Film Story

In the film story, as the title suggests, water in its cycle is shown at the source: is routed through a filtration plant for purification; enters the home through pipes to the faucet; leaves the home through pipes to sewer mains and thence, through sewage treatment plant and outfall to the sea where it is again evaporated and condensed, and the cycle re-peated, endlessly. Dramatic interest is supplied by the trials and tribulations of the citizens of a hypothetical small town in the 1890's when stream pollution was more the rule than the exception. A typhoid epidemic brings concerted action leading to a municipal purification plant and state legislation for corrective measures.

The picture is a combination of human interest photography and animated diagrams, showing in a manner intelligible to the layman the methods and processes by which public water supplies are filtered and distributed to homes and industries, and how human and industrial wastes are treated or disposed of, so as to avoid pollution of the streams and other bodies of water which may be sources of supply.

In the film story, as the title suggests, water in its cycle is shown at the source; is routed through a filtration plant for purification; enters the home through pipes to the faucet; leaves the home through pipes to sewer mains and thence, through sewage treatment plant and outfall to the sea where it is again evaporated and condensed, and the cycle re-peated, endlessly. Dramatic interest is supplied by the trials and tribulations of the citizens of a hypotheti-cal small town in the 1890's when stream pollution was more the rule than the exception. AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF RIVERTON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON FURTHER AMENDING AN ORDINANCE OF THE SAID BOROUGH ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE LIMITING AND RESTRICTING TO SPECIFIED DISTRICTS AND REGULATING THEREIN BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES ACCORDING TO THEIR CONSTRUCTION AND THE NATURE AND EXTENT OF THEIR USE, IN THE BOROUGH OF RIVERTON, IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON, AND PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE PROVISIONS HEREIN CONTAINED AND FIXING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF."

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of The Borough of Riverton in the County of Burling-ton, State of New Jersey:

SECTION 1: That an Ordinance of the said Borough entitled "An Ordinance limiting and restricting to specified districts and regulating therein buildings and structures according to their construction and the nature and extent of their use in the Borough of Riverton, in the County of Burlington, and providing for the administration and enforcement of the provisions herein contained and fixing penalties for the violation thereof," adopted September 11, 1930, and thereafter amended by ordinances of the said Borough adopted November 12, 1931, September 12, 1935, and March 20, 1946, respectively, be and the same is hereby further amended as follows:

Article III of said Ordinance shall hereafter read and be as follows:

ARTICLE III

Classes of Districts For the purposes of this ordinance, the Borough of Riverton, in the County of Burlington, is hereby divided into five (5) classes of districts as follows:

1. Residence A District

Residence B District Residence C District

Business District
Restricted Manufacturing District

Article IV of said Ordinance shall hereafter read

nd be as follows

ARTICLE IV Boundaries

Residence A District

The Residence A District shall comprise the entire area of the Borough except such portions thereof as are included within the boundaries of the Residence B District, the Residence C District, the Business District and the Restricted Manufacturing District, respectively

Residence B District

The Residence B District shall comprise the part of the area of the Borough within the following boundaries: Beginning at the Northeasterly corner of Fulton Street and North Broad Street, and extending thence Northeastwardly along the Northwesterly line of North Broad Street 100 feet, measured at right angles to Fulton Street, to the Southwesterly line of an additional section of the Business District created by this amending Ordinance; thence Northwestward-ly parallel with Fulton Street and along the South-westerly line of said section of the Business District 100 feet, measured at right angles to North Broad 100 feet, measured at right angles to North Broad Street; thence Northeastwardly parallel with North Broad Street and along the Northwesterly line of said section of the Business District 378.66 feet to the Southwesterly line of the Restricted Manufacturing District; thence Northwestwardly along the Southwesterly line of the Restricted Manufacturing District and parallel with Fulton Street 681.28 feet; thence Northeastwardly along the Northwesterly line of the Restricted Manufacturing District and at right angles to Fulton Street 25 feet; thence Northwestwardly along the Southwesterly line of the Restricted Manufacturing District and parallel with Fulton Manufacturing District and parallel with Fulton Street 269.08 feet; thence Northeastwardly along the Street 269.08 feet; thence Northeastwardly along the Northwesterly line of the Restricted Manufacturing District and at right angles to Fulton Street 315 feet, more or less, to the Southwesterly shore of Fompeas Creek; thence Northwestwardly and Southwestwardly along the Southeasterly shore of the Delaware River, following the several courses and distances thereof, to the Northeasterly line of Fulton Street; and thence Southeastwardly along the Northeasterly line of Fulton Street 1700 feet, more or less, to the Northeasterly corner of Fulton Street and North Broad Street and place of beginning; and also the part of the area of the Borough bounded by the Northeasterly line of Main Street, the Southwesterly shore of Pompess Creek, the Southeasterly line of Eighth Street and the Southeasterly boundary line of the Borough.

