War Fund Includes USO and 16 War  
Relief Agencies

### The Community Chest Includes:

#### THE VISITING NURSE SOCIETY

Even greater demands will be made upon our Visiting Nurses during the coming year. Hospital services have been curtailed because of the shortage of doctors and nurses. More babies are being born at home and less serious illnesses are treated at home. This condition increases the responsibility of the Public Health Nurses and they carry the burden of keeping their Community up to standard.

The Visiting Nurses have carried on health programs in the local schools, established a Baby Clinic in Palmyra and assisted in a Venereal Disease Clinic at Zurbrugg Hospital.

Public health is of vital importance and a community's responsibility. With the pressure of war activities it is easy to forget the existing organizations which have served us for many years.

#### THE FAMILY SERVICE COUNCIL OF RIVERTON AND CINNAMINSON

which provides "family service" that operates in advance of relief, supplements relief and follows relief, in order that the need for relief may be deferred or avoided; that in deserving cases the arbitrary standards for relief may be supplemented, and that the job of maintaining morale and economic independence may be wisely supervised after relief is withdrawn. This is an insurance that is necessary to our Community.

#### BURLINGTON COUNTY HOSPITAL

The emergency of war has greatly increased the difficulty of hospital administration. Doctors and nurses have been called to the colors in growing numbers and the challenge to such institutions as the Burlington County Hospital to hold the quality of service unimpaired, is indeed a serious one. It is a matter of pride that the challenge has been well met this year, in spite of the fact that the greatest number of patients in the institution's history have applied for and received care.

It is vitally important that our citizens shall be aware of the necessity of helping to uphold, through their contributions, the service standards of this life-giving force in the Community. National defense and public morale require it.

#### THE CINNAMINSON HOME

The Cinnaminson Home has a record of fifty-three years of valuable service in our Community. Sixty-four hospitals and social agencies, as well as doctors and ministers have learned to turn to The Home when problems of convalescent care or spiritual and physical rehabilitation for women and girls confront them. It is more than ever important, at this time, to render this service, which returns these people to their homes as useful members of society, and we hope that the generous support of our friends and neighbors will not fail us now.

#### THE ZURBRUGG MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

For thirty years this hospital has served the needs of Riverton and Cinnaminson. Being situated closer to these communities than any other similar institution, it receives a large number of emergency cases each year and is ready night and day to care for those who are in need of its services. Many people who have been referred by other local social service organizations are treated at Zurbrugg each year. The equipment and facilities are considered above the average for an institution of its size and are constantly being improved. The hospital plays an essential role in restoring health to our citizens—health, the most prized of all human possessions.

#### BURLINGTON COUNTY Y.W.C.A.

The Young Women's Christian Association of Burlington County is part of an international association of women dedicated to the task of applying to daily life the ideals of the Christian religion.

It has co-operated closely with the U.S.O. and all the unusual services made necessary by war conditions. Still first in the purpose of the Association is the emphasis on the spiritual needs of its members, but a wide and varied program also provides for interesting activities in recreational and intellectual fields. Its clubs draw women and girls from all walks of life and innumerable occupations.

With a complete and competent staff the Association hopes this year to render very real service in Burlington County and it greatly needs the help and continued interest of its friends in Riverton and Cinnaminson.

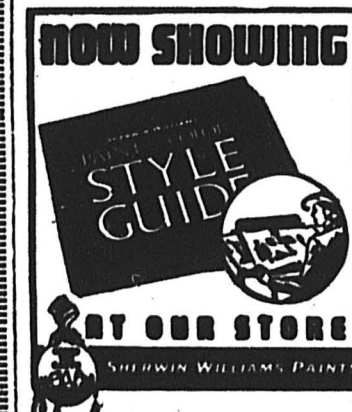

County Supervisor for the Farm Security Administration, said today. Sherer said that the "GI Bill of Rights" makes veterans eligible for Bankhead-Jones Farm Purchase Loans on the same basis as tenants. These loans, made through FSA, may be for as much as \$12,000 and are repayable over 40 years at three per cent interest.

