The count, which was ordered by the judge at the request of Carl Mann, one of the apparently defeated candidates started at 10 a.m. under the supervision of the County Board of Elections.

Mann was defeated by John F. Jamison by one vote on the regular count and the latter's majority was increased to three as a result of the soldier vote.

It is reported that Mr. Mann paid a deposit of \$75 for the recount. The expense will be borne by the Borough, however, should the final count be reversed. Mann will act as his own attorney.

### Film Story

In the film story, as the title suggests, water in its cycle is shown at the source; is routed through a filtration plant for purification; enters the home through pipes to the faucet; leaves the home through pipes to sewer mains and thence, through sewage treatment plant and outfall to the sea where it is again evaporated and condensed, and the cycle repeated, endlessly. Dramatic interest is supplied by the trials and tribulations of the citizens of a hypothetical small town in the 1890's when stream pollution was more the rule than the exception. A typhoid epidemic brings concerted action leading to a municipal purification plant and state legislation for corrective measures.

The picture is a combination of human interest photography and animated diagrams, showing in a manner intelligible to the layman the methods and processes by which public water supplies are filtered and distributed to homes and industries, and how human and industrial wastes are treated or disposed of, so as to avoid pollution of the streams and other bodies of water which may be sources of supply.

#### Film Story

In the film story, as the title suggests, water in its cycle is shown at the source; is routed through a filtration plant for purification; enters the home through pipes to the faucet; leaves the home through pipes to sewer mains and thence, through sewage treatment plant and outfall to the sea where it is again evaporated and condensed, and the cycle repeated, endlessly. Dramatic interest is supplied by the trials and tribulations of the citizens of a hypothetical small town in the 1890's when stream pollution was more the rule than the exception. A typhoid epidemic brings concerted action leading to a municipal purification plant and state legislation for corrective measures.

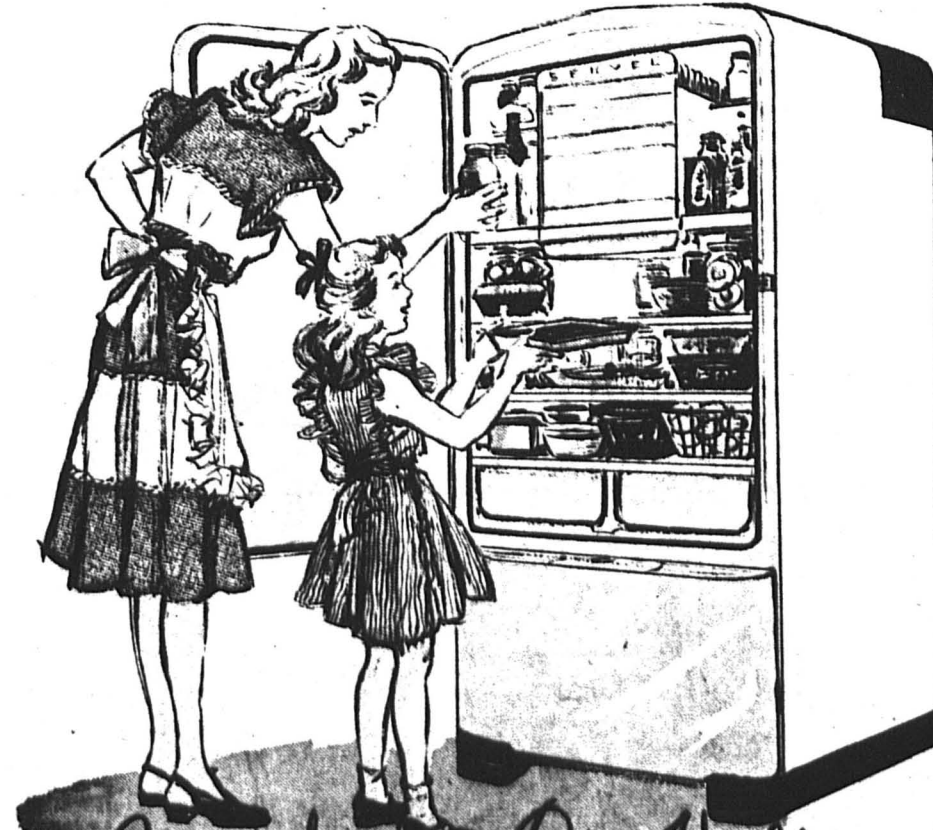

### License Referendum

### Phone Calls Increase

A demand for telephone service far greater than any the war produced is seriously affecting the speed of service the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company can give telephone users, the company reports.

