JAMSON WINNER BY SINGLE VOTE

By the narrow margin of a single vote John F. Jamson won the Republican nomination to Borough Council at the Tuesday election in the closest vote ever recorded in the borough. Jamson polled 268 votes against 257 for Carl Mann and 240 for Mrs. Carvel Sparks. George T. Beaton, incumbent, easily won the other nomination with 342 votes.

With the ballots counted in the second and third districts Jamson had a lead of 22 votes over Mr. Mann. This was being cut gradually as the count progressed in the first district and the few spectators present realized that the outcome would depend upon the last few ballots. Jamson had a margin of two votes when only a pair of ballots remained to be tallied. One of these had no choice for council indicated and the other was for Mann, leaving Jamson the winner by the narrowest of margins.

Other Results

In the other Republican contests Driscoll gained a substantial majority over Hoffmann in the Governor contest. Biting far outdistanced his two opponents in the Surrogate race, while Russ and Klander were ahead in the Freeholder race. Jones was a close third to Russ, with Klander well ahead.

There were no contests on the Democratic slate and the party vote was light as usual.

E. Mercer Shreve received the nomination for Borough Council, while John Mustard received nine write-in votes for the other nomination.

WILLIAM HAAS INJURED IN AUTOMOBILE CRASH

On Friday afternoon, May 31, Pfc. William B. Haas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clement Haas, Broad street, Riverton, was seriously injured in an automobile accident on the Richmond-Washington Highway about 30 miles north of Richmond.

A Fort Lee soldier, Douglas A. Asher, of Springfield, Mass., was killed instantly. Luke Gray, ex-Marine, of Farnborough, N. J., driver of the car is in a critical condition. Edgar Love of Mantua, N. J., owner of the car, has regained consciousness but his condition is critical. William B. Haas, 103rd Training Company, ASFTC, was returning to Fort Eustis.

The injured were taken to the Medical College of Virginia Hospital. Haas suffered a fractured jaw, triple fracture of the pelvis and possible internal injuries.

Mrs. Haas left for Richmond immediately.

HESLER, STACK ARE NOMINATED

In a very close election Joseph Stack defeated Harold Marshall for one of the Republican nominations in Palmyra, with Paul Hesler easily winning the other position.

Stack polled 500 votes, while Marshall ran only a mere two behind. Hesler was well out in front with 719.

Klander and Russ ran ahead in the Freeholder contest, while Pettito gave Biting a good run in the Surrogate race.

Driscoll had nearly a 2-1 advantage over Hoffmann for Governor.

Smith for U. S. Senator, Matthews for Congress and McCay for Assembly were unopposed and polled large votes.

The voting was extremely light with 1,143 Republicans and 169 Democrats casting ballots. The total registration is 2,720.

Memorial Day Program Here

Memorial Day was appropriately observed Thursday in Palmyra and Riverton.

The parade began at the Riverton Firehouse and proceeded to the cemetery, after which exercises were held at the Palmyra Grove, where the Rev. Robert B. Stewart, pastor of the Calvary Presbyterian Church delivered an eloquent tribute to the heroes of the nation's wars who made the supreme sacrifice.

Mayor John F. Ward, of Palmyra, and Mayor Nathan Lane, of Riverton, also made fitting remarks.

At the Riverton Honor Roll, Mayor Lane said:

"We pause here today to pay tribute to the memory of those seven Riverton Boys who gave their lives for us in the last war—Richard Barclay, Harry V. Groome, Jr., James J. Hemphill, Robert Knight, Jr., John J. Matthews, Ross Elliott, Jr., John R. Siddall, and also those whose names are perpetuated in our Memorial Park.

"Their graves are elsewhere, but we remember them here with loving care and gratitude for their noble sacrifice in the great cause.

"In the name of the people of Riverton, the Borough Council and Mayor bestow this slight symbol of the sorrow we feel in their loss to us, and our profound sympathy for those who mourn."

