who was recently elected a director
of the Cinnaminson Bank and Trust
Co., of Riverton, to succeed the late
George C. Frank.

Mr. Lamon, a resident of Palmyra
since 1919, has conducted a real
estate and insurance business in that
community since 1926. He was a
member of the Palmyra Board of
Education from 1924-1931 and served
as Mayor from 1932-1936.

He served as director of the Bur-
lington County Board of Freehold-
ers from 1936-1939.

Mr. Lamon is a member of the
Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club, for-
mer president of the local Business
and Professional Men's Club, past
president of the Burlington County
Insurance Agents' Association and
vice president of the Burlington
County Real Estate Board.

DANGERS OF INFLATION

One phase that Rotary Interna-
tional is playing in the war and post
war effort was emphasized last
Thursday evening at the meeting of
the Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club.

The speaker was Royston D. En-
gle, Secretary of the Moorestown Ro-
tary Club who spoke on the subject
"Dangers of Inflation." These talks
are sponsored by the Federal Gov-
ernment and Rotary International.

"There are two fundamental fac-
tors in inflation viz: Wages and
Prices. Since the Government has
pegged all wages this price can be
disregarded by us but prices must be
taken into consideration by all of
us. If prices are not stabilized
while wages are, we cause a serious
unbalance of the economic structure.

"We can win the war but will lose
much if we go through an inflation-
ary period following it. Inflation can
be most devastating if we allow it
to run rampant. Inflation has fol-
lowed every war in which we took
part and we must do everything pos-
sible to prevent it after this war.

Prices Lower

"In 1914 prices of commodities
were from 50 percent to 150 percent
lower than they were in 1918. This
applied to all commodities used by
us. The important question for all
of us to ask ourselves is "Are we
going to forget 1918?"

"The economists who were called
to Washington, in an effort to con-
trol inflation, developed NRA but it
was a failure because there were no
teeth in the act. The Lever Act was
passed which said "that profits
should be reasonable" but because it
did not designate when profits were
reasonable prices ran rampant.

"At the present time prices are no-
where near as high as they were fol-
lowing World War I. World War I
cost 32 billion dollars but the actual
cost in war production was only 18
billion dollars. The difference was
due to no control of prices.

There are three things that are un-
der control at the present time viz:
Prices, Rents and Scarce Commodi-
ties. By controlling these things we
are assured of an equal distribution."

Paul R. Jones, chairman of the
Tri-Borough Youth Fund reported

\$1,657.00.

ELLIOTT KILLED

Word has been received from the
Navy Department by Mr. and Mrs.
Ross T. Elliott, 402 Fulton street,
Riverton, that their son, Ensign Ross
Tompkins Elliott, USNR, has been
killed in action.

Ensign Elliott was aboard the
U. S. S. Emmons, a destroyer mine
sweeper, which was sunk April 6th
off the Northern coast of Okinawa,
by a Japanese suicide plane.

Ensign Elliott was a graduate of
Episcopal Academy and the Univer-
sity of Virginia, following which he
received his commission as Ensign
in February, 1944.

The Commandant of the Boston
Navy Yard stated that the U.S.S.
Emmons has one of the highest ef-
ficiency ratings and also moral rat-
ings of any destroyer which has come
into the Boston Navy Yard.

Ensign Elliott has two brothers
in the armed services, Midshipman
Michael B. Elliott, of Annapolis, and
Lieut. Colonel Frank Elliott, of the
Army Air Force.

ing team.

