## FORD CITED AGAIN

Mrs. Thomas J. Ford, 715 Cinnamon street, Riverton, has just received another citation from her son, Pharmacist Mate 2-c Thomas J. Ford. It reads as follows:

Fourth Marine Division, Fleet  
Marine Force  
c-o Fleet Post Office,  
San Francisco, Cal.

In the name of the President of The United States, the Commanding General, Fourth Marine Division, Fleet Marine Force, takes pleasure in awarding the Bronze Star Medal to Pharmacists Mate, Second Class, Thomas J. Ford, (651-55-49), U.S.N.R., for service as set forth in the following Citation:

"For heroic achievement in connection with operations against the enemy while serving as a Medical Corpsman on Iwo Jima, Volcano Islands, on 21 February, 1945. When the rifle platoon to which he was attached was forced by heavy enemy mortar, machine gun, and rifle fire, to withdraw approximately seventy-five yards behind its farthest point of advance, leaving several seriously wounded men in that area. Pharmacists' Mate Second Class Ford, with complete disregard for his own safety, left a covered position to move forward through this heavy fire and render aid to the casualties. Although the intensity of the enemy fire made immediate evacuation of the wounded men impossible, he continually exposed himself by moving among them to render aid, and remained with them for more than two hours, until the advance of the platoon beyond his position made their evacuation possible. His initiative and courageous devotion to duty throughout were in keeping with the highest tradition of the United States Naval Service."

## DAV INSPECTOR INVITES INQUIRY



Speaking before a group of recently discharged South Jersey veterans of World War II on the accelerated expansion program of DAV, State Inspector Franklin K. Schlegel, Disabled American Veterans, extended an invitation to all medically discharged veterans interested in joining or forming new chapters, to write or contact him through August F. Walters Chapter No. 4, located at 310 Broadway, Camden.

"Organized in 1920, the Disabled American Veterans," said Inspector Schlegel, "is a Congressionally chartered organization of American citizens who were wounded, gassed, injured or disabled as a result of their honorable service in the armed forces of the United States or of some country allied with it, during time of war. The purpose of the Disabled Veterans is to restore, as far as possible, war disabled veterans to as good a position as they would have enjoyed had they not been disabled, and to make them better and happier citizens, through sympathetic understanding and comradeship assistance in solving their problems. Toward this end the Disabled American Veterans endeavors to secure fair and just compensation, adequate and sympathetic medical care, and honest and profitable employment of those who are employable."

"At the close of World War I, this nation was unprepared to cope with the problems of the returning disabled veteran. It was found that because of the handicaps resulting from injuries and wounds, it was necessary to provide an extensive program of special training to rehabilitate these veterans. The government instituted vocational training but because there was no precedent for such a program, no experience to fall back on, it proceeded by trial and error method." Although many mistakes were made, many problems incidental to this program were solved by close cooperation between the government and the veterans.

"It was from this group of disabled trainees that the Disabled American Veterans was organized. Through the years the DAV gave valuable assistance to Congress and sponsored nearly all the beneficial veterans legislation that followed, as applied to disabled veterans. The government recognized the value of our organization and the important role it was playing in the postwar reconstruction period and a Congressional Charter was granted the DAV. Today the DAV has a membership of more than 65,000 and maintains 45 state departments and more than 900 chapters."

In the field the DAV maintains 54 national service officers located in 48 of the 53 veteran facilities throughout the United States. These national service officers are specially trained men with years of experience in handling the problems of disabled veterans and their dependents. They are qualified experienced men and are certified by the Veterans Administration to represent claims before various boards. They have access

## AIDS SERVICE MEN

More than three million service men and women are being served each month by USO facilities outside the Continental United States, according to advices today to John W. Thacher, Chairman of the National War Fund U.S.O. drive in Burlington County, from the National War Fund.

USO is now arranging for clubs and units in the Philippines and has adjusted other services to meet greater demands occasioned by the shifting scenes of combat concentration.

In addition to the inauguration of services in the Philippines, USO activities in the Antilles are being kept at a peak to accommodate troops in training and in process of redeployment from the European to the Pacific theaters.

Latest records show that USO now operates 164 overseas clubs throughout the Western Hemisphere outside the Continental United States. One of the largest and busiest clubs in this area is that at Cristobal, C. Z., serving troops en route through the Panama Canal. Along with the expansion of USO Club facilities, there is also a great increase in the activities of USO-Camp Shows, the "soldiers in grease paint" who follow the combat forces to every corner of the world. Entertainment as an antidote for either combat fatigue or occupational ennui is now provided by USO-Camp Shows for our troops wherever they are stationed.

Activities of the USO are financed by the National War Fund through the generosity of Americans who contribute to community war funds such as the Burlington County National War Fund-U.S.O. campaign which will take place in late September, Chairman Thacher stated. The National War Fund drive in Burlington County includes not only the twenty agencies affiliated with the War Fund but also the three county wide youth agencies, the Y.M.C.A., the Burlington County Council, Boy Scouts of America, and the Y.W.C.A.

## YEARLY GETS MEDAL

Staff Sergeant Lester R. Yearly, Section Sergeant, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Yearly, 600 Cinnaminson street, Riverton, has been cited by the 349th "Krautkiller" Regiment of the Fifth Army's 88th "Blue Devil" Division and awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge for actual participation in combat against the enemy in Italy.

Standards for the badge are high. The decoration is awarded to the infantry soldier who has proved his fighting ability in combat.

to the confidential files of the veterans Administration and are somewhat like lawyers except that in this case there is absolutely no charge to the veteran represented."

