THE ROMANCE OF INTERNAL SECURITY

The part being played by the F.B.I. in protecting the people of the United States during the war years was the topic at the meeting of the Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club last Thursday evening.

The speaker was Samuel B. Blaskey, Special Agent, Federal Bureau of Investigation, of Camden.

Mr. Blaskey told how the Bureau investigated the German-American Bund and other subversive groups for espionage and un-American activities.

On September 6, 1939, by direction of President Roosevelt, the F.B.I. became the clearing house for information relative to subversive activities and all information had to go through that organization.

The Bureau was instrumental in breaking up the 5th Column ring which was being organized here.

Many new investigation procedures have been developed since the outbreak of the war.

Spies Captured

Since the beginning of the war many spies have tried to enter the U. S. on repatriation ships. These individuals were citizens of the U. S. but had lived in Europe and had been trained for espionage by the Nazis. Several of these men were investigated and their activities were known of by the F.B.I. even before they sailed from Europe.

At the close of the formal talk several questions were asked by the members.

The abduction took place in Palmyra on Monday, when Furlong induced the child to enter his car. She was later found in Delaware Township.

Palmyra police figured prominently in breaking the case so promptly. Furlong was arrested late Tuesday and, according to police, has signed a confession.

Sergeant Joseph P. Wille, 590 Warrington avenue, East Riverton, a member of the 110th Infantry Regiment, 28th Division, was recently awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge.

The citation stated that Sergeant Wille received the award for "Exceptional courage and outstanding leadership and ability."

NURSE ASSOCIATION

He was distressed by the unattended illness among his poorer neighbors and from his own funds paid the salary of a nurse to visit and take care of them. The Government has served notice on us that more and more civilian nurses must be taken for the war wounded. We have been told over the radio recently that soon there will be very few nurses left for us here at home and we shall be expected to take care of our own sick, with the assistance of the Visiting Nurses.

By taking advantage of this service when necessary and doing our share toward paying for it, we help to keep it available.

SERGEANT COOK'S UNIT COMMENDED

Flying in a Ninth Air Force A-20 Havoc against an important enemy railroad yard at Northern, Germany, Sergeant William W. Cook, Jr., 20, of 406 Howard street, Riverton, recently shared in a high commendation received by his unit for its bombing accuracy.

The Key transportation center, supplying the enemy forces opposing Allied advances toward Berlin, was pulverized by "super-accurate" hits on the target by the 410th Bombardment Group, in which Sergeant Cook is an aerial gunner. So outstanding were the results of the mission, that Major General Samuel E. Anderson, commanding the light and medium bomber components of the Ninth Air Force, singled out the unit with the following commendation:

"Your . . . superior strikes at Northern . . . the entirely in keeping with the reputation you are establishing as the best bombing group in the world today. I'm immensely proud of you. Keep up the good work."

Participating in missions carrying him deep into Germany, Sergeant Cook has been aiding the execution of one of the prime missions of tactical air power—the isolation of the enemy battlefield.

Prior to being inducted into the Army in March, 1943, Sergeant Cook was employed by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, in Philadelphia.

Methodism in this vicinity had its beginnings 105 years ago. In 1940 a Sunday School was organized and met in a small one room building which has long since been demolished. It was not until the year 1853, June 15, that a church organization was officially incorporated. Thus, this Sunday, the members of Epworth parish will commemorate the 92nd Anniversary of their church.

A history of the church's growth is of interest to all for it reflects the growth of the community. In 1853 12 houses comprised the community and the church had a membership numbering 35. The following year a

church building was erected. That edifice is now the Borough Hall. In 1887 a parsonage was built and is now the home occupied by Mrs. Emily Lutz, 25 W. Broad street.

The continued growth of the church necessitated the erection of a new house of worship. On September 3, 1893, under the pastorate of the Rev. George H. Neal, the present building at 5th and Morgan avenue, was consecrated and dedicated to the glory of God. The present parsonage was built in 1904. Population increases in this vicinity demanded larger educational facilities, so in the year 1915, under the leadership of the Rev. S. Monroe Van Sant, a modern Church School plant was begun and completed with dedicatory services on October 15, 1916.

