SCHOOL ELECTIONS

TAYLOR ENDORSES MRS. RANSOM FOR SCHOOL BOARD

The following open letter is addressed to the residents of Cinnaminson Township by H. G. Taylor, Jr., for many years a member of the Cinnaminson Board of Education. Fellow Citizens of Cinnaminson Township:

On Wednesday night, February 13, 1946, you will have the privilege and responsibility of voting at the annual school election. In addition to voting on the items of the school budget you will choose a member of the Board of Education for a term of three years.

It is in regard to this choice that this letter comes to you. Many of you know of my sincere and long felt conviction that there should be Negro representation on our board. The very fact that approximately one-third of our school population is Negro, makes it clearly right and sensible. In theory, the rightness of this suggestion is beyond argument and I believe that in practice its rightness would be demonstrated

THE GENERAL MOTORS SITUATION EXPLAINED

At the meeting of the Palmyra-Riverton Lions Club held on Thursday night of last week an illustrated talk was presented by Charles Taylor and Harry Burton, representatives of General Motors.

The purpose of the talk was to explain the real issues involved in the present strike. A similar procedure is being followed with business groups all over the country.

The speakers asserted that the present situation is the result of a lack of a sound National policy insofar as labor is concerned. They also pointed out that the real issue, in view of negotiations conducted up to the present, appears not to be a question of wages.

This issue, in the opinion of General Motors, is whether or not the UAW and CIO will be able to pry their way into the whole field of management.

It was made clear that the UAW and CIO regard General Motors as a test case and that the outcome of the strike will have a direct bearing on the conduct of business, large and small, throughout the entire country. A guest at the meeting was Elwood Thum, president of the Pennsauken Lions Club.

About the Weather

Weather was the topic discussed at the Palmyra-Riverton Rotary Club last Thursday. J. C. Adams, chief meteorologist of the Philadelphia Weather Bureau spoke of the pains and pleasures of his hazardous profession. Another 100 percent meeting was announced by the attendance chairman and the goal for a perfect record in January seems sure. The old time song team of LeFavor and Thomas reminded members of pre-war days.

After sketching the importance of meteorology in the war, Mr. Adams told his hearers that the Philadelphia Weather Bureau possesses modern equipment and makes a complete observation four times daily of temperature, humidity, units of precipitation, and the number, kind and movement of clouds. Since the process is carried on throughout the nation and sent over teletype it reaches South Canada and Alaska. Isobars are entered on maps to indicate highs and lows while heavier lines show the warm and cold air lines. High and low pressure are less important than watching air masses. When warm and cold bodies of air meet there will be rain. Weather men therefore try to locate fronts and determine where they will meet, their direction, and depth. Small balloons are sent up and followed by a theodolite which by means of measuring the angle gives the speed of rise and hence the density.

True Saying

Mr. Adams pointed out that the old saying "When there are dew drops in the spider web, there will be no rain" is very true. The depth of moist air lifted determines the rain, he went on to say. Once box kites were used to determine thickness but this took too long. Instruments were then put in airplanes for the purpose, but they were grounded too often by bad weather. Now a small radio set fastened to a balloon which as it ascends gives signals indicating the temperature and moisture content of the air. After moist layers of air have been located it is necessary to measure the speed of their motion, in other words wind velocity.

Experience has shown that there is no set rule on the way weather will move. From the forecasters point of view a nice steady movement may suddenly change for no observable reason. The ring around the moon does indicate bad weather in that it means that the light is shining through a gauzy cloud. Thin white clouds changing to thin hazy ones also forecast bad weather.

Mr. Adams closed his talk by discussing how much the weather bureau was used by various businesses. Reports, for instance, are important to public utility inasmuch as they have to know how much electric current will be necessary during the business hours and this amount is determined according to atmospheric conditions. Railroads, trolley lines and bus companies want to know about the ice and snow conditions. Restaurants, on nice days when women are going to shop prepare many salads for their consumption. On cloudy days they don't do so. Likewise in bad weather deliveries of food to terminal and station restaurants are much heavier than on clear days.