Concluded Inspector Schlegel, "This is not the entire story of DAV. At a later meeting I will tell you of our extensive University training program and employment of service officers as instituted during the present World War. In the meantime, if you know other veterans honorably discharged and C.D.D., do not hesitate to have them call upon me at any time for any service I may be able to render."

## MAKING LENSES

Palmyra-Riverton Rotarians learned about lens manufacturing at their meeting last Thursday. Robert Kennedy, their fellow-member, spoke interestingly on the topic, which is his vocation, and hence his Rotary classification.

In addition to passing out and explaining interesting pictures of glass making, he demonstrated the operation of the various parts that go into a binocular. Before the war we were largely dependent, he stated, upon Europe for our supply, but now the United States is turning out the best instruments in the world.

There are over 100 kinds of optical glass, said Mr. Kennedy, all of which must be made from sand that is free from iron salts. Since Pearl Harbor our plants have been greatly enlarged, so that we now turn out thousands of tons of glass annually. We have, once again, made ourselves independent of Europe.

Mr. Kennedy described the parts of the binoculars used by the Navy and Army. They have been improved in accuracy and power, and now surpass those made anywhere in the world. The lenses and prisms which are necessary formerly were ground by hand. At present a much faster grinding machine has been perfected, that enables us to meet our vast needs.

## New Type Developed

Pre-war optical instruments made in this country were satisfactory for use in normal latitudes. When, however, they were steadily employed from the Arctic to the Tropics the cementing liquid proved faulty. Intensive research has led to the discovery of a thermoplastic material which is weather-proof, and stands up under extreme temperatures.

His own business of grinding lenses and prisms for government use next claimed the speakers attention. By exhibiting models, he demonstrated how the finished projects were prepared. In addition he passed around prisms in various stages of completion, that made clear how light is reflected to make upright images. The future, Mr. Kennedy thinks, holds great promise of even finer optical glass and instruments which will meet the modern requirements for such products.

Lt. Col. James Davidson, an officer of the recently returned 44th Division, and Sgt. John Broemme, future son-in-law of Rotarian Willy Vetterman, were honored guests of the club. Rotarians Roger Allen and John Knederson of the newly-formed Mt. Ephraim Rotary Club were also present.

## EDITH L. VAN VLECK

Mrs. Edith Lucille Van Vleck was born in Towanda, Penna., October 21, 1885, the daughter of Edwin D. Bronson and wife, Edna Smith.

Bronson. Mrs. Van Vleck attended high school in Montrose, Pennsylvania, where the family resided for about fifteen years. In 1910 Mrs. Van Vleck was graduated from the Moody Bible School in Chicago, Illinois. She served in Christian work in Canton and Akron, Ohio, from 1912 to 1916. On August 30, 1916, she

was united in marriage with Rev. T. M. Van Vleck. Following their marriage, she with her husband, served in mission work of the Moravian church in the West Indies. Due to illness, they returned to the states in 1924 and in 1927 were called to service in the Moravian church in Canadensis, Pa., where they served until moving to Palmyra in January 1945.

Accustomed all her life to good health, Mrs. Van Vleck and the family did not think seriously of the illness that came suddenly on July 19. The doctor advised rest for her heart which showed signs of strain and

overwork. A few days later complications appeared and caused great suffering until the Heavenly Father graciously released her on Saturday, July 28.

Having been reared in a Christian home, Mrs. Van Vleck gave her heart to God at an early age. Later her life was dedicated to His service. She was gifted as a Bible teacher and leader of young people's work. Labors taken up here were suddenly ended, but her works do follow her and although she "being

dead, yet speaketh" for His Glory.

The members of the immediate family surviving are: husband, T. M. Van Vleck; a sister, Mrs. Christine Swickard of Columbus, Ohio; a brother, A. M. Bronson, of Scranton, Pa.; and an uncle, Dr. A. M. Bronson, of Deland, Fla.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. P. S. Meinert, of Bethlehem, Pa. and were held in the Moravian Church, Palmyra, Tuesday night, July 31st. Interment was in Montrose, Pa., the following day.

### REPORT ON CLOTHING COLLECTIONS

Palmyra, N. J.

Clothing contributed by the American Overseas Relief Committee for the victims overseas before winter sets in, according to a report from Henry J. Kaiser, National Chairman of the United National Clothing Collection, Harry K. Mansfield, local chairman of the clothing drive, who received the report, made it public today.

The report from Mr. Kaiser pointed out that the first large shipment of contributed clothing left America for war-devastated lands within thirty days after the clothing campaign ended.

It disclosed that 29,397,427 pounds of clothing had been packed as of July 24 of this amount, 13,564,246 pounds had been shipped or was specifically scheduled for shipment. The remaining 15,833,181 pounds are being made to ship the balance.

Mr. Kaiser's report pointed out that the clothing already shipped or specifically scheduled for shipment will aid people in nine countries in the following amounts: Belgium, 1,814,284 pounds; Czechoslovakia, 2,022,276 pounds; France, 3,533,815 pounds; Greece, 1,334,472 pounds; Italy, 340,045 pounds; the Philippines, 1,041,725 pounds; Yugoslavia, 4,423,647 pounds; China, 50,000 pounds; Russia, 1,000,000 pounds.

Commenting on this report, Mr. Mansfield said, "Every person who helped our community collect 20,100 pounds of clothing for overseas war relief should feel proud of having participated in this great cause. We are all glad to know that the clothing is now on its way overseas to the suffering people."

He said that the clothing drive was a success because of the generous contribution from Mr. Kaiser of a building and shipping program designed to get our contributions, along with those of every other American community, on the backs of the needy boys and girls and men and women before winter.

Mr. Mansfield, summarizing figures cited by Mr. Kaiser, said that reports filed by 7,671 local chairmen in cities and towns all over the nation showed collections totaling 150,366,014 lbs. of used clothes, shoes, and bedding.

