**HEAR TALK ON
VETERANS PROGRAM
IN HIGH SCHOOL**

Melvin Kreps, vice principal of the
Palmyra High School, informed the
members of the local Rotary Club at
their supper meeting last Thursday
evening, of the work being done by
the High School to assist returning
veterans. Thus far, 238 returned
service people, have made use of the
guidance and counseling service of-
fered as well as the educational pro-
gram which is presented. In the first
classification, guidance is given to
those veterans who seek to enroll in
colleges and universities. Many
G.I.'s have taken advantage of the
economic opportunity to attend col-
lege and have shown themselves
serious students. Through out the
country, Mr. Kreps stated, less than
3 percent have "fallen out" of col-
lege. A recent survey revealed that
not one of the graduates from our
own High School, attending college
as a veteran, has failed. The great
problem now is how to care for the
continuing stream of returning men
and women who desire to enter col-
lege as well as those who are gra-
duating from our high schools and
preparatory schools. Already the
colleges are taxed beyond capacity
and it will be some years before all
applications may be handled. To al-
leviate this situation the N. J. Leg-
islature has extended the privilege to
local Boards of Education to set-up
Junior Colleges.

Under the second classification,
that of giving actual educational as-
sistance to the veteran, Mr. Kreps
stated, that a night school is being
conducted in the High School en-
abling veterans to complete their
high school education and also to
give "book learning" to those who
are serving as apprentices in various
trades. Refresher courses are like-
wise offered. The speaker praised
the local Board of Education and the
administration of the High School
for being prepared to care for the
returning veteran and to assist him
in completing his education for his
life's vocation.

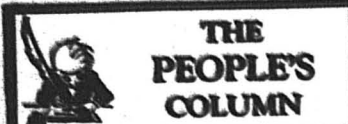

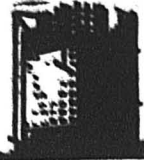

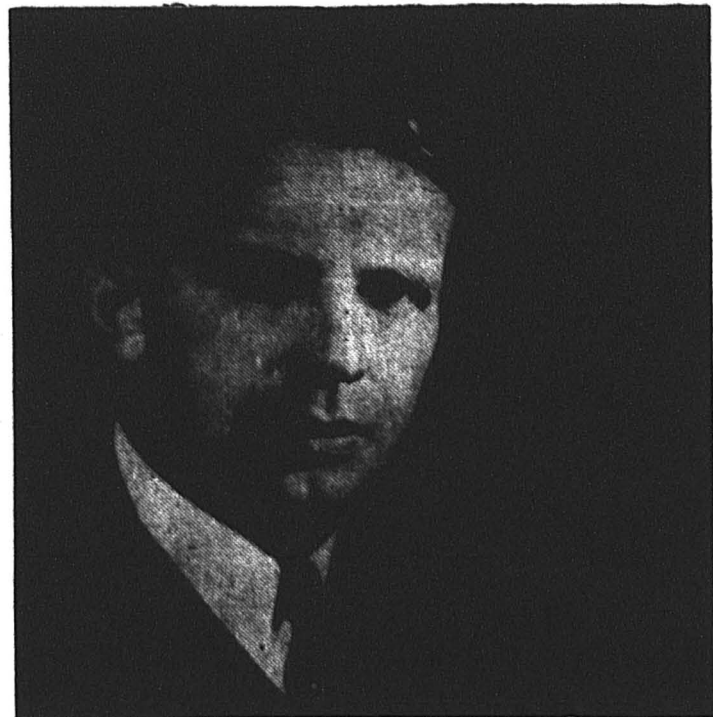