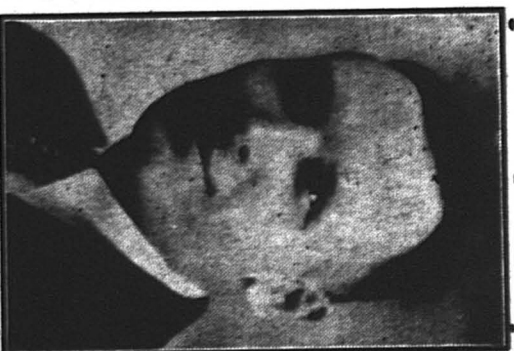
With all districts reporting, the total county vote showed that Albert C. Jones and Stanley Russ received the Republican nominations for the two Freeholder positions. Jones with a total of 9,146 was high man on the ticket, while Russ polled 8,883 as compared with 7,794 for Klander. Both Russ and Klander were backed by the United Republican organization, while Jones ran as an independent. Parker, the fourth candidate, lagged far behind the other three.

George B. Biting received the Republican nomination for a fourth term as Surrogate, easily defeating his two opponents, Coates and Pettito.

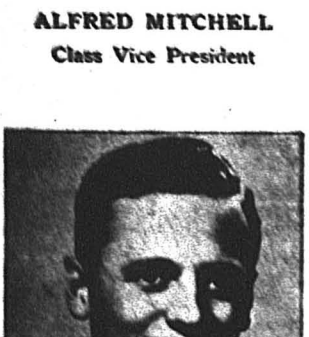

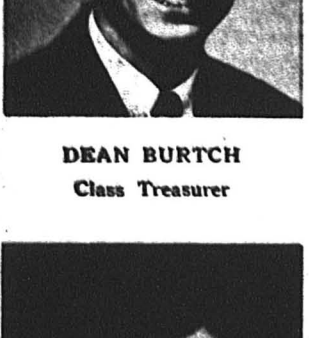

construction of a sewage disposal plant at Morgan and Bank avenues, Palmyra officials asked their engineer to express an opinion regarding the effect of such a plant to the local water supply.

The reply of the engineer is as follows:

May 28, 1946
To The Honorable, The Mayor and Members of Borough Council Palmyra:

Re: proposed Sewage Handling or Treatment Facilities

At your request we have investigated the possibilities of contamination of the local potable water supply due to the construction of a sewage pumping station or sewage treatment plant in the immediate vicinity of the above-mentioned water supply.

In our opinion, the construction of a sewage pumping station should not be detrimental to the water supply, assuming that the sewage treatment station is constructed in conformance with all applicable rules and regulations of the New Jersey State Department of Health.

However, we feel that the construction of a sewage treatment

plant at this location would be detrimental to the operation and use of the present water supply for the following reasons:

(1) The existing water supply is obtained by means of deep wells and relatively shallow infiltration galleries. The infiltration galleries are particularly vulnerable to contamination by the discharge of inadequately treated sanitary sewage in their immediate vicinity.

(2) The location of a sewage treatment plant adjacent to the existing water supply would create a negative psychological effect in the minds

of the residents of the locality. Summarizing, it must be borne in mind, in any event, that the construction of sewage handling or treatment facilities could not be undertaken without the approval and permission of the New Jersey State Department of Health whose sole interest in the matter would be the health and welfare of the public.

Should you desire any other information with respect to proposed handling or treatment facilities please advise me.

