## Navy Chaplain Speaker

Lieut. Commander Hugh Miller, Chaplain in the U. S. Navy, drew an interesting picture of the life of the Navy Chaplain last week before the local Rotarians, based upon a wide variety of his experiences during three and a half years in the service. Lt. Commander Miller was introduced by his father, Rev. K. P. Miller, former member of the Club, now residing in Collingswood, who served as a Navy Chaplain during World War I.

Chaplains, said the speaker, are all volunteers, and are commissioned "Chaplain, with a certain rank." In other words, they are chaplains first and incidentally attain rank. No chaplain ever forgets this sequence as it relates to his service.

### Many Duties

The chaplain has many widely divergent responsibilities. He may be, and often is, morale officer, Recreation officer and Welfare officer. He must be a religious teacher, pastor and priest to his flock. He officiates at weddings, baptisms, and funerals. His place is where his men are and there he is always found. His work is performed according to the accepted pattern of his own church.

The speaker illustrated all of these varied activities with interesting, touching and often humorous episodes from his own experience, telling of the out-of-the-way places and unusual conditions under which he had discharged these responsibilities.

He concluded with an earnest appeal not to forget the millions of young men still in the service and overseas, pointing out that they are facing temptations in many corners of the world where ethical and moral considerations are on a level they have never encountered in America. They are younger men, lonely and homesick and need more than ever before our letters, our friendly interest and our encouragement.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF RIVERTON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON FURTHER AMENDING AN ORDINANCE OF THE SAID BOROUGH ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE LIMITING AND RESTRICTING TO SPECIFIED DISTRICTS AND REGULATING THEREIN BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES ACCORDING TO THEIR CONSTRUCTION AND THE NATURE AND EXTENT OF THEIR USE IN THE BOROUGH OF RIVERTON, IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON, AND PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE PROVISIONS HEREIN CONTAINED AND FIXING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF."

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of The Borough of Riverton in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

SECTION 1. That an Ordinance of the said Borough entitled "An Ordinance limiting and restricting to specified districts and regulating therein buildings and structures according to their construction and the nature and extent of their use in the Borough of Riverton, in the County of Burlington, and providing for the administration and enforcement of the provisions herein contained and fixing penalties for the violation thereof," adopted September 11, 1930, and thereafter amended by ordinances of the said Borough adopted, respectively, November 12, 1931, and September 12, 1935, be and the same is hereby further amended as follows:

(a)

The following definitions are added to Article II of said Ordinance at the end of said Article:

(ac) Two Family Dwelling. A two family dwelling is a building constructed or adapted exclusively for occupancy as a dwelling by not more than two families.

(ad) Twin House or Double House. A twin house or a double house is a building consisting of two contiguous houses separated by a party wall, each of which houses is constructed or adapted exclusively for occupancy as a dwelling by not more than one family.

(ae) Apartment Building. An apartment building is a building constructed or adapted exclusively for dwelling purposes and containing more than two one-family apartments.

(af) Apartment Hotel. An apartment hotel is a building constructed or adapted exclusively for dwelling purposes and containing more than two one-family apartments and also providing certain hotel facilities.

(b) Article III of said Ordinance shall hereafter read and be as follows:

## ARTICLE III

## Classes of Districts

For the purposes of this ordinance, the Borough of Riverton, in the County of Burlington, is hereby divided into four (4) classes of districts as follows:

1. Residence A District
2. Residence B District
3. Residence C District

## 4. Business District

(c)

Article IV of said Ordinance shall hereafter read and be as follows:

## ARTICLE IV

## Boundaries

## Residence A District

The Residence A District shall comprise the part of the area of the Borough that is designated as Residence District on the Zone Map attached to and constituting a part of this Ordinance, but excluding therefrom the area comprising the Residence B District, the area comprising the Residence C District, the area heretofore added to the Business District by Ordinance of the Borough adopted November 12, 1931.

## Residence B District

The Residence B District shall comprise the part of the area of the Borough that is bounded by the Northeastly line of Fulton Street, the Southwestly shore of Pomps Creek, the Southwestly shore of the Delaware River, and the Northwestly line of North Broad Street; and also the area bounded by the Northeastly line of Main Street, the Southwestly shore of Pomps Creek, the Southwestly line of Eighth Street, and the Southwestly boundary line of the Borough.

## Residence C District

The Residence C District shall comprise the part of the area of the Borough that is bounded by the Southwestly line of Thomas Avenue, the Southwestly boundary line of the Borough, and a line parallel with and distant two hundred (200) feet Northwestwardly, measured at right angles thereto from the Northwestly line of Park Avenue.

