting Nurses have carried on health programs in the local schools, established a Baby Clinic in Palmyra and assisted in a Venereal Disease Clinic at Zurbrugg Hospital. Public health is of vital importance and a community's responsibility. With the pressure of war activities it is easy to forget the existing organizations which have served us for many years.

The Family Service Council of Riverton and Cinnaminson

which provides "family service" that operates in advance of relief, supplements relief and follows relief, in order that the need for relief may be deferred or avoided; that in deserving cases the arbitrary standards for relief may be supplemented, and that the job of maintaining morale and economic independence may be wisely supervised after relief is withdrawn. This is an insurance that is necessary to our Community.

Burlington County Hospital

The emergency of war has greatly increased the difficulty of hospital administration. Doctors and nurses have been called to the colors in growing numbers and the challenge to such institutions as the Burlington County Hospital to hold the quality of service unimpaired, is indeed a serious one. It is a matter of pride that the challenge has been well met this year, in spite of the fact that the greatest number of patients in the institution's history have applied for and received care.

The Cinnaminson Home

The Cinnaminson Home has a record of fifty-two years of valuable service in our Community. Sixty-four hospitals and social agencies, as well as doctors and ministers have learned to turn to The Home when problems of convalescent care or spiritual and physical rehabilitation for women and girls confront them. It is more than ever important, at this time, to render this service, which returns these people to their homes as useful members of society, and we hope that the generous support of our friends and neighbors will not fail us now.

The Zurbrugg Memorial Hospital

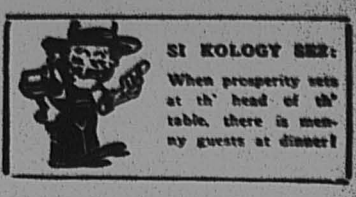

BOY INJURED

Robert Oliver, 7, of 623 Main street, Riverton, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Oliver, is in Zurbrugg Memorial Hospital with a possible fractured skull as a result of being hit by a car at Seventh and Main streets last Friday afternoon, shortly before 5 o'clock.

The driver of the car involved was James C. Fish, of Westmont, who was on his way to a doctor here.

At a hearing conducted before Recorder William H. Bottger on Friday night, Fish was charged with careless driving by Mr. Oliver. In the testimony, it developed that Oliver, driving his trailer truck had turned from Main into Seventh street and his son, across Main, was running to meet his father when he was hit.

Another car Fish, in his testimony, in which he was substantiated by his wife, said that a moving van, going south on Main obscured his vision so that he was unable to avoid hitting the boy, although he drove his car to the curb in an attempt to prevent an accident. Two other boys also crossing the street were uninjured.

Recorder Bottger found Fish guilty of careless driving (to which charge he had pleaded not guilty) and suspended sentence.

Officer John Robinson of the Riverton police investigated the incident.

NO REGISTRATION

While Officer John Robinson, of the Riverton police was questioning Mrs. J. C. Fish, wife of the driver of the car involved in the Oliver accident last Friday afternoon, a car going south on Main street, rounded the turn at Seventh at a high rate of speed and narrowly missed hitting the group of people who had been attracted to the scene by the previous mishap. The spectators also noted that the machine had no '44 license plates.

Robinson immediately started in pursuit and when the car turned north into Cinnaminson street, a dead end, stopped the machine and arrested the occupants, the driver being Alvin Dasulis, from Cambridge, a member of the U. S. Army Medical Corps home on furlough at Cambridge with his parents. This fellow, out of uniform, which he stated was being pressed, was tough, having been bolstered with a sizeable portion of a fifth of amber whiskey of a well known brand. Robinson, however, cooled him down and took the driver and his companion, one J. D. Stinson, also in the Medical Corps, and a former oil well digger from Oklahoma, to the police station.

At a hearing held Friday night before Recorder William H. Bottger, Dasulis pleaded guilty to the charge of driving a car without proper registration and disorderly conduct. He was not sufficiently intoxicated to be pronounced guilty of drunken driving. His companion was found guilty of intoxication.

Both were fined and assessed costs by the Recorder on all charges which the oil man paid. In the testimony it was brought out that the pair were on their way to Burlington to get a license for the car which is owned by Dasulis. He, apparently, was entirely unaware of the fact that Palmyra, where he stated he was going, is not a suburb of Burlington, nor of Riverton.

Recorder Bottger gave the two offenders a most opportune lecture upon the conduct of members of the armed forces while on leave. In this he was ably assisted by two members of the State Police who were also present before the hearing ended.