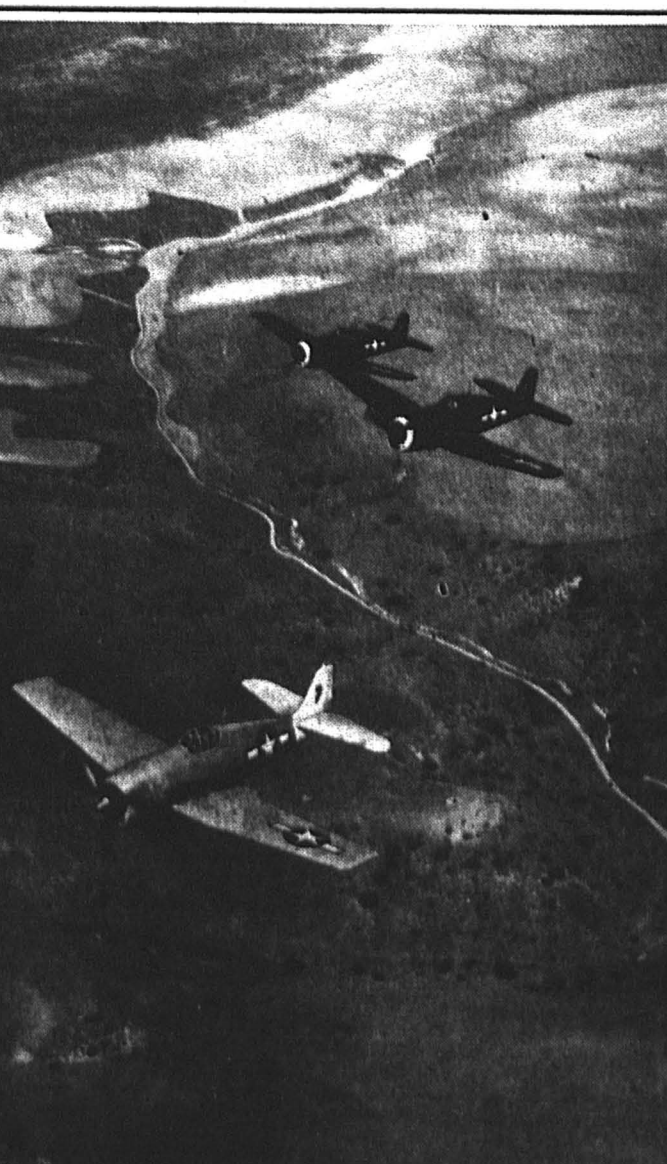

SURGERY SOMETIMES USED IN TUBERCULOSIS

THE treatment of tuberculosis suggests to most of us a picture of a patient on a sleeping porch drinking large quantities of wholesome milk. And these simple things—rest, fresh air, good food, are still the cornerstones of treatment. Yet even here, there is a place for the surgeon. The simplest surgical method used in this disorder is a procedure known as pneumothorax. The doctor introduces a small needle into the chest (outside the lung but inside the chest wall) and lets in a measured quantity of air. This causes the lung on that side to collapse, and the air outside the lung acts on it like a splint. In other words, the affected lung is given a chance to rest. Nature has given us twice as much lung power as we need, so the patient has no difficulty breathing with only one lung, while the other one gets its well-earned rest. In time, the air outside the lung is absorbed and it soon expands again to its normal size, often much better for its brief rest.

Trouble was that some patients with tuberculosis had fibrous bands connecting the lung to the ribs or chest wall. And in these cases, the lung could not collapse, so pneumothorax was ineffective. The surgeon came to the rescue with a simple procedure. He cut the fibrous bands, allowing the lung to collapse. If that does not work, it is possible to make a small incision in the neck, cutting the nerve to the diaphragm (that's the big muscle plate under the lung), which causes that organ to push up against the lung and collapse it that way. In other cases it may be desirable to remove part of the rib over the affected lung and thus put the diseased tissue at rest. The ribs soon begin to grow back but fortunately in a slightly different part of the chest wall, so that the good effects are not altered; and there is no prolonged weakening of the wall of the chest. These surgical procedures of course are not cure-alls, but they help a surprising proportion of patients. In tuberculosis, as in many other disorders, the number one method is still prevention. Nothing better in this line has been found than the routine physical and x-ray examination plus common sense hygienic living.

