PALMYRA WOMAN KILLED BY SHOTGUN

Mrs. Anna Allen, 33, of 519 W. Fourth street, Palmyra, died early Saturday morning of last week as a result of a shotgun wound in the abdomen. William Davenport, her brother; Moses Allen, 35, her husband and Leroy Robinson, 25, Davenport's stepson, are being held in \$500 bail as material witnesses to the shooting.

According to police records, the Palmyra headquarters was notified of the incident by Davenport. Upon the arrival of Officers Stack and Wallace they immediately sent Mrs. Allen to Zurburg Memorial Hospital, where she was pronounced dead upon arrival.

The affair is reported to have started when Allen arrived home early in the morning and insisted upon talking with Robinson. The two became involved in an argument with Davenport joining in. The situation became worse and during the altercation Mrs. Allen got out of bed and apparently grabbed a shotgun which had been placed at the side of the doorway in the hall. The situation was further complicated by the fact that no lights were on in the house.

Shot Fired

It appeared that Mrs. Allen swung the gun by the barrel hitting her husband in the head with the stock with such force as to break it. As this occurred the gun was discharged and, when some one turned on the lights, it was found that she had been fatally wounded.

The County Detective's office immediately conducted an investigation and a post-mortem was performed.

Bail was secured for the three witnesses on Monday night.

MAJOR LYTLE TELLS ROTARY ABOUT AFRICA

"Africa is a vast area of jungles, deserts and straw huts," Major Harry S. Lytle told Rotarians last Thursday.

Having gone to Africa with a military intelligence unit early in the war, Major Lytle spent more than two years on the dark continent.

"Although the natives have no particular love for the whites, they were friendly," Major Lytle stated. He felt that the natives, having been exploited for centuries, could not be blamed for their attitude. He said, "The natives are intelligent though uneducated." Their homes, if they have any, are of mud or grass.

The chief of the tribe is a rich man with many wives and lives in a fine manner. He collects and keeps the taxes and if a native fails to pay his tax his home is burned.

Because of the strict laws, morals of the natives are unusually good. Death is the usual penalty. Many of the crimes known in America are not practiced in Africa.

Natural resources are abundant in Africa though undeveloped, Mr. Lytle pointed out. Agriculture is developing. The best cotton in the world is produced along the Nile Valley.

NATIONAL PUBLIC HEALTH WEEK

Starting April 7th, the country is celebrating "Public Health Week." Its purpose is to acquaint us all with the great public health work being done in the United States and to encourage us all to know and appreciate our Visiting Nurses better. Watch for the poster display in several of the store windows.

In this time of great scarcities we have all come to value that which we have and which might be unobtainable at the moment. Nurses are very scarce and the three towns are fortunate in continuing to enjoy the services of Miss Helen Blair and Miss Caroline Cook. In some of our states as many as two-thirds of the counties have no visiting nurse service.

As part of the life of the country a hundred or even fifty years ago, there was scarcely a neighborhood that did not have at least one capable and experienced woman who could be counted on for support in times of illness or emergency. The scattered population and scarcity of doctors during the early life of America developed these helpful women whose ability and unselfish service often safeguarded the health of those around them.

If you feel that their number is smaller now and that we are poorer as a people because of it, do not forget their modern counterpart, the Visiting Nurse. Not as a substitute for the old neighborliness, but as an up-to-date extension of it, we have the efficient service performed by our public health nurses.

Don't forget that as a resident of Palmyra, Riverton, or Cinnaminson, it is your privilege to call on Miss Blair and Miss Cook. They are listed in the telephone book under "Visiting Nurses" and will take care of ordinary nursing service such as bathing the sick or caring for the new baby. They are also ready to give any special professional nursing service your doctor may indicate.

REGISTRATION CLOSES ON APRIL 25

Those not permanently registered as voters must do so before Thursday, April 25, in order to vote at the Primary Election in June.

For method of registration consult the election notices published in this week's issue of The New Era.

Cocoa trees, nuts and fruits are in abundance. Implements are crude, labor slow and wages low. The average native works 10 to 15 hours per day and earns about \$20 per year. The women do the heavy work.

Transportation is very poor. Although some railroads have been built they are not long and are poorly developed. The donkey and camel are the chief beasts of burden. Horses are used chiefly for sport being unsuited for heavier work. Manufacturing is practically non-existent, said Mr. Lytle.

Wild life is abundant with practically every species of animal. Mr. Lytle said. During the war the natives found a ready market for the sale of skins from animals. Leopard skins were an excellent source of income. These skins were sold to soldiers for \$3 to \$5 each. Thus, for \$25 one could buy enough skins to make a fur coat worth many hundreds of dollars.

