Completing a quarter of a century in the telephone industry, Edward N. Hoyt, of 215 Thomas avenue, Riverton, a plant engineer for the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company, was honored Tuesday, August 27, at a luncheon at the Tavistock Grill, Camden, N. J. He was presented a gold service emblem by M. S. Adams, division plant engineer for the company.

Hoyt's Bell System career began in 1921 when he joined the Delaware and Atlantic Telephone and Telegraph Company as a clerk in the Camden office. Promoted to draftsman a few months later, he was named an engineering assistant in 1923 and made a plant engineering assistant in 1931. In his present post, which he assumed last year, Hoyt is engaged in helping to draw up plans for the large-scale plant expansion and construction program being undertaken by the company.

A veteran of World War I, Hoyt is a member of the Frederick M. Rodgers Post No. 156 of the American Legion at Palmyra. Active in church affairs, he is superintendent of the Sunday School of the Central Baptist Church, Palmyra and has sung in the church choir since 1921. 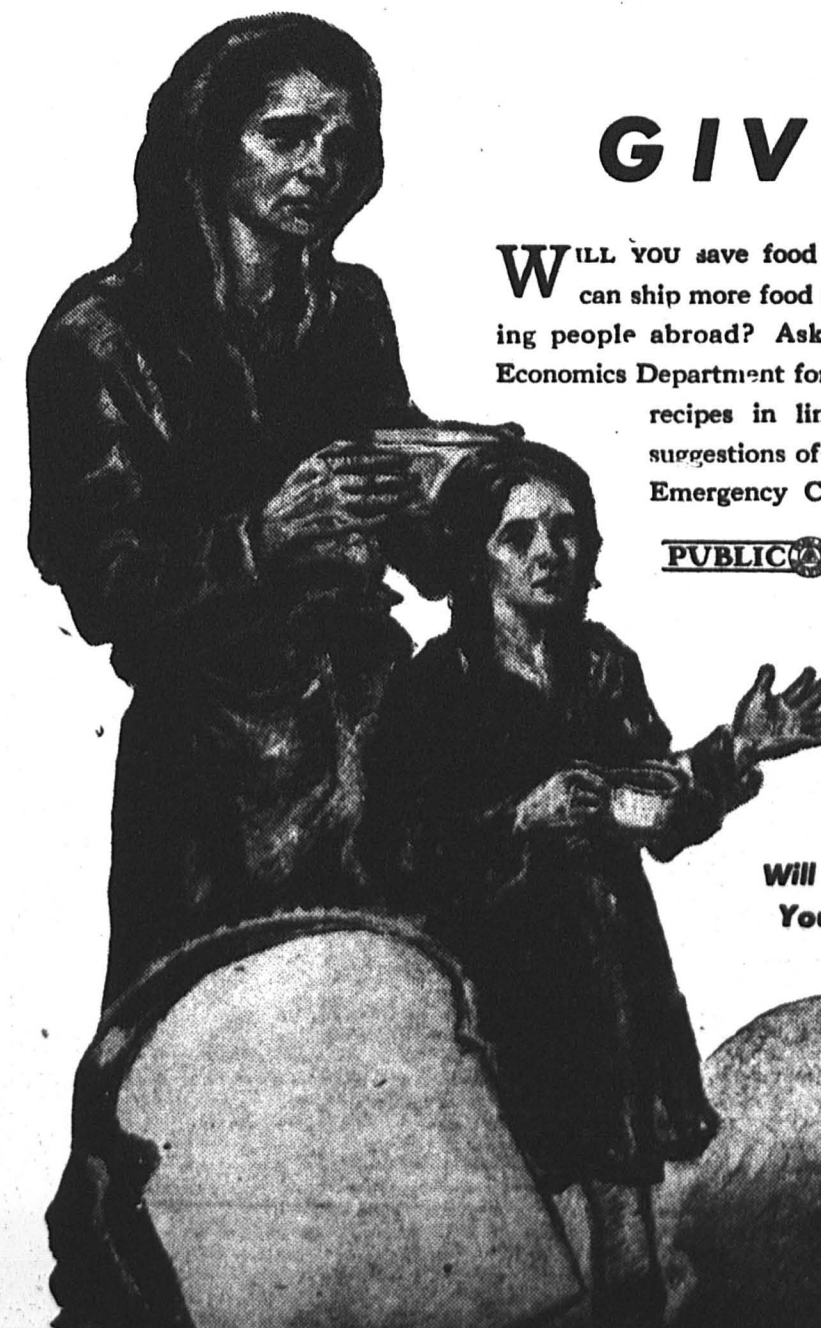

Mathews Replies To
Opponent's Charges

Speaking at the outing of the West End Republican Club at Trenton Sunday afternoon, Congressman Frank A. Mathews, Jr., Republican Candidate for re-election from the Fourth District of New Jersey, pointed out that his Democratic opponent, Charles R. Howell, relies upon unconfirmed rumors and editorial comment instead of getting the facts.