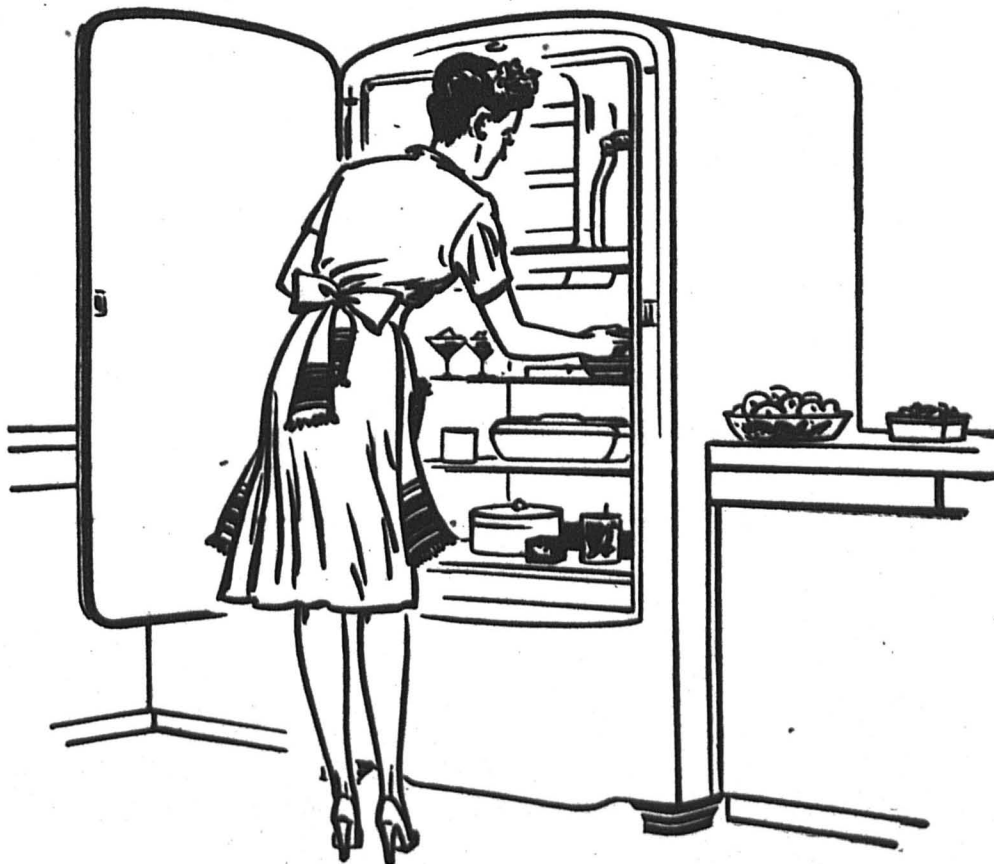

S. J. Port Commission

On June 20th the guest speaker at the weekly Rotary Club dinner was Mr. Henry Peterson, Secretary of the South Jersey Port Commission. Mr. Peterson was introduced by J. W. Van Horn. Mr. Peterson is also President of the City Council of Woodbury and a member to the Camden Rotary Club.

Mr. Peterson gave a thumbnail sketch of the work of the South Jersey Port Commission and its function in relationship to the industrial and economic life of our area. In 1926 due to the demand for world market outlets by South Jersey industries, the State Legislature created the South Jersey Port Commission which comprises a seven-county district. The Burlington County representative on this commission is Norman F. Russell, President of the U. S. Pipe and Foundry Co., Burlington. In 1928 agreement was reached with the City of Camden for the construction of the Camden Marine Terminal and this terminal is one of the most modern marine setups on the eastern seaboard. The port is not built in order to produce revenue but comes in the same category as public schools, highways, etc., in that the whole community benefits from the project.

In order to help the marine facilities of the Delaware, the Government has dredged a 40 ft. channel to the Navy Yard, 37 ft. to the Delaware River Bridge, 35 ft. to Allegheny Avenue, and 25 feet to Trenton. This allows almost any draft ship to come into the ports of Camden and Philadelphia.

Mr. Peterson commented on the present pollution of the Delaware River and stated that unless it was cleaned up in short order it threatened to destroy the value and worth of the harbor as a port. Considerable harm is done to the paint and equipment of vessels anchoring in the harbor due to this pollution. Both Camden and Philadelphia have taken steps to clean up this situation.

The South Jersey Port Commission has set up a traffic bureau to protect freight rates on material moving in and out of this particular district.

Mr. Peterson made mention of the proposed bridge at Pennsville across the Delaware and stated that this project was well on its way and should be started very shortly. He expects that this bridge will affect all the surrounding South Jersey communities. Mention was also made of the proposed tunnel at Hog Island which will probably go through.

Commenting on the economic life of Burlington County, Mr. Peterson stated that 88.8 per cent of the dwellings have electricity and 80.9 per cent had running water, 51.2 per cent of the properties were owner-occupied, 92.5 per cent had radios, 81.2 per cent cooked with gas, so that we are not really a rural county but suburban.

There are 122 manufacturing establishments in the county whose annual wages total \$10,000,000, and there are 1,847 farms that have an average acreage of 170 and a value of \$20,000,000.