Sherer said Congress recently appropriated \$50,000,000 to Bankhead-Jones loans. Half that amount is earmarked for loans to veterans.  
"The veteran's big problem will be to find a farm which can be bought at its long-time capacity value," Sherer said. "Unless the veteran can find the right farm at the right price, liberal credit will do him no good, and it may actually do him harm."  
Sherer said that he and members of the Advisory Committee, all local farmers, are helping veterans search for good farm purchase opportunities. "So far the pickings have been slim," Sherer said.

### JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

Speaking upon a subject that concerns every city and community, local Rotarians heard Robert Cicala, Mount Holly attorney, express his views gained from close relationship with boys and girls brought before our juvenile courts.  
He defined a "delinquent" as one who had fallen short of the mark of moral conduct set by God and human society. The failure of the child to measure up to the mark set for him was due to many factors beyond the child's control. Poor housing, inadequate food and shel-

ter, homes broken by disagreement and divorce, have all contributed to the making of a juvenile delinquent. Often he is a sick person due to improper food and the lack of parental affection. In many large families he is the unwanted child. There can be no solving of the problem unless it involves a solution to the problem of delinquent parents.  
The attorney then briefly traced the development of the Juvenile Court and the establishment of Boys Schools to give sympathetic and trained understanding to delinquency.  
He urged that the Court should be used only as a last resort, when all other community agencies had tried to help the young person and failed, and it was evident that institutional care was needed.  
Communities were urged by the speaker to continue their work with youth through the schools and churches and the various boy and girl agencies for today's juvenile delinquents may become tomorrow's criminals.

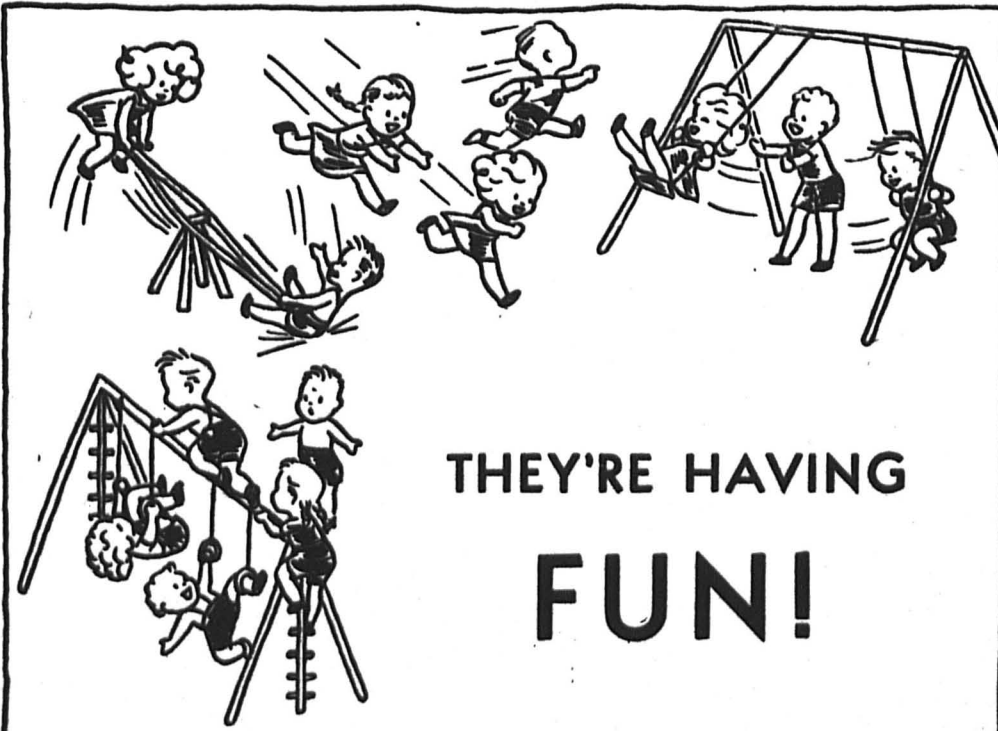

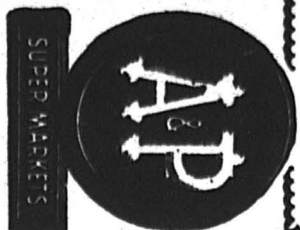

Hubert Cooper, Moorestown, Chairman of the Nurse's Aide Committee for Burlington County Chapter, American Red Cross, has received a letter from Mrs. Frances Herr, Directress of Nurses at Burlington County Hospital, expressing appreciation of the assistance given by the Nurse's Aide Corps, and emphasizing the need of continued service.