## Business District

The Business District shall comprise the parts of the area of the Borough that are designated Business District on the said Zone Map, and also the area heretofore added to the Business District by Ordinance of the Borough adopted November 12, 1931.

(d)

The Title of Article VI of said Ordinance shall hereafter read and be as follows:

## ARTICLE VI-A

## Residence A District

and the words "a Residential District" in Section 1 of said Article, and the words "a Residence District" wherever they appear in Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article, are eliminated, and the words "the Residence A District" are substituted therefor, it being the intention and purpose hereby to restrict the application and operation of said Article in its entirety to the Residence A District; the designation and word "eliminated," and the following designation and words are substituted therefor: (a) Single Detached Dwelling for one family only; Two Family Dwelling, Twin House or Double House; the clause, "Two Family Dwelling, three thousand five hundred (3,500) sq. ft., are eliminated;" "Four Family Dwelling, two thousand two hundred and fifty (2,250) sq. ft., and "Row House, two thousand two hundred and fifty (2,250) sq. ft.; the clause, "Apartment House, one thousand two hundred and eighty (1,280) sq. ft., in Section 3 (e) of said Article, is eliminated, and the following clause is substituted therefor: Two Family Dwelling, Twin House, or Double House, three thousand five hundred (3,500) sq. ft.; the following clauses, in Section 3 (e) of said Article, are eliminated: "Four Family Dwelling, two thousand two hundred and fifty (2,250) sq. ft., and "Row House, two thousand two hundred and fifty (2,250) sq. ft.; the clause, "Apartment House, one thousand two hundred and eighty (1,280) sq. ft., in Section 3 (e) of said Article, is eliminated, and the following clause is substituted therefor: Apartment Building or Apartment Hotel containing not more than four one-family apartments, two thousand five hundred (2,500) sq. ft., containing more than four and not more than six one-family apartments, two thousand two hundred (2,200) sq. ft., containing more than six and not more than nine one-family apartments, two thousand (2,000) sq. ft., and containing more than nine one-family apartments, one thousand eight hundred (1,800) sq. ft.; and paragraph (g) in Section 3 of said Article is eliminated.

(e)

The following new Article is added to said Ordinance immediately after Article VI-A:

## ARTICLE VI-B

## Residence B District

## Section 1. Regulations Respecting the Nature and Use of Buildings.

In the Residence B District no building or premises shall be used, and no building or structure shall be erected or altered to be used, in whole or in part, for any other than the following purposes, (except as otherwise provided for in this Ordinance); namely, as

(a) A single detached Dwelling-house for one family only; provided, however, that a garage to accommodate not more than two motor vehicles may be constructed as an integral part of the dwelling-house; and provided, further, that a person residing in the dwelling-house may maintain therein a professional office or studio for the practice of his profession, but no goods shall be publicly displayed on the premises, and no sign or name plate shall be exhibited thereon other than one sign or name plate showing only the name and profession of the person using such office or studio, which sign shall not exceed two square feet in area.

(b) A Church; a Meeting House for religious worship; a Public School; a Private School; a Club-house or Meeting Hall of a social, educational or fraternal organization not operating for pecuniary profit;

(c) A Public Building open to, and directly serving, the public generally, such as a Community House or Public Library;

(d) A Municipal Fire House; a Fire House of an incorporated Volunteer Fire Company;

(e) An Accessory Building providing an accessory facility appropriate and customarily incidental to the use of a building of the nature of the main building; provided, however, that such accessory building shall be located on the same lot with the main building and shall be used only by persons residing in or employed by persons residing in the main building, or by persons entitled to use the main building; and provided, further, that no accessory garage shall have capacity for more than three motor vehicles;

(f) Sign, name plate, or bulletin board, not exceeding twenty (20) square feet in area, maintained at the entrance to any Church, School, Club-house, Meeting Hall, Public Building or Fire House; and a temporary sign, not exceeding nine (9) square feet in area, and which pertains exclusively to the premises, or to the construction of a building in course of erection thereon.

ceeding twenty (20) square feet in area, maintained at the entrance to any Church, School, Club-house, Meeting Hall, Public Building or Fire House; and a temporary sign, not exceeding nine (9) square feet in area, and which pertains exclusively to the premises, or to the construction of a building in course of erection thereon.

## Section 2. Regulations Respecting the Height and Location of Buildings, Size of Yards, and Lot Area.

## In the Residence B District,

(a) No dwelling-house or other main building shall exceed two and one-half (2½) stories in height; and no accessory building shall exceed one and one-half stories in height.