According to Mr. Adams radar will help in weather forecasting. Soon the bureau will be able to locate and measure the width of storms, thus it will be able to give accurate information about the progress of any kind of weather. Long range forecasting is not yet too accurate but is coming. Beyond 48 hours it cannot be relied upon. His listeners were much impressed that a meteorologist could make so live a subject of such an unusual topic.

HONORS FOR CONWELL
Ed Conwell, of Riverton, who defeated a fast field in the 60-yard dash at the 39th annual Millrose Games last Saturday, was selected as the outstanding performer in this first post-war track and field carnival at Madison Square Garden.

The former New York University sprinter, now competing for the Shore Athletic Club of Long Branch, was placed first on seven of the eight ballots cast by a committee of eight named to select the three top athletes for the Rodman Wanamaker International Trophy.

It was Conwell's second successive sprint triumph this season. He won the 50-yard dash in The Philadelphia Inquirer Invitation meet Jan. 25 at Convention Hall, Philadelphia.

CONCERNING THE SCHOOLBOARD MEMBER
Three hundred eighty thousand men and women, serving on 113,500 boards of education in their respective communities control the destiny of America's public schools. These schoolboard members are trustees of our democracy, for from the schools they direct will come the adult citizens of tomorrow.

Schoolboards are responsible for the educational welfare of 26 million boys and girls. They manage property worth nearly eight billion dollars. They approve the expenditure of about 2½ billion dollars annually and give employment to more than a million persons. Each board in its own community must accept large responsibility for the scope and character of the school program and for the extent to which school opportunities are readily available to all who need them.

Although few enterprises in America are larger than public education, and none is more vital to American life, the work of schoolboard members is often taken for granted. The public understands so little the importance of their work, and hears so little fanfare with reference to what they do, that not enough attention is paid by the voters to the qualifications of those selected to serve on boards of education. Those to whom this trust is given should be the community's best leaders—men and women who have demonstrated their sound judgment, their ability to work co-operatively, and especially their sincere interest in the welfare of children.

In spite of the progress made in recent years, we have not yet reached the goal of the complete divestment of schoolboards from political influences. The work of a board of education is not easy. To learn the distinction between policy-making and administration is at once the most difficult and most important lesson which the new board member can master. Each year sees progress toward the ideal of schoolboards which concern themselves with basic policies—boards that employ professionally-trained administrators and delegate to them the responsibility for school management. Only as this is done will schools have professional leadership as contrasted with the sincere but often bungling interference of laymen on boards of education.

A second problem of the schoolboard member is discovering how to work as a member of a board rather than as an individual. The board member learns that school decisions are not made outside of board meetings; that board meetings are held for the purpose of deliberation and group decision; that outside the board meeting the member is only a private citizen who cannot properly make any official statement for the board or make any commitment with respect to his own decision in the board meeting.

Great improvement in the quality of schoolboard performance has been brought about by state associations of schoolboard members. Through their conferences, and publications these organizations are exerting a constructive leadership on the activities of board members. Relations between the board and the professional staff are being clarified. Long-term planning is being encouraged. Sound procedures and promising innovations are brought to the attention of schoolboards everywhere. The relations of the schoolboard to the public are being explored.

The successes and failures of boards of education will reflect the extent to which a constructive public opinion is brought to bear in selecting board members and in keeping them aware of the people's wishes. The education of America's children is too precious to be placed in the hands of just anyone. The amount of money expended and the potential power of education are forces to be placed in the hands of persons with faith and vision. Public education is a public trust and must be so administered. The opportunities for service should challenge the best citizens of all political parties, creeds and economic levels.

Local Library Needs More Contributors

The following report was recently rendered to the Members of the Board of Trustees, Riverton Free Library by Harry F. Jones, president of the organization:

All of you know full well that our organization is playing an important part in the education and enjoyment of the citizens of Cinnaminson, Palmyra and Riverton. That in itself is full reward for the interest you have shown and the attention you have given to the management of its affairs.