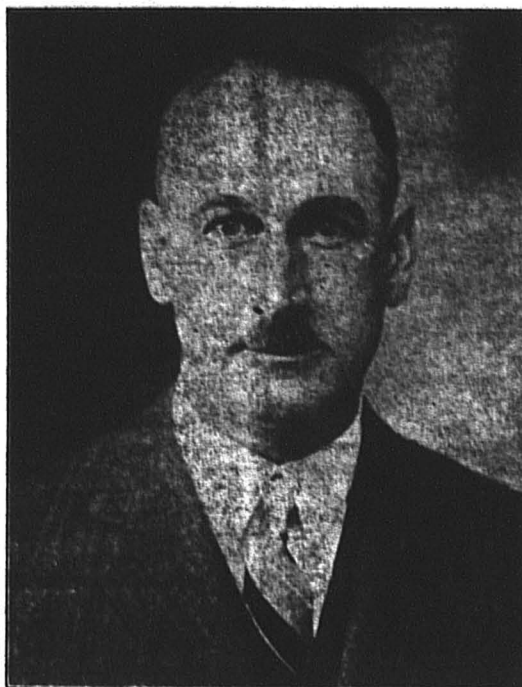
The county league will be com-

Twenty-five Years Service Recognized

Harvey G. Fisher, well-known
resident of Palmyra and prominent
officer of the Calvary Presbyterian
Church in Riverton, received the sur-
prise of his life last Friday evening.

He had been invited to attend a
social meeting of the congregation in
the Church School assembly room.
When he arrived the assembly room
was filled to overflowing, and every-
one present, with the exception of
Mr. Fisher, knew the reason for the
gathering. The congregation had
assembled to recognize Mr. Fisher's
25 consecutive years of service as a
Trustee of the Church, and to pre-
sent him with a tangible token of
their appreciation.

When Mr. Fisher arrived, unsus-
pecting, he was requested to lead the
audience in group singing. This he
did in a very acceptable way. Mrs.
Elsie Graepf then rendered a solo.
An interesting script on "Twentieth
Century American History" was then
read by Raymond Bailey, and as the
main events of the century were
mentioned, appropriate pictures of
Mr. Fisher were flashed on a screen,
beginning with his babyhood days
and proceeding through his "bakery
days," "bank days," "sailor days,"
and so on. The audience enjoyed this
feature immensely while Mr. Fisher
looked on in evident bewilderment.

Real Purpose

Rev. R. B. Stewart, who served as
Master of Ceremonies, then disclosed
to Mr. Fisher the real purpose of
the "surprise party," and called on
Mr. Carson, senior elder of the Cal-
vary Church to present to Mr. Fisher
a beautiful "Parker 51" set as a
token of the appreciation of the con-
gregation for his quarter century of
faithful and fruitful service as a trustee.
In a few well-chosen words
Mr. Carson referred to the many
"goodbyes" that marked our present
age, and suggested that the pleasure
of this moment was enriched by the
fact that though a presentation was
being made it did not indicate an-
other "goodbye." It was his hope
and the hope of the congregation,
Mr. Carson declared, that Mr. Fisher
might be permitted to serve for an-
other quarter of a century.

After Mr. Fisher had made an ap-
propriate response, Elder James
Wright was then called upon by Mr.
Stewart to present a corsage to Mrs.
Harvey Fisher.

He recalled the years of loneliness
she had endured while her husband
was attending to the affairs of the
church, and the corsage was simply
a tangible reminder from the con-
gregation that they had not been un-
aware of her "courageous endurance."

The party then retired to the So-
cial Hall of the church, where re-
freshments were served, an hour of
fellowship was enjoyed, and Mr.
Fisher had the opportunity to show
off his "Parker 51," and to let every-
one know just how completely he
had been surprised.

REPORT ON RED CROSS WAR FUND DRIVE

was collected in the County during

Summer Round-Up

The annual Summer Round-Up of children will be conducted from April 30 to May 4. The Summer Round-Up is a major health project of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and its purpose is to send children to the entering grades of school in good physical and mental condition. In this State it is sponsored by the New Jersey Congress of Parents and Teachers and the Medical Society.

The Round-Up group includes all children from two years of age to those eligible for School in September.

Names of children who will enter school in the fall for the first time have been secured through the school census.

Parents will be visited by a member of the local committee and will be advised to take their children to their family physician for examination.

A standard examination is used and each child's form is turned over to the school authorities, to serve as the initial unit of the child's permanent health record.

