COMMISSIONER OF LABOR SPEAKS TO ROTARIANS

Interesting facts, figures, and observations with regard to the work and philosophy of the Department of Labor of the State of New Jersey were presented before the local Rotarians last Thursday by Harry Harper, Commissioner of the Department.

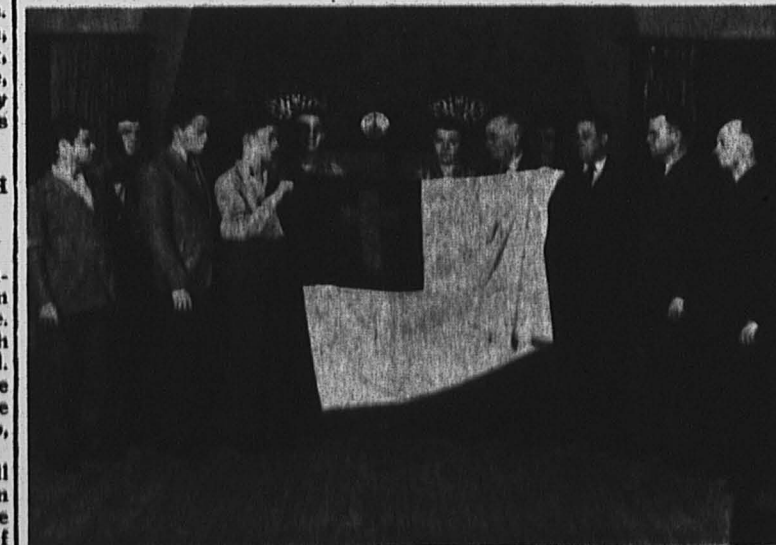
Mr. Harper, who was introduced by State Senator Arthur W. Lewis, dealt with the programs and progress of the Safety Department, the Mediation Board, and the Workmen's Compensation Department.

Last year the Safety Department approved 200 new industries, or 59 million dollar's worth of new work. A Bill, put through in 24 hours, outlawed strikes against public utilities in the State of New Jersey. This

was the first Bill of its kind in the United States, and became the pattern for other States to follow.

Commenting on the impending strike of the Bell Telephone workers, the Commissioner intimated that his Department was already contacting "Bell" workers to discover whether, in the event of a strike, they would work for the Government. The great American need at the present moment, Mr. Harper declared, "is to let the workers know that a good day's pay deserves a good day's work. Workers must be convinced that a good day's work is necessary." But it is also imperative that employers know their employees intimately, that they are really interested in them as individuals, and that they become acquainted with them as fathers and heads of homes who have many problems and concerns that are not related exclusively to the place in which they work.

Passing on to a consideration of the problems of the Mediation Board, the Commissioner was convinced that much more could be accomplished if the Board could have at least two hours' notice before the

MOSQUITO CONTROL

DeWitt Morris of Riverton, a member of the Burlington County Mosquito Extermination Commission, in company with Earle D. Potter Commission Superintendent, made an inspection to locate possible breeding areas for mosquitos in Riverton, Palmyra and Cinnaminson.

Several places in Palmyra and Cinnaminson were found and these areas will receive attention in May before greegling reaches the adult stage. These areas will be checked throughout the breeding season and treated whenever mosquito breeding occurs. All the residents of these areas

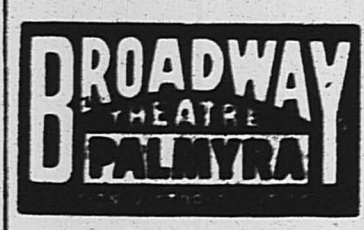

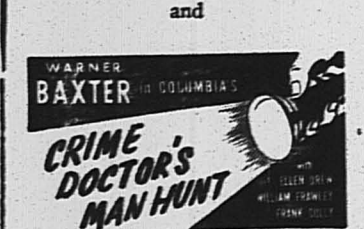

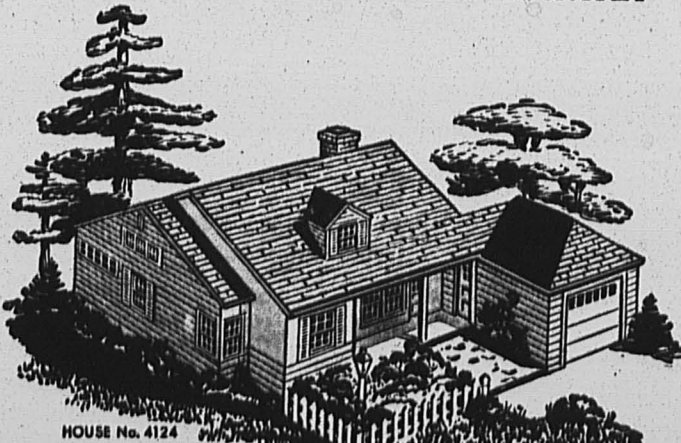

THE POSITION WE TAKE . . .

