Your Congressman

As more people become conscious of the terrific implications of the so-called policy announced by President Truman on March 12th, opposition to that policy becomes even stronger when it is realized that carrying out the policy to its fullest extent will place such a burden upon the American people that there will be a grave question whether our economy can stand it, even if the American people can stand the sacrifices involved. If the policy is not fully carried out, we will lose the money we spent, disappoint the peoples of foreign nations we have led to expect that they will receive more, our objective will fail, our prestige will be lost and we will again look back sadly upon more ruins of our "rat hole" foreign policy. As we even now remember the \$3,750,000 to Great Britain.

War is waste.

On April 11th, the Philadelphia Office of the War Assets Administration announced that surplus property which cost the Government \$5,358,000 is being offered for sale on a sealed bid basis that week. According to previous results, the taxpayers will take another licking.

On April 14th, the same office announced that \$20,102,000 worth of surplus property was sold by it during the month of March 1947.

On April 15th, the same office announced that \$2,990,384 worth of surplus metal working equipment has been sold so far this year.

One bright spot in this picture was the announcement that surplus property valued at \$1,011,600 during March was sold to veterans of World War II, including motor vehicles, general products, textiles, apparel and machinery.

The House has passed another appropriation bill, this time for the Department of the Interior, which reduces the President's Budget request by 45 per cent. It won't do any serious damage to the essential activities of the Department. Just another Republican pledge carried out in the House.

AN APPEAL

Several days ago a letter of resignation was received from Mr. C. Russel Oakes, a teacher of Biology and Science and assistant football coach at Palmyra High School. In his letter Mr. Oakes stressed the pleasant associations he has had with students and teachers at Palmyra and the excellent working conditions. However, he has been unable to secure a home in Palmyra or vicinity for his wife and children, and must secure a position elsewhere where housing is available.

A similar situation prevails in the case of Mr. A. C. Isch, Band director at the local high school. Mr. Isch has been forced to take two small rooms in Camden to house his wife and daughter. Everyone was impressed, thrilled, and pleased at the excellent program rendered by the high school band in its annual concert last Friday and Saturday. However, Mr. Isch has given notice that he will not return next year unless he is able within a few days to secure a house or apartment for his family.

Another member of the high school faculty, a veteran of several years service like Mr. Oakes and Mr. Isch, has been forced to move with his family to a small home near Bridgeboro, necessitating long and costly commuting from his home to the high school.

Everyone was loud in his expressions of appreciation for the work done by our servicemen during the war and many were the expressions of gratitude and promises of post-war rewards. Yet these men ask nothing more than a place in which to house themselves and their families.

Efforts have been made by the Board of Education and the administration to help these men find homes. Paid advertisements were inserted in local papers, letters sent to all clubs and organizations, personal appeals made in various meetings of citizens.

We see moving vans on the streets of Palmyra at frequent intervals; new students are entering our schools constantly. Yet, from September to the end of April no offer has been made to rent a home or apartment to any of these teachers.

Are not the children of Palmyra High School entitled to good teachers here when they have them? Cannot someone offer to share a large home or to rent an apartment or home, at least until the new proposed veteran's housing program is completed? These men have been in the service a long time. They cannot pay \$8000, \$9000, or more for a house at present. They need help now.

If anyone can supply information which will lead to securing a home for either or both of the two men mentioned, please get in touch with them direct or the office of the school district.

There will be simple refreshments. Come and bring a carload of family, friends and neighbors. In case of heavy rain our party will be postponed until Saturday, May 17th.