Right now the principal point requiring attention centers in the need for funds to properly carry on our work.

The report of our treasurer shows we have a deficit at the close of the calendar year amounting to \$700.00 and our operating loss for the year is \$832.58. Much of this is accounted for by the necessity of re-roofing our building at a cost of \$590.00.

The total circulation of 17,638 books during the year indicates a widespread knowledge of the facilities we have to offer but with a combined three community population of about 12,000 it is obvious that there is much greater opportunity for our service.

It is hoped more people will show an interest in the unusual store of books available for young and old and that we shall be able to interest more of our citizens in becoming contributing members. 227 personal contributions for membership were made in 1945, ranging from \$1.00 to \$5.00 and this in itself clearly shows we have a responsibility we are not fulfilling in making our needs known. I hope all of you will urge your friends and neighbors as well as newcomers to our communities, to join in this important work. If each and every individual who reads this report will accept it as a personal urge to subscribe by taking a Library membership I am sure we shall have an encouraging response to start off the new year. Few charitable or educational activities hold greater promise of community dividends.

We have been fortunate in the recognition given the work of the Riverton Library by the members of the Board appointed to handle a former resident of the Township of Cinnaminson, Miss Susan Lippincott. In 1909 Miss Lippincott established a fund for a library in Cinnaminson and in her will she decreed that this fund should accumulate for a building as well as the purchase of suitable books for the benefit of the residents of that Township. Change in the methods of transportation and availability of library service in both Moorestown and Riverton led the Trustees of this fund to recommend to the Court that its annual income could best be used for the purpose originally intended if this income were divided between the Riverton and Moorestown Libraries for the purchase of books. After careful review and consideration Vice-Chancellor Woodruff approved this proposal. When yearly income payments from this fund become available it will do much to aid us in further extending the service we are able to give.

We have been unfortunate in the death of one of our leading citizens, Benjamin B. Mechling, who has been associated with the affairs and management of the Library for a great many years. It is with regret that I also report the resignation of Paul R. Jones, former supervising principal of the Palmyra Public Schools, whose new work in Moorestown will deprive us of his counsel and assistance.

1946 should be a year of steadily increasing progress and I wish to thank all members of the Board of Trustees, the Library Staff and volunteer helpers Mrs. J. Carl De La Cour and Miss Anna Coale for their interest and help, which have been

The Borough of Riverton (\$700.), Palmyra (\$350.) and Cinnaminson (\$100.) give valuable and official support. Porch Club benefits are held annually and an annual return of slightly over \$100.00 is derived from an endowment fund which has been accumulated over a period of 35 years.

NEW PUMPER FOR EAST RIVERTON



The above illustration shows a pumper similar to one ordered this week by the Delaware Fire Company No. 1, of East Riverton, from Peter Pirsch, of Dandelion, N. J. The apparatus, which is the latest word in fire-fighting equipment has been purchased for the sum of \$7,500 and delivery is expected in May.

The equipment is known as the Great Eastern triple combination pumper, 750 gallon per minute capacity. It is equipped with a 300 gallon booster tank and a complete portable 1500-watt Pyle-National flood light system. Among the other valuable accessories are a foam generator for oil fires, a 33-foot extension ladder and a 12-foot roof ladder. The body of the truck has ample room for 1,200 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and 400 feet of 1 1/2 inch hose.

The company also has a 750 gallon American LaFrance pumper which has been completely overhauled recently and is in first class condition. With the addition of the new apparatus, the East Riverton organization will be exceptionally well equipped to combat any fires which may occur. A new automatic fire alarm system has recently been installed so that the ringing of the telephone in the fire house blows the siren, thus assuring no delay in the sounding of an alarm.

The officers of this progressive group of fire fighters are Charles Frank, chief; Leon Egans, 1st assistant chief; Leon F. Martin, 2nd assistant chief. William Oliver is president.

When the new equipment arrives, the Riverton-Cinnaminson-Palmyra area will be afforded fire protection from four companies which have a total of eight pumping engines and two city service ladder trucks.

