TRAFFIC HEAVY

Monday night traffic on S-41 and over the Tacony-Palmyra Bridge was the heaviest in years as motorists took advantage of the first holiday week-end since the close of the war with Japan.

SERGEANT YEARLY HOME FROM ITALY

Staff Sergeant Lester R. Yearly arrived home Thursday from the European Theatre of war to spend a thirty-day furlough with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Yearly, of Cinnaminson street, Riverton.

S-Sgt. Yearly has been overseas since 1943 and was a member of the 349th Infantry, Eighty-eighth Blue Devil Division, which saw action in Africa, Cassino, Rome, the Gothic Line and the Po Valley in Italy. He was wounded at Lasolione, Italy, in October, 1944, and after hospitalization returned to duty. He wears three battle stars, Good Conduct Medal, Infantryman's Combat Badge and Purple Heart.

The Division was also awarded the Presidential Unit Citation and the Croix de Guerre.

S-Sgt. Yearly will report to Camp Campbell, Kentucky at the termination of his furlough.

The Feed Industry

By way of an excellent series of slides, which showed clearly each phase of the operation, local Rotarians were carried through the process employed in a modern industrial plant specializing in the production of poultry and animal feed. J. R. Allison, who holds the Rotary classification of "Feed Distributing," presented the slides as part of his vocational talk before club members at their regular Thursday meeting.

Mr. Allison explained that the various grains are brought to the plant in large railroad cars, while the molasses used in the process is brought in large tank cars. The grains are stored in pits which are 52 feet deep while the molasses is pumped to huge storage tanks.

Processes

At the start of the operation the oats are drawn to large crushers and the corn to equally large corn crackers. From these machines the crushed grains are blown into a mixer, where also, the molasses is sprayed. The ingredients of the feed are added to produce the special feed desired, thoroughly mixed and comes out in small pellet form. Mr. Allison pointed out that each pellet contained a balanced ration and would not be blown away by the wind.

As the thoroughly and scientifically mixed feed comes from the mixer on endless belts, bags of various sizes are automatically filled. While this is being done, said Mr. Allison, "Samples of the mixture are taken every 7 minutes for the most careful examination in the large and well-equipped laboratories." "These laboratories," followed Mr. Allison, "are responsible for the remarkable improvement in all types of feeds." The endless belts with grain, now automatically placed and sealed in bags, carry the bags to freight cars where 400 carloads a day are shipped to dealers all over the world. 600 bags make up a car load. Usually ten days supply are carried on hand but during the past several years it has been impossible to help as much as a two day supply ready for shipment.

"All operations including the making of bags from burlap which comes in 1,000 yard bales to the printing on the bags" is done in the plant according to Mr. Allison. Printing shops print all literature and advertising. To protect the dealers each bag is marked for identification which can be traced back to the operator in charge.

"The feed industry as a whole," said Mr. Allison, tries to do its business through the four Rotary Principles:

1. Is it the truth?
2. Is it fair to all concerned?
3. Will it build good will and better friendship?
4. Will it be profitable to all concerned?

Tom Scott, who has won national acclaim for his singing roles with Fred Waring's Orchestra, will appear on the program, giving some of his famous interpretations of American folk songs. Every member has been assured of something of special interest to follow up, and give added enjoyment during the successive months, including a special bridge party for new members. Instruction will be given those interested in linoleum block printing, with the idea of making individual Christmas cards. Then there will be talks ranging from housekeeping trends through "The Story Behind Superstition," and "Memory or Telepathy," to subjects of world-wide interest, such as "Is there Democracy in the Soviet Union," and "The Comeback of Conquered Peoples."

The charm and hospitality of Christmas will be captured in the annual Christmas tea.

A program of great appeal will be the hobby show—with its variety of exhibits and collections.

The Charter Luncheon in the spring has been arranged to be an unusually festive occasion, and will afford entertainment for all,—the new members as well as those of long standing.