New Jersey's proposed new Constitution represents a "great advance over the present Constitution" according to Charles A. Beard, noted historian and constitutional authority. Beard, in a letter to State Highway Commissioner Spencer Miller, Jr., expresses his hope that "the people will give their approval in November."

Beard, who is co-author of a recently widely-acclaimed book, "The Basic History of the United States," has been noted as an outstanding writer and authority in the field of politics since 1904. He has written several works on American government and politics and in many quarters he is looked upon as America's leading living historian.

In his letter to Commissioner Miller, Beard wrote: "I have followed the press reports on the long struggle you have had in New Jersey over efforts to bring your fundamental law up-to-date. For a long time it looked as if nothing could be accomplished but you seem to be in sight of the goal at last, in spite of all the barriers. . . I have read the document very carefully. It is my opinion that, in view of all the conflicting interests which had to be conciliated, the proposed Constitution represents a great advance over the present Constitution. The state is to be congratulated and I hope that he people will give their approval in November."

TRAFFIC DEATHS

Motor Vehicle Commissioner Arthur W. Magee reported today that New Jersey traffic accident fatalities have followed a downward trend for the past five months with the result that, as of September 1, there were 40 fewer lives lost on the streets and highways.

Citing figures, Commissioner Ma-

ge announced that 365 persons have been killed this year as against 405 last year, a decrease of 10 per cent. Approximately 57 per cent of those killed were pedestrians.

Anxious that the State maintain its improved record, Commissioner Magee warns motorists against the hazardous road conditions due to falling leaves during the months of October and November.

"Wet leaves," he said "make highways extremely treacherous. Motorists should not attempt quick stops on roads covered with soggy foliage, because of the skidding danger. Early darkness is another factor to be considered in driving at this time of year."

ARTICLE V—Sections V, VI, and ARTICLE VI—Section I (with part of Schedule*)

Revised Constitution

FOR THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY



To Be Voted Upon as a Whole by the Voters of New Jersey at the General Election, Nov. 7, 1944

ARTICLE V JUDICIAL

SECTION V (concluded)

Judges: Compensation Full Time Service, etc.

6. The Chief Justice and the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and the Justices of the Superior Court shall, at stated intervals, receive for their services such salaries as may be provided by law which shall not be diminished during the term of their appointment. They shall hold no other office, or position, of profit under the government of this State or of the United States or of any instrumentality or political subdivision of either of them. Any justice or judge of any court in this State who shall become a candidate for an elective public office shall thereby forfeit his judicial office. The Justices of the Supreme Court and of the Superior Court shall not, while in office, engage in the practice of law or other gainful occupation.

Courts: Power of Superior Court Justice

7. A Justice of the Superior Court may exercise the powers of a judge of any court established by law in the county or counties to which he may be assigned and may hold any such court with like jurisdiction, powers and duties as a judge therein.

Judges, Inferior Courts: Removal

8. Judges of inferior courts may be removed from office without impeachment and in such manner as may be provided by law.

SECTION VI

Administration of Courts (1, 2)

1. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall be the administrative head of all of the courts in this State, and shall supervise their work. He shall appoint an executive director of the courts to serve at his pleasure.

2. The executive director shall:

- (1) Assist the Chief Justice in all matters related to the administration, finance and personnel of the courts;
- (2) Publish a statistical record of the judicial services of all the courts, the justices and judges in the State, and of the cost thereof, at such times as shall be required by law;
- (3) Prescribe records, reports and audits for the inferior courts;
- (4) Have such other duties as may be delegated by the Chief Justice.

Reporter: Clerk of Courts (3, 4)

3. The Supreme Court shall appoint a Court Reporter, a Clerk of the Supreme Court, and a State Clerk of the Superior Court, each of whom shall hold office at the pleasure of the Supreme Court. The appointment of the Clerk of the Supreme Court and of the State Clerk of the Superior Court shall be made with the approval of the Governor.

4. The State Clerk of the Superior Court shall act as clerk of the appellate divisions and he, the county clerks and surrogates shall be the clerks of the Superior Court and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by rules of the Supreme Court subject to law.

Judgments, etc.

5. Judgments may be docketed and notices of pendency of actions and other papers or documents may be filed or recorded in such offices, with such effect, and in such manner, as may be prescribed by law.

