## Unusual Opportunity For Local Voters

The people of Riverton, as well as those of Palmyra and Cinnaminson are being given one of the most unusual opportunities ever offered to the people of any community, that of having their own residents chosen to represent them in the highest governmental offices, National, State and County. This unique situation probably will never again be experienced locally.

With Judge Frank A. Mathews, Jr. for Congress; Arthur W. Lewis, for State Senator; Albert McCay, for Assembly; and Frank A. Shover for Freeholder, four of the most important offices can be occupied by outstanding men from the communities being referred to as the "Tri-Boroughs."

This most remarkable coincidence, its significance and value to the people of this immediate area was pointed out to a large group of citizens meeting in the interest of local candidates by Blaine Capelhart, prominent Cinnaminson attorney.

Speaking before the recently organized Independent Citizens Group, Mr. Capelhart declared, "The organization of all voters to get back of our local candidates is one of great merit."

Donald M. Patterson, Riverton church and civic leader, told the assemblage of citizens that "never in the history of our community have our people been presented with such a grand opportunity."

### Partisan Politics Out

"Partisan politics should be 'out' for us," he said. "Every voter in this town regardless of his political faith should vote for Frank Mathews and Arthur Lewis. These men are our friends and neighbors, they are interested in our local problems, and as highly qualified citizens their election will bring honor and prominence to our community."

Russell M. Bigelow, chairman of the Independent Group, stated that the enthusiasm for the movement for full support of local candidates was growing "by leaps and bounds." "This movement has met with a tremendous response and acceptance, and is now spreading like wildfire to our neighboring communities." "I have been swamped with calls from community and civic leaders who agree to the importance of uniting all our people into one great group supporting these outstanding men."

He said that as more and more people understood the full significance of what the election of these men would mean to our town, they would "ride into office on a tide of roaring votes such as this area has never known."

A unanimous expression of pride in the honor which has come to our community and a confident feeling of a sweeping non-partisan vote for our fellow townsmen pervaded the meeting.

### MATHEWS ACTS QUICKLY

Prompt action has been taken by Lieutenant Colonel Frank A. Mathews, Jr., Republican candidate for Congress, with former Representative D. Lane Powers in opposing the proposed ship "graveyard" in the Delaware River from the "Tacony-Palmyra Bridge to Torresdale. The plan called for such a yard on the northwesterly side of the ship channel for a distance of 500-1,000 feet. Local yachtsmen and many others are not in favor of the project. Colonel Mathews has been advised that the matter is under careful investigation by the district engineer of the War Department and that he will receive a full report in the near future.

## Big Republican Vote

Down the line for the entire Republican Ticket headed by Judge Frank A. Mathews, Jr. and Senator Arthur W. Lewis was the slogan adopted unanimously by the Riverton Republican Club at a rally held this week.

Speaks on G. I. Benefits

At the meeting of the Palmyra-Riverton Lions Club held on Thursday night of last week the speaker was Russell Delmar, of Riverton, whose topic was "The Veteran and His Problems." Mr. Delmar, with headquarters in Trenton, is an official of the New Jersey Division of Veterans' Services which at present is engaged in the tremendous task of advancing discharged service men concerning the various laws which benefit them.

These include loans, insurance, education and many other problems which range all the way to the recovery to a wrist watch that was left for repairs in Germany.

Loans are made through banks and the State or Federal Government, as the case may be, guarantees to the bank a certain percentage of the loan. The veteran must prove to the bank's satisfaction that his contemplated project has merit and is likely to succeed.

### For Education

The provisions for education are most liberal. The government allows the applicant to select a school or college of his choice, but his credit for admission must meet the requirements of the institution of learning which he proposes to enter. He is allowed a year's education for his first 90 days of service after which, if his record is satisfactory, he is allowed one month of schooling for each month of service. Tuition, books, etc. are paid for up to \$500 per year and the veteran receives a subsistence allowance of \$50 per month if single and \$75 per month if married.

In closing, Mr. Delmar said that, generally, the veterans who have seen the most service are the ones who are the most cooperative and eager to find their proper adjustment in civilian life.