(b) On every lot there shall be a front yard of a mean depth of not less than twenty-five (25) feet, a rear yard of a mean depth of not less than thirty (30) feet, and a side yard of a mean width of not less than fifteen (15) feet on each side of the lot.

(c) No accessory building or any part thereof shall be located or erected on the front half of the lot, or in any required side yard, or in any required rear yard within ten (10) feet of any side line of the lot, or within five (5) feet of the rear line of the lot; and no accessory building or buildings shall occupy more than forty per cent. (40%) of the area of the required rear yard.

(d) The minimum lot area per family, and the minimum lot area for any dwelling-house or other permitted main building, shall be sixty-five hundred (65,000) square feet.

(e)

The following new Article is added to said Ordinance immediately after Article VI-B:

## ARTICLE VI-C

## Residence C District

## Section 1. Regulations Respecting the Nature and Use of Buildings.

In the Residence C District no building or premises shall be used, and no building or structure shall be erected or altered to be used, in whole or in part, for any other than the following purposes (except as otherwise provided for in this Ordinance); namely, as

(a) A single detached Dwelling-house for one family only; provided, however, that a garage to accommodate not more than two motor vehicles may be constructed as an integral part of the dwelling-house; and provided, further, that a person residing in the dwelling-house may maintain therein a professional office or studio for the practice of his profession, but no goods shall be publicly displayed on the premises, and no sign or name plate shall be exhibited thereon other than one sign or name plate showing only the name and profession of the person using such office or studio, which sign shall not exceed two square feet in area;

(b) A Church; a Meeting House for religious worship;

(c) A Public Building open to, and directly serving, the public generally, such as a Community House or Public Library;

(d) An Accessory Building providing an accessory facility appropriate and customarily incidental to the use of a building of the nature of the main building; provided, however, that such accessory building shall be located on the same lot with the main building and shall be used only by persons residing in or employed by persons residing in the main building; and no accessory garage shall have capacity for more than three motor vehicles.

(e) Sign, name plate, or bulletin board, not exceeding twenty (20) square feet in area, maintained at the entrance to any Church, Meeting House or Public Building; and a temporary sign, not exceeding nine (9) square feet in area, and which pertains exclusively to the premises, or to the construction of a building in course of erection thereon.

## Section 2. Regulations Respecting the Height and Location of Buildings, Size of Yards, and Lot Area.

## In the Residence C District,

(a) No dwelling-house or other main building shall exceed two and one-half (2½) stories in height; and no accessory building shall exceed one and one-half (1½) stories in height.

(b) On every lot there shall be a front yard of a mean depth of not less than sixty-five (65) feet, a rear yard of a mean depth of not less than fifty (50) feet, and a side yard of a mean width of not less than forty (40) feet on each side of the lot.

(c) No accessory building or any part thereof shall be located or erected on the front half of the lot, or in any required side yard, or in any required rear yard within twenty (20) feet of any side line of the lot, or within ten (10) feet of the rear line of the lot; and no accessory building or buildings shall occupy more than forty per cent. (40%) of the area of the required rear yard.

(d) The minimum lot area per family, and the minimum lot area for any dwelling-house or other permitted main building, shall be thirty thousand (30,000) square feet.

SECTION 2. That this Ordinance shall take effect upon its final passage and adoption and publication in the manner prescribed by law.

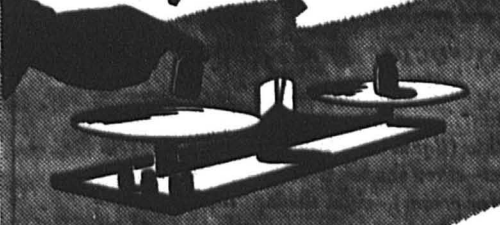

# MAXIMUM SPEED IS 40 MILES PER HOUR

Motor Vehicle Commissioner Arthur W. Magee emphasized that the repeal of the 35 miles per hour speed limit on New Jersey highways to 40 miles per hour and not a higher speed as has been erroneously reported.

The 45 mile per hour speed mentioned in the law does not apply generally but only to passenger cars traveling in zones that are properly posted by the State. The signs designating these zones were removed during the war but are to be installed again shortly on the same highways where they previously were.

Commissioner Magee hopes that the return of the higher speed limit will not be accompanied by an increase in accidents. He cites the fact that speed has always been the leading traffic violation and that it usually figures in a high percentage of accidents. He quoted the driver violation records of last year in the State which showed 25,557 convictions for speeding. This represented 45 per cent of all violations.

"I have hopes that the majority of drivers will keep their speeds below the maximum because too many cars and too many tires are in such condition that high speed would invite disaster," said the Commissioner.