The New Jersey Bell Telephone Com-
pany wants to be fair about wages and
to do what is best for both employees
and telephone users. Wages that are
too low are not fair to the employees
—who do the work. Wages that are
too high are not fair to the public—
who buy the service.

A comprehensive survey shows that
telephone wages compare favorably
with those paid by other concerns
in New Jersey for work requiring
similar skills and training. Not only
do present telephone wages compare
favorably with other industries, but
the same is true of vacations, holi-
days, sickness benefits, pensions and

WHAT WE PAY NOW . . .

Here are rates of pay for typical
telephone jobs, not including over-
time. There is extra pay for Sundays,
holidays, and evening and night duty.
Top rate pay for a five-day forty-hour
week for the highest paid telephone
craftsmen is \$79; for switchboard
operators, \$44. Stenographers receive
a top rate of \$48 for a thirty-five
hour week. Starting rates for un-
trained beginners range from \$26 to
\$30 a week depending on the locality

REPORT FROM Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

The Senate, or at least its Foreign Relations Committee, is trying to repair some of the damage done by the President's speech of March 12 regarding Greece and Turkey, with other far-reaching implications.

If the President's diplomacy in this matter is a criterion for American diplomacy in our new world leadership, it is something for the American people to worry about.

In his speech of March 12th, he said that the United Nations was unable to do anything about the Greek and Turkish situation because it was an emergency, but he did not even suggest that, although we act in the emergency, we ultimately submit the question to the United Nations.

Then, two or three weeks after the reaction set in on this mistake, he had Mr. Austin try to soften the matter with the United Nations and now the Senate Foreign Relations Committee is further backtracking to cover up the diplomatic blunder.

But there are certain features which cannot be overlooked. Accepting the President's statement that the United Nations cannot act, and that we are the only nation in the world which can, it must be perfectly apparent that this creates a situation in which the 55 nations of the U. N. O. consist of one nation, Russia, which doesn't seem to give in on anything; one nation, the United States of America, which is apparently going to assume the entire burden, financial and military, of carrying out the purposes of the United Nations; and 53 nations, which decide what this one nation, the United States, shall be obligated to do.

The time is coming when we must have an understanding about this whole thing. If the United Nations is to make a decision, then each of the United Nations should bear its share of the responsibility for carrying out that decision, or if the United States of America has the responsibility alone, then the decisions on the question of if, when, and how anything should be done, must be made by the United States alone. These things must be clarified. We cannot assume the responsibility without the authority. On the other hand, if the United Nations is to be made a success, it must be by the efforts of all the nations, and not ours alone.

Just before his speech of March 12th implying that we combat Communism in all parts of the world, the President had written a letter to George H. Earle, Jr., in which he said that Communism in the United States was a "bugaboo," and two weeks after he made the speech, he suddenly decided it was so important that Communists should be cleared out of our own government.

Is it any wonder that both the Congress and the people of the United States are confused and bewildered in trying to determine what the foreign policy of the Administration actually is?

DR. JOSEPH STOKES

He is survived by his wife, Mary E.; two sons, Dr. Joseph Stokes, Jr., Philadelphia, and Dr. S. Emilen Stokes, of Moorestown, and a daughter, Mrs. Robert C. Smith of Moorestown.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the Friends Meeting House, Moorestown. Burial was in Westfield Friends Cemetery, Westfield.

Your preference for fish are just as much a give away as to the place you hail from as your accent or your colloquialisms.

At least that is the experience of J. C. Zink, head of the A and P Food stores in this area. His company ships more than 65,000,000 pounds of fish to all parts of the country annually, and as a result must watch carefully for any shift in the nation's demands.

The demand indicates that fish preferences have remained fairly constant during the past 10 years. Philadelphia wants flounder just as much as scrapple except when shad are running, while Baltimore and the Chesapeake Bay area lean to croakers, with rockfish, oysters, crab and shad also popular.

The Scranton, Pa. area is fond of mackerel, although various kinds of filets are also sought, while Richmond and most of Virginia favor spots, with shad also popular when they are running. The areas around Hagerstown, Md., Martinsburg, W. Va., Winchester, Va., and Waynes-

boro, Pa., like trout and weakfish, with shad, cod and haddock as runners-up.

In New York top honors go to cod, but in Boston, home of the bean and cod, haddock gets the nod. Pittsburgh also goes for haddock. In Chicago, fresh water fish from the Great Lakes are top favorites with lake trout getting the preference, while Cleveland, only short distance away, leans toward North Atlantic varieties with haddock getting top billing.

Much of the South prefers catfish, although the citizens of Georgia would rather have Florida mackerel. Des Moines, Kansas, Minneapolis, Milwaukee and St. Louis put ocean perch, commonly called rose fish, at the top of the heap.

TRANSPORTATION

"Transportation is the life-blood of every community" was the theme of a talk given by Earle R. Lippincott to the Palmyra-Riverton Lions Club at its meeting last Thursday.