Thus in 92 years Epworth Church has kept pace with changing demands and needs of the people. Today the parish numbers 751 communicants with a constituent membership of over 1,200 residing mainly in Palmyra, Riverton, and Cinnaminson; 120 of her sons and daughters are in the uniform of our Country.

These long years of service will be commemorated at the morning worship hour, this Sunday, at 11 o'clock.

The minister will speak upon the theme, "The Church, the Family of God." The Sacrament of Holy Baptism will be administered. The ministry of music will be offered by the Senior and Chancel Choirs under the direction of Mrs. Rachel Lord. Anthems to be sung include, "Lift Up Your Heads," by Ashford and "I Would Be True."

A Church Nursery is conducted enabling parents of young children to attend the worship service. Epworth's Church School, at 9:45 for the period of Christian instruction. Roy S. Austin is General Superintendent of the School. Classes under trained leadership are offered all age groups.

The Youth Fellowship meets at 7. Group discussion is conducted by the young people and a brief devotional service observed.

Evening Worship in the Sanctuary is at 7:45. The pastor will comment on a recent article by John D. Rockefeller entitled, "That the Church May Truly Live." Robert Strahan will be heard in a tenor solo.

ROTARY SERVICE

Palmyra-Riverton Rotarians tem-
porarily forgot the heat as they lis-
tened to an address by Walter J.
Schob, President of the Philadelphia
Rotary Club. Mr. Schob, who is
also president of Honor Bilt Prod-
ucts, Inc., spoke on "The Fourth
Love," which he interpreted as the
love of service. Naturally enough
the concept blended with the motto
of Rotary "Service Above Self." Said
Mr. Schob, "I think a youthful re-
action is one of the answers to Ro-
tary's vigor and splendid continuing
record of accomplishment. Rotary
through its members is forever find-
ing something to be done in the field
of service."

He then went on to discuss the
first three loves which he defined as
the Love of Powers, the Love of
Fame, and the Love of Love Itself.
All he feels are great motivating
forces by which humanity is affected.
The Love of Service, however, may
be thought of as the climax of these
three, for its only reward is the deep
satisfaction that comes with the
knowledge of having served.

Love of Service

Mr. Schob believes that Rotarians
by carrying out the four objectives
of their organization, are simply ex-
pressing to the Love of Service.
He stated, for instance, "Not
long ago I attended a convention of
my National Trade Association. I
noticed that on our board of direc-
tors and among the leaders of our
industry there was a very generous
proportion of Rotarians. And this
is not at all peculiar to the Bedding
Industry. It is generally true that
the leaders in any movement for bet-
ter business practice, for better em-
ployer-employee relations, for im-
proved buyer-seller contacts—are
Rotarians."

Rotary, said Mr. Schob, provides
the inspiration for the Love of Ser-
vice. He summarized his apprecia-
tion of its values as follows, "Think
what Rotary offers to those of us
fortunate enough to be members. The
opportunity for honest-to-goodness
fellowship and the broadening of ac-
quaintance and viewpoints. The
chance to learn something from the
other fellow—his work—his prob-
lems—his failures—his successes.
The inspiration, through this fellow-
ship to better serve community and
craft. The opportunity for stimula-
tion of thought on a great variety
of subjects. All of these are to be
found in Rotary and they are to be
found easily by those who seek to
serve."

A PROCLAMATION**DOG QUARANTINE**

Take notice that the undersigned, Borough Clerk of the Borough of Riverton, by and with the advice and order of the Borough Council, does hereby prohibit the running at large of all dogs on the streets, highways, roads or other public places in the Borough of Riverton between July 1 and October 1, 1945.

Any dog being on any street, highway, road or other public place in said Borough between said dates, shall be led by a line or chain so as to prevent the biting of persons on said highways or public places.