Sickness is prevalent. 99 out of every 100 natives have some jungle afflictions. "For the white man Africa is a graveyard," said Mr. Lytle. "They cannot stand the climate and diseases. The life of the native is only about 35 years."

Mr. Lytle praised the work of the missionaries who have done much to teach cleanliness and personal hygiene to the natives.

Jones affirmed his "Republican loyalty" and pledged that in the general election campaign he will support all Republican candidates nominated in the June 4 primary.

"I am an independent candidate for the Republican Freeholder nomination because I believe that the veterans of World War II are entitled to representation on the Board of Freeholders and because I believe that my record as a Freeholder and my willing resignation to enter military service qualify me to return to membership on the board," Jones declared.

"My decision to run for Freeholder is the result of the urgings of many friends, who have pledged their support to my candidacy. These friends have during the past few weeks repeatedly waited upon me and insisted that I become a candidate, and return to the Freeholder position which I vacated when I entered the army."

"At no time has there been any thought in my mind of forming a new political organization. I have no connections whatever with any

political organization in Burlington county at this time, beyond that group of friends who are giving me their support. I have entered the Freeholder race as an independent because my war experience has convinced me more than ever that the American people want leadership and will not countenance dictatorship. The voters of Burlington county want the opportunity to select their own candidates and they are fed up with candidates selected by small groups of politicians seeking, first of all, to increase their own tenure in office."

I have a high regard and respect for those who are commonly accepted as leaders of the Republican party and I will welcome their support in my campaign. I firmly believe, however, that the only way the majority party of Burlington county can regain the respect of the voters is through independent leadership and open primary elections.

"I voluntarily entered the army and gladly severed all connections with political office at that time. I am proud of the fact that I was able to serve my country during the war, but I do not intend to capitalize on this volunteer service in approaching the voters for their support. I do believe, however, that the war veterans are entitled to representation on the Board of Freeholders."

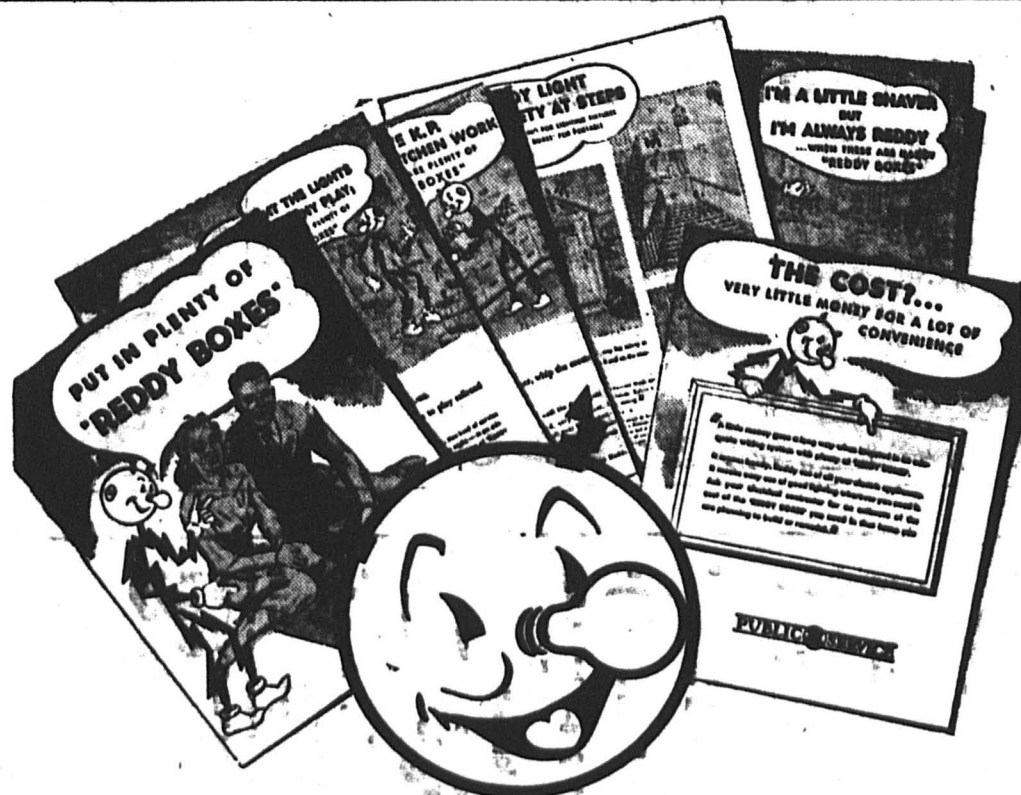

armed force service to join the regular army for direct assignment to the Second Armored Division, the famous "Hell on Wheels" Division which swept through North Africa and Sicily, and which made the break through in Normandy, is announced by Captain Charles E. Seymour, U. S. Army Recruiting Officer, Trenton, N. J. All such enlistments must be accomplished before midnight, April 7, 1946.