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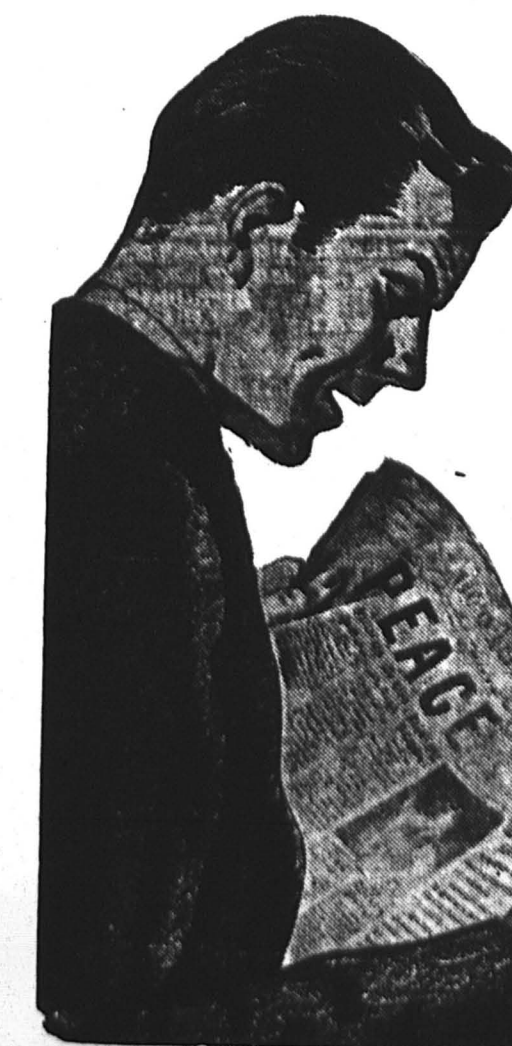

ALL OF US are looking forward eagerly to a speedy return to normal living. And a telephone in every home is a definite part of that picture. It would be less than natural if hopes were not aroused for a quick reduction in the number of New Jersey families waiting for telephone service. We expect to fill at least 15,000 of their orders before the first of the year, but there is a long, hard road ahead before everyone can be supplied. That's because to serve 3 out of 4 now waiting requires not just telephone instruments but also cable and central office equipment which take longer to make and install.

The modern telephone system is extremely complex. Unlike a commodity, it is composed of many kinds of equipment which must be combined and made to work smoothly with the apparatus already in service. Enlarging the system is a long process.

Reconverting factories and getting raw materials is a huge task—but it's only a start. The shortage of telephone equipment is nationwide. New Jersey's share of the national output calls for great quantities of switchboards, cable, wire, telephone instruments, and scores of

other items. Cable and wire alone run into staggering figures, many millions of feet. New switchboards take months to build, and then more months to install. Miles of new cable must be made and laid under streets and along highways. And for each installation of new apparatus, there must be myriad wire-end connections, each completed by hand. Nearly all of New Jersey's 200 telephone exchanges, over-burdened during the war, need to be expanded. In some instances, new or enlarged buildings are required.

For the job ahead, the war record of the Telephone Organization is the best index of what may be expected of it in peacetime. That same capacity will be thrown solidly into the task now getting underway. No effort will be spared to cut down the waiting list as quickly as possible and speed the return of "service on demand" for everyone who wants it.

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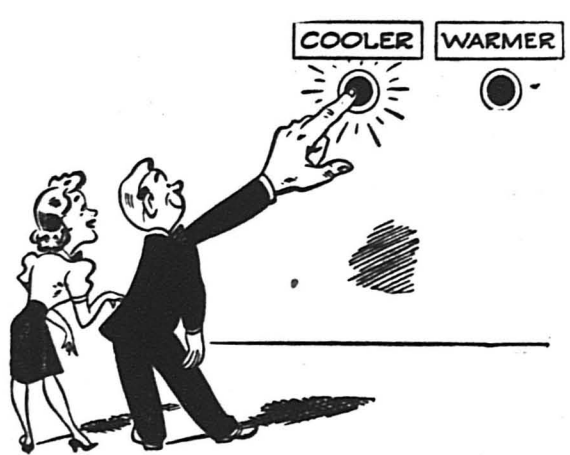

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MOORHOUSE ON CRUISER ASTORIA

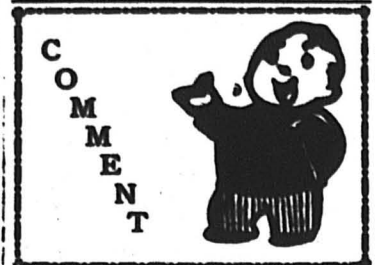
Joseph Moorhouse, water tender, first class, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Moorhouse, 508 Main street, Riverton, has helped the light cruiser, U.S.S. Astoria, avenge her namesake—a heavy cruiser which was sunk by the Japs off Guadalcanal in 1942.

Since she entered Jap waters eight months ago, this ship has been in the thick of action at Two Jims and Okinawa, in the North China Sea and off the coast of Tokyo itself. Operating with a fast carrier task force under Admiral William H. Halsey, Jr., she has succeeded in knocking 13 Jap planes out of the air and hitting numerous others.