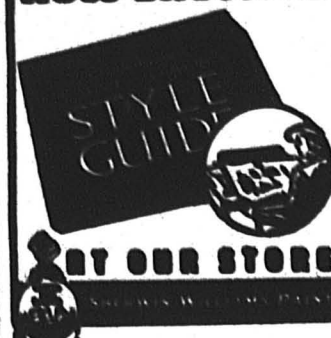

Southern Peanut Pie
3/4 cup milk, scalded
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1/2 cup cornstarch
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup salt
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 baked 9" pie shell
1 cup egg whites
1/2 cup sugar

Scald milk in top of double boiler. Combine sugar, cornstarch, flour and salt. Mix thoroughly. Add to milk and cook until thick and smooth, then cook 15 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Stir a small amount of mixture into egg yolks, return to double boiler and cook a few minutes longer. Remove from heat. Add peanut butter and blend.

Cool. Pour filling into baked pie shell. Beat egg whites until stiff. Add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Pile lightly on filling. Bake in slow oven (225°F.) for 25-30 minutes or until delicately browned.

Boiled Frosting for Loaf Cake
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1 egg white
1/2 cup vanilla
Cook sugar, corn syrup, and water together over low heat, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Bring to a boil, cover and cook for about 3 minutes. Continue cooking to 242°F. or until the mixture will spin a long thread. Keep covered as much as possible. Wipe off any crystals on sides of pan. Pour the hot syrup slowly over the stiffly beaten egg white, beating constantly. Add vanilla and beat until cool and stiff enough to spread.

Yankee Noodle Pudding
1 pkg. fine egg noodles
1/2 cup light brown sugar
2 cups milk, scalded
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1/2 cup sugar
Dash salt
1/2 cup vanilla
1/2 cup light brown sugar
1/2 cup cinnamon
Dash nutmeg
2 egg whites

Cook noodles as directed on package and drain. Section oranges. Pour milk onto the slightly beaten egg yolks, sugar and salt. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until custard coats the spoon. Add vanilla. Line a shallow baking dish with the oranges; cover with cooked egg noodles mixed with brown sugar and spices. Pour the custard over this. Beat the egg whites until stiff. Beat in sugar and spread this meringue over the pudding. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) for 15 minutes, until meringue is light brown. Peaches, apples or berries may replace oranges. Chill before serving. Serves 6.

Soybean Macaroons
Dash of salt
2 cups flaked breakfast cereal
1 cup sugar
1 cup cooked soybean mash
flavoring
Add salt to egg whites and beat until slightly stiff. Add sugar, a tablespoon at a time, and beat until stiff. Mix soybean mash with flaked cereal which has been crushed, and gradually fold this mixture into egg whites. Add flavoring. Drop by spoonfuls on waxed paper and bake in a very moderate oven (300°F.-325°F.) for about 25-30 minutes, or until delicately brown and well set.

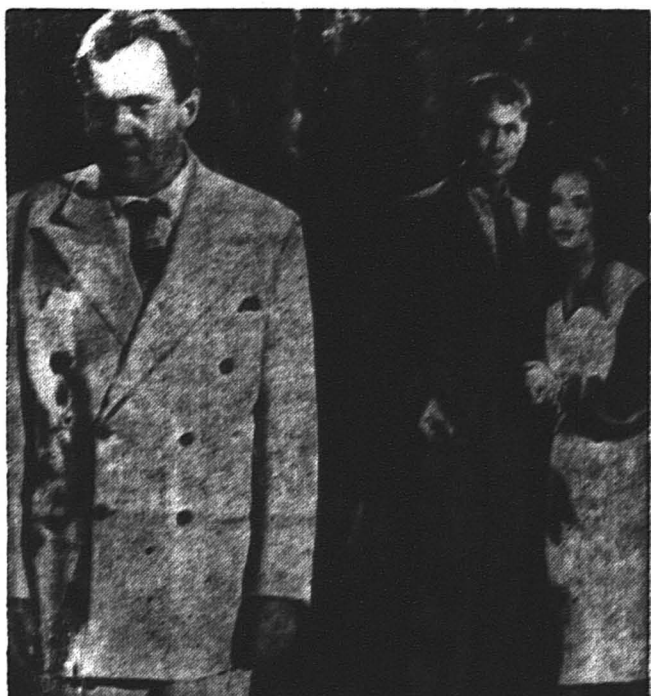

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WOOD PROMOTED TO LT. COLONEL

Graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point, James N. Wood, of Riverton, a P-51 Mustang squadron commander, has been promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. The pilot, husband of Mrs. Dorothy Wood, of Elm Terrace, recently concluded his combat career here in England after almost 400 hours in the air against the enemy.