## JONES RESIGNS

The resignation of Supervising Principal Paul R. Jones was accepted with sincere regret at a special meeting of the Palmyra Board of Education held last week.

The resignation will become effective January 1, 1946, or as soon thereafter as a successor may be appointed. Mr. Jones plans to accept a position in the Moorestown Public Schools, taking the post recently made vacant by the resignation of Dr. George C. Baker, supervising principal.

He has held his supervisory post in Palmyra since July 1, 1936. Mr. Jones came to Palmyra with a splendid background and his work and the way he has conducted the school program during his nine years here are a real credit to him and an inspiration to others to keep up these high standards.

He was born in Kingston, Pa. and was graduated from Bloomsburg High School and later from Mansfield State Teachers' College. He holds a Master's Degree from Columbia University and has done graduate work at the University of Virginia, Rutgers University and Columbia University. Mr. Jones has traveled quite extensively in both this country and Europe.

He has been principal of schools in Auburn Township, Pa., and was supervising principal of schools at Davidson, Pa., and Pemberton, N. J., before coming to Palmyra.

Mr. Jones is a member of the New Jersey Council of Education, American Association of School Administrators, Rotary Club, Burlington County Y.M.C.A. Board, Tri-Borough Community Center and Riverton Public Library Board.

Made Improvements  
During the time which he has been head of Palmyra's school system Mr. Jones has been responsible for and instituted many improvements here. Some of which include the erection of the splendid stadium and greenhouse. He organized the Friends of Music, which is composed of representative members of each of the sending districts. Band Parents and all local service organizations.

He has seen to it that the music department was equipped and ready to take care of individual instruction, realizing that many student needs vary. The curriculum has been entirely reorganized, again stressing the need of the individual.

Mr. Jones appointed heads of various departments throughout the school in a large number of subjects. A college Guidance Adviser was appointed to keep in close touch with the various colleges and study problems affecting Palmyra High School and its students. In the same capacity a Work Co-Ordinator is serving to help each and every student with his or her business problems.

Under Mr. Jones the In-Service Group was organized bringing closer contact to every teacher, those of the grades, as well as the high school.

## ELECTION TUESDAY

The General Election next Tuesday promises to bring out a large vote in this section according to local political authorities.

With two candidates from Riverton and two from Palmyra running for important posts a large vote is expected for the "native sons" on the Republican ticket. The candidates are Frank A. Mathews, of Riverton, for Congress; Arthur W. Lewis, also of Riverton, for State Senator and Albert McCay, of Palmyra, for member of the General Assembly and Frank A. Shover for Freeholder.

The remainder of the G.O.R. ticket is composed of Frank A. Shover and LeRoy Church for Freeholders and Richard J. Grover for Coroner.

The Democrats are making a strong bid for their ticket which is composed of Frank S. Katzenbach for Congress; Edwin L. Davis, for State Senator; G. L. Middleton for the General Assembly; Clinton H. Cowperthwaite and John A. Haas for Freeholder with Joseph S. Gregory running for Coroner.

Unusual Situation  
Never before have Riverton and Palmyra been honored by having four candidates for a similar number of such high positions and if these men are elected this section of the county can be assured of most able representation at Mr. Holly, Trenton and in Washington.

Local Candidates  
Local candidates on the Republican ticket will have no opposition in Riverton and Cinnaminson. In the former community Charles Coward and Richard J. Appicott are unopposed for Borough Council as are G. Kenneth Davis and Robert Cole for collector-treasurer and assessor, respectively.

Nathan Lane, present Councilman, is running without opposition for Mayor.

In Cinnaminson the Republicans also have no opposition, the candidates being Robert J. Wood for Township Committee, Joseph B. Keating for Collector and Leslie W. Reeves for Assessor.

The Republican Ticket in Palmyra is headed by John R. Ward for Mayor and Edward W. Fry, W. Paul Van Sant for Council and Charles K. Mervine for Assessor. All are incumbents.

Mayor Ward is opposed by the perennial candidate, Howard Powell on the Democratic Ticket.