Following is Mrs. Herr's letter: "My dear Mrs. Cooper: I am sure we all feel strongly the deep solemnity of the past few weeks. The news brings home to us the thought that we must all lend assistance to rebuilding a world. We are all weary but nonetheless happy that we can help speed the return to a peaceful, normal existence. But that return to normalcy, I am afraid, will be a long and arduous task."

"Here and now, I wish to express my undying gratitude to the Red Cross for their very generous and able assistance to the Burlington County Hospital during these trying years. I would like those women who have given so faithfully, and unselfishly of their time and energy to know just what it has meant to the sick of Burlington County to have had the attention and care this Corps of Nurse's Aides have given. I dare say not a few of the patients realize that without the bedside care given largely by the Aides, there would have been but little need for the rest of us! An operation may be very successful, but the post-operative care—daily bedside nursing, the cheerfulness of the nurses and Nurse's Aides—plays an important role in the welfare and eventual recovery of the patient. An alcohol rub and a fresh bed goes a long way

to restoring health and happiness!

"I have often wondered just what we could have accomplished without the Aides. Surely the hospital could not have run smoothly, if at all, with the depleted staff of graduate nurses which we have had in this emergency. I must ask you to urge them to help us through this last mile of the way."

"I am sure they too, are tired—those women who have kept to the letter their hospital assignments, and I feel a hesitancy in asking them for more. "The duration plus six months" is a familiar phrase to us all and I use it now regarding my request for Aides. I hope another six months will see us "in the clear," and will put an end to this cry for help that must have become a familiar sound during these war years."

"The years before the war Burlington County Hospital was staffed by graduates from leading Philadelphia hospitals, not to mention the outstanding students that were Burlington County's own. A great many of our staff members joined the

armed forces. In the past two weeks, we have lost five members of our nursing staff. Husbands are returning, eager to make good the plans they made while away in France, Germany, Iwo Jima or Manila, and I wish them well. But it does leave us in a serious situation, thus my urgent request that you ask the Aides to stand by us and help us surmount this last "hump!"

## WAR'S END REVIVES WORLD TEA TRAFFIC

Tea will be one of the first imported foods to feel the effects of victory in the Pacific, it was reported today by the nation's leading tea distributor.

"Just as the tea supply was an immediate casualty of the attack on Pearl Harbor, it is now an indication of the quick revival of the Far East as the principal source of this product," said Joseph G. Vaskas, purchasing agent for the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company and

member of the Tea Industry Advisory Committee. "With Japan and its prewar tea export total of 65,000,000 pounds removed from the scene, China is prepared to more than make up the difference."

Vaskas said that if Allied occupation forces find Java and Sumatra, two vital tea producers in the Dutch East Indies, were stripped or otherwise ruined by Jap invaders, Chinese production capacity is still ample to bring world supply back to normal. China produces one billion pounds of tea a year, but usually exports only about 10 per cent. With the reopening of South China ports, a much larger percentage of her output may be diverted to export channels.

At present, world tea supplies are about 86 per cent of normal. Under a United Nations agreement made in 1942, the British Ministry of Food was appointed the single buyer of tea, and the consuming countries were given pro-rated allotments. In September of that year, the allotment for the United States was fixed at 65,000,000 pounds annually. Now

it is 86,500,000, while pre-war needs in this country called for 100,000,000 pounds. With a stockpile maintained in warehouses and a considerable cut in set-aside orders by the armed services, American tea supplies will soon reach prewar levels, he said.

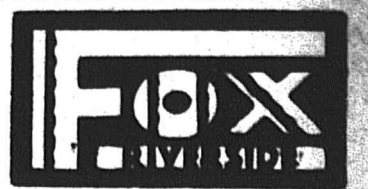

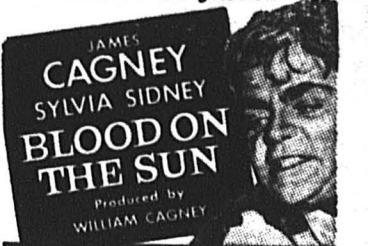

**CAPTAIN WOOD RECEIVES BRONZE STAR MEDAL**

Captain Alexander C. Wood III, of Riverton road, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal by Lt. Col. Henry W. Johnson, Battalion Commander of the 390th Military Police Battalion. Presentation of the award was made at Battalion Headquarters in Antwerp, Belgium in the presence of high ranking military officials of the Belgian Port.