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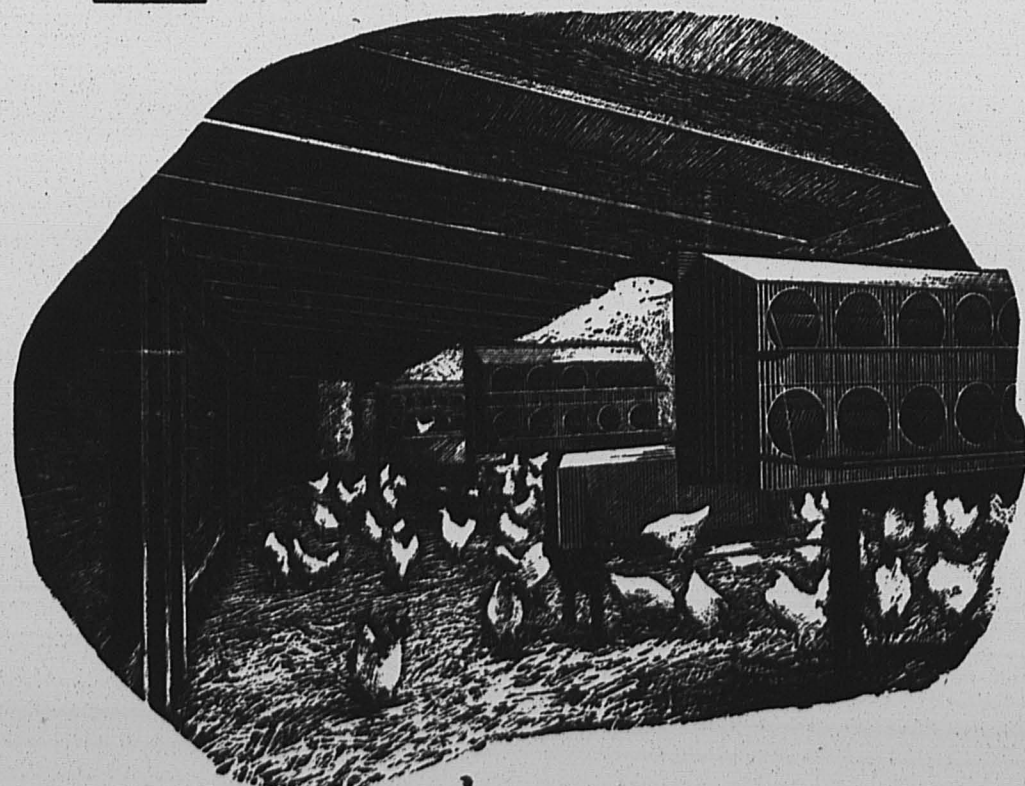

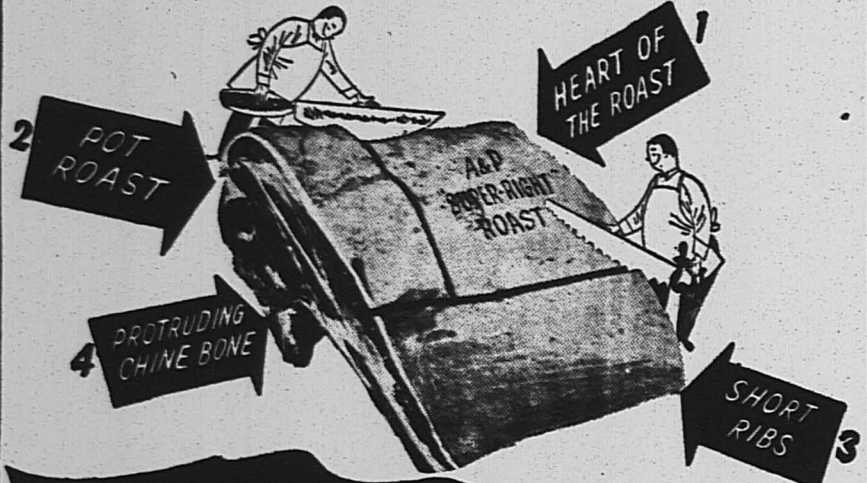

REPORT FROM Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

Information for veterans! Civil
Service examinations for positions

Veterans and veterans organiza-
tions will be glad to know that the
Veterans Administration has de-
signed four additional Post Offices
in the 4th Congressional District
which are now in position to accept
applications for and supply U. S.
flags for burial purposes. These
Post Offices are at Burlington,
Hightstown, Princeton and River-
side.

This week the House struggled
with the perplexing problem of what
to do about rent control. Most of
the members want to get rid of it
as soon as possible, want to give
landlords a square deal and at the
same time, not inflict injustices on
tenants. This problem is the pro-
duct of past mistakes.