## SQUASH HELPS

### WARTIME COOK

If anyone offers a prize for the vegetable that grows in the greatest variety of shapes and sizes, the squash wins hands down.

With 14 types and 77 varieties to choose from, a cook with an eye for squash can select any weight, color or shape she wants for the dinner table, the A & P Service for Home-Makers points out. Some weigh ounces, and others used for canning have been developed to tip the beam at over a hundred pounds.

Summer squash is prized by folks who demand appetite appeal, yet have to watch their calories. There's a fair supply of minerals in this type, as well as vitamins A, B, C and G. If you haven't been introduced to zucchini, you've missed a good summer type of squash that responds to frying, boiling for serving under a thin cream sauce, or baking Italian-style with a garnish of cooked tomatoes and grated cheese. The crook-neck and vegetable-marrows summer squash also get a good reception at the table when their delicate flavor is given an extra touch of seasoning.

Best known of the winter-type

squash is served with beef rump roast, dumplings and gravy, a salad of chopped onion, cabbage and carrots, hot rolls, chilled watermelon slices and beverage.

### MANY BENEFIT FROM SOCIAL SECURITY

The number of monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits in force in the area serviced by the Camden office of the Social Security Board, increased by approximately 61 percent during 1945, it was announced by Joseph M. Davis, Manager.

Explaining that the figures are estimated and subject to minor revision, Davis said that 5,773 men, women, and children in his area are receiving monthly benefits. The total monthly benefits being paid out to the beneficiaries in this area is \$115,354.96. Families where widow and children survive the wage earner, often receive as much as \$85.00 a month, depending upon the number of survivors and the earnings of the wage earner. The maximum benefit payable for the retired worker at the present time is \$43.60 per month. The service area of the Camden office includes Camden, Gloucester

\$21.80; widows with young children, 142, ranging up to \$85.00 per month; children of deceased or retired workers, 130, ranging from \$7.50 to \$32.70; aged dependent parents of deceased workers, who left no widow or children under 18, 13, ranging from \$5.00 to \$21.80 each.

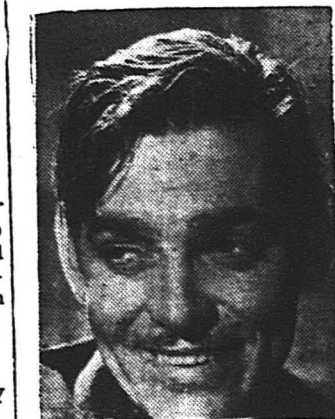

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## WAR ENDS

After several days of rumors, false reports and the like, the actual end of the war was loudly hailed locally at 7 p.m. on Tuesday night of this week. Every radio in this vicinity must have been in operation, since hardly had the momentous announcement been made when sirens began to blow, church bells were rung and the streets were filled with cars that had the horns pinned down. All the fire trucks with sirens blaring toured the streets and were joined by many autos in impromptu parades that lasted far into the evening.

Services held in several churches were attended by large congregations. Horns and other noise makers were employed to good advantage and a few celebrants with revolvers used long-husbanded ammunition to add to the occasion.

Practically all business houses remained closed Wednesday and Thursday. Gasoline stations that were open did a rushing business.

Many in Service

In the homes of these gallant soldiers, sailors, marines and the other branches of the service there was great rejoicing that their loved ones had been spared and might soon be returning home. 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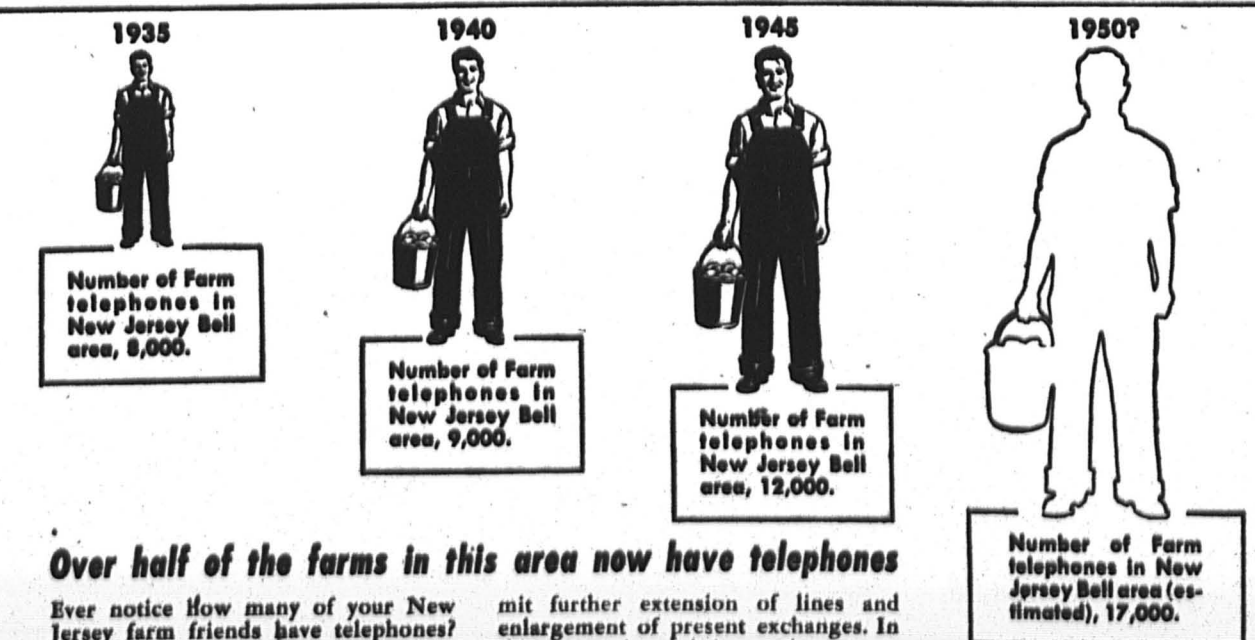