Pilots of this ship's two Kingfisher seaplanes have fished seven carrier-based airmen from the sea, finding them on rescue search missions and accomplishing some of the rescues within shooting distance of the enemy ashore.

The Astoria was part of the Naval task force which made the initial strike on the Tokyo area. In another operation, she and a task force sailed continuously for 80 days, making intermittent strikes against the enemy

and setting a record for the length of time any sizable task group has been continuously underway.

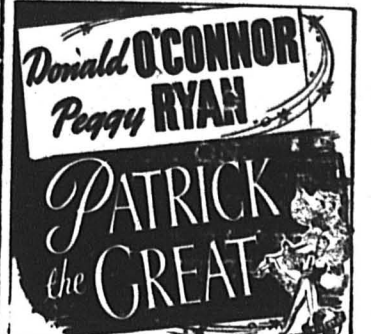

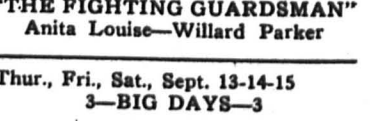

Legion Plans New Memorial Building

At a recent meeting of Post Rodgers American Legion, the Post saw the culmination of months of planning by The Memorial Building Committee, when W. Harold Thorn, chairman of the plans and construction committee presented several drawings by various architects for consideration by the Post members. After a serious study of these plans the Post unanimously adopted the Architect Petty, of Moorestown.

The proposed Memorial Building will be a modern fireproof structure, of buff brick trimmed with California Redwood, housing the most complete Veterans headquarters in this area. It will include four bowling alleys, four billiard tables, library and game rooms. A snack bar, large meeting room and stage, as well as various small committee rooms and quarters for caretaker will also be included.

One of the most modern and beautiful appointments will be a glass enclosed restaurant, combining both an all weather enclosed dining area and an open air terraced dining section. The inclusion of this and other innovations will make the building self-supporting and will be an accomplishment that creates an opportunity for service to the communities of Riverton, Cinnaminson and Palmyra, since Post activities are restricted to these three communities. The committee is now negotiating to secure a plot of ground located convenient to all three and of sufficient size to allow for parking and outdoor sports.

The Post believes that only through co-operative effort will a suitable Memorial be created, having permanency and utility, that may reflect credit on the area and show full appreciation to the 1800 men and women who have served in World War II.

A supplementary plan is now being formulated which will include a shrine within this memorial building which will contain the names of persons from this area, who served in our Nation's major conflicts.

DOG CATCHER ACTIVE

Urges Leadership

Former Judge Frank A. Hendrickson in an address to members of the Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club proposed that the United States furnish the leadership which will prevent future wars. His suggestion was that America back to the fullest limit a World Court or other international organization designed to maintain peace.

"This victory was our victory," Judge Hendrickson flatly told the Rotarians, adding:

"We did not want to fight, we wanted peace." "But we delivered the goods to Russia so that the defense of Stalingrad was possible, we provided a bridge of ships and an umbrella of planes to Great Britain and made of those Isles a great bastion of military strength, we provided General Eisenhower and General MacArthur, the greatest military leaders of our age, we won the victory."

He said America would not be impressed by the talk which persisted after the last war, "that we got into the battle after the war was won."

All Working Together
This great victory was made possible by all working together, the military and naval forces, industry, labor and science, all contributing their fullest to prevent the enslavement of the peoples of the world.

The United States, declared Judge Hendrickson, now faces a very grave responsibility to see that victory is maintained. "We must police the world so that never again there can arise other Hitlers and Hirohitos who for real brutality and aggression made Napoleon and Alexander appear like pikers. We must pay homage to our dead whose inspiration by heroic deeds imposes on us a realization of the full measure of our duty to God, Our Country and Our Flag."

Although we have witnessed one of the greatest periods in American History, a period which saw the greatest devastation and the greatest offensive weapons ever created for destruction; "Democracy still lives and the American flag has still never bowed in defeat." Truly it is a period written in "blood, sweat and tears." Civilization has survived bloody massacres, cruelties, and the atomic bomb, he said, and the United States will provide the greatest period of prosperity through scientific achievement and the genius of the American people that the world has ever known. "The peoples of the earth will live in peace and harmony."