When the Administration failed
after V. E. Day to understand that
it had a serious problem on its
hands and to do something about
getting building materials on the
market so that the only solution
possible could be achieved (more
homes), it kept fooling around with
controls, creating bureaus, admin-
istrators and trying to get subsidies.
The chief difference between mem-
bers of the House was whether rent
controls should be allowed to expire
at the end of June or whether they
should be eased off. As we were
faced with a condition and not a
theory, your Congressman felt that
the only safe way to end the mat-
ter was by easing out the con-
trols, rather than suddenly pulling
them out by the roots, and by pro-
viding better means whereby hard-
ship cases could be taken care of
meanwhile. Undoubtedly there is
still an emergency existing in the
housing problem in certain places,
but there are also places where such
problems do not prevail and where
national rent control regulations are
a nuisance and a hardship. Regard-
less of this difference, a whole lot
of members, including your Congress-
man, voted for an amendment to the
bill which allowed counties, cities
and towns to end rent control in
their jurisdiction if they found no
emergency to exist. This brings the
remedy right back where it belongs,
and gets the federal government off
the neck of people in localities which
do not need rent control, and at the
same time, allows it to continue for
a little while only in those localities
where it is needed.

Better Transportation

At a meeting of the Executive Council of the Delburco Transportation Committee held last week in the Boro Hall, Palmyra, it was decided to continue plans for the distribution of a Commuters' Questionnaire in all of the river-front towns. STATEMENT ON SMALL POX

The Riverton Board of Health desires to call attention to the following facts:

Recent and present experience shows that smallpox is still a serious threat to the public health. Public health and medical authorities agree that the community safest from the threat is a well vaccinated community.

As you know, a case in New York City resulted in death in March. The infection is believed to have been contracted in a foreign country. Many exposures resulted from this case. Although by no means all of the exposed persons were identified, several cases of smallpox were found among these persons in New York City. As a result of additional exposures to these later cases, a group of cases occurred at a point in New York State many miles from the City.

On April 17 a fatal case of smallpox was recorded in the City of Camden, N. J. Direct communication with the New York City cases was not established. A few days ago a member of the crew on a steamer was found to have what at first was believed to be smallpox while the ship was in Philadelphia-Camden Harbor. Admission of the patient to several local hospitals was sought. Our latest information is that a diagnosis of chickenpox has finally been made. However, should it have been smallpox as originally considered, many exposures would have resulted.

These experiences bring most forcibly to attention the threat of smallpox to all communities of New Jersey. With present means of rapid transportation, the large movements of population daily for business, shipping and recreation, hardly any community in the State can longer be classed as isolated.

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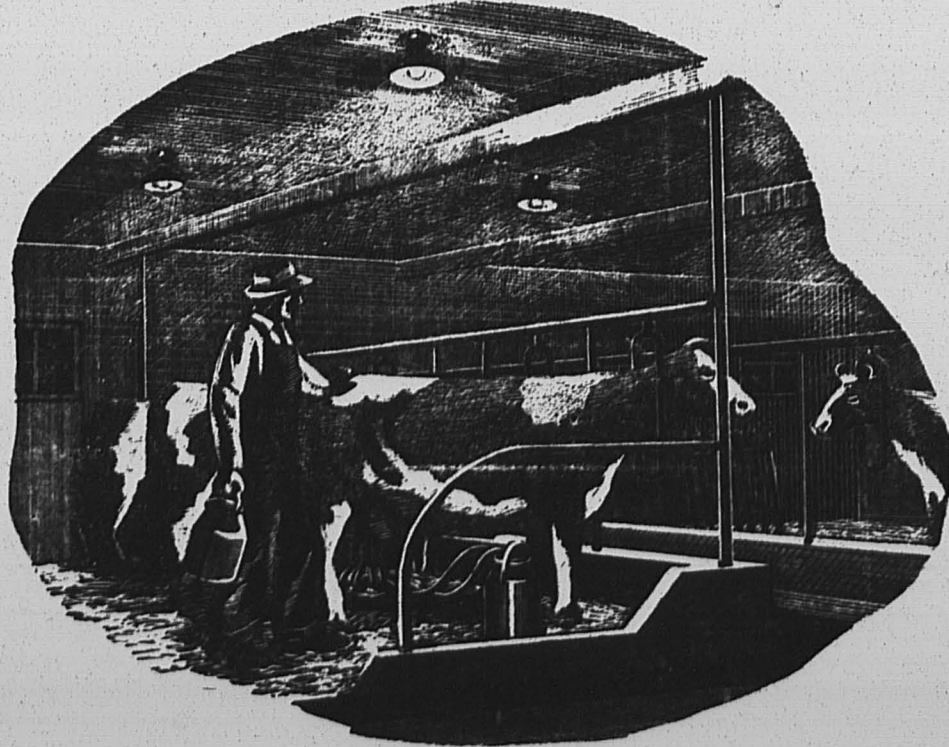