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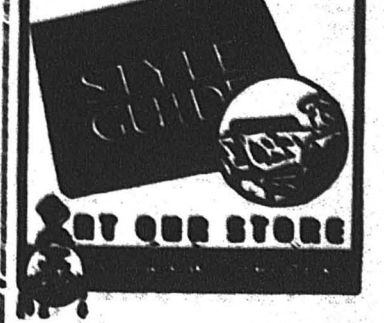



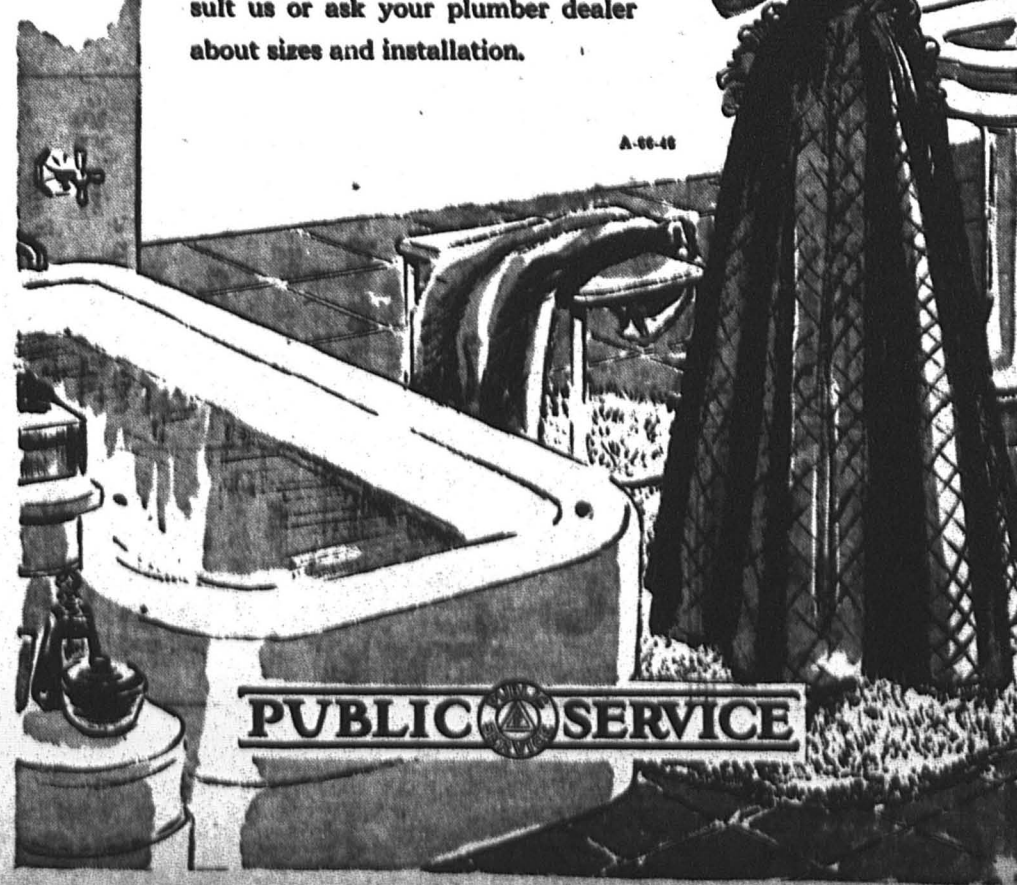

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT
The Board of Chosen Freeholders have carefully considered all requests for appropriations granting those deemed necessary and general.
It will be noted that the major increase is listed under caption of "Capital Improvement" which appropriation provides money for an addition to the Welfare Home to properly care for the great demands placed upon that institution.
The increased living costs has necessitated increased appropriations for the operation of all County institutions.
The County is faced with a large and expensive road repair and reconstruction program on which additional State aid is needed and anticipated. An appropriation has been made of all the present State aid to help finance this expensive program; and in addition provisions have been made to issue road bonds in the event additional State aid is not made available. This action is taken to prevent placing real estate for road repair, reconstruction and reconstruction inasmuch as the State of New Jersey receives sufficient Motor Vehicle funds to finance this work as well as that in the several counties of the State.