### DEMOCRATIC RALLY

Former Governor A. Harry Moore, New Jersey's only three-elected Governor, who has carried Burlington County in all three elections, will speak in Mount Holly, N. J., Friday night, November 2nd, 1945, in behalf of the county Democratic ticket and Frank S. Katzenbach, 3rd, Fourth District candidate for Congress. The rally will be held in the Court House at 8 p.m. under auspices of the Democratic County Committee, with James M. Davis, Jr., county chairman, presiding. The candidates, Edwin L. Davis, for State Senator; G. L. Middleton, for Assembly; Clinton H. Cowperthwaite and John Haas, for Freeholders, and Joseph Gregory, for Coroner, will also speak. Every one is invited to attend.

William J. Steen, P.O. 2-6, U.S.N., who has been stationed as an athletic director in San Juan, Porto Rico, has been discharged from the Navy and has returned to his home, 216 Fulton street, Riverton, where his wife and family reside.

Record keeping at the school has been improved and simplified and commencement awards have been increased.

PLANES AVAILABLE  
AS WAR MEMORIALS

J. J. Robinson, Executive Chair-  
man of the War Finance Committee  
for Burlington County announced re-  
ceipt of the following Bulletin from  
the War Finance Division of the U.  
S. Treasury:

"It is now possible for any City to  
obtain a Navy Fighter Plane to pro-  
mote the Victory Loan Drive. At  
the end of the Drive the plane can  
be retained as a permanent War Me-  
morial, or turned over to an educa-  
tion institution for study purposes.

Many Navy carrier-based fighters  
are being declared surplus. We have  
arranged with the Reconstruction Fi-  
nance Corporation to have these  
planes made available, as war mem-  
orials, to cities, towns and counties  
for a token payment of \$100 each.  
The planes cannot be converted to  
civilian or commercial use, nor can

they be sold in whole or in part.  
They cannot be flown after they have  
been delivered.

Purchase will usually involve, in  
addition to the token payment, the  
cost of crating and shipping the  
planes from disposal points, of which  
there are several scattered about the  
country.

There is, however, a possibility we  
may be able to have a Navy pilot  
fly the plane for "presentation" to  
an airport at or near the city making  
the "purchase."

Papers involving the transfer of  
possession of the plane under the  
conditions outlined above must be  
signed by a responsible local public  
official.

Any individual or organization can  
provide the funds for purchase and  
shipment. They must not be War  
Finance funds.  
Any public official who is interest-  
ed in obtaining a plane can get fur-  
ther particulars by communicating  
with Mr. Robinson.

## TAX REFUNDS MAILED

Joseph D. Numan, Jr., Commis-  
sioner of Internal Revenue, announced  
today that reports recently received  
from all collection districts indicate  
that the mailing of refund checks to  
individual income taxpayers on the  
basis of their 1944 income tax re-  
turns was virtually completed in mid-  
September, well ahead of schedule.

Approximately 21,000,000 taxpayers  
received refunds totalling about \$1-  
000,000,000—substantially all of which  
was in repayment for tax withheld  
from their wages in excess of their  
tax liability for 1944.

In view of the fact that, in any  
mailing operation of this size, many  
of the checks are undeliverable be-  
cause of faulty or changed address-  
es, taxpayers who claimed refunds on  
their 1944 returns and have not yet  
received them are invited to consult  
the office of the collector of internal  
revenue where their returns were  
filed.

Robinson Coale, chairman of the police committee reported that conferences had been held recently with officials of Palmyra and Cinnaminson regarding the installation of a police radio system for the three communities. No definite decision has been reached as yet and the matter will be investigated further.

Mr. Coale stated that such a project would require the services of a man at the station 24 hours a day and that the three municipalities would share this cost, about \$2,400 per annum. Maintenance of the equipment would be an additional expense. Installation costs would be as follows: \$900 for the station itself, \$665 for a two-way system in each car and \$400 for a mist.

Councilman Richard Lippincott of the highway committee reported that he had been investigating leaf-sucking machines in other municipalities which employ them to remove fallen foliage from the highways during the Fall months, but was not ready to recommend the purchase of such equipment at the present time.