All dogs must be licensed and have a license tag on the collar or harness. Burns' ship was one of the first at Okinawa, sweeping a path for other units of the fleet. Later it was assigned to regular destroyer duty.

Burns is a veteran of three European invasions—Normandy, southern France and Sicily.

**COLONEL ELLIOTT WITH
4TH FIGHTER GROUP**

Lt. Col. Frank B. Elliott, 28, whose wife, Constance, lives at 465 High street, Burlington, is now operations officer with the celebrated 4th Fighter Group, the oldest fighter outfit based in England.

Col. Elliott, the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Elliott, of 402 Fulton street, Riverton, is in charge of the Group's training program which is designed to fit pilots for battle in the Pacific.

The New Jersey flyer is well acquainted with all types of aerial warfare, having flown one tour of operations as a bomber pilot in B-24 Liberator bombers, another tour with an Air Force scouting unit, and at present with the P-51 Mustang 4th Fighter Group.

Col. Elliott joined the Army in June, 1940. Later he attended the AAF flying school at Maxwell Field, Ala., where he won his wings.

He has destroyed three enemy planes on the ground and wears the Distinguished Flying Cross with three oak leaf clusters, the Bronze Star Medal, and the Air Medal with 12 oak leaf clusters.

POLIO TREATMENT

Palmyra-Riverton Rotarians listened to a description of the advances made in the treatment of infantile paralysis cases during the last five years at their meeting last Thursday.

Mr. George Aaron, a lawyer and Director of Public Affairs of the City of Camden, talked about the Camden Municipal Hospital's Sister Kenny Polio Clinic of which he was the inspiration and founder. In recent months he has devoted much time towards spreading the news of the opportunity available in Camden for Polio victims.

Science, said Mr. Aaron, has not yet been able to isolate the polio virus although it knows that a virus is the cause of the disease. Treatment, however, is much more effective today than ever before, largely through the efforts of Sister Kenny, an Australian nurse, who discovered and practiced her restorative methods in the Australian bush. Before her experiment physicians immobilized the stricken limbs of the patient. She, however, wraps the leg or arm in blankets of water and also uses the system of hot water packs. Until the installation of the Kenny Clinic in Camden, 30 percent of the cases came through totally recovered. Last year 70 percent went home totally cured.

Use of Funds

Mr. Aaron pointed out that the money for the work in which he is interested is raised annually by a drive; in recent years it has been tied in with President Roosevelt's birthday. 50 percent of the money stays in the local county where it is raised and the rest goes for medical research into the cause of polio. No one is deprived of the treatment because he does not have money. The National Infantile Paralysis Foundation through its local chapter furnishes all the funds necessary. Experts believe that there is no better clinic anywhere than the one in the Camden Municipal Hospital. It has recently been offered a whirling pool of which there is only one other in the United States and that at Warm Springs, Georgia.

Club members were impressed with Mr. Aaron's enthusiasm and evident devotion to helping infantile paralysis sufferers. They do not doubt the sincerity of his statement that, "If it's polio, Camden will take them in and pay the expenses." Quite evidently the aim of the local chapter is to do good. Mr. Aaron's statement that people who live in dirt and slums seem to be more immune than those who live in rural areas was also interesting.

The Club was delighted to have a number of guests among whom were Lt. George Durgin, son of President George Durgin of the Camden Rotary Club, Staff Sgt. Fred Freeman, a former Palmyra resident, and Sgt. Warren H. Lamon, son of Rotarian Walter Lamon, who had been in a German prison camp for some months. Mr. Henry B. Drake, Mayor of Island Heights, New Jersey, and Mr. Charles B. Probasco, of Hightstown, father-in-law of Rotarian Stanley Pine, and a member of the Lions Club, were also present.

The Palmyra-Riverton Club led in the attendance record for the district, and for clubs of its class in the May computations. Mr. Paul Jones gave the final report of the Tri-Boro Youth Fund which is going to reach its goal. Two