"I feel, too, that many drivers who, of necessity, drove at lower speeds during the war years and learned to like it, will never again travel at higher speeds."

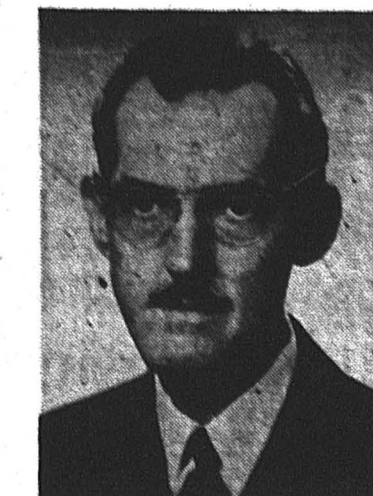

## SITUATION IN IRAN

Opening his talk with a fable which threw the present situation in Iran into bold relief, Rev. Hugo A. Muller, who has spent a large part of his life as a missionary there, gave the local Rotarians last week a clear picture of the issues in that trouble spot in the world's affairs. Mr. Muller was introduced by Joseph Low.

"The beasts one day," said Mr. Muller, "met to organize their society into an orderly one. But, before they could perfect the organization, the lamb rose to make a complaint against the bear who, it said, was not playing fair. The beasts were about to discuss the matter when the bear said, 'We can settle this better ourselves' and picked up the lamb and carried it to his den."

Current news dispatches make clear not only who the principals in this fable are, but also what is happening to Iran, the lamb.

Apart from its oil resources, Iran has an importance far beyond its rank as a nation. For centuries it has been a buffer state between the great land empire of Russia and the great sea empire of Britain. As late as 1810 the two were 1100 miles apart. Today they are at one point only 25 miles apart. Like two electrically charged clouds, the closer they get the greater the danger of lightning flashing across the intervening area.

In 1907, by treaty, a Russian sphere of influence was set up in the northern portion of Iran and a British sphere in the southern portion, although the entire country was autonomous. In 1918 Russia abrogated the treaty, returned all her concessions to Iran and removed her troops.

German Movement  
In 1941 Germany was exerting with growing success a pincer movement, one prong stabbing across North Africa toward Egypt and the other reaching for the Russian heart at Stalingrad. The Allies were agreed that control of pro-German Iran was imperative. Britain moved in from the south and Russia from the north to meet at Teheran. America followed with 30,000 troops to maintain the communications which brought to Russia more than 4½ million tons of desperately needed supplies—and brought too the great rival empires face to face.

Thus the political situation in this area, which holds such a prominent place in world news, is further complicated.

## ATTENTION DOG OWNERS

There is an infectious disease which has come to our twin towns. Oaklyn has lost 500 dogs, Moorestown between 150 and 200, and several other towns are beginning to have their dogs die just as we are. As yet there has not been a great number of cases here but mostly all have proved fatal. In fact the mortality of dogs, between the ages of six months and three years, who have

contracted this disease is about 95 percent.

The Twin City Rod and Gun Club has consulted a well known veterinarian to bring to you these facts. We will not go into the confusing medical terms but will try to outline the facts as simply as possible.

This disease was brought in from the western states and the dog is infected by stepping in the urine from a diseased dog. The germ enters through the feet and the first symp-

tom is a slight lameness which may last for only one or two days. Next there is a period that can be as much as three weeks in which the dog may or may not lose his appetite. During this period the infection attacks the liver, spleen and intestines. The dog then becomes ill with vomiting and a stringy saliva drool which smells very fetid. The fever is 105 to 106. In most cases there is a brief period of perhaps 3 days in which the dog seems to be getting better then comes the high fever again with a twitch followed by convulsions, coma and death.

Due to the fact that the disease is so hard to recognize at first and that it requires about three months before an area that has been visited by an

infected dog, can be free again, it is readily seen that the best control for both your dog and other dogs is quarantine. Keep your dogs from running at large. For as long as there is one infected dog, these towns will not be freed for three months following. How many we will lose is a question, but a question you can answer only by strict supervision of your dog.

Those of us who have lost our dogs have felt mighty bad. Let's hope this article will save you from the same heartache.