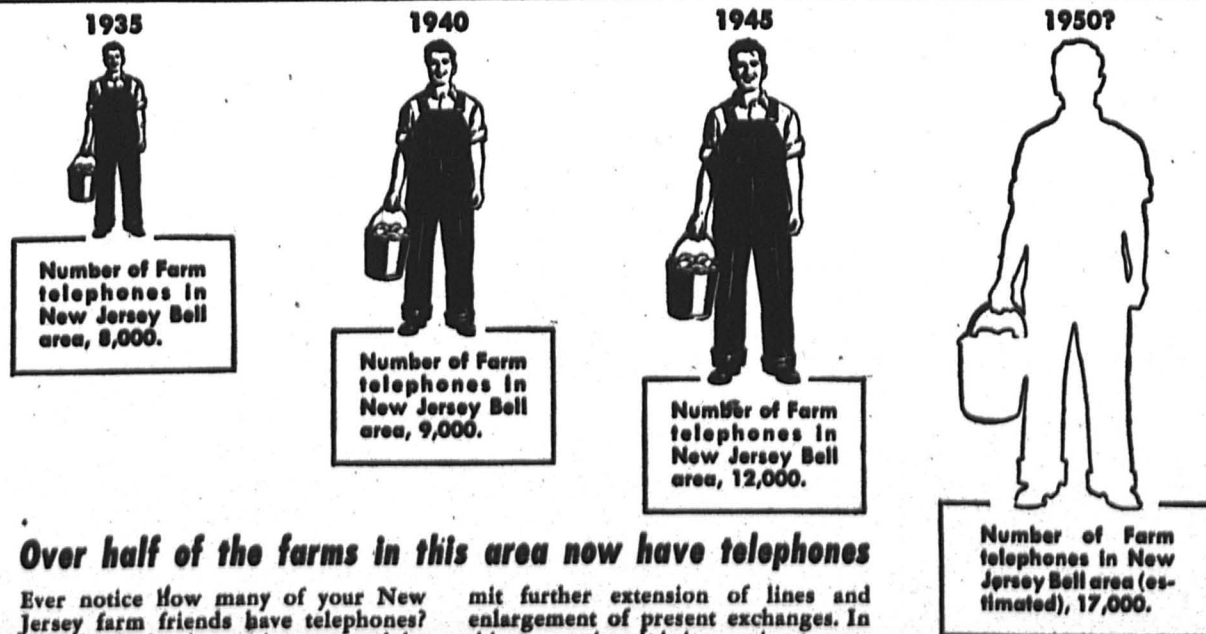

## GAS FOR VETERANS

The Veterans Council, composed of all local interested organizations, wishes to advise that a concession has been obtained granting up to 30 gallons of gasoline to Veterans presenting Discharge Certificates within 30 days of discharge.

Soldiers on furlough had previously been eligible for gasoline, but discharged men were not eligible unless they owned cars and had jobs. It was felt that a reasonable allotment of gasoline was due them in order to facilitate their return to civilian status and to secure employment.

The Executive Committee of the Veterans Advisory Program initiated the effort about two months ago and have now been advised of the amended OPA regulations.

## WAR ENDS

After several days of rumors, false reports and the like, the actual end of the war was loudly hailed locally at 7 p.m. on Tuesday night of this week. Every radio in this vicinity must have been in operation, since hardly had the momentous announcement been made when sirens began to blow, church bells were rung and the streets were filled with cars that had the horns pinned down. All the fire trucks with sirens blaring toured the streets and were joined by many autos in impromptu parades that lasted far into the evening.

Services held in several churches were attended by large congregations. Horns and other noise makers were employed to good advantage and a few celebrants with revolvers used long-husbanded ammunition to add to the occasion.

Practically all business houses remained closed Wednesday and Thursday. Gasoline stations that were open did a rushing business.

## Many in Service

Riverton, Palmyra and Cinnaminson have a large representation in the armed forces, with probably about 1,000 men and women in uniform. In the homes of these gallant soldiers, sailors, marines and the other branches of the service there was great rejoicing that their loved ones had been spared and might soon be returning home. It must not be forgotten, however, that there are other homes filled with sadness, homes in which a son or brother or husband has made the supreme sacrifice "that this Nation might live." To them, all pay the highest tribute.

Thus, on August 14, 1945, "the end" was inscribed in the book which was begun on the seventh of December, 1941.

Again, the forces of Right have won the victory.

## FIRST FLAG AT ANZIO

The National Emblem displayed at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Wallace, Fourth street, Riverton, on V-J Day had an unusual history. It was sent to them by their son SM 1-c Charles Wallace, U. S. N., and was the first flag into the Anzio beachhead, being flown by a PT boat on which Wallace was signalman.

It was the duty of this boat to locate the beach in darkness and send the "fix" to other craft farther offshore.

Wallace has been in the Navy since February, 1942, and has seen much action.