The deceased is survived by two sisters and a brother. Mr. Hughes was a painter and a member of the Central Baptist Church.

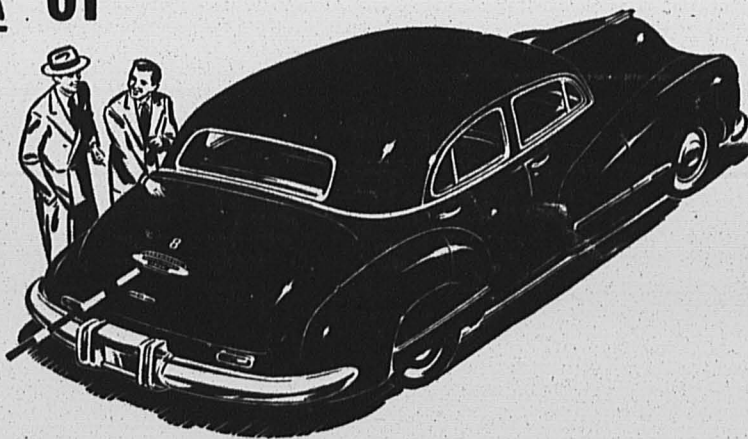

Total enrollment-Kindergarten to 12 1,269

It is important to note that in the Spring Garden Street unit 15.3% of the pupils are colored; in the Delaware Avenue Junior School 29.3% are colored; while in high school the percentage is 12.3%. The percentage for the entire system is 15.6%. Many of these students are good school citizens, enter into school activities and make reasonable progress scholastically. Many of the athletes of the high school are colored; several of the class officers; several members of the band, orchestra, choir; and quite a few members of the Honor Roll.

It is important also to know that of the 733 high school pupils reported above, 484 are non-resident students from other districts. Cinnaminson sends the largest number, 118; Delaware 108; Riverton 100; Delran 91; Pennsauken 64; while 3 are paid individually. The revenue from these tuition pupils will be about \$40,000 in the current school year. The advantages of having tuition students are two fold: The sending districts can pay tuition for high school students at a cost much less than that of maintaining their own small high

school. Secondly, the resident pupils benefit through the increased enrollment because the total enrollment of the high school is that much larger. Therefore, many courses can be offered which could not be offered in a small high school for residents only. Likewise many activities can be made available for students, both athletic and non-athletic. These activities provide growth for students in non-scholastic areas and supply the color, the thrill, and the enjoyment which result in better student morale and a better school.

Sending districts have been notified that tuition fees will be drastically increased for next year, for it would not be good economy for Palmyra taxpayers to pay the extra costs entailed by the added student population.

A study of enrollment figures for the past few years shows that the grade school enrollment dropped from a high point of 1,000 pupils in 1930 to a low point of 517 in 1945, and is on the upgrade again. An enrollment of about 555 is anticipated next fall and a sharp increase for the next four years thereafter. This raises serious problems about building facilities for this group of children.

The high school enrollment in 1930 was about 400. This rose to nearly 800 in 1940, dropped during the war years to a low of 708, and has risen this year to 733. There may be a slight increase next year, but the sharp increase in high school enrollment will not be felt for about two or three more years.

The highest total enrollment of the Palmyra schools was in 1935 when it totaled 1,500 pupils. The decrease since then to a low of 1,225 in 1945 was largely due to the war and to the low birth rate in the depression years. This total is also on the upgrade.

The problems of building and equipment inadequacies will be discussed in a future "Know Your Schools" column. These can be closely related to the fluctuation of pupil enrollment figures, and provide much food for serious thought and planning for the future only two or three years ahead.