Captain Alexander C. Wood is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Wood, Jr., of Riverton. Prior to his induction in the Army, Captain Wood practiced law with the firm of French, Richards and Bradley of Camden, N. J. He received his college degree from Haverford College in 1935 and his law diploma from the Harvard Law School in 1938.

Captain Wood was inducted in the Army as an enlisted man on May 5, 1942 and was commissioned an officer on February 12, 1943, after graduating from the Provost Marshal General School at Ft. Custer, Mich. A month later he was shipped overseas and was assigned to the Office of the Provost Marshal in Oran, Africa. After 16 months service at that post, he was assigned to the Office of the Provost Marshal of the Continental Advance Section which supported the 7th Army during the invasion of Southern France. It was during this period that Captain Wood excelled in his work and was thus awarded the Bronze Star Medal. His citation reads as follows:

"Captain Alexander C. Wood, III, (then first Lieutenant) (Army No. 0197922), Corps of Military Police, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations, as Assistant Police and Traffic Officer, Headquarters Continental Advance Section, European Theater of Operations, from 25 July 1944 to 1 November 1944. Captain Wood was responsible for the successful reception, orientation and deployment of military police organizations. Untrifling in his efforts and outstanding in his expedition accomplishments of his duties, he was an inspiration to both fellow officers and enlisted men. Entered military service from New Jersey."

Captain Alexander C. Wood III has the accredited service record of 95 points and should soon return to Riverton. He is as anxious to see his parents as they are to see him.

"Judge Mathews also is an expert on other phases of legislative business. He was for years special counsel to the State Highway Department and is now a Deputy Attorney General of New Jersey."

"With our support, Judge Mathews' election will be assured and the people of Burlington County will have a friend and neighbor in Washington during these crucial days of reconversion."

LEWIS REPORTS PROGRESS  
ON TRANSIT SURVEY

Progress in preliminary surveys to determine the feasibility of South Jersey rapid transit lines to connect numerous suburban communities, was reported today by State Senator Arthur W. Lewis, of Riverton.

Discussing progress of the survey, as reported by State Commissioner of Economic Development Erdman, Senator Lewis said that while no predictions can yet be made as to whether the proposed improvement of transit facilities will be economically feasible, hope for establishment of the new rapid transit lines can be seen in the early report.

Senator Lewis' statement was based on a report to Commissioner

Erdman, made at Lewis' request, from the firm of engineers retained by the state to make preliminary surveys.

Representing the South Jersey Transportation Committee, Lewis some time ago conferred with Governor Edge and secured the latter's approval of the survey, which is financed by the Economic Development Department.

"If the survey reveals that the proposed transit lines are feasible, prompt efforts will be made to push the project to development," Senator Lewis said today. He pointed out that the proposal embodies high-speed transit lines running from the Camden-Philadelphia bridge into Burlington county and several other South Jersey counties. Principal communities in each county would be linked by the lines.

Senator Lewis said that among the aspects of the survey already completed are population studies for the area and for individual routes, field inspections of the area and general inspection of present rail lines, studies of railroad schedules to develop the densities of the train movements.

Traffic data for the Delaware River

Bridge also has been compiled, along with traffic and operating data for the bridge high-speed line. Data also will be compiled on traffic on present bus lines, while a preliminary contact has been made with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, for the purpose of obtaining necessary data as to railroad and ferry traffic.

"While the engineers are still in the stage of assembling underlying factual data, most of which must be analyzed before conclusions can be reached on the South Jersey transportation problem, the proposed project is progressing satisfactorily," Senator Lewis said.

"With establishment of rapid transit lines through well populated sections of South Jersey, the entire area should enjoy a boom such as never before seen," he added. "Every effort will be made to have the surveys completed and a definite proposal ready for action as soon as possible."
