

For thirty years, men and women of all faiths and walks of life have made the American Friends Service Committee an instrument of their sympathy for their fellow men in distress. Their giving has been their spiritual ministry. In helping to reshape the broken lives of men, they have become partners in a living communion and have caught a vision of man's highest calling-to be the hands and feet of God.

This sense of doing God's work must be carried out through many agencies and on a far greater scale. In this spirit of dedication erica's relief efforts this winter can become a vital force in re building hope, faith and unity in war-ravaged lands and in our own country. If, as a nation, we can capture the enthusiasm and sense of high calling that has impelled us hitherto in lesser tasks. AS PROTESTANTS, CATHOLICS OR JEWS, let us give largely and quickly to the established church agencies of our faith. Their devoted workers are ministering to the needy as an expression of America's religious faith in the brotherhood of man.

AS MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITIES, let us work for and support the relief agencies aiding Greece, China and several other nationalities now campaigning for funds. On their success depends the continuance of vital medical services, training for leadership in health, education and child-care, maintenance of orphans, resettlement of refugees and displaced people.

The American Friends Service Committee is working in many parts of Europe and Asia and requires \$8,000,000 in 1947. The food purchases based on this budget are now being seriously curtailed until additional funds are received.
