REPORT FROM

Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission will conduct written examinations for applicants for admission to the U. S. Military Academy at West Point at 8:30 a. m. Monday, July 21st. Candidates from the Fourth District of New Jersey, (Burlington and Mercer Counties) will take the tests at the Trenton Post Office, and those in the armed services will be examined under the supervision of their commanding officers at their military stations either in the United States or abroad.

Young men from the Fourth District interested in taking the examination must notify Congressman Mathews in writing to his Washington office not later than June 14th to be eligible to compete.

There will be one vacancy from the Fourth District for the West Point this year but no vacancies at Annapolis.

In accordance with your Congressman's established policy the man making the highest mark on the written examination will be appointed, and then must qualify before an Army Board of Review if he is successful will be admitted in July, 1948. The three men receiving the next highest grades in order will be appointed alternates to the principal appointee.

Candidates must be at least 17 years of age and not more than 22 as of July 1, 1948, except that men who have completed one year of honorable service in the armed forces are eligible up to 24 years.

Your Congressman is encouraged in his efforts to procure improvement in the service on the No. 9 bus line of the Public Service Interstate Transportation Company. Mr. Herbert E. Harper, Manager of the Southern Division, has advised your Congressman that the Corporation had received additional buses which will allow the release of diesel hydraulic units for this line. He also advises that they have gathered quite a few figures and have taken traffic checks in connection with providing express service on Route 9 in certain hours. Additional traffic checks are being taken, and Mr. Harper says that he should shortly be in position to discuss with your Congressman a definite proposition for the improvement of this line.

On Wednesday of last week, your Congressman made a speech of fifteen words before the House. That speech was: "Mr. Speaker: What this country needs is a foreign policy that is less foreign and more policy."

Your Congressman had the pleasure of visits from an old friend, Admiral Calvin Durgin of Palmyra, and Commander James Degan.

ELECTION RESULTS

Despite local contests in Riverton, Palmyra and Cinnaminson, the voting was extremely light at the Primary Election on Tuesday. In Palmyra, where two complete tickets were in the field only about half of those registered went to the polls to sweep the G. I. ticket into office by a huge majority.

Colonel Charles V. Dickinson was accorded the Republican nomination for Mayor by a 3-1 majority over his opponent, Councilman T. Curtis Flynn. Harold Marshall and Robert Snover, Dickinson's running mates for Council, defeated Russell Dilks and Councilman Wesley P. Huyett. In Riverton, Carl Mann and Albert C. Farrow won the two Republican nominations for Borough Council. Mrs. Carvel Sparks was the defeated candidate. S. Robinson Coale was accorded the nomination for Mayor without opposition as was Russell M. Bigelow for assessor.

Cinnaminson

Maurice Conrow easily defeated John C. Adams for the Republican nomination for member of the Township Committee in Cinnaminson. This was the only local contest in that community.

County

In the vote for County candidates, Albert C. McCay won the G. O. P. nomination for member of the General Assembly by an overwhelming vote in the 11 local election districts. William Parker was nominated for Sheriff without opposition and Clarence G. Price for Freeholder secured a substantial majority over his opponent.

In the Coroner contest, Donald Cole, Independent Republican, staged a surprising vote against Richard Belton, United Republican candidate and carried most of the local districts.

The question regarding the proposed revision of the State Constitution was approved by a wide majority and Senator Arthur W. Lewis and Lester A. Drenk were nominated delegates to the Convention.

The Democratic vote was very light and all candidates were nominated without opposition.

SUMMER BAND SCHOOL

The Palmyra Public School are offering free class instruction on all band instruments in the annual summer band school which is now in progress. The group is meeting on Saturdays until the end of the term and thereafter, beginning June 16, daily until July 3. The school furnishes the instruments free of charge to all students selected for instruction. The purpose of the school is to start beginning instructional students to replace those graduating, and to provide additional instruction for intermediate students who will participate in the school band this fall.

Vacancies exist on the following instruments: Flute, Trombone, Cornet, Tuba, Snare Drum and Alto Saxophone. Youth Council Report

Henry G. Naisby, chairman of the 1947 Tri-Borough Youth Council Campaign reports that the goal has been surpassed by about \$200 and that when returns are complete solicitations will total about \$7,250. Words of appreciation have already gone to those in the Campaign who worked to make it a success and thanks are much in order to each contributor in the communities.

The house to house canvas realized an increase over past collections due to more thorough coverage. There have been about 1900 contributors out of 2,500 homes contacted. The greatest objection by contributors was the frequency and number of campaigns although a number of those solicited registered opinions against particular organizations participating in the Council. Attempts will be made by the Council to correct such conditions during the coming year and thus maintain the good will established in the past.

Expenses of the Campaign slightly exceeded \$400, part of which was a capital expense usable in the future. A breakdown of expenses will be given to any interested person who desires to call the Campaign Chairman. The actual distribution to each organization participating in the Council will be contingent on the amount of pledged money that is realized and on the amount of any further contributions but will be about 90 per cent of the budget of each. Pledges included in the above total, amounted to \$659.90 and will be handled by an able Pledge Committee.