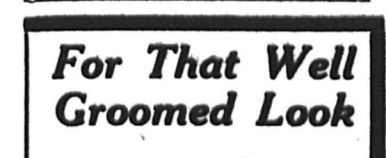

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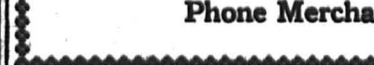

C. MORRIS BECK DIED ON TUESDAY

C. Morris Beck, 67, former chief of the Palmyra Police Department, died suddenly on Tuesday afternoon of this week in his home, 614 Highland avenue, Palmyra. Chief Beck retired from the force three years ago because of poor health, having served for 31 years.

Born in Pottsville, Pa., he moved to Palmyra early in his life and was a resident of that community for more than 50 years.

Under the direction of Chief Beck, the Palmyra Police became one of the most efficient organizations of its kind in the State and he figured prominently in the solution of a number of important cases. RATION BOARDS COMBINED
Consolidation of seven local War Price and Rationing Boards in Camden County and six in Burlington into one Board for each County, was announced today by Camden OPA District Director T. Harold Dempsey. The consolidation will become effective on October 15.

The mergers are the first of a series that by January 1, 1946, will consolidate the 35 local Boards in the Camden OPA District of seven counties into nine.

The headquarters of the Camden County Board, which will be located on the thirteenth floor of the Broadway-Stevens Building, 300 South Broadway, Camden, will take over the work now being done by the local Boards at Pennsauken, Haddon-

field, Collingswood, Gloucester, Audubon and Berlin.

Activities for Burlington County will center in the office now used by the Mt. Holly local board at 37 Main street. Boards to be consolidated in Burlington County are now located at Mt. Holly, Bordentown, Burlington, Palmyra, Wrightstown and Moorestown.

"The consolidations," Dempsey said, "have been made necessary in order to meet changed conditions brought about by the ending of the war. Rationing has been curtailed and will continue to be reduced. OPA therefore, is streamlining its operations."

"We shall eventually use the consolidated Boards as centers for price compliance activities. Present members of local boards who have rendered outstanding and extremely effective service during the war, will augment and strengthen the new County Boards. These boards will play a major role in OPA's anti-inflation program."

"In consequence of the change, after January 1, all County Boards will

be called Price Control Boards instead of War Price and Rationing Boards. Any rationing programs in operation after January 1, will be handled from the Camden OPA District Office in the Broadway-Stevens Building, Camden.

"In the meantime, as far as Camden and Burlington Counties are concerned all applications that before October 15 had been sent to the local Boards should be sent thereafter to the County Boards at Mt. Holly and Camden.

Fewer Employees

"In compliance with Civil Service regulations each of the paid employees effected by the consolidations will receive thirty days notice. In Burlington County that will mean a reduction from 16 to 6 and in Camden from 23 to 9. When all consolidations have become effective on or before January 1, the entire paid force in County Boards in the Camden OPA District will have been reduced so that overhead will have been cut by more than \$200,000. In addition there will be a reduction of several thousand dollars per year in rental costs for buildings and equipment.

"That the personnel effected by consolidation may be afforded opportunity for re-employment, we have made arrangements with Civil Ser-

vice to give every consideration to their applications for re-employment. Those best qualified for available work will be referred to the War Manpower Commission for consultation.

"When consolidations have been completed the other County Boards will be located as follows: For Cumberland in Vineland; Salem in Salem; Gloucester in Woodbury. Atlantic City will have two boards, one in Atlantic City and one in Egg Harbor. Cape May County also will have two boards, one in Ocean City and one in Wildwood."

Further announcements of forthcoming consolidations will be made from Camden OPA District Headquarters as and when they are put into effect.

When the doors of the local Ration Board office in Palmyra close on October 15 there will, in all probability, be few mourners on hand to witness its passing. Just picture the situation which would have existed during the war had their NOT been rationing!

The buildings that were to be demolished in Riverton because they are unsafe, fire hazards, etc., are still standing in all the glory of their shabbiness.

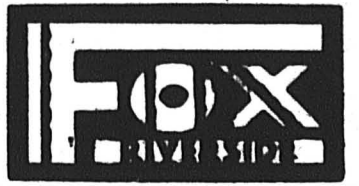

PRICE CONTROL IS NECESSARY

As long as the demand for goods far exceeds the available supply it will be necessary to control prices or we will have a period of inflation, so spoke T. Harold Dempsey, Camden District Director of OPA, to members of the local Rotary Club. The period that followed the last World War was cited by the speaker as giving an example of what might happen in our country if price controls were lifted. In the 18 months following November, 1918, living costs went up 46 percent to be added to the already 62 percent increase created during the war years.

