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

would appeal to United States troops. All of the officers were agreed that Hitler made many technical decisions. When Dr. Allen pressed Keitel for an answer as to why as Chief of Staff he could not enforce his orders, the Field Marshal at once replied that Hitler was of course an expert. For the past decade he had been reading all of the books and technical pamphlets about warfare that existed. Further questioning, however, revealed that Goering and Doenitz would not take orders from Keitel even though he was theoretically the head of combined operations staff. The speaker remarked that there was no

much internal dissension revealed among high ranking officers that the achievements of the general staff seemed greater than one would have expected.

Women Workers

German women, said Dr. Allen,

were not worked nearly as much in factories and other war jobs as in England and America. Their places were taken by slave laborers largely French, Poles, and Russians. One factory, for instance, employing 12,000 people had only two thousand German workers. The mechanical equipment was not superior to ours in the speaker's judgment.

The Russians did not figure very greatly in Dr. Allen's travels, but he did it a point to speak with a sizable group of American mechanics who had been in Russia for two years or more servicing lend lease planes. These officers and men had no difficulty in getting along with their Allies and proclaimed the Russians "swell fellows."

Dr. Allen closed by stressing again the very sad condition of France who needs all the help we can give her. England too, he said, while a little better off for food than in 1942, is still in very poor condition. He regards it as our duty to send all we can spare abroad this winter.

President Stewart called the attention of Rotarians to the fact that Carl Thomas, Jr., had been selected for the All Inter-Academic football team. He also commended Vice-President Walter Lamon for the excellent job he was doing as Program chairman; the members showed their agreement with this sentiment by hearty applause.



SOUTH AMERICA

Malcolm R. Grew, international representative of the Y.M.C.A. and charter member of the Santiago, Chile, Rotary Club, gave a very interesting discourse on South American countries at last week's Rotary meeting. Members of the local Y.M.C.A. Board were present to hear Mr. Grew's address.

According to Mr. Grew, the South American countries have just recently industrialized themselves, which was necessitated by the war conditions. This trend towards industrialization started in the last war and definitely increased during the present conflict. The industrial items normally imported by the South American countries were no longer available and they realized that it was necessary to supply their own needs.

Some of the South American countries are moving towards free elections and expressions of true democracy. They are learning quickly the new political life and are profiting by the experiences of the other so-called democracies, such as this country, France and Great Britain, although some of the countries still cling to their old political characteristics. In Chile at the present time there are sixteen political parties. Due to the number of parties involved, a conglomeration of legislation has been put on the books that means nothing.

Mr. Grew pointed out that social legislation as we know it is rather old in Chile. There are a number of social legislation laws but they are not put into effect. The people of Chile take the attitude that social security should be for protection and should not be taken as a right of the people. Social legislation in Chile has been developed to a relatively high degree particularly among the working class. Social books are issued to all people and fingerprinting is compulsory.

Mr. Grew pointed out that one out of every three people in Chile works for the State and that due to social legislation 80 percent of the lawyers and 60 percent of the doctors work for the State. No one hires workmen in Chile unless their social book is up-to-date which provides for free health care, free dental care, etc. Social security in Chile provides for retirement of an individual at 65 on an amount equal to salary received over the last ten years. However, the life expectancy of Chileans is only 32 years and not many people are able to take advantage of this retirement. It is expected that access to the dental and health service will tend to increase their life expectancy.

Their class structure consists of the upper, middle and lower. It is much more distinct than what we find in our own country. 60 percent of the population is considered to be in the lower class and the other two make up the balance of 40 percent. Mr. Grew pointed out that organizations such as Rotary, Y.M.C.A., Salvation Army, etc., have been a great help in spreading a good neighbor policy which he believes to be of paramount importance in South America. At the present time the Rotary Club of Santiago has 315 members and is one of the largest outside of the United States. These organizations have proven to be a big thing in Chile due to the fact that people want to do things for others in their community.

Mr. Grew also pointed out that South Americans are suspicious of the American people and they are very justified in assuming this. As time goes on this is the irritating thing that goes away with. Com-

merce is getting better and trade with North America is increasing. Due to these factors confidence in the United States is becoming greater. Also a factor in this increased confidence is our good neighbor policy and our performance in the past war. The people are coming to the conclusion that the United States in sincere in its State Department methods and it is Mr. Grew's opinion that if this good neighbor policy is continued, better relations can be expected. It is also his opinion that at present there are too few Americans in South America and most of them occupy key positions. The English, Germans and Spaniards are in the majority in the foreign population. The South Americans have the idea that North Americans are all fantastically rich, married and divorced four or five times.

OPEN HOUSE AT FORT DIX ARMY AIR BASE

Sunday, December 16 will be the occasion of the biggest public display of aircraft yet made available to the citizens of this area when Fort Dix Army Air Base holds the second of three "Open House" dates. "Open House" will also be held Dec. 23.

