CANNING SUGAR

Many requests have been made of the Rationing Board at Palmyra, to find out when and how much canning sugar will be available, T. Curtis Flynn, Chairman of the local Board has made the following statement.

So that the people of our district will have some idea of how much sugar will be available this year, I would like to state. At the beginwere instructed to accept applications and issue up to 20 pounds of sugar per person, if the request was made for canning enough articles that would require that much sugar, be-fore our applications on hand were processed and mailed, this amount was reduced to 15 pounds per person, and all applications on hand as of May 1st were issued on this basis.

On June 1st we were instructed to stop issuing canning sugar to anyone and on June 11 we were again instructed to issue in the month of June 6200 pounds, which quota was already issued before the stop order came through, therefore we could make no further issuances before the next quota was received on July 1.

From June 11 when the June quota was exhausted, until June 20th, we have accumulated 1300 applications and to be fair to all applicants, all applications in by June 20th will receive about 25 percent of the amount they are entitled to. All applications received after June 20th, will be issued after August 1st, at whatever basis the quota will allow.

This does not mean that you will receive no more this year, but as the quota allowed us for August, September and October is received, so shall it be distributed.

Undoubtedly this regulation has affected many people from canning in the way they have been accustomed to, but with the acute shortage of sugar this year, it is suggested all other ways of sweetening be used that is possible in order to save our

To help the canning sugar program Mr. Flynn, Chairman of the Board, would appreciate it if anyone that has gotten their full quota of sugar and find they are not going to use the full amount for canning would return the stamps they will not need to the Ration Board. In this way it will add to our quota and we will be able to give the people that put in their application later a small amount of sugar to do some of their canning.

DO WE NEED WELFARE WITH VANISHING RELIEF ROLLS

Juvenile Delinquency

The recent increase in juvenile de linquency has given has given great-er concern to our local Welfare Di-rectors. The Welfare Office has become a clearing house or point of focus where the police, parents or school authorities can cooperate in an effort to provide proper preven-tive remedial measures.

Community Needs There is a State-wide trend in Welfare Departments from mere emergency unemployment relief offices to the status of agencies caring for the broader needs of the community. "This transition is a natural and log-ical development resulting from the ning of the season the Local Boards realization that factors other than unemployment are often responsible for creating the necessity for public assistance. War conditions have brought new problems as well as aggravated old ones, thus adding du ties and responsibilities for local Welfare Departments entirely aside from the granting of relief.

Common Sense While personnel and expenditures have been reduced in many municipalities and in some instances can be tut still further, local governing bodies should not lose sight of the fact that a skilled director of welfare must be retained. This procedure is similar to carrying insurance. It is a guarantee that no deserving needy person will suffer, as well as assur-ance that no undeserving person will consume the taxpayers' dollars. A year without fires is no argument for disbanding the fire company.