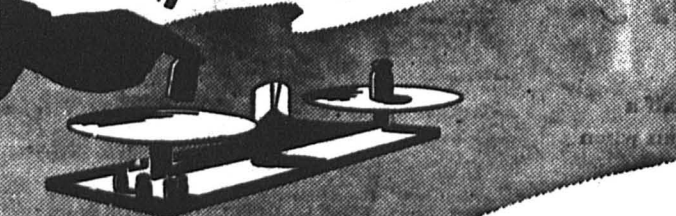

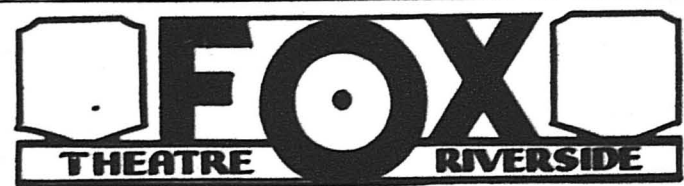

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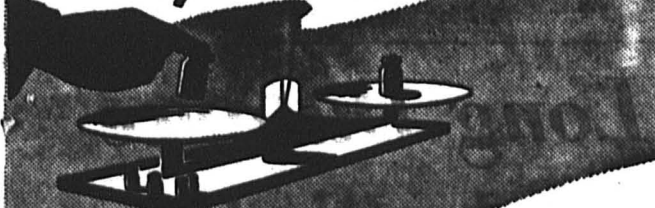

SUNDAY DINNER  
Suggestions

GREEN PEAS are not a new comer to the hit parade of food favorites. This popular member of the legume family was an important ingredient in the cooking pots of early Greeks and Romans as far back as the Bronze Age, and the same plump pod was exported to England by Dutch farmers early in the 1600's.

Peas today enjoy universal popularity as a favorite green vegetable in most family circles. Either fresh, canned or frozen, served alone or in combination with other foods, they make an attractive, tasty and nutritious addition to any dinner menu.

Plentiful spring crops currently coming to market as a harbinger of warmer weather encourage the use of colorful green peas to spur listless spring appetites. The A & P Service for Home-Makers reports. Rich in sodium and potassium, high in protein content and an excellent source of vitamins B and C, peas can play an important nutritional role in the diet.

Special attention to a few minor details in preparation will enhance the flavor and color of the fresh variety. Peas should not be shelled until ready to cook. One or two empty pods included in the cooking water will make peas sweeter. When cooking is completed, peas should be removed from the water as speedily as possible.

Peas may come to the dinner table in a wide variety of ways, the most popular being served alone as a basic green vegetable. They are equally tasty in combination with carrots or corn, and blend well in omelettes and other egg dishes. As a filler in casseroles, meat pies or soups, they add both taste and color. Cold peas furnish eye-appeal and nutrition to a variety of salads, either alone with dressing, or in combination with other vegetables, left-over macaroni, flaked salmon, tuna fish or crabmeat.

For Sunday dinner, serve green peas with a roast leg of lamb and gravy, mashed potatoes, mint sauce, a raw carrot and cabbage salad, fruit jello and a beverage.

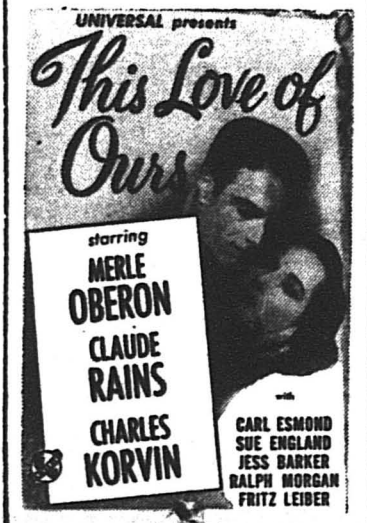

## CHILDREN WITH ASTHMA

WHILE asthmatic children are generally of superior intelligence, this  
is of little consolation to the parents of a child who frequently  
wakes up in the middle of the night coughing and sneezing. The me-  
chanics of asthma are well understood by doctors; the cause is not so  
clear. Mechanically what happens is that the little tubes through which  
air is passed to the lungs become partly obstructed because their lining  
membrane swells up. This inter-  
feres with breathing and causes the  
outpouring of mucus which, when  
the air whistles through it, pro-  
duces the wheezing sound. The  
cause of asthma is hypersensitivity;  
a long word that means excessive  
sensitivity to a substance that is  
harmless to most people. The state  
of hypersensitivity is called allergy.  
A person might be allergic to al-  
most anything; some are sensitive  
to ragweed pollen, some to certain  
foods, some to the dust from the  
stuffing in a mattress or pillow. In  
one case a child was found sensi-  
tive to the hair of his pet dog.

The doctor has to be something  
of a detective to track down the  
offending material. He may have to  
experiment by omitting first one  
then another article of diet; by  
having the child sleep first on one  
kind then on another kind of mat-  
tress; by sending away his pet ani-  
mals. Or the doctor may discover  
the cause by analyzing the dates or  
places at which the attacks occur.  
In other cases, the physician will  
use skin tests. That is, he scratches  
the skin with minute particles of