Direct assignment to the second Armored is assured regardless of the period for which qualified men join, whether 18 months, two years or three years. Veterans separated

from the service for less than 90 days will be enlisted at their wartime grade, and those separated more than 90 days will be enlisted at a grade commensurate with their armed force training and experience.

The Second Armored Division, now at Camp Hood, Texas, served and fought on three continents, in ten countries, under five armies and one task force, and in seven army corps from 1942 until V-E Day. Four Major Generals led the Division through 1,702 miles of combat advance against the enemy in Africa, Sicily, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany.

During its campaigns the Division

captured 94,151 prisoners; liberated 22,538 Allied prisoners of war; shot down or captured or destroyed on the ground 266 enemy planes; fired 17,306,972 rounds of cannon, rifle and machine gun ammunition.

The Division has been twice cited by the Belgian Government and wears the Fourragere of the Belgian Croix de Guerre.

All men who wish to enlist for the Second Armored Division should do so now, for April 7th is the deadline. They will find a recruiting station in the following towns: Trenton, Lambertville, and Burlington.

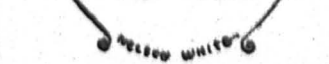

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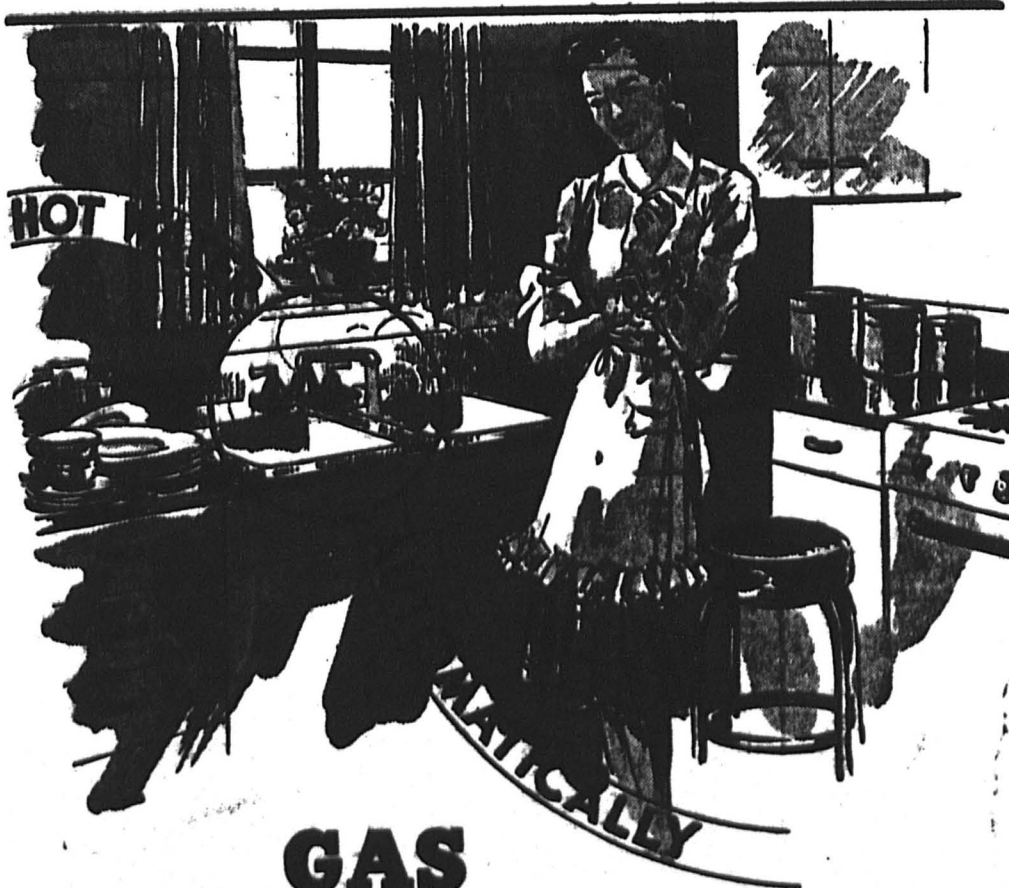

DIPHTHERIA DEATHS ARE NEEDLESS

DIPHTHERIA was at one time the most feared disease of childhood. Its manner of transmission wasn't known, and there was no way of immunizing children so they would not take it. There was no treatment that was completely dependable, and children who took it and did recover were often left with weak hearts, bad kidneys, or paralyzed throats.