Assignment of Justices

6. The Chief Justice, subject to the provisions of this Constitution, shall annually assign the Justices of the Superior Court to the counties and to the parts of the Superior Court, and may from time to time transfer Justices from one assignment to another, and make temporary assignments to the appellate divisions, as need appears.

Report of Work of Courts

7. Prior to each legislative session the Chief Justice shall file with the Governor and the Legislature a report of the work of the courts as provided by law.

ARTICLE VI

PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

SECTION I

Oaths of Office

1. Every appointive State officer shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, take and subscribe an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of this State and of the United States and to perform the duties of his office faithfully, impartially and justly to the best of his ability.

Merit System

2. In the civil service of the State and all of its civil divisions, all offices and positions shall be classified according to duties and responsibilities, salary ranges shall be established for the various classes, and all appointments and promotions shall be made according to merit and fitness to be ascertained, so far as practicable, by examinations, which, so far as practicable, shall be competitive; except that preference in the appointment of persons who have been or shall have been in active service in any branch of

the military or naval forces of the United States in time of war may be created by law.

Extra Compensation

3. Any compensation for services or any fees received by any person by virtue of his appointive State office or position, in addition to the annual salary provided therefor, shall be forthwith paid by him into the State Treasury, unless the compensation or fees be allowed or appropriated to him by the Legislature.

ARTICLE XII—SCHEDULE—SECTION IV

*The "Schedule" practices for orderly transition from the old to the new Constitution. Its official text is appended as a single Article (XII) at the end of the Revised Constitution. For ready reference, however, the Schedule is being printed in appropriate parts with the Articles to which it relates.

8. From and after the taking effect of the Judicial Article of this Constitution, all the functions, powers and duties conferred by statute or rule upon the Chancellor, the Ordinary and the Justices and Judges of Courts abolished by this Constitution, to the extent that such functions, powers and duties are not inconsistent with this Constitution, shall be transferred to and may be exercised by Justices of the Superior Court until otherwise provided by law or rule of the Supreme Court excepting that such statutory powers not related to the administration of Justice as are then vested in any such judicial officers shall, after the Judicial Article of this Constitution takes effect and until otherwise provided by law, be transferred to and shall be exercised by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

9. Upon the taking effect of the Judicial Article of this Constitution, the Clerk of the Supreme Court shall become the Clerk of the new Supreme Court and shall serve as such Clerk until the expiration of the term for which he was appointed as Clerk of the Supreme Court, and all employees of the Supreme Court as previously constituted, of the Clerk thereof and of the Court of Errors and Appeals shall be transferred to appropriate similar positions with similar compensation and civil service status under the Clerk of the Supreme Court or the Supreme Court which shall be provided by law.

10. Upon the taking effect of the Judicial Article of this Constitution, the Clerk in Chancery shall become the State Clerk of the Superior Court and shall serve as such Clerk until the expiration of the term for which he was appointed as Clerk in Chancery, and all employees of the Clerk in Chancery, the Court of Chancery, the Chancellor and the several Vice-Chancellors shall be transferred to appropriate similar positions with similar compensation and civil service status under the State Clerk of the Superior Court or the Superior Court which shall be provided by law.

11. Appropriations made by law for judicial expenditures during the fiscal year 1945-1946 may be transferred to similar objects and purposes required by the Judicial Article. Restrictions upon supplemental appropriations contained in this Constitution shall not apply to any appropriations which may be required to finance the new judicial system prior to the fiscal year 1946-1947.

12. The Judicial Article of this Constitution shall take effect on the first day of November, one thousand nine hundred and forty-five, except that any provision of this Constitution which may require any act to be done prior thereto or in preparation therefor shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

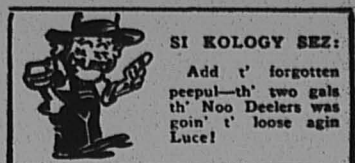

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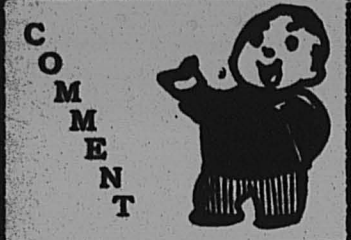

Is the National Dairy Council afraid that people will get wise to the fact that margarine is as good as it is? It certainly appears that way.

CONSERVE FUEL OIL, URGED BY FLYNN

Continued conservation of fuel oil was urged today by T. Curtis Flynn (board chairman) as he requested fuel oil users who have not yet filed renewal applications for the 1944-45 heating season to do so at once.