The Residence C District shall comprise the part of the area of the Borough that is bounded by the Southwesterly line of Thomas Avenue, the Southwesterly boundary line of the Borough, the Southeasterly boundary line of the Borough, and a line parallel with and distant two hundred (200) feet Northwestwardly, measured at right angles thereto, rom the Northwesterly line of Park Avenue.

Business District

The Business District shall comprise the parts of the area of the Borough that are designated Business District on the Zone Plan attached to and consti-Bistrict on the Zone Plan attached to and constituting a part of the original Zoning Ordinance of the Borough adopted September 11, 1930; and also the area added to the Business District by Ordinance of the Borough adopted November 12, 1931; and also the area within the following boundaries: Beginning at a point in the Northwesterly line of North Broad Street distant 100 feet Northeastwardly, measured at right angles thereto from the Northwesterly line. at right angles thereto, from the Northeasterly line of Fulton Street; thence Northwestwardly along the Northeasterly line of the Residence B District and parallel with Fulton Street 100 feet, measured at right angles to North Broad Street; thence North-eastwardly along the Southeasterly line of the Residence B District and parallel with North Broad Street 378.66 feet; thence Southeastwardly along the Southwesterly line of the Restricted Manufacturing District and parallel with Fulton Street 100.98 feet to the Northwesterly line of North Broad Street; and thence Southwestwardly along the Northwesterly line of North Broad Street 378.66 feet to the point and place of North Broad Street 378.66 feet to the point and place of beginning.

Restricted Manufacturing District

The Restricted Manufacturing District shall com-orise the part of the area of the Borough within the Northwesterly line of North Broad Street distant 479.64 feet Northeastwardly from the Northeasterly corner of Fulton Street and North Broad Street, and extending thence Northwestwardly along the North easterly line of the Residence B District and parallel with Fulton Street 782.26 feet; thence Northeastwardly along the Southeasterly line of the Residence B District and at right angles to Fulton Street 25 feet; thence Northweatwardly along the Northeasterly line of the Residence B District and parallel with Fulton Street 269.08 feet; thence Northeastwardly along the Southeasterly line of the Residence B District and at right angles to Fulton Street 315 feet, more or less, to the Southwesterly shore of Pompess Creek, thence Southeastwardly along the Southwesterly shore of Pompess Creek, following the several courses and distances thereof, 1000 feet, more or less, to the Northwesterly line of North Broad Street; and thence Southwestwardly along the Northwesterly line of North Broad Street 425 feet, more or less, to the point and place of beginning.

The following new Article is added to said Orlinance immediately after Article VII:

ARTICLE VII-A

Restricted Manufacturing District Section I. Regulations Respecting the Nature and Use of Buildings

In the Restricted Manufacturing District no building or premises shall be used, and no building or structure shall be erected or altered to be used, in whole or in part, for any other than the following purposes, (except as otherwise provided for in this Ordinance); namely,

(a) Any use permitted by the Zoning Ordinance of the Borough in the Residence B District.

(b) Any business or commercial use permitted by the Zoning Ordinance of the Borough in the Business District, and the manufacture of products from wood, metal, paper, plastics, glass or similar materials, but excepting and excluding any and every busi-

provided that before any building, structure or premises shall be erected, altered, adapted or used for any business, commercial or manufacturing purpose a permit therefor shall be obtained from the Bor-ough upon authorization by resolution of the Borough

Section 2. Regulations Respecting the Height and Location of Buildings, etc. In the Restricted Manufacturing District,

(a) No building or structure designed or adapted for business, commercial or manufacturing purposes shall exceed fifty feet in height, provided that chimneys, water tanks and similar accessory structures may be erected to such greater height as reasonably may be necessary, with the approval of the Board of Adjustment.

(b) No building or structure shall be erected, adapted or used in part for business, commercial or manufacturing purposes and in part for residence purposes except in conformity with ARTICLE VII, Section 3, paragraph (a) and (b) (1).

(c) No building or structure or any part thereof shall be erected within twenty-five feet of any street line or any boundary line between the Restricted Manufacturing District and any adjacent District. (d) No building or structure for any purpose per-mitted in the Residence B District shall be erected,