Featuring the exhibition of all types of airplanes and air force ground equipment, will be the Air Transport Command's record breaking transports, the C-54 and the C-47. These planes are used by the ATC in flying thousands of men from ports of debarkation to separation centers, as ambulance planes on medical air evacuation missions, and in regular freight and passenger flights.

In addition to the ATC equipment, officials of Fort Dix Army Air Base promise to give all visitors to the base close-up views of such highly publicized aircraft as the P-38 twin-tailed Lightning, P-47 Thunderbolt, P-51 Mustang, fighters; B-25 Billy Mitchell, B-17 Flying Fortress, B-29 Superfortress bombers. Ramps will be specially constructed around each plane to enable the visitors to inspect all parts of the plane's interior and exterior.

Nor will all the planes remain on the ground during the "Open House." Of the aircraft that will be demonstrated in flight the most interesting will be a jet-propelled fighter. Every effort is being made by the air base to obtain an R-6 helicopter for a demonstration flight.

Another interesting feature of the "Open House" will be a demonstration of Ground Control Approach, a

hitherto secret device that enables pilots to take off and land their planes when visibility is negligible.

Also on exhibition will be crash trucks, refueling units, fire fighting trucks, ambulances, parachutes, maintenance shops, propellers and engines. It is planned to drop-test a parachute during the afternoon of each of the "Open House" dates.

The operation and use of each type of airplane or ground equipment will be thoroughly explained to visitors by competent flying and ground personnel of the Air Transport Command.

A special parking lot has been designated for visitors and shuttle buses will operate between the gate and exhibit area.

GOULD RESIGNS FROM COUNCIL

At the meeting of Riverton Borough Council held last week, the resignation of David F. Gould, member of the organization, was accepted with deep regret.

Mr. Gould's resignation, which becomes effective December 31, was made because of business reasons, which have necessitated his transfer to a location in New York.

He has accepted a position as director of research and development with Brunswick Radio, in New York City. While residing in Riverton, Mr. Gould has held the position of chief chemist of the Barrett Division Allied Chemical and Dye Corp.

His successor will be named by the incoming Mayor, Nathan Lane, who takes office January 1. Mr. Lane's appointment must be ratified by the new Council when the new member is named. Since Mr. Gould's term expires next year, the appointment will be until December 31, 1946.

Mr. Gould is serving his third term as a member of the local governing body. During his tenure he has been chairman of the sewer commission and has spent much time in working out plans for a sewage disposal plant.

PARALYSIS FUND SPONSORED BY ROTARY CLUB

The forthcoming drive for money for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis was the subject of discussion at the regular Thursday meeting of the Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club. The club voted unanimously to sponsor this drive.

Paul Schneider, local chairman of the National Paralysis Fund, spoke on the work that was being done by this organization and later introduced Dr. Charles Smith who is chairman of the County chapter of the National Paralysis Drive.

Last year approximately \$2,000 was collected in our three communities for the fight against this disease. During 1945 there were over 1,000 cases of infantile paralysis in New Jersey, 30 of these cases being in Burlington County. At the present time there are still 10 cases in Burlington County which are being treated in various institutions. Most of the Burlington County cases are sent to the Camden Municipal Hospital and the County Paralysis Fund organization has an agreement with the various hospitals taking these cases that they will guarantee payment of all bills connected therewith. The National Foundation supports all phases of hospitalization, research and the like. Half of the money collected in these drives goes to the Burlington County chapter for their use and half to the National Foundation for research, epidemics, etc.

An interesting movie was shown entitled "The Fight Against Infantile Paralysis." The movie vividly portrayed the work that was being done in the fight against this disease and showed the marvelous results which were being obtained.

A goal of \$2,000 has been set for the three communities. Various chairmen will be appointed at a later date. Some chairmen have already been appointed and these are as follows:

The irony of the situation is that should an accident occur, the operator of the vehicle is at fault, since it is against the law to tow children on sticks.

COLD WEATHER HINTS FOR MOTORISTS

Want to keep your aged car running this winter? Most people at Keystone Automobile Club say, but unfortunately they neglect certain cold-weather precautions. Keystone lists the following as the principal causes of trouble in winter operation:

1. Heavy oil, which conceals and wears down even a fully charged battery.
2. Heavy transmission grease, which retards operation.
3. Weak batteries. A battery showing only one-quarter charge will freeze at zero, but it is good for two below when fully charged.
4. Insufficient anti-freeze. A gallon is not enough for zero or sub-zero temperatures.
5. Frozen lock tumblers in the ignition.
6. Grease on the Bendix starter spring, which prevents the starter from functioning.
7. Water freezing in gas strainer and gas lines, preventing flow to engine.
8. Poorly adjusted and dirty ignition points.
9. Improperly adjusted spark plug gaps, and, on fouled plugs.
10. Brakes frozen to the drums.
11. Points in automatic voltage regulators sticking, not only preventing battery from charging, but causing a leakage of existing voltage.
12. Improperly fastened, corroded or dirty battery cable connections.