This sense of doing God's work must be carried out through many agencies and on a far greater scale. In this spirit of dedication America's relief efforts this winter can become a vital force in rebuilding hope, faith and unity in war-ravaged lands and in our own country. If, as a nation, we can capture the enthusiasm and sense of high calling that has impelled us hitherto in lesser tasks, America will yet become an instrument in God's hands to help rebuild a shattered world.

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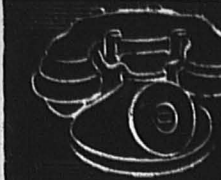
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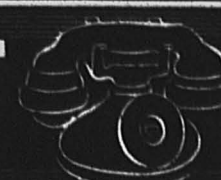

REPORT FROM
Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

Of interest to veterans: Civil Service examinations for Automotive Mechanic at U. S. Naval Air Station at Lakehurst will be held soon, and the closing date for applications is June 3. Examinations for Jr. Cook, Cook, Diet Cook, Mess Supervisor, Waitress and or Waiter, Hospital Attendant and Mess Attendant for Tilton General Hospital at Fort Dix, New Jersey will also be held. Reaction has already set in on the passage of the first bill to carry out the "Truman Doctrine," the Greek-Turkish "Aid" Bill, recently passed by the House. Congressmen who voted for the bill are now asking: How far are we going with this thing? What is it going to cost? Where will it lead us? What will it do to our economy?

Your Congressman discussed the matter with a member of the House who voted for the bill and was surprised to learn that the Congressman was seriously considering voting against appropriations authorized in the bill and necessary to carry out its provisions.

Your Congressman has been somewhat amused by the attitude of people who criticized him last year by claiming that he did not represent the people and paid no attention to them, and who are now criticizing him because, knowing the vast implications of the President's speech of March 12th, he went out and interviewed some of the people who are going to pay the bill and whose brothers, husbands and sons will be called upon for military service to back up the "Truman Doctrine," particularly should it eventually lead us into another war.

Your Congressman does not believe that the mere passage of this bill is going to immediately lead us to any war, although unquestionably, the provisions of the bill, coupled with the President's speech of March 12th and the public statements of those backing it, are reasonable grounds for apprehension. He is of the opinion that as bill after bill comes in to carry out the "Truman Doctrine" in various other countries, involving enormous expenditures of money, the people, and hence the members of Congress, will eventually demand a halt, and the whole thing will bog down. Yet if we do not carry this doctrine out to its logical conclusion, I am inclined to agree with the following statement made by a news commentator as follows: "A Truman Doctrine insufficiently backed is worse than no doctrine at all."

At the same time, to sufficiently back the Doctrine will nullify every attempt this Congress has made or can make to reduce taxes, federal expenditures, and to stop inflation.

As your Congressman has told you before, the United States of America cannot be global minded in ambition without being global minded in responsibility.

Your Congressman has been happy to have been of some assistance in the plans for the Memorial Day celebration at the Beverly National Cemetery. This is the only National Cemetery in the State of New Jersey, and one of only ninety in the whole United States. Your Congressman has been helpful in getting military and naval personnel assigned to participate in the parade and ceremonies, because he believes that "a nation which forgets its heroes cannot live."

Among the visitors to your Congressman's office during the last week were Robert G. Keiley of Riverton, Andrew Tippin of Merchantville, and William E. Steele of Riverside, New Jersey.

President Commends
Users and Operators

Chester I. Barnard, president of the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company, has pledged his organization to "do all that is humanly possible" to make up ground lost by the telephone strike in filling orders for telephone service and expanding telephone facilities.

In a statement following return of the operators to the switchboards, the telephone president expressed the deep appreciation of the company to telephone users for their cooperation in using the service sparingly during the strike, and to the telephone men and women who kept service going during the work stoppage.

"We're all glad that the telephone men and women have returned to work in New Jersey," he said, "and are deeply grateful to telephone users whose cooperation in using the service considerably during the strike enabled us to put through all calls, so far as we know, that were essential to individual and community welfare and safety."

"We believe the settlement reached is a fair one, both to employees and to telephone users who, in the long run, pay the wages."