During his many missions over enemy territory Colonel Wood destroyed four-and-one-half Jerry planes, three of them as he finished 20 hours of combat flying prior to returning to the States for a 30-day furlough last May. The much decorated pilot holds the Silver Star for "gallantry in action;" the Distinguished Flying Cross with three Oak Leaf Clusters for "extraordinary achievement in aerial combat;" and the Air Medal with four Oak Leaf Clusters for "sustained combat operations against the enemy."

Coming overseas as a Captain and a P-47 Thunderbolt flight leader, the New Jersey pilot later took over as his squadron's operations officer, a post which netted him his majority in June, 1944. He was made a squadron commander in the 356th Fighter Group commanded by Colonel Philip E. Tukey, Jr., of Cape Elizabeth, Maine, in October of last year.

The twenty-five-year-old son of Mrs. Ellen N. Wood, of Rogers, Arkansas, the flier is a graduate of the high school there and later attended the University of Arkansas for a year before he was appointed to West Point in July, 1938. He was commissioned a second lieutenant on May 28, 1942.

Another feature of the evening was a Hobby Show presented by the Mothers Art Craft Club of East Riverton. Projects on display were

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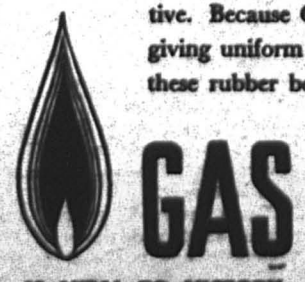

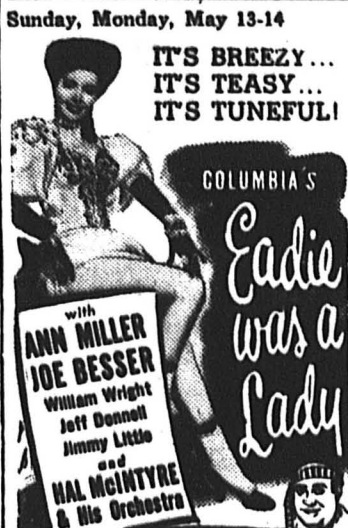

Better Education

The importance of education was
the theme at the meeting of the local
Rotary Club held last Thursday eve-
ning.

Dr. Fred L. Hipp, Director of Pub-
licity, N. J. Education Association,
spoke on the needs and importance
of more and better education.

No matter how much we know
about any one factor in life there
comes a time when some one thing
that we do not know can affect us
adversely and affects what we do.

Information and technical skill are
of utmost importance in our lives and
is far more important than what we
have. With information and techni-
cal skill we will make progress for
ourselves and all the world but what
we have, usually, can affect only our-
selves and a very few closely asso-
ciated with us. What we know will
develop resources that will benefit
the entire world.

If people had been educated
differently we would not have had a
World War. The education of youth
in Germany that the State is supreme
and that the individual does not
count is responsible for the attitude
of the soldier in this war. They have
no sense of guilt because they have
been educated that way. Youth
groups and camps were organized in
every town in Germany where they
were taught this thing. The thing
that we will need to worry about is
what is in the minds of the people
more than we will about the destruc-
tion of physical resources.

In World War I the typical atti-
tude in which the Russian soldier
was found was with his hands raised
in surrender. In this war we know
they have been among the bravest
and most stubborn fighters. This can
be attributed to education because
under the Czar they were kept in
ignorance but since the Revolution
they have been educated.

The higher the education level the
more goods bought and the more
money in the hands of the people.
Indianapolis, Indiana and Atlanta,
Georgia are approximately the same
size but Indianapolis has more tele-
phones, buys more imported foods
and have better living conditions be-
cause the percentage of educated
people is much higher. The amount
of education governs the amount of
money spent and the income of in-
dividuals. From a survey made by
the U. S. Chamber of Commerce 50
per cent of college students, 39 per
cent of high school students and 11
per cent of 8th grade or less earn
\$5,000 a year or more.

Brazil and the United States are
about equal in natural resources but
Brazil is low in income and educa-
tion, the U. S. high in income and
education.