Local War Price and Rationing Boards are now completing the mailing of fuel oil ration coupons for the season, Mr. Flynn said. The heating season began on September 1. Coupons now being issued must be budgeted to last through next August 31, he said.

The OPA director emphasized that any consumer failing to file the simple renewal application form 1167 before October 1 will lose a small percentage of his yearly ration due to the fact that from that date on, in most areas, a portion of the season will have elapsed and for that elapsed portion of the season a deduction corresponding to the total ration will

all of the oil allocated for civilian use, and to distribute that oil fairly to all consumers. When more oil is available, for civilian use, OPA will see that consumers get it."

Mr. Flynn especially urged fuel oil users to budget their rations carefully.

Each consumer is being provided a "Ration Calendar and Delivery Record" with his coupons. It contains a fuel oil consumption chart showing how much oil should have been burned at any time during the heating year. OPA will announce weekly the percentage of the heating season that elapsed so that consumers may easily make comparisons on their ration calendar.

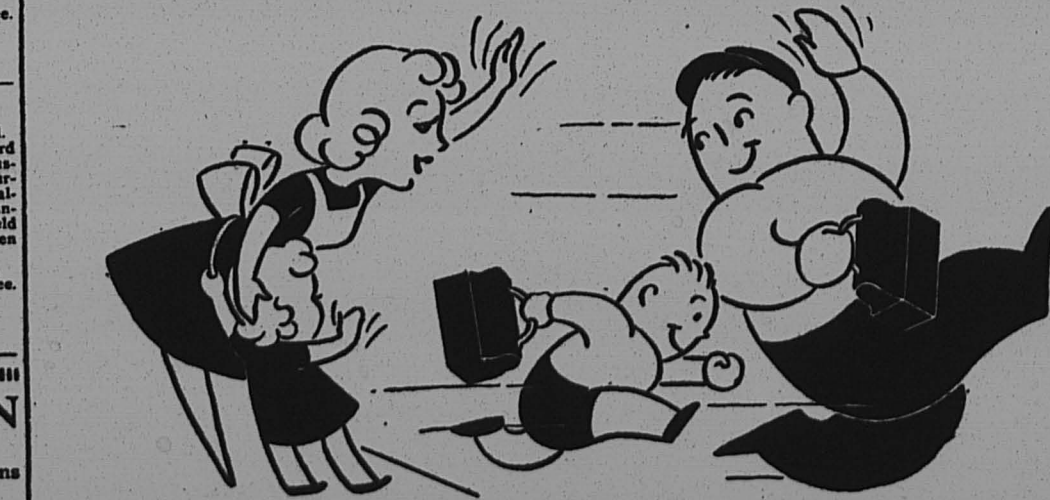

ARTICLE VI—Sections I (concluded), II, III, IV and ARTICLE VII

Revised Constitution

FOR THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY



To Be Voted Upon as a Whole by the Voters of New Jersey at the General Election, Nov. 7, 1944

ARTICLE VI PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES SECTION I (concluded)

Official Bonds 4. Any person before entering upon the duties of, or while holding, any public office, position or employment in this State may be required to give bond, as may be provided by law.

Terms of Office; Commissions 5. The term of office of all officers elected or appointed pursuant to the provisions of this Constitution, except when herein otherwise directed, shall commence on the day of the date of their respective commissions; but no commission for any office shall bear date prior to the expiration of the term of the incumbent of said office.

Officers Elected by the Legislature 1. The State Comptroller, the State Treasurer and the State Auditor shall be elected by the Senate and General Assembly in joint meeting for terms of four years and until their successors shall be qualified into office. The Governor may, whenever in his opinion it would be in the public interest, require from them written statements, under oath, of information on any matter relating to the conduct of their respective offices.

Prosecutors of the Pleas 2. Prosecutors of the pleas shall be nominated by the Governor and appointed by him with the advice and consent of the Senate. They shall hold their offices for terms of five years.

Elective County Officers 3. County clerks, surrogates, sheriffs and coroners shall be elected by the people of their respective counties at general elections. County clerks and surrogates shall hold office for terms of five years. Sheriffs and coroners shall hold office for terms of three years. Whenever a vacancy occurs in the office of county clerk, surrogate, sheriff or coroner in any county, it shall be filled in such manner as may be provided by law.