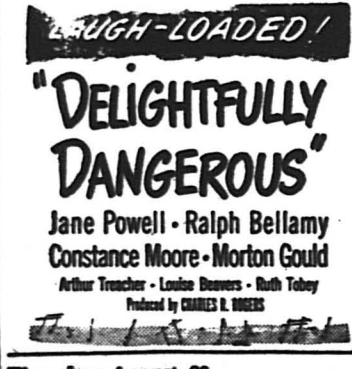

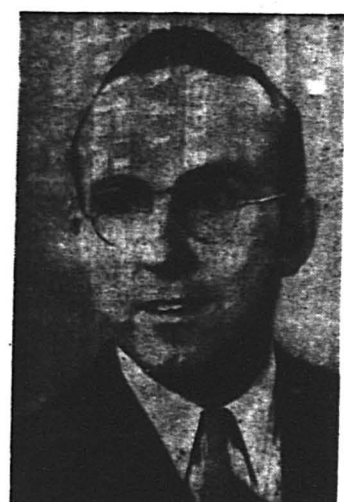

He is at present Chairman of the Burlington City American Red Cross Branch, and is in charge of house-to-house canvassing during the 1945 Red Cross War Fund drive.

While he has not had time to formulate plans for Burlington County's Blood Donor program for the coming year, Mr. Devereux will confer Saturday with Mrs. Ruth Mayo at the Philadelphia Blood Donor Center and will arrange to send donors in to the Center as often as possible. The visits of Mobile Blood Donor units from the Center to Burlington County was discontinued recently because of the shortage of doctors and nurses to staff them, but Mr. Devereux hopes they may be resumed this fall.

said. "Seriously wounded servicemen will be in the hospitals for months and years, and may need many transfusions. The American people must not let them down by discontinuing their blood donations because of the end of the war."

Mr. Devereux was born in London, England, and attended Dulwich Public School in that city. He came to the United States in 1919. Since 1929 he has been Assistant Treasurer of the Neidich Cellulose Co. in Burlington. As Burlington County Blood Donor Chairman he succeeds Mrs. Clarence Hubbs of Palmyra, who resigned in May after three years of service, during which more than ten thousand pints of blood were collected by Burlington County Red Cross.

A by-product of the blood collected by the Red Cross, the immune serum globulin, is now being processed and distributed without charge to physicians, hospitals and clinics through the National Blood Donor organization.

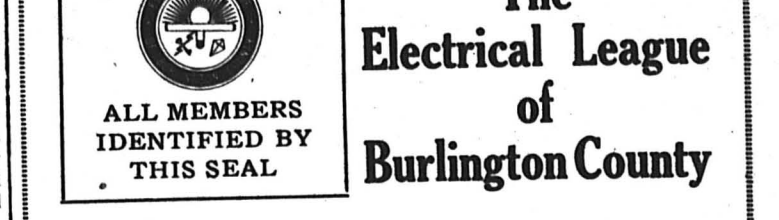

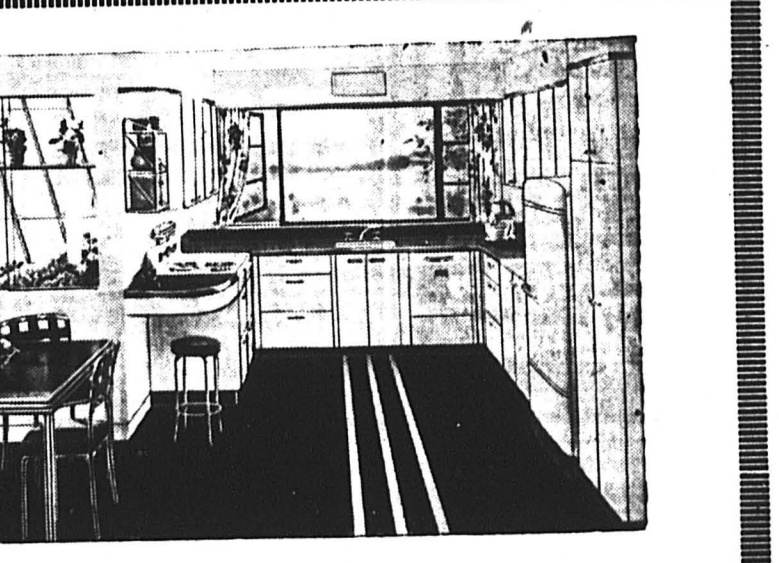

## OBSERVE VICTORY

In an impressive and well planned program local Rotarians joined together at their regular meeting on Thursday to pay tribute to all the forces which again have brought peace to the world. An atmosphere of calm seriousness prevailed as George W. Luce, Sr., chairman of the War Activities Committee spoke briefly on "The Challenge of Victory."

Mr. Luce issued the challenge for all Americans to unite to make possible a peaceful world. "Civilization cannot exist in competition with the Atomic Bomb" warned Mr. Luce in his exhortation to all to work for peace or see humanity perish.

Club President Robert B. Stewart offered as his prayer, the mystery poem of World War II, "A Soldier, His Prayer." Written on a scrap of paper which fluttered into the hands of a soldier during the battle against Rommel in North Africa, this poetical beautiful prayer, whose author is either dead or missing, bids fair to become one of the truly great poems of our times.

Davidson Speaks

The principal speaker of the evening, Lt. Col. James M. Davidson, Inspector General of the 4th Division, after briefly describing the history and work of the inspector general, traced the activities of the 4th Division in World War II. Organized in 1921 with the personnel divided approximately two-thirds from New Jersey and the remainder from New York, the 44th entered Federal Service on February 16, 1940, and was sent to Fort Dix. First assigned to guard duty on the New Jersey-Delaware coast until no longer needed, this division was sent to Louisiana where it was "stream-lined" for modern warfare. Many organizations of the 44th were separated from it, sent to join other divisions and went to the European Theatre. The new 44th of which Lt. Col. Davidson was a part was sent to the Pacific Coast to guard the coast line from California to Washington until danger of an invasion there had passed. Further break-up of this division took place in Washington with some units going to the Pacific battle fronts.