"According to a newspaper item on Thursday last," said the Congressman, "my opponent differs with me on the value of letters from my constituents and takes me to task for my attitude. If Mr. Howell is correctly quoted, he either has been relying upon unconfirmed rumors and biased editorial comment or he is completely incapable of evaluating his correspondence. He says that if he should be elected, which, of course, he won't be, he will welcome letters. Now, in the address made by me, upon the comment about which by people who do not hear it Mr. Howell so naively relies, I used these words: 'Of course your Congressman wants to hear from you if you have something to tell him about a subject with which you are familiar and give your reasons for your views. He needs your help.' And I meant every word. Since that is my attitude, with which Mr. Howell disagrees, that is all right with me."

"What I talked about in that address, from which the garbled, distorted and false accounts of what I said arose, was the flood of correspondence, parrot like, which results from organized and well financed pressure group representing special interests, often inimical to the welfare of the majority of the people who have not the organization, money or time to turn the whole thing into a letter writing contest and have a right to depend upon their Congressman's good judgment."

Thus, Congressman Mathews pointed out, if Mr. Howell, as he indicates, would vote according to the number of letters he received he really would not be representing the people.

Concluding his remarks, the Congressman said, "Obviously my opponent is content to rely upon unconfirmed and twisted rumors and serves notice in advance that he would be an easy mark for pressure groups. This, indeed, would be disastrous for the great majority of the people of this district. I expect to produce further proof of the deliberate distortion of my remarks by my opponent and those backing him as the campaign progresses."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINNAMINSON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON FURTHER AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING AN ORDINANCE OF THE SAID TOWNSHIP ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINNAMINSON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON FIXING AND DETERMINING THE SALARIES, WAGES OR COMPENSATION OF ALL OFFICERS, APPOINTEES AND EMPLOYEES OF THE SAID TOWNSHIP."

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Cinnaminson in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

SECTION 1: That an Ordinance of the said Township entitled "An Ordinance of the Township of Cinnaminson in the County of Burlington Fixing and Determining the Salaries, Wages or Other Compensation of All Officers, Appointees and Employees of the said Township," adopted June 12, 1945, and amended by an Ordinance of

the said Township adopted March 26, 1946, be and the same is hereby further amended, and supplemented, as follows:

(a) SECTION II of said Ordinance, including the caption of said Section, shall hereafter read and be as follows:

Police Officers

(b) The following new Section and caption are added to said Ordinance immediately after Section 8 thereof and shall hereafter constitute a part of said Ordinance:

Emergency Service Dispatcher
SECTION 8-A: That the Emergency Service Dispatcher of the Township, employed on a weekly basis, shall receive the compensation of \$10.00 per week, payable weekly at the end of the week, and shall provide, at his own expense, such office and office assistance as may be necessary for the performance of his official duties; provided, however, that the Township shall assume and pay the charges of the telephone company for furnishing the special telephone service and equipment required for the performance of the official duties of the Emergency Service Dispatcher.

SECTION 2: That this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its final passage and adoption and publication in the manner prescribed by law.

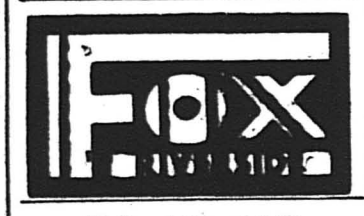

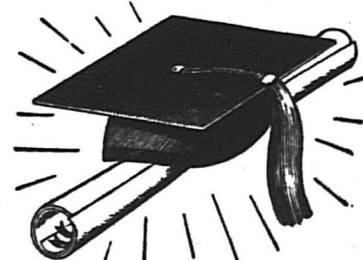

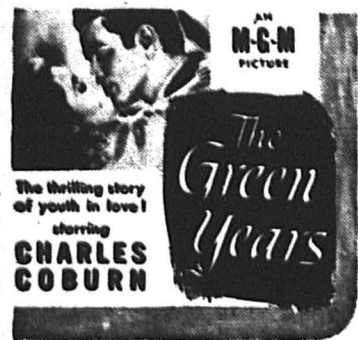