"The wage increases accepted by the Commercial and Traffic employees, and offered to the Plant and Accounting employees, including the so-called fringe items and shorter work schedules, amount to approximately \$6,000,000 a year. While these increases are far less than the \$25,000,000 in increased wages and other benefits originally demanded by the unions, they add greatly to the cost of furnishing service in this State."

Talk Over Problems
With Your Family
Service Counselor

The work of the Family Service Council of Riverton and Cinnaminson has been directly affected by the war. Not only are there the problems of the returning veterans to consider but the homes of many residents have suffered from the natural tensions growing out of the recent difficult years. The effects of inadequate housing and the resultant overcrowding are becoming increasingly apparent. Men and women (both veterans and others) are realizing the economic uncertainty of this post-war era. Indirectly this tension also affects the children of the family.

Many families work out these situations themselves, while some receive help from their ministers, physicians or friends. Some just "muddle along" without knowing that there is an agency in the community with trained personnel who can be of real help in a crisis. Financial or social standing has nothing to do with the need for assistance from the Council when family problems arise.

It is the firm conviction of the Council that preventive help with personal problems is just as important to the welfare of individuals and communities as preventive medicine to bodily health. When a problem is beyond the power of the Family Service Council to solve, Mrs. Smith, our executive secretary, has supplementary resources to which she can refer. It is never too much trouble to exhaust every possibility in an attempt to clarify the problems which are brought to her.

Everyone in the community is urged to become more familiar with the work of the Family Service Council, whose office is in the Collins Building in Riverton. The door is always open to those who need sympathy and help. Hours are from 9:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. Monday through Friday. Special appointments can be made. Telephone Riverton 9-0284.

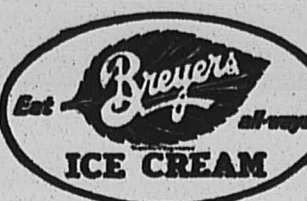

REPORT FROM Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

Winston Churchill is now asking the British people whether Europe, through its poverty and quarrels, is forever to be a burden and danger to the rest of the world. He is also asking them if they imagined they can be carried forward indefinitely upon the shoulders of the United States. That is pretty plain speaking by an Englishman, not by some American who has opposed the idea that the United States can and should support the rest of the world indefinitely.

Reaction to the Truman Doctrine is setting in still further. A newspaper commentator here in Washington now says that both Messrs. Vandenberg and Marshall have said that for the present, at any rate, no further appropriations like the \$400,000,000 aid for Greece and Turkey or even like the Foreign Relief Bill are to be asked for. The commentator, who by the way, appears to be a liberal, also says: "The one thing that is certain is that American resources are not inexhaustible and cannot be drawn on indefinitely."

So it looks as if the Truman Doctrine has stalled before it really got started. If it has, it will be a good thing for the United States and the rest of the world, and will give a little more hope for peace.

In the meantime, the Communists are still making good progress here in the United States, while the administration talks a lot and does nothing to stop them.

And also in the meantime, the United States is in bad need of a foreign policy. During the debate on the Naval Appropriations Bill, your Congressman wanted to know whether the Appropriations Committee had considered the Truman Doctrine in fixing these appropriations, and expressed his own thought that a nation's military and naval policy must depend upon its foreign policy, because it is the military and naval force that is used to carry out that foreign policy.

According to the advocates of the Truman Doctrine, we are out to stop Communism all over the world. But suppose Communism does not want to be stopped. If it does not, the first sensible question which arises is: What are we going to stop it with? It seems to your Congressman that there are other very effective means which could be taken to put a crimp in Communism without starting a war about it now, and if we do not take these steps, we may be ultimately forced to the only alternative again without being prepared.

I repeat, the United States needs a foreign policy.

Applications for the principalship are now being reviewed and the appointment will be announced on or before July 15.

Contests for the Republican nomination for members of the governing bodies in Palmyra, Riverton and Cinnaminson promise to be the most exciting features of the Primary Election which will be held on Tuesday of next week.

Riverton

The Special Election ballot will be separate from the ballot for the Primary Election. A voter may take or reject either or vote both ballots. If both are used he will be asked to sign his name twice in the designated columns; under "1947 Primary Election" and under "Other Elections."