Reorganized  
Lt. Col. Davidson stressed the fact that many members of this division, because of their National Guard training, were selected for officer training, further depleting the ranks of the original division. Complete reorganization of the 44th took place in 1943 and when sent overseas, the new division of 11,000 men contained only 700 of the original personnel.

Arriving at Cherbourg, the 44th went into action in that area as part of the 7th Army. "This division, said Col. Davidson, stayed in the combat picture until November, liberated Strasburg, relieved in the "Battle of the Bulge" and many units earned Presidential Citations."

After 144 days of continuous combat, the 44th received a much needed 10 day rest. Back in action again it came under attack by 3 German Divisions on New Years Day where it completely annihilated the enemy. Crossing the Rhine, the division took the city of Mannheim, aided in the surrender of Heidelberg, crossed the Danube into Austria where the 19th German Army surrendered to them 2 days before cessation of hostilities on May 8th.

Battle Exploits  
"The battle exploits of all the personnel of the 44th must never be allowed to grow cold," stated Col. Davidson. "New Jersey can justly be proud of the achievements of her own division and feel adequately repaid for the cost of training the magnificent group of brave men which made up its personnel."

In closing Col. Davidson pointed out that the sacrifices, bravery and exploits of the men of our Armies must never be forgotten if we are to

## OPA THANKS BOARD

Administrator Chester Bowles has promptly announced the end of gasoline, fuel oil, canned fruits and vegetables and oil, however, he emphasized that rationing of meats, fats and oils, butter, sugar, shoes, tires and other commodities will continue.

The need for a stronger price control and educational program presents a problem which requires prompt and concerted action.

War-weary people are anxious to get away from wartime controls and regulations. We have already shown them that OPA is equally anxious to lift restrictions at the earliest possible moment. But, as Mr. Bowles said today, these controls must be eliminated in an orderly way. Determining factors will be military cutbacks and increased production to bring civilian supplies more nearly in balance with civilian demand.

Experience has shown us that inflationary pressures will be at even a greater pitch than those we successfully combated during the war. A greatly strengthened price panel program will be required to control inflation. Our prosperity and economic security for at least a generation to come will depend on how well we do our job.

Now that the war has ended, people may be less cooperative unless they are shown the necessity for the controls we are forced to continue. Obviously then, the need for a more effective educational program goes hand-in-hand with the need for strengthened Price Panel program.

Since gasoline and fuel oil have been dropped from the ration list, some of your most valuable members may feel their work is finished. That is not so. We need them to serve on Price and Community Service Panels, and I appeal to you to do your utmost to persuade them to help complete our work.

Sudden Victory has made it impossible for the National Office to completely outline plans for the future at this early date. We do know, however, that we still have a big job to do and I shall advise you as to details of the new program just as quickly as they are received. You have my assurance that we will need the knowledge and services of the experienced, capable panel members who have been relieved of their rationing responsibilities.

Please accept on your own behalf and extend to your fellow members and personnel my sincere thanks for your loyalty and for the highly valuable contribution you have made toward winning the war.

Only Nature can explain how the tomato came to be closely related to the potato and the eggplant and even belongs in the same plant family as the petunia.

But there is no question about a tomato's value as a food, according to the A & P Service for Home-Makers. From gardens or truck farms, fresh or canned tomatoes help supply vitamin C and qualify the vegetable as a health-protecting food.

Tomatoes can take their place in any meal and in almost any part of any meal. Juice adds to a good breakfast menu or it can be served as a chilled cocktail to start a dinner. Tomato soup holds a well-earned popularity for luncheon or as one course of a dinner.

Fresh tomatoes put color and worth while eating in a mixed salad. There are many persons who like the plain sliced tomatoes seasoned either with some salt and pepper or a little sugar, or topped with salad dressing. Stewed tomatoes is another favorite.

Firm, ripe tomatoes fried in bread or cracker crumbs offer a choice and contrast in taste and color with green tomatoes prepared in the same man-

ner. Sandwiches, omelets and combinations with other cooked vegetables and use of tomatoes in meat dishes lengthen the list of possibilities before the tomato goes to the table.

Baked corn and tomatoes make a good dish to serve in a Sunday dinner with a meat pie, cole slaw, hot rolls, rice custard and beverage.

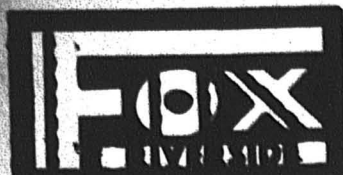

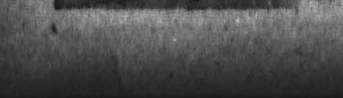

served so faithfully, who have made untold sacrifices of your time and energy, are among the truly unsung heroes of the war. You have accomplished the herculean task of seeing that 130 million Americans received their fair and equitable share of war-scarce commodities and you have been largely instrumental in holding the line against inflation in the face of terrific odds.

I have at all times during my tenure endeavored to give every one in the district, regardless of party affiliation, race, creed or nationality the best public service within my ability. I hope I have succeeded.

In leaving the Fourth District as many cases arising from the war which have come to me for assistance, I intend to maintain my offices and secretarial staffs in Trenton and Washington from the time of my resignation until my successor is elected in November of this year.

In effect, therefore, I shall be representing the Fourth District in an unofficial capacity, drawing no Federal salary, but carrying on all duties of a representative of my constituency. I shall lack, of course, the power of a veto, but in all respects I shall remain in position to be of service to the district relating to Federal problems."