How different the situation today! The germ of diphtheria is understood by the medical profession. It can be identified, cultured and studied directly. It can be detected in the throats of sick children, and in healthy persons who are carriers of the disease, thereby making the diagnosis definite.

As the germ grows in the throat it produces a violent poison or toxin which is responsible for the symptoms of the disease. If the body is able to neutralize this toxin by the production of antitoxin, the patient will eventually get well, but as it cannot be sure that the body will be able to do this itself, saving antitoxin injected into the body by a doctor. How much better it is for parents to have the foresight to have their children immunized before they become infected. Very few die of diphtheria if antitoxin is given before the child contracts the disease or antitoxin

when disease is recognized.

Parents should not fail to have their children immunized against diphtheria. Parents who neglect to do so are taking a dangerous risk, for diphtheria's highest death rate occurs among little children under five years. If a baby is nine months or older—and has not been immunized against this disease—see your doctor at once. Then at school age the child should be tested to make sure his immunization is still effective.

Doctors are deeply concerned over government records which reveal that there was an 18 per cent increase in cases of diphtheria reported in 1945. Neighborhoods which had been free from diphtheria for years suddenly discovered cases in their midst. Parents are urged to cooperate in the fight against this disease by having their children immunized at once. Its importance cannot be over-emphasized.

PROTEST PROPOSED LOCATION SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT

At a meeting of Riverton Borough Council held on Thursday night of last week a petition was presented asking that council disapprove a section of the Filtter property, Morgan and Bank avenues as a site for the proposed sewage disposal plant. The petition was signed by nearly 100 residents in the vicinity of the site in question.

Although no announcement had been made of the fact, it became generally known that the governing body was considering construction of the plant on either the Filtter property or the northeast corner of the Dreer property at Pompos Creek. The petition stated that it is an established fact that properties in the vicinity of such plants greatly depreciate in value. Since the Morgan avenue location is a residential one, Council was asked to locate the plant in an area unsuited to residential development.

The petition was read, accepted and ordered filed. The only comments were made by S. Robinson Coale, president of Council, who presided in the absence of Mayor Nathan Lane.

Mr. Coale stated that the problem of a location for a sewage disposal plant is a very serious one. He said that the borough engineer had been instructed to prepare an estimate of the cost of construction at both the Dreer and Morgan avenue locations. This survey showed that it would apparently cost \$25,000 to \$40,000 more to locate the plant at Dreer than at Morgan avenue, exclusive of the price of the land. No information is available regarding this factor, although many believe that the Dreer property would be much cheaper since the land is undeveloped.

At the Morgan avenue location the former Filtter residence has been converted into an apartment house with nine families in residence. The plant could be built without tearing down the house, officials state, but in such an event the value of the property would be materially reduced, according to the petitioners.

Mr. Coale asserted that no definite decision had been reached by Council as to the location of the plant and that the matter is still under consideration.

Believing that the Filtter property is most unsuited for a sewage disposal plant, the petitioners pointed out that, regardless of the efficiency of operation, all properties in the vicinity would become much less desirable. They stated that they will exert every effort to prevent its construction there. They also assert that a survey of such plants throughout South Jersey reveals the fact that they are located at some distance from a residential area. In addition, they say that the probable higher price of the Filtter property over the Dreer site would greatly reduce the differential in construction costs between the two locations.

NEW OFFICER NAMED

At the meeting of Riverton Borough Council held last Thursday night, Albert E. Pierce, 22, 215 Cinnaminson street, Riverton, was appointed a special police officer for a period of six months. The appointment is effective immediately and carries a salary of \$135 per month, plus 40 percent bonus.

Mr. Pierce, who is the son-in-law of Sergeant John Robinson of the police department, was recently discharged from the Army.

The appointment was protested by Frank Goodwin, whose nephew, Albert Wille, 21, also a discharged veteran, was also an applicant. Mr. Goodwin stated that Wille had been a resident of Riverton all his life and he felt a home town boy should have

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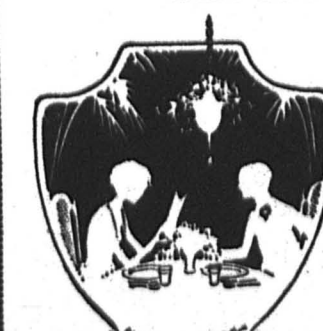

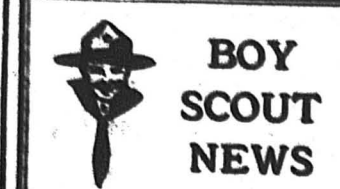