Legislative Investigations; Duties of Officers and Employees 1. The Legislature may by concurrent resolution and either house thereof may by resolution constitute and empower a committee thereof or any public officer or agency to investigate any and all phases of State and local government, or any part thereof, the fidelity of any public officer or employee, or the performance of any public office, employment or trust. No person shall be privileged from testifying in relation to any such matters, and upon so testifying he shall be immune from criminal prosecution with respect to any matter to which such testimony may relate unless he has waived such immunity. Any person holding public office, position or

employment who shall refuse or willfully fail to obey any subpoena lawfully issued by such investigating committee, officer or agency, or who shall refuse to testify or to answer any questions relating to any matter under investigation, or who shall refuse to waive immunity from prosecution with respect to any matter upon which he may testify, shall thereby become disqualified to continue in his office, position or employment, which shall forthwith be deemed vacant and he shall be ineligible to hold any public office, position or employment.

Impeachments (1, 2, 3) 1. The Governor and all other civil officers of the State Government, except judicial officers, shall be liable to impeachment for misdemeanor in office during their continuance in office and for two years thereafter.

2. The General Assembly shall have the sole power of impeaching in such cases by a vote of a majority of all the members. All such impeachments shall be tried by the Senate, and members, when sitting for that purpose, shall be on oath or affirmation "truly and impartially to try and determine the charge in question according to evidence;" and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of all the members of the Senate.

3. Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and to disqualification to hold and enjoy any public office of honor, profit or trust in this State; but the person convicted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial and punishment according to law.

ARTICLE VII FINANCE

State Credit 1. The credit of the State shall not be directly or indirectly loaned in any case.

State Revenues 2. All revenues of the State Government from whatever source derived, including revenues of all departments, agencies and offices, shall be paid into a single fund to be known as the General State Fund and shall be subject to appropriations for any public purpose, but this paragraph shall not apply to moneys which may be received or held in trust, or under grant or contract for restricted use, or which must be received or held in a particular manner in order to receive a grant, or which may be payable to any county, municipality or school district, of the State. Nothing in this paragraph shall prevent or interfere with any payment of State revenues to, or any direct or indirect collection or retention of State revenues by, any county, municipality or school district which payment, collection, or retention may be provided by law. Nothing in this paragraph shall abridge the right of the State to enter into contracts.

State Budget 3. No money shall be drawn from the State Treasury but for appropriations made by law. So far as known or can be reasonably foreseen, all needs for the support of the State Government and for all other State purposes shall be provided for in one general appropriation law covering one and the same fiscal year, except that, when change in fiscal year is made, necessary provision may be made to effect the transition. No general appropriation law or other law appropriating money for any State purpose shall be enacted if the appropriation contained therein together with all prior appropriations made for the same fiscal period shall exceed the total amount of revenue on hand and anticipated which will be available to meet such appropriations during such fiscal period, as certified by the State Comptroller.

Property Taxes 4. Property shall be assessed for taxes under general laws, and by uniform rules, according to standards of value as may be provided by law but not in excess of true value; but exemption from taxation may be granted by law to persons who have been, are, shall be or shall have been in active service in any branch of the military or naval forces of the United States in time of war.

State Debts 5. The Legislature shall not, in any manner, create any debt or liability or liabilities, of the State, which shall singly or in the aggregate with any previous debts or liabilities at any time exceed one hundred thousand dollars, except for purposes of war, or to repel invasions, or to suppress insurrection, or to meet an emergency caused by act of God or disaster, unless the same shall be authorized by a law for some single object or work to be distinctly specified therein; which law shall provide the ways and means, exclusive of loans, to pay the principal and interest of such debt or liability as it falls due. No such laws shall take effect until it shall, at a general election, have been submitted to the people, and have received the sanction of a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election. Any such debt or liability thereby authorized shall be paid in annual installments, the first of which shall be payable not more than one year and the last of which shall be payable not more than thirty-five years, after such debt or liability shall have been contracted; but the privilege of paying all or any part thereof prior to maturity may be reserved to the State as may be provided in the law authorizing such debt or liability. All money to be raised by the authority of any such law shall be applied only to the specific object or work stated therein and to the payment of the debt or liability thereby created. No such law shall be repealable until such debt or liability, and the interest thereon, are fully paid and discharged.