BRADDOCK WORKED ON ATOMIC BOMB

August 15, 1945

Dear Mother and Daddy  
Well, at last it's over. It will seem strange not hearing about battles, etc. Most radio broadcasters are crediting the atomic bomb with shortening the war. I'm now permitted to say that I've been working on the project at Mallinckrodt. The enclosed clipping tells just about everything that has been released up to now. My own work has been concerned mainly with analysis of the brown oxide and research in developing analytical methods for the raw uranium ore. We were all so sure of the eventual success of the bomb that we predicted they would sue for peace within four days after its first use. We predicted that more than a year ago, and that's just the way it came out. They dropped the first bomb on Thursday and the Japs announced on Friday their willingness to surrender.

You may have read about a Col. Nichols who is a big shot on the project. He has visited our labs several times, and gave the chemists a talk one time. General Grover has also been here.

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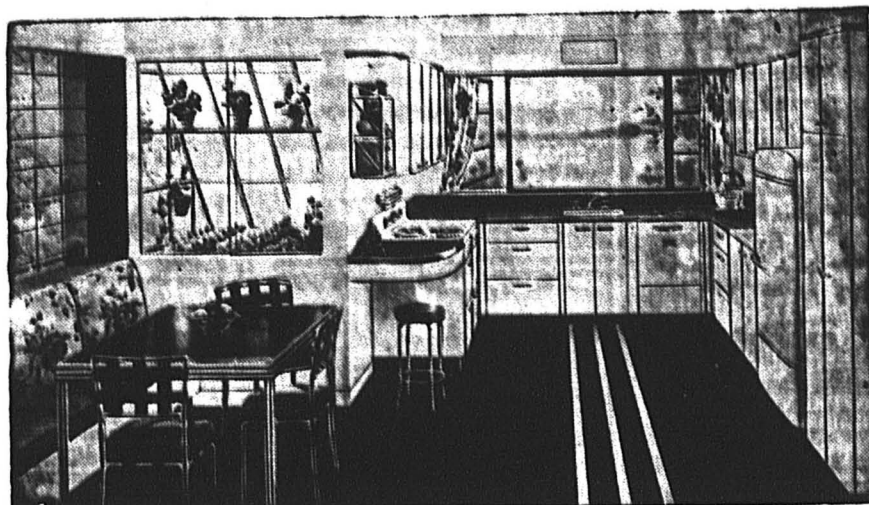

WAC OF THE WEEK

Madeline Pennington, Technician 4th Grade, daughter of Mrs. A. Pennington, 7 Front street, Riverton, has been selected as the "Wac of the Week" by the paper published by the Letterman General Hospital in San Francisco, California.

The article is as follows:  
"T-4 Madeleine Pennington, New Jersey's addition to the trumpet section of the Wac band, may not have a musical heritage behind her but, in past activities and her music-making present mean anything she is on her way to a glorious future.

The dark-eyed, vivacious Wac, a member of the corps for two and a half years, can point to only one musician in her family—her grandfather who played the cornet in France years ago and still practiced when he immigrated to the United States.

Madeline, on her own volition and without parental prodding, began taking trumpet lessons when she was 10; she played in high school band and orchestra and, upon graduation, got work in the record department of Wanamakers' department store in Philadelphia.

Her every-day work in music was not enough. After hours Madeline played in the store's band, the city's symphony orchestra for women, a 14-piece women's dance band that furnished music for school and hotel functions. She was also one of a trumpet-playing trio that whistled away the off-duty hours of Fort Dix soldiers.

In Des Moines, February of 1943, Madeline was auditioned and assigned as trumpeter with the outfit which later became the Fort Oglethorpe Band.

On Oglethorpe she had all the thrills that the rest of the band experienced in playing for the visits of famous people—and she had more. For Madeline had the definite, but dangerous, privilege of being bugler.

"Two days a week I bugled. It got to be routine, except for retreat. That has always been impressive to me; it has always made me think more than anything else of the fellows over there."

## JOSEPH WALLACE HOME

Joseph L. Wallace, 23, aviation machinist's mate, first class, USNR, of 212 Thomas avenue, Riverton, has returned on leave from the Pacific where he coped with the mechanical problems involved in the sorties of a carrier-based group of Navy fighter and torpedo planes operating as the Navy's Composite Squadron 96.

Wallace, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Wallace, of Riverton, attended Palmyra High School. He was employed as a shipfitter before entering the Navy in February, 1942.

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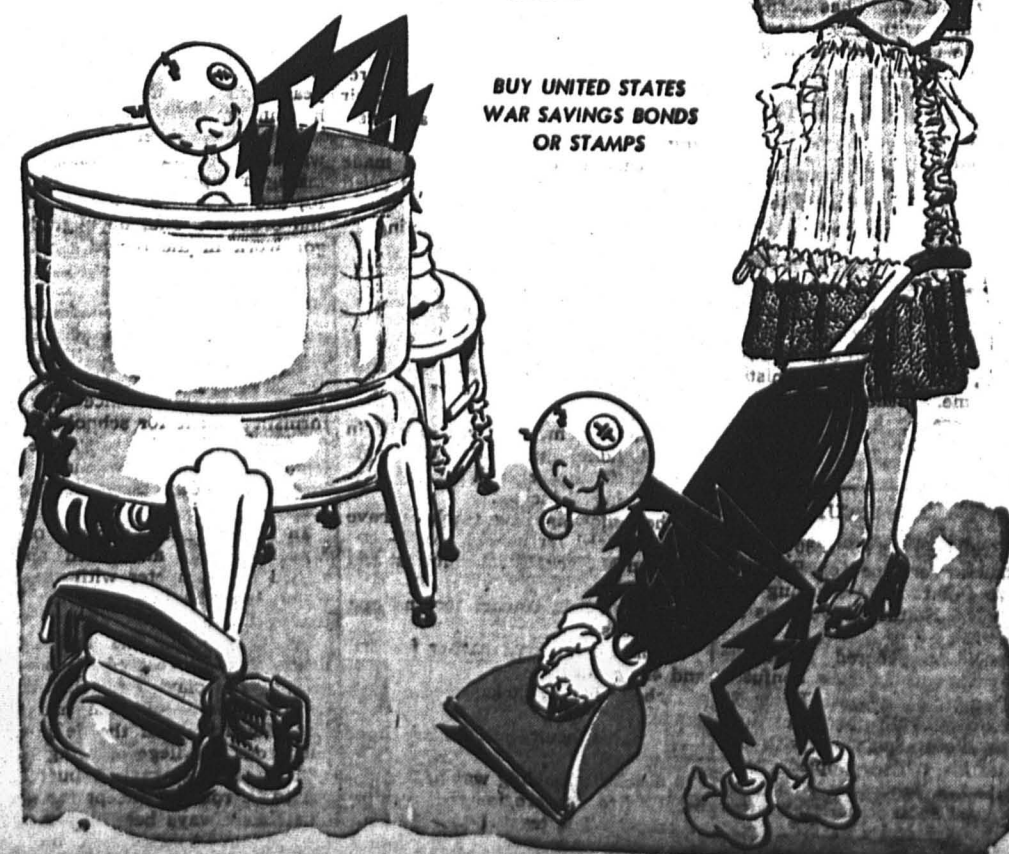