Voters who have been discharged since April 24, 1947 and who show proof of honorable discharge may register at the County Board of Elections, 117 High Street, Mount Holly, New Jersey, and vote on the emergency-voting form provided.

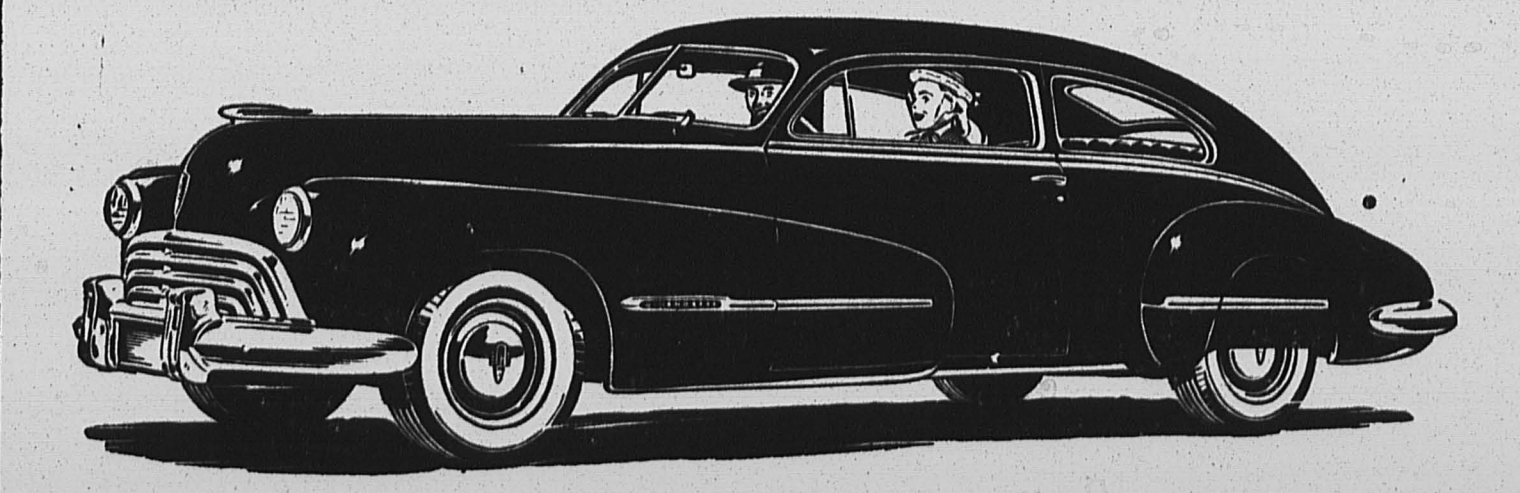

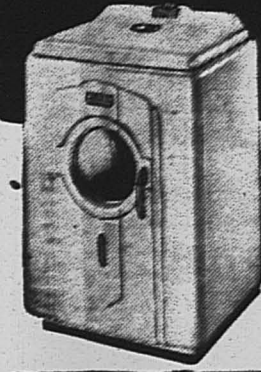

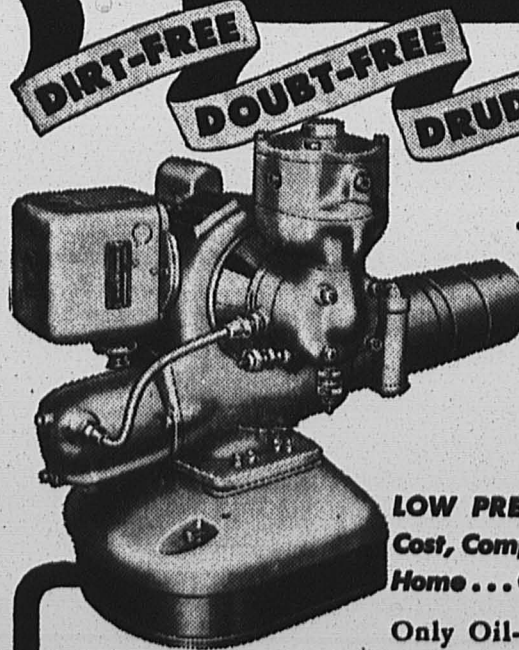