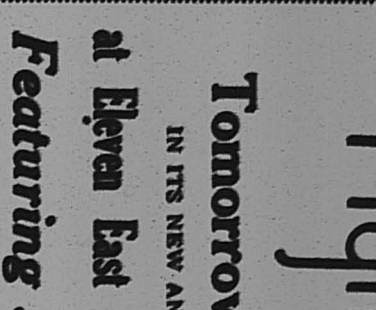

MORTGAGE BURNING

If you are a member or adherent of the Calvary Church you should have already received an invitation to the Mortgage Burning Service to be held in the Sanctuary on Friday evening, October 27, at eight o'clock. If you have not, just blame it on the postal authorities, or on some unintentional oversight, and accept this notice as your personal invitation. The Session and Trustees are anxious to have everyone who has at any time or in any way contributed towards the liquidation of the church who are interested in attending this service are also very cordially invited.

Special commemorative programs have been printed, and extra copies, with mailing envelopes, may be obtained on Friday evening. Copies will be sent by the Church to all Honor Roll members and non-resident members, but there may be others, associated with the Calvary Church in other years who would be interested in receiving a program from a friend.

In preparing the historical note for inclusion in the permanent records of the Church some very interesting facts have emerged that should be of interest to all who are acquainted with the Calvary Church property as it is today.

When the officers of the Church first decided, on April 1, 1925, that the existing building was inadequate to meet the religious needs of local Presbyterians it was agreed to proceed with improvements not to exceed a total cost of \$6,000. A month later the ceiling had been lifted to \$12,000. The following month Mr. George T. Dold presented rather ambitious plans for a new church building and these received favorable attention. Eight months later the congregation voted to proceed with the erection of a Sunday School building and to remodel the existing church at a cost not to exceed \$55,000. This figure stood for exactly three months, when the ceiling was raised to \$75,000, and by May 17, 1926, seventy-five percent of this sum had been pledged, the Vaughan family, then residing on River Bank having expressed the purpose to give \$20,000 towards the cost of the edifice.

The contract for the new church building was let on July 13, 1926, and the building was completed in approximately fourteen months. For a part of that period the congregation met in the Porch Club, while Sunday School was held in the Riverton Public School.

The mortgage, placed on the church property on April 6, 1927, never at any time exceeded the December 1, 1927 figure of \$38,000. By April 1, 1943 it had been reduced to \$16,200, and on September 30, 1944 the indebtedness was completely liquidated.

While high commendation is due to those who labored so tirelessly and so successfully during the past eighteen months to free the church from a debt that had already cost the congregation over \$19,000 in interest payments alone, one cannot fail to pay still greater tribute to that smaller band of the early "twenties" who had the vision of a beautiful House of God, lifting its stoneware tower to the heavens, and who had the spirit of sacrifice necessary to actualize their dream.

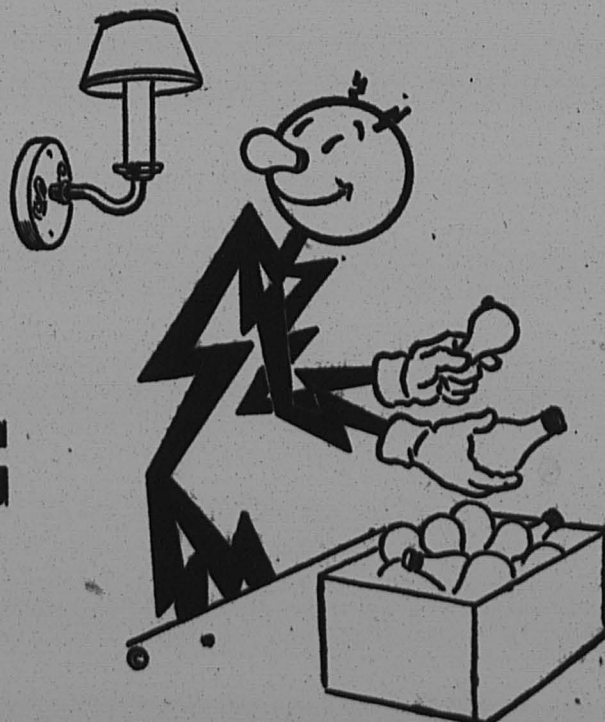

ARTICLES VIII, IX and X (with part of Schedule)

Revised Constitution FOR THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY



To Be Voted Upon as a Whole by the Voters of New Jersey at the General Election, Nov. 7, 1944

ARTICLE VIII ELECTIONS AND SUFFRAGE

General Elections 1. General elections shall be held annually on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; but the time of holding such elections may be altered by law. The Governor and members of the Legislature shall be chosen at general elections.