Miss Carrie M. Garrison, superintendent, reported that during the month of October there were 25 adults and 5 infants cared for in the home. There were 1,328 meals served to guests during the month.

The Riverton Needlework Guild sent 217 garments and useful articles to the Home and the First Aid Unit, of Palmyra, sent 168 hospital supplies.

The Board authorized Miss Cornelia Murray, of Riverton, to make a survey of the various agencies and find the greatest need at the present time, so the Home could meet this need and thus serve even more efficiently the needs of the Social Agencies. The Board wishes to run the Home with the greatest degree of safety and efficiency and is a real help where it is most needed.

## LARGE ADVANCE SALE FRIENDS OF MUSIC MEMBERSHIP

On Thursday evening, November 7, the Friends of Music executive committee under the chairmanship of Albert McFall met in the high school building. The committee was very much encouraged to learn that approximately 400 advance memberships had been sold. This showed the enthusiastic support of the public.

## G. I. Bill of Rights

"The Right of the Act must be well, as well as the letter," said Walter G. Barber, Counsel Representative of the Veterans' Administration office in Camden, in analyzing the "G. I. Bill of Rights" for the local Rotary Club last Thursday. Mr. Barber, who was introduced by George Lutz, is a veteran of both World Wars and his sympathetic understanding of veteran problems was apparent throughout his talk.

With one thousand, six hundred and seventy-one problem cases behind them, the Camden office is currently handling about 100 such cases a day and they cover an amazing variety of situations, including, among others, lost papers, re-employment, readjustment and unemployment allowances, loans, life insurance, taxes, pensions, disability benefits, benefits for dependents, education, vocational rehabilitation, hospital and medical care, etc.

Mr. Barber urged that every veteran take special care to safeguard the significant papers relating to his service and discharge and suggested that they have their discharge recorded with two photostatic copies certified so that the original may be completely safeguarded against loss.

## Proper Channels

Explaining how important it is that all questions be cleared through official channels to cooperating agencies, Mr. Barber gave many illustrations of the misinformation, delay and disappointment that result when this was not done. He urged that every veteran become associated with one of the service organizations, pointing out that these organizations were in position to direct all questions quickly to the proper channels.