New Jersey telephone users are making close to 5,000,000 calls a day on the average, the company reports, some 700,000 a day more than a year ago. The increase in calls out of town is particularly marked. There are more calls than the switching centers and line network can handle without traffic jams occurring in the switching centers, and calls are traveling bumper-to-bumper on the wire highways.

Renewing its appeal to users of its service to do so sparingly, and keep their calls brief, the company says use of the telephone has outstripped temporarily the best efforts of the industry to provide enough facilities to handle all calls promptly. There are more telephones in New Jersey in service than ever before—80,000 have been added since the first of the year. Each telephone is being used more than ever.

The company has not been idle in trying to meet the situation. So far this year, despite acute shortages of copper, tin, textiles and lead used in making telephone equipment, it has installed more central office equipment in 50 of its 204 central offices, and added some 425 million conductor feet of wire in cable to its statewide network, it reports. It has increased its organization in a year from 15,000 to 21,500, and is all set to accelerate its \$150,000,000 construction program to expand the system and improve service. But—

### More Calls Here

Even if people hadn't suddenly decided to use their telephones more than they ever did before, it is a big job, and takes time. There is a four-year lag to make up from the war years, in which equipment for civilian use was unobtainable. And telephone equipment, particularly switching equipment, is among the most complex in existence, to make and install.

Consequently, the effect of the present unprecedented telephone calling on the speed of service (accuracy and tone of service have been maintained at about prewar levels, the company reports) is a matter of concern to the company as well as to telephone users who have to wait for the operator to answer, or are asked when they make an out-of-town call to please try again a little later.

The equipment needed is on order and being installed as rapidly as it is obtained. Meanwhile, the company says fewer calls, and short ones, are the best means of improving service. It expressed appreciation for the understanding and patience being shown by the public through this difficult service period.

Paul A. Coffee, manager for the company here, said that since last year at this time calls in Riverton-Palmyra area have increased from 6,900 to 9,300, and the operating force at the Riverton exchange had increased from 17 to 23.

The camp, operating four weeks until August 2, is still accepting registrations for the last two weeks.

### BIGELOW ENDORSED FOR COLLECTOR

The Executive Committee of the Republican Club has endorsed the name of Russell M. Bigelow, 212 Lippincott avenue, and recommended him as the Republican candidate to the Republican County Committee for the office of Collector Treasurer of Riverton.

The County Committee members have unanimously endorsed the candidates and have filed the endorsement with the County Clerk at Mt. Holly.

Mr. Bigelow has been a resident of Riverton for over 12 years. He is well known for his civic activities and his many friends wish him a successful campaign for this important borough office.

According to the County Clerk's office, however, Bigelow's name will be in the "nomination by petition" column along with two other candidates who have also filed petitions. They are Ralph H. Taylor, who now holds the position, having been appointed by Council to succeed C. Kenneth Davis, resigned, and Robert E. Gowell.

### REPORT OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES DEPARTMENT

The Report of the Department of Weights and Measures as submitted to the Board of Chosen Freeholders of Burlington County for the period ending June 30, 1946, is as follows:

Gentlemen: The following is a resume of the work of the Department for the year just concluded as submitted to the State Department of Weights and Measures.

The office work of the Department has steadily grown by the reason of new legislation that now requires the licensing of various classes of vendors, the licensing of Weighmasters and others. The dispensing of fuel oil has given rise to a new kind of testing both as to bulk in the Wholesale plants and the meters of individual trucks.

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (One-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)

3. A reenlistment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided reenlistment is within 90 days after last honorable discharge.

4. Up to 90 days' reenlistment furlough with pay, depending on length of service, with prescribed travel allowance paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who enlist.

5. Consult your Army Recruiting Officer for other furlough privileges.

6. Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to enlist or reenlist.

7. Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20

years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. (Retirement income in grade of Master or First Sergeant up to \$185.63 per month for life.) All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.

8. Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights assured for men who enlist on or before October 5, 1946.

9. Choice of branch of service and overseas theater (of those still open) on 3-year enlistments.