Public Questions 2. All questions, which are to be submitted to a vote of the people of the entire State, shall be submitted at general elections.

Qualifications of Voters 3. Subject to the provisions of this Article, every citizen of the United States who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, been a resident of this State one year and of the county in which the vote is claimed five months, next before an election, and who shall have been duly registered as a voter pursuant to law, shall be entitled to vote therein for all officers that are now or hereafter may be elective by the people, and upon all questions which may be submitted to a vote of the people.

4. No pauper, idiot, or insane person shall enjoy the right of an elector. 5. Persons may be deprived by law of the right of suffrage because of conviction of crime.

Soldier's Voting 6. No person shall, for the purpose of suffrage, be deemed to have become a resident of, nor to have abandoned prior residence in, this State or any county thereof by reason of his presence therein or absence therefrom during active service in any branch of the military or naval forces of this State or the United States.

7. No elector in active service in any branch of the military or naval forces of this State or of the United States shall be deprived of his vote by reason of his absence from his election district.

8. The manner in which and the time and place at which ballots may be cast by electors absent during active service in any branch of the military or naval forces of this State or of the United States, and the manner of the return and canvass of such absentee votes, shall, at all times, be provided by law.

ARTICLE IX AMENDMENTS

Proposals 1. Any specific amendment or amendments to the Constitution may be proposed

in the Senate or General Assembly, and if the same shall be agreed to by three-fifths of all the members of each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and shall be published once in at least one newspaper of each county, if any be published therein, not more than four months, and not less than three months, prior to its submission to the people.

Submission of General Election 2. Such amendment or amendments shall be submitted to the people at the general election next succeeding the publication, in such manner as the Legislature shall prescribe.

Separate Approval or Rejection 3. If more than one amendment be submitted, they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately and distinctly.

4. If at the election the people shall approve such amendment or amendments, or any of them, by a majority of the legally qualified voters of this State voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved shall become part of the Constitution.

Resubmission 5. If at the election the people shall not approve any such amendment, no specific amendment to effect the same or substantially the same change in the Constitution shall be submitted to them before the fifth general election thereafter.

ARTICLE X GENERAL PROVISIONS

Self-executing Provisions, Spal, etc. 1. The provisions of this Constitution shall be self-executing, to the fullest extent that their respective natures permit. Legislation shall be enacted in furtherance of their purposes and to facilitate their operation.

2. The word "day" when used in this Constitution means a calendar day.

3. The seal of the State shall be kept by the Governor, or person administering the government, and used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the State of New Jersey.

4. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the State of New Jersey, sealed with the great seal, signed by the Governor, or person administering the

government, and countersigned as may be provided by law, and shall run thus: "The State of New Jersey, to... Creating." All writs shall be in the name of the State; and all indictments shall conclude in the following manner, viz.: "against the peace of this State, the government and dignity of the same."

Effective Date 5. This Constitution shall take effect on the second Tuesday in January one thousand nine hundred and forty-five, except Article V which shall take effect on the first day of November, one thousand nine hundred and forty-five, all subject to the provisions of the schedule hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE XI—SCHEDULE—SECTION I

"The Schedule" provides for orderly transition from the old to the new Constitution. In the official text it appears as a single Article (XI) at the end of the Revised Constitution. For ready reference, however, the Schedule is being printed in appropriate parts with the Articles to which it relates.

1. This Constitution shall supersede the Constitution of 1844 as amended, and the Legislature shall enact all laws necessary to make this Constitution fully effective.


2. The adoption of this Constitution or the taking effect thereof or of any Articles thereof shall not of itself affect the tenure, term or compensation of any person holding any State civil office or State position or employment at the time when the same is adopted or takes effect, except as provided in this Constitution.

3. All militia officers in office when this Constitution takes effect shall continue to exercise their respective commissions and powers until otherwise provided by law.

4. All law, statutory and otherwise, all rules and regulations of administrative bodies and all rules of Courts in force and effect at the time this Constitution or any Articles thereof take effect shall remain in full force and effect until they expire or are superseded, altered or repealed. All writs, actions, causes of action, prosecutions, contracts, claims and rights of individuals and of bodies corporate, and of the State, and all charters and franchises shall continue unabated and unaffected notwithstanding the taking effect of any of the Articles of this Constitution, and all judgments which have been found, for any crime or offense committed, before the taking effect of this Constitution or any Article hereof may be proceeded upon notwithstanding the taking effect thereof. The Supreme Court shall make such general and special rules and orders as may be necessary for the transfer of all suits, proceedings and judgments to the appropriate Court and section thereof. Indictments may be found and proceeded upon, after the judicial Article of this Constitution takes effect, for crimes or offenses committed before said Article shall take effect, in the Court succeeding to the jurisdiction of the Court in which they could have been found and proceeded upon if such Article had not taken effect.

