District Governor Here

Palmyra-Riverton Rotariams were host to District Governor Emmor Roberts of the Mariton-Medford-Vincentown Chab last Thursday. Mr. Roberts, who is well known locally through his service as state senator, gave an inspirational talk on the meaning of Rotary. Another feature of his visit was the induction by him of two new members. Mr. Robert J. Finney and Robert Kennedy. The former will fill the classification of oil refining and the latter that of lens manufacturing.

Governor Roberts introduced his

Governor Roberts introduced his remarks by pointing out that American Rotarians are spared the suffering which is commonplace in other lands. We take our freedom as a matter of course but clubs in the distant parts of the world and in the occupied countries meet only under the greatest of difficulty. As examples, Mr. Roberts cited the continued growth of New Zealand clubs even though every man up to forty-two years of age has been called into government service. 

Even greater demands will be made upon our Visiting Nurses during the coming year. Hospital services have been curtailed because of the shortage of doctors and nurses. More babies are being born at home and less serious illnesses are treated at home. This condition increases the responsibility of the Public Health Nurses and they carry the burden of keeping their Community up to standard.

The Visiting Nurses have carried on health programs in the local schools, established a Baby Clinic in Palmyra and assisted in a Venereal Disease Clinic at Zurbrugg Hospital.

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

ARTICLE V JUDICIAL Section V (concluded)

They shall hold no other office, or position, of profit under the government of this State or of the United States or of any instrumentality or political subdivision of either of them. 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



ARTICLE VI PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES SECTION I (concluded)

Official Bonds 4. Any person before entering upon the duties of, or while holding, any public office, position or employ-ment in this State may be required to give bond, as may be provided by law.

Terms of Office; 5. The term of office of all officers elected or appointed pursuant to the provisions of this Constitution, except when herein otherwise directed, shall commence on the day of the date of their respective commissions; but no commission for any office shall bear date prior to the expiration of the term of the incumbent of said office.

1. The State Comptroller,
the State Treasurer and the
State Auditor shall be elected by the Senate and General Assembly in joint meeting for terms of four years and until their successors shall be qualified into office. The Governor may, whenever in his opinion it would be in the public interest, require from them written statements, under oath, of information on any matter relating to the conduct of their re-

Prosecutors of the pleas shall be nominated by the Governor and appointed by him with the advice and consent of the Senate. They shall hold their offices for terms of five years.

County clerks, surrogates, sheriffs and coroners shall be elected by the people of their respective counties at general elections. County clerks and surrogates shall hold office for terms of five years. Sheriffs and coroners shall hold office for terms of three years. Whenever a yearney occurs in the office of Whenever a vacancy occurs in the office of county clerk, surrogate, sheriff or coroner in as may be provided by law.

All revenues of the State state Revenues Government from whatever source derived, including revenues of all departments, agencies and offices, shall be paid into a single fund to be known as the General State Fund and shall be subject to appropriations for any public purpose, but this paragraph shall not apply to moneys which may be received or held in trust, or under grant or contract for restricted use, or which must be received or held in a particular manner in order to receive a grant, or which may be payable to any county, municipality, or school district, of the State. Nothing in this paragraph shall prevent or interfere with any payment of State revenues to, or any direct or indirect collection or retention of State revenues by, any county, municipality or school district which payment, collection, or retention may be provided by law. Nothing in this paragraph shall abridge the right of the State to enter into contracts.

State Debts 5. The Legislature shall not, in any manner, create any debt or debts, liability or liabilities, of the State, which shall singly or in the aggregate with any previous debts or liabilities at any time exceed one hundred thousand dollars, except for purposes of war, or to repel invasions, or to suppress insurrection, or to meet an emer-gency caused by act of God or disaster, un-less the same shall be authorized by a law for some single object or work to be distinctly specified therein; which law shall provide the ways and means, exclusive of loans, to pay the principal and interest of such debt or liability as it falls due. No such laws shall take effect until it shall, at a general election, have been submitted to the people, and have received the sanction of a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election. Any such debt or liability thereby authorized shall be paid in annual installments, the first of which shall be payable not more than one year and the last of which shall be payable not more than thirty-five years, after such debt or liability shall have been contracted; but the privilege of paying all or any part thereof prior to maturity may be reserved to the State as may be provided in the law authorizing such debt or liability. All money to be raised by the authority of any such law shall be applied only to the specific object or work stated therein and to the payment of the debt or liability thereby created. No such law shall be repealable until such debt or liability, and the interest thereon, are fully paid and discharged.





ARTICLE VIII ELECTIONS AND SUFFRAGE