New Jersey has an education ave-
rage of a little better than eighth
grade, it has the best education sys-
tem in the world and some of the
poorest schools. The wide variation
of education available is due to place
of residence. New Jersey would be
richer if education was higher.

How we develop our boys and
girls will be responsible for the kind
of government we have and whether
we have lasting peace or not.

thus save a needless trip to the lo-
cal Board office, No. 2 Broad street,
Palmyra.

Much time, he said, can
be saved by using the mail for re-
questing application forms and re-
ceiving ration stamps for gasoline, tires, fuel
oil, shoes and home canning sugar.

BOND SALES START

The "Mighty 7th" War Loan
Drive began April 9th for Industrial
employees on payroll saving plans,
and will extend from May 14th to
July 7th for Individuals. All Series
E, F and G War Savings Bonds and
Series C notes processed through the
Federal Reserve Bank from April 9
to July 7, will be credited to the
Drive.

The National quota has been set
at 14 billion dollars, to be raised
from non banking sources. New
Jersey's quota is \$22 million dollars—
251 million of which must be derived
from sales to individuals, including
\$148 million dollars of E Bonds sales.
Burlington County's assignment is
\$2,100,000 E Bonds—\$800,000 in
other issues to individuals and \$1-
100,000 in Corporates—a grand total
of \$4,000,000. In the Sixth War Loan
Burlington County had an overall
quota of \$3,500,000 and exceeded this
amount by 20 per cent. The E Bond
quota in the 6th was \$1,250,000 and
this was exceeded by 25 per cent.

MECRAV SAVES LIFE

In a recent edition of the London
edition of the "Stars and Stripes"
appeared an article headed "Rescued
Men from Mars." Coming from Al-

who marched more than 300 miles
over Burma's nearly vertical scenery
and performed miracles of surgery
under fire.

Included in the accomplishments
was the following:

"Major Paul Mecrav, Jr., formerly

brought in with his windpipe shat-
tered by shrapnel. Mecrav tried with
his finger to remove the blood clots
choking the wounded man, but the
patient stopped breathing. Then
Mecrav placed his mouth over the

then proceeded to keep the man
breathing by blowing to inflate the
lungs until surgical repair was pos-
sible."

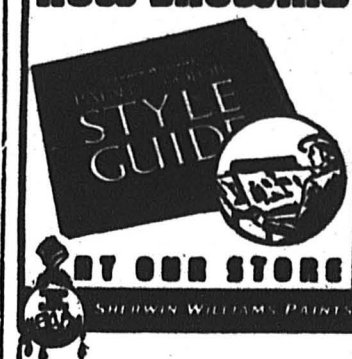

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINNAMINSON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON FIXING AND DETERMINING THE SALARIES, WAGES OR OTHER COMPENSATION OF ALL OFFICERS, APPOINTED AND EMPLOYEES OF THE SAID TOWNSHIP.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Cinnaminson in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

**PART I
ELECTED AND APPOINTED OFFICERS; PROFESSIONAL SERVICES**
Assessor
SECTION 1: That the Township Assessor shall receive the salary of \$700.00 per year and a further sum equal to the minimum annual charge for local residence telephone service, and shall provide, at his own expense, such office as may be necessary for the performance of his official duties; which salary and telephone allowance shall be payable in equal semi-annual installments at the end of the months of June and December.

Auditor
SECTION 2: That the Registered Municipal Accountant employed by the Township each year to audit the accounts of the Township, as required by law, shall receive an annual salary of \$1,000.00, and shall provide, at his own expense, such office as may be necessary for the performance of his official duties; which salary and telephone allowance shall be payable in equal semi-annual installments at the end of the months of June and December.

Building Inspector
SECTION 3: That the Township Building Inspector shall receive as his annual salary or compensation an amount equal to the salary received by him during the calendar year upon the issue of building and other permits, and a further sum equal to the minimum annual charge for local residence telephone service, and shall provide, at his own expense, such office as may be necessary for the performance of his official duties; which salary and telephone allowance shall be payable in equal semi-annual installments at the end of the months of June and December.