## AMERICA'S PLACE IN THE NEW WORLD

"America must adopt a more realistic role in world affairs and provide a rallying place for the peoples of the world, if western civilization as we know it is to survive," Suddreth Hurt told local Rotarians in an address before them on Thursday. Making a return appearance before the Rotary Club this year, Mr. Hurt, a widely known radio analyst, columnist and lecturer, spoke on "America's Place in the New World."

Mr. Hurt pointed out that never had any people found themselves faced with so great a responsibility as now. Because of this responsibility America must assume leadership in International affairs. "We must provide this leadership," said Mr. Hurt, first, "because of our ideology of government."

Man's determination to be free has caused him to rebel against despotic power over him. America has stressed the fundamental freedoms which has made it the most powerful nation in the world. "No nation can long remain strong where one group retains political control over a period of time."

## World Leadership

Secondly, said Mr. Hurt, "The superior economic strength of America makes it necessary that we assume world leadership." No other nation can gear its economic system as we can ours. [We must see to it that

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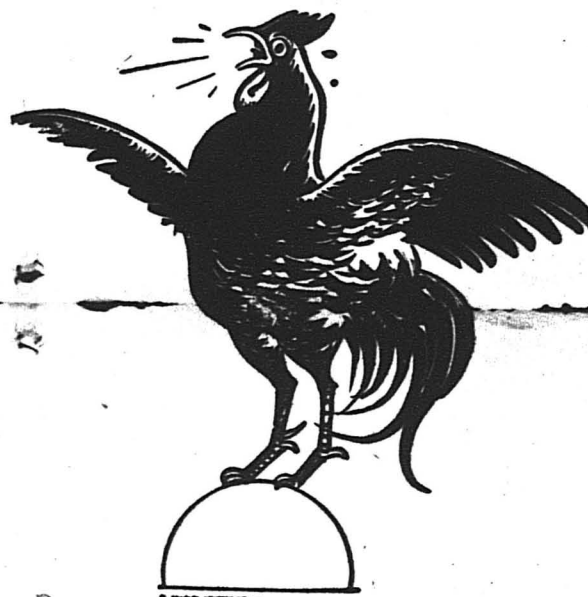

this system is used for right purposes. The third reason is that our "technological shells are developed to a greater degree than that of any other country." This is of tremendous importance in maintaining peace in the world. With America emerging from the war the strongest power militarily gives us another reason. According to Mr. Hurt, the scrapping of our naval strength after this war as we did after the last one is unthinkable.

"We must retain our full naval and air strength to prevent any future conflicts." Of most importance however, cautioned Mr. Hurt, is that if we do not accept this leadership civilization itself may not continue; "certainly it may not survive another war." Mr. Hurt said that the atomic bomb is a great symbol for peace. It makes unnecessary nations going to war for coal or oil or minerals, and nations relying on atomic power improperly used would lead to the earth's destruction.

Carrying his subject through, Mr. Hurt then outlined in a vivid way just what he thought America must do in the new world. America must see that a new world structure is organized which will provide a higher standard of living for the peoples of the world. "The big three, starvation, idleness and cold, make people desperate and lead to anarchism and totalitarianism."

We must see that these three do not gain control anywhere in the world. We must assume active leadership in the new United Nations or-

organization, insist on all misunderstandings being settled judiciously through a new International Court of Justice, and promptly punish all leaders who defy the recommendations of the World Court. We must see that textbooks used in the schools of all countries stress the merits of a democratic way of life.

"Above all, we must give the people on the earth a chance to live as cultured people." Mankind does not want to slaughter his fellow-man—war is inwardly repulsive to mankind. It is environmental factors that cause people to kill, believes Mr. Hurt. What mankind wants above all these is a secure family life, a chance to enjoy the beauties of nature and of music, and to follow the cultural pursuits in which he is interested, to live in peace with his fellow man.

All this can be accomplished, said Mr. Hurt, if America assumes world leadership. We then need have no

worries which form of government will dominate. Totalitarianism will cease to exist—democracy will provide the way for a fuller and richer life for the world.

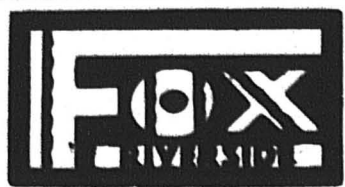