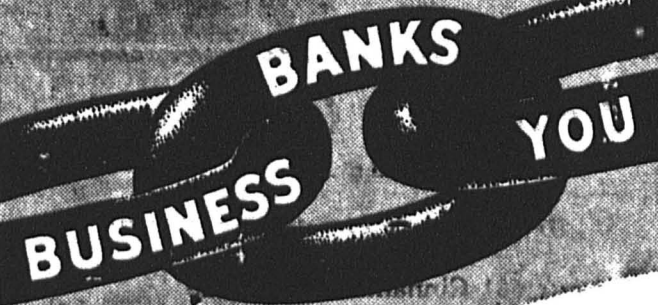

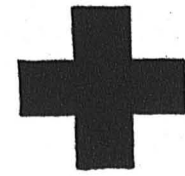

MANY ATTEND FORUM

Opposition to mandatory legislation which deprives local counties and communities of home rule, was expressed Monday night by State Senator Arthur W. Lewis, of Riverton, at a legislative forum which he and Assemblyman Albert W. McCay sponsored at the Court House in Mount Holly.

Senator Lewis pointed out that many movements on foot seek to deprive local communities of home rule. "I want to be considered as aligned with those who insist that as much home rule as possible be retained by the local communities," he said.

Over 300 Burlington county citizens attended the forum at the invitation of Senator Lewis and Assemblyman McCay. Discussion of pending legislation ranged from the new state aid to education bill, utility strike legislation, auto speed laws, a proposal to limit the number of licensed liquor selling establishments in each municipality, and the State appropriations bill.

A large group discussed Senate No. 25, the state aid to education bill, and heard Senator Lewis and Assemblyman McCay describe the provisions of the bill, which they said are intended to provide equalization of educational opportunity for every child in the State. Lewis and McCay said that the bill is the first move in the equalization program.

Opinions of the citizens, invited by the legislators, were freely given. Approval was given bills introduced by Senator Lewis to increase the amount of state aid to counties for highway purposes by \$600,000. Senator Lewis said that the State Association of Freeholders as well as the Burlington county Freeholders, favor the bill, which would give Burlington county about \$250,000 additional in state highway funds. Lewis pointed out that this money is badly needed to relieve local taxation on real estate.

NEW LICENSES READY
Beginning Friday, the Motor Vehicle Department will begin the renewal of motor vehicle registrations and drivers' licenses for the 1946 registration year. Agencies will be open weekdays throughout the month of March from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

All 1945 plates and drivers' licenses become invalid after March 31, at midnight. Cars appearing on the public streets after that date bearing the old registration are regarded as unlicensed vehicles and a heavy penalty is provided by law for violations. The same applies to operators who fail to renew their driving privileges. The single registration plate will be used again this year and can be attached to the vehicle any time during the month of March.

Anticipating an increase in business Motor Vehicle Commissioner Arthur W. Magee urges car owners and drivers to apply early in the month for their renewals. He recalled other years when lines formed at the agencies during the closing days of the month and motorists frothed at the delay. "Those who put off their renewals until the last minute will have only themselves to blame," he cautions.

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

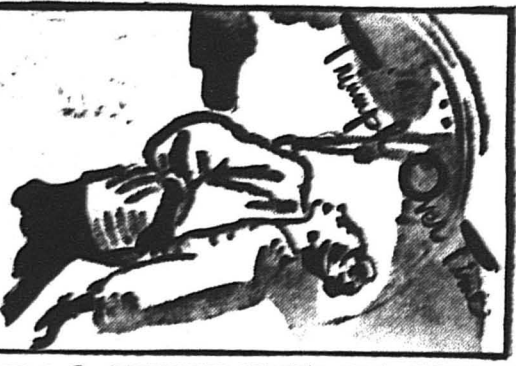