Clerk
SECTION 4: That the Township Clerk shall receive the salary of \$1,000.00 per year and a further sum equal to the minimum annual charge for local residence telephone service, and shall provide, at his own expense, such office as may be necessary for the performance of his official duties; which salary and telephone allowance shall be payable in equal semi-annual installments at the end of the months of June and December.

Collector
SECTION 5: That the Township Collector of Taxes shall receive the salary of \$1,000.00 per year and a further sum equal to the minimum annual charge for local residence telephone service, and shall provide, at his own expense, such office as may be necessary for the performance of his official duties; which salary and telephone allowance shall be payable in equal semi-annual installments at the end of the months of June and December.

Collector of Arrears
SECTION 6: That the Township Collector of Arrears of personal property taxes, whose appointment by the Township Committee is subject to revocation by the Committee at any time under the authority of the Revised Statutes (40:149-2), shall receive as his compensation an amount equal to the salary received by him during the calendar year upon the issue of building and other permits, and a further sum equal to the minimum annual charge for local residence telephone service, and shall provide, at his own expense, such office as may be necessary for the performance of his official duties; which salary and telephone allowance shall be payable in equal semi-annual installments at the end of the months of June and December.

Director of Welfare

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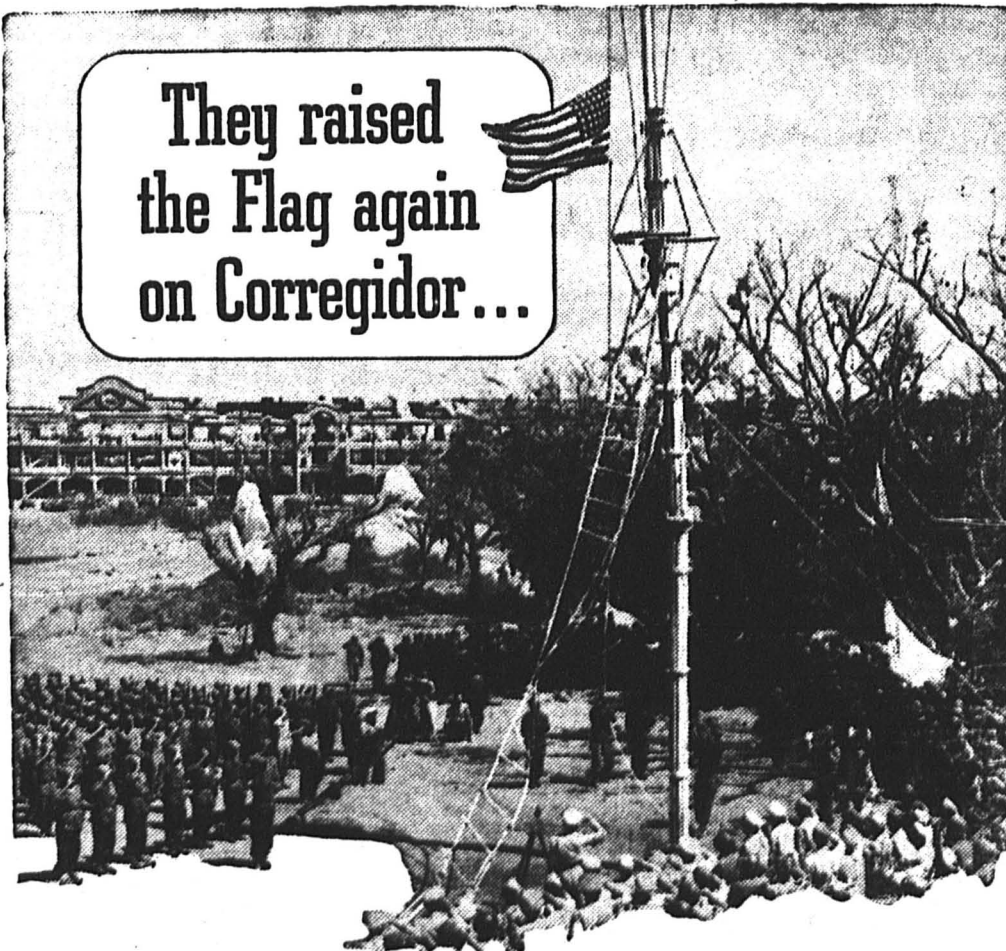