He voted AGAINST the airplane appropriation, AGAINST repeal of the arms embargo, AGAINST extending selective service, AGAINST the fortification of Guam, FOR weakening price control, and FOR the "states rights" bill limiting the soldier vote. He is about as consistent an obstacle to any sensible solution of the problem of world peace as could be imagined. He has been overlong in Washington.

The voters have the opportunity this fall to replace him with an excellent representative, Mr. Guinness of Hopewell, whose attitude toward the peace-settlement is simple and forthright "for entry into a world organization to maintain peace with necessary military commitments to enforce it." Mr. Guinness has the trained mind of a research chemist, broadened by extensive travel, and can show an impressive record of civic activity which has won him non-partisan support in his own community. We have in his candidacy the best chance hitherto offered, to vastly improve the representation of our District in the House of Representatives. The Princeton group of the Independent Voters' League, though committed in the main to the re-election of President Roosevelt, has endorsed Mr. Guinness not only as one of the best of the Congressional candidates in New Jersey, but also in the hope of defeating the undesirable Mr. Powers, and diminishing, at least by one, the dangerous isolationist bloc in the House.

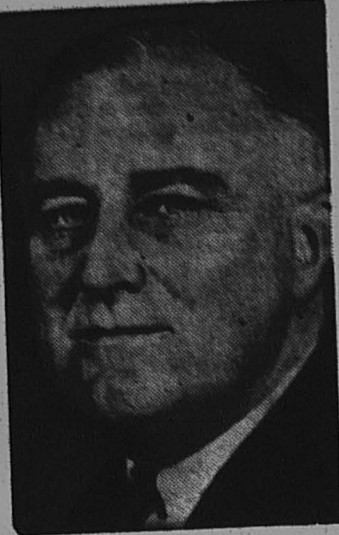

NEW CONSTITUTION
AIDS VETERAN

The proposed new State Constitu-
tion to be submitted to the voters on
November 11 actually insures rights
of veterans, whereas the old Consti-
tution contains no such provisions
whatever, was the statement made
recently by Lt. Col. (Inactive Re-
serve) Frank A. Mathews, Jr., of
Riverton. In fact, under the present
Constitution, the exemption allowed
veterans on real estate taxation
would probably be declared uncon-
stitutional if attached, said Colonel
Mathews. He expressed surprise at
newspaper accounts of certain vet-
eran groups throughout the state de-
claring to the contrary. The present
Constitution makes no mention of
veterans or their rights at all, where-
as the proposed Constitution provides
in Article III, Section VI, Clause 8,
that the Legislature shall not pass
any private, special or local law re-
lating to taxation or exemption there-
from, except as expressly provided
in this Constitution, and the only ex-
ception he can find, he said, is in
Article VII, Clause 4, which provides
in part that "exemption from taxa-
tion may be granted by law to per-
sons who have been, are, or shall
have been in active service in any

branch of the military or naval service
of the United States in time of
war."


"This means, in my opinion," said
Colonel Mathews, "that the only per-
sons for whom the Legislature may
grant tax exemption constitutionally
are veterans."

In Article VI, Section 1, Clause 2,
which refers to the Civil Service,
Colonel Mathews pointed out, pre-
ference is made for the appointment
of persons who have been or "shall
have been in active service in any
branch of the military or naval forces
of the United States in time of war,
and no such provision is contained
in the present Constitution.

"It would appear to me," Colonel
Mathews stated, "that veterans who
are affected by the proposed Constitu-
tion on the grounds that it grants
them less rather than more benefits
than the old one are either woefully
ignorant of the provisions of both or
are making misleading statements
from undisclosed motives entirely op-
posed to the actual interest of vet-
erans."

Colonel Mathews is a Post Depart-
ment Commander of the American
Legion and a former Judge of the
District Court of Burlington County,
and is a Deputy Attorney General of
the State. He served many years in
the National Guard, was inducted in-
to the 4th Division and was subsequen-
tly relieved of active duty because of
an alleged physical disability. He
has two sons in the service.