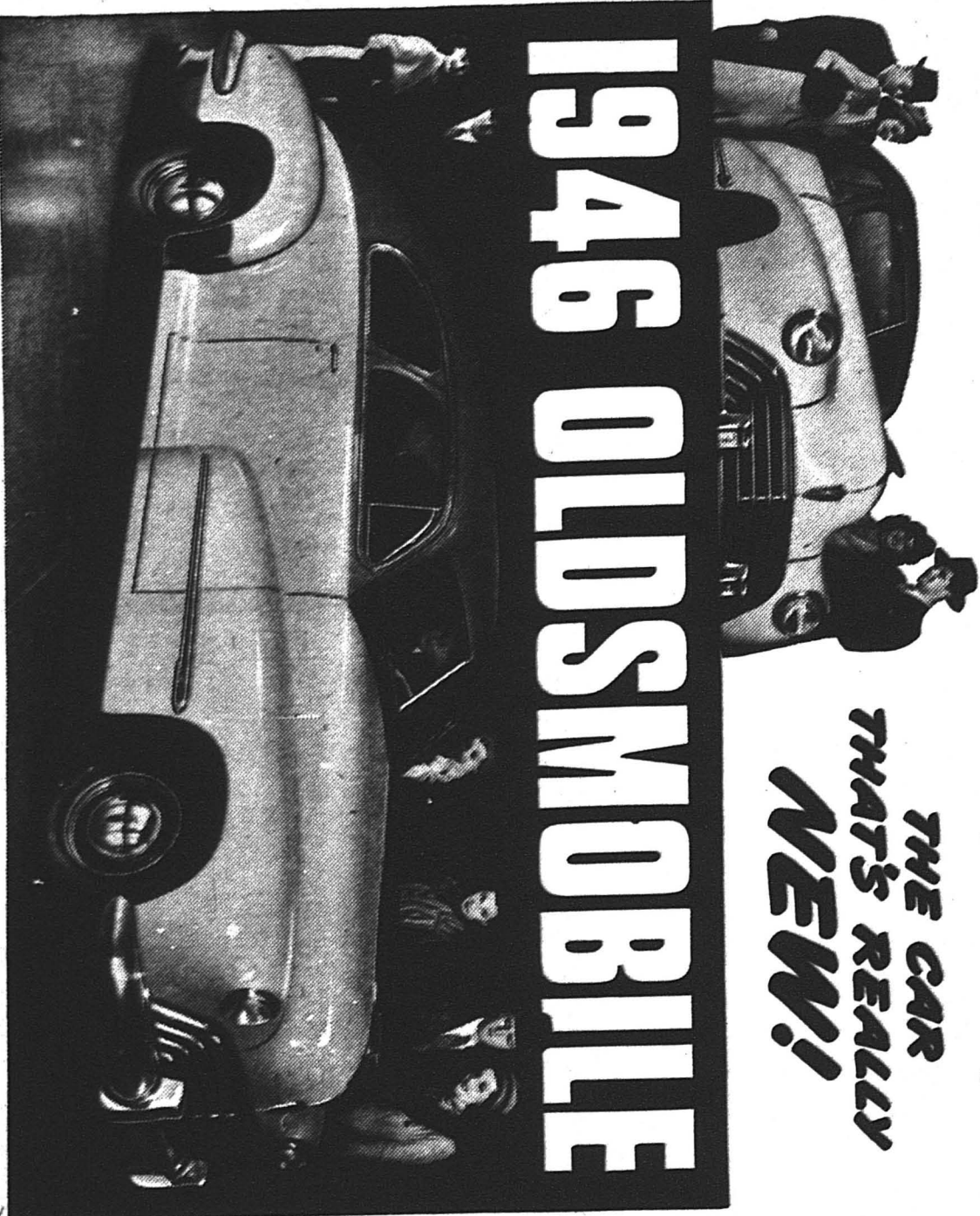

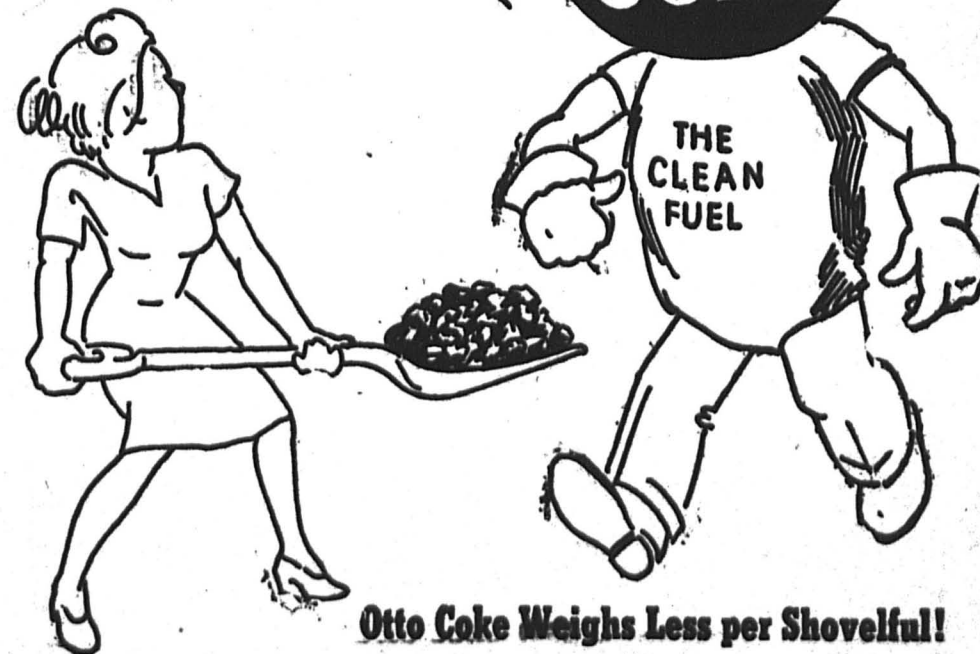
