## REPORT FROM Your Congressman

War is waste.  
American history seems to show that we never prepare for a war because we do not believe one is going to start, and after one starts we then prepare as if it is never going to stop. As a result we waste even more than other nations.

As evidence, the Office of the War Assets Administration in Philadelphia, is constantly announcing sales of surplus equipment and materiel. According to that office, optical equipment comprising periscopes, telescopes, binoculars and similar equipment, costing the government \$5,000,000 have been sold during the last five months. \$250,000 worth of fire extinguishers were offered for sale at less than half of their original cost; \$9,000,000 worth of Army and Navy surplus shoes are being offered for sale; enough shaving brushes to lather the faces of two million men will be offered at competitive bidding, closing March 24, 1947. These are but a few items of many, many others announced during just that short period from February 12, 1947 to February 20th, 1947 by this one office.

On February 6th the same office announced that five foreign governments have bought more than one million dollars worth of surplus property through it, Russia leading in purchases, paying \$292,613 for steel products, industrial machinery and railroad equipment which originally cost \$660,510, which represented a loss of 57 per cent on such equipment as locomotives and car parts, cranes and derricks, wire, ingots and pipe tubing.

For those interested, the same office announced on February 14th that the plant at Burlington which was built and equipped by the government and leased to the Aluminum Corporation of America for war-time production of aluminum will be put up for sale or rent during March. It is an eight million dollar surplus war plant and another eight million was spent to equip it. There are about 70 acres of land in the property, which is on Keim Boulevard adjacent to State Highway 25. The two sections of the plant have thirty-nine permanent structures with a combined floor area of about 645,000 square feet. Their floor areas range from 145 to 86,000 feet. In addition there are 15 temporary frame structures. Among the equipment are cranes, hoists, tanks, production items and special electrical facilities. The plant has utilities for water, sewerage, gas and electricity and a central heating plant. It also has 10 railroad sidings with a total of 13,800 linear feet of trackage.

The Director announces that proposals for the purchase will be received until 11 a. m., March 19th at P. O. Box 2130, Middle City Station, 18th and Ransdell streets, Philadelphia, and that credit terms can be arranged and priority certificates from the RFC Corporation may be procured by eligible small business concerns.

Here's an opportunity for somebody. Just how much of a licking the taxpayers will take on this one remains to be seen.

## STADIUM LIGHTING SYSTEM REJECTED

At a special election held last Friday night by the Palmyra Board of Education the proposal to secure a lighting system for the stadium was defeated by an overwhelming majority, the tally being 263 against and 94 in favor.

The proposal called for a bond issue in the amount of \$25,000 and the project was to have been self-supporting.

One of the chief reasons given for not favoring the project was its comparatively limited use and the thought that other improvements, such as a new gymnasium, would be more advantageous to the school.

The Washington residence at 607 was slightly damaged, but prompt work on the part of the firemen prevented further spread of the flames which were whipped by a high wind.

Armstead, who with his wife left for work at 7:45 was unable to account for the origin of the fire which broke out at the rear of the two-story dwelling. The blaze had gained considerable headway before being discovered and had gotten into the partitions making a difficult job for the firefighters.

Two booster lines and two one and one half inch of lines of hose were used on the fire which was brought under control shortly before 9 o'clock.

The Palmyra and Riverton Fire Companies responded to the alarm.

## County Library Report

The following is the 1946 Annual Report of the Burlington County Free Library as submitted by Hazel C. Clark, librarian:

The staff of the Burlington County Library very much enjoy their work with people and books. To find a book that a reader wants and to get it to him gives one a great satisfaction, and to take an armload of new books into a school room filled with children is a most gratifying experience. Meeting people, talking about books, opening boxes of new books and glimpsing the fascinating pages inside, these are the tasks that make up our day, our week, and our year, and make our work so stimulating and enjoyable. But when the record of the years' work is reduced to reports and statistics, it becomes dull and uninteresting. The human touch is lost and instead we appear to have only the report of a machine doing so much work in a given time.

There are now 111 centers from which books are distributed through the County. Several of the small library stations have been closed during the year and we have been unsuccessful in our efforts to find a new location. It is recommended that a study be made of the method of distributing books to our small communities to make certain if they are now given the best possible service under our present organization.

Larger library units have made many demands on the County Library resources. Their reference requests run the gamut of human knowledge; how to direct a church choir, how to start a mail order business, something on nuclear physics, superlatives, and how to make over clothes for a twelve year old girl; to mention a few. In addition to these requests, their readers ask for many individual titles, both old and new.

The return of the veterans to their homes in this county has affected the library in ways it was impossible to foresee. Of course, books on vocations and business were popular, but the demand for required college reading was unexpected. College and University libraries were unable to buy enough copies of necessary books to supply their classes, so the students asked their families to borrow them from the local library. We have been able to supply some of them, but could not meet the constant demand. At least one undergraduate copied and photostated a portion of one of our books, in order to have some of the necessary references when he returned to college. In some cases, we have a long line of reservations on our only copy of a needed book and are unable to buy another one.

Work with the schools is an important part of our program, but the many changes in the teaching staff of the County schools has interrupted the use of the books. New teachers have to be interviewed and the facilities of the County Library explained. Full curriculums make it sufficient time to assume the charge of the library room, but the teachers are enthusiastic about the books and eager to give our school librarian time to talk about them to the pupils on her visits to the schools. The Library Councils are functioning and the pupil members carry the clerical work of the school library room.

During the year the rooms in the headquarters were repainted, an improvement much appreciated by the staff. We still need more room, particularly additional space for a reading room, so that a reader needing to consult our reference material may

have a place to work. The number of borrowers coming to the headquarters library is increasing and under present conditions, we are unable to give him any table space at all.

The past year has been a difficult one for the County Library. The end of the war did not mean an immediate return to pre-war ease of buying and distributing books. On the contrary, this year, it has been more difficult than during the war. In some cases, the first printing of a book was so small that we were unable to secure a copy from our dealers and were forced to wait months until the publishers brought out a second printing. Strikes, too, have delayed the receipt of our orders for in addition to the truckmen and railroad strikes, there have been strikes in shipping rooms and binderies. Our readers have been very patient and merit our thanks for the spirit in which they have accepted our explanations. We only hope that the next year we may be able to give more prompt service.

## Stubborn Fire Causes Considerable Damage

Palmyra and Riverton fireman battled a stubborn blaze on Monday morning of this week at the home of Sidney Headington, 415 Leconey avenue, Palmyra, the alarm being sounded shortly after 8:30 o'clock.

The loss to the residence was considerable. The fire was the second in this section to cause extensive damage to dwellings within a week.

## Communications in War

"Communications in World War II" was the topic of the illustrated talk given before the members of the Palmyra-Riverton Lions Club on Thursday night of last week by E. A. McCay, of the New Jersey Bell Telephone Co. Mr. McCay also demonstrated the actual equipment which he described in his address.

The vast strides made in communications came as a result of much research done in the company laboratories, one of which is located at Murray Hill, New Jersey.

A novel development was the throat microphone which enabled a machine gun operator of a plane, for example, to talk while both hands were employed. This device transmitted only voice vibrations and excluded all other sounds. A lip microphone which operated while soaking wet was also of value in landing operations.

Various types of field telephones were shown, together with the new type cables which operated them. Wire laying was greatly facilitated by using airplanes, it being possible to lay 16 miles of wire in less than seven minutes. This was especially valuable in wooded terrain.

Other inventions described were firing devices for rockets, electric gun directors and operational flight trainers, all of which played an important part in winning the war.