This time, said Mr. Dempsey, the inflationary increase would even be greater for the demand for goods is larger and the accumulated purchasing power in savings is higher and the supply of goods lower. If we do not want to experience another period of industrial failures, bank closing, and mortgage foreclosures, then we need to control prices until the time comes when the supply of goods equals the demand. To everyone the advice comes, "Pay no more than ceiling prices."

Because of the lifting of rationing on many consumer goods the work of local Boards, for whom Mr. Dempsey voiced high praise, has been greatly lessened. Consolidation is taking place to reduce the 5,500 Boards to 2,000.

After Nov. 1st the 35 local units will be consolidated to 9 with the Board in Mt. Holly serving this area. Beginning with the new year these Boards will be known as "Price Control Boards."

In introducing the speaker, Dr. Hulise paid tribute to the work of the members of rationing boards when he said, "No group has done so much and received so little credit."

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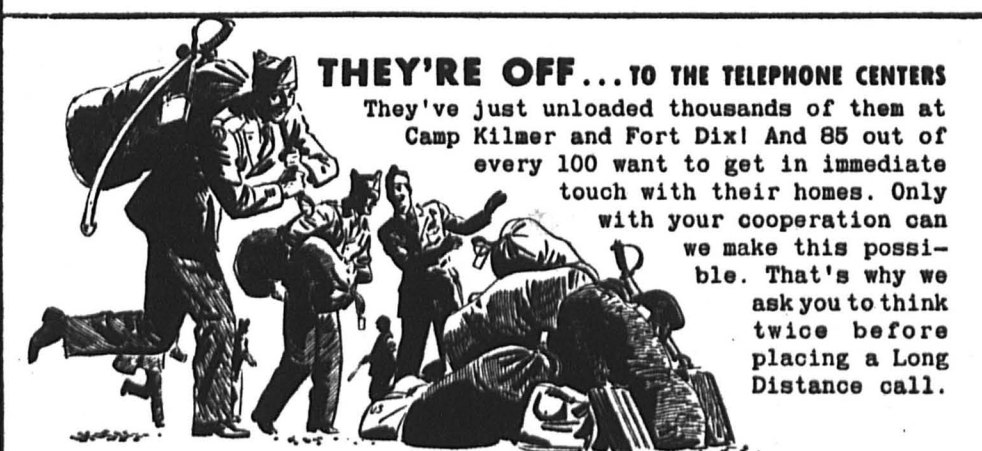

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF BURLINGTON REGULATING THE PARKING OF VEHICLES ON PORTIONS OF CERTAIN STREETS AND AVENUES IN SAID BOROUGH, AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THE TERMS AND PROVISIONS THEREOF, AND REPEALING CERTAIN PRIOR ORDINANCES OF THE SAID BOROUGH RELATING TO THE PARKING OF VEHICLES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Borough Council of the Borough of Burlington, State of New Jersey: That no person shall park any vehicle for more than one hour continuously, on any week-day, between nine o'clock a.m. and six o'clock p.m. on any of the hereinafter designated portions of streets in the said Borough of Burlington:

(a) The Southwesterly side of Main Street within 270 feet Northwestwardly from North Broad Street.
(b) The Northeasterly side of Main Street between North Broad Street and Howard Street.
(c) The Northeasterly side of Main Street within 130 feet Northwestwardly from Howard Street.
(d) The Northeasterly side of Howard Street within 165 feet Northwestwardly from Main Street.
SECTION 2: That no person, at any time, shall park any vehicle on any of the hereinafter designated portions of streets or avenues in the said Borough of Burlington:

(a) The Norwesterly side of Fourth Street between Fulton Street and Elm Avenue.
(b) The Northwesterly side of Park Avenue between Thomas Avenue and Elm Avenue.
(c) The Northwesterly side of North Broad Street within 125 feet extending Southwestwardly from a line 70 feet Southwestwardly from Main Street.

Weather permitting, other fall non-scheduled races for the various class boats will be sailed Sundays.



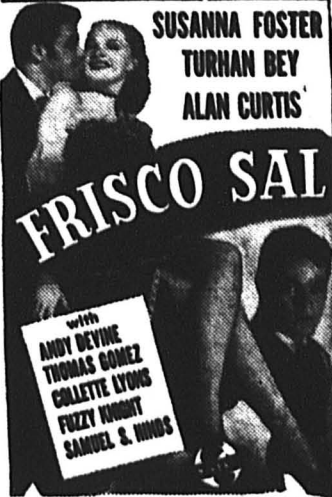