REPORT FROM

Your Congressman

The day this is written the newspapers carry the story that the Secretary of State wants the United States to pour six billion dollars a year into Europe, for at least three years, in addition to all that we have already spent there, with so little real result in the rehabilitation of that portion of the world. Prior to World War I we poured our money and goods into Europe to assist "friendly" nations in their fight. We were told they would furnish the men and we would only have to furnish the materials. But the men followed the materials. It was a "war to end wars" which didn't; it was a war to "make the world safe for democracy" which didn't. And the then Democratic President, Woodrow Wilson, was re-elected as the man "who kept us out of war," which he didn't, because a month after he was inaugurated for his second term we were in it.

After the war we poured in more money which we never got back except from little Finland. The situation became gradually worse instead of better. As a result of these conditions World War II broke out. We became "the arsenal of democracy." Again we were just to furnish the goods. The then Democratic President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, told us that American boys would go and be sent to the battlefields of Europe. But, again, the men followed the money and materials, and we heard about the "Four Freedoms" and the "Atlantic Charter" and how we were fighting for the people of every nation to have "democratic" governments. And, again, the President was re-elected on the slogan—"Don't change horses while crossing a stream."

In World War II Russia was a "friendly" and "democratic" nation. We gave her 11 billion dollars in "lend-lease" whatever that was or is. And when the fighting stopped we formed the United Nations Organization to see if there was not some way the peoples of the earth could relieve themselves from these devastating wars, particularly in view of the perfection of the atomic bomb, long range airplanes and other increasingly dangerous threats to the annihilation of cities or whole nations. Yet already people are talking about the threat of Russia and Communism. Many of these people never saw a threat in Communism during the many years your Congressman, along with a few others, tried to convince them of the truth. And Russia is expanding and blocking every effort toward world peace.

After World War II we again poured billions of dollars—more than ever before—into Europe. And yet we have the situation described above. And still, with all this record, we are following the same old path. We are told that if we spend this money we won't have to send our boys to fight foreign wars. The people to whom we give the money will stop Communism, it is argued. And in the face of the record! Your Congressman voted against the vast three billion seven hundred fifty million dollar gift to Great Britain because the record and common sense indicated that it would be money poured down a "rat hole." A year's time has proven it, for we have already, but not with your Congressman's vote—given 400 million to Greece and Turkey for armament.

And now six billions more every year for at least the next three years! Do you think that will be all the money or the limit of time? And what happens to American economy and the American people in the meantime? Will there be a "crisis" in November, 1948? And will the men follow the money and materials? Look at the record again!

REPORT FROM

Your Congressman
FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

This week's report will be devoted to a matter which, although it concerns all of us, is particularly vital to veterans.

You will recall that your Congressman has consistently said, in speeches and over the radio, and written, that the housing shortage as a result of war conditions could only be cured by obtaining building materials and the workmen to put them together into a home.

Instead of attacking the problem from this angle, the Democratic Administration pinned its faith, as always, on the creation of new bureaus, administrators, and appropriation of federal funds.

Now let's see what actually happened.

About a year ago, Congress passed the Patman so-called Veterans Housing Bill. When this bill came before the House it contained an authorization for the appropriation of 600 million dollars. Your Congressman voted to take this out of the bill. The House did so. Immediately arose a wail from those who were to carry out this Act, that this money was the "heart" in the bill, that without it they could do nothing, even though the Act gave the housing administrator more authority and power than any government official had ever had, outside of the President himself. It gave him priority over all other government bureaus, regulations and restrictions, so far as housing was concerned.

Mr. Wilson Wyatt, who was appointed Housing Expediter under this Act, loaded the newspapers and the radio with propaganda against removal of this 600 million dollars. He convinced many veterans, particularly young ones who had not yet had a chance to become familiar with actual conditions, that anyone who voted against this appropriation was an enemy of the veteran and was preventing people from getting homes.

The Senate restored the item of 600 million and the conference report, reconciling the differences between the two houses compromised 400 million, and this was the amount put in the bill, for which your Congressman voted, because he wanted every effort made to expedite home building.

Now, one year later, the House, with scarcely a breath of opposition, ordered the liquidation of the Office of Housing Expediter. The testimony taken by the Committee at its hearings on this subject is extremely enlightening. Space permits only the recital of a few of the facts. During that year, the Housing Expediter, even with the great desire of bureaucrats to spend the public's money, could only find excuse to spend between 55 and 60 million dollars of the 400 million appropriated, of which amount 15 million was for access roads on government owned timber.

When asked why, after crying and moaning that 600 million dollars was absolutely necessary, the Housing Expediter had missed his estimate by 93 or 94 per cent, the answer was that it could not be explained. But the real explanation is simple and was exactly as pointed out by your Congressman all along. You can't build houses out of dollars bills, and when you can't get building materials or workmen, you just don't build houses.

You would think that from that lesson these people would have learned something. Not so. The same folks who wailed and moaned for the 600 million dollars and the creation of this bureau are now wailing and moaning because the present Congress has not created some more bureaus, provided some more federal funds and gone through the





same motions again.

But the present Congress has done some things which have helped the situation. Furthermore, testimony before the Committee showed the exact conditions your Congressman pointed out, and, surprisingly enough, that all building materials are now at an all time peak of production. If that is the case, certainly no more bureaus or no more federal funds are needed.

The shortage of materials at first and the constantly rising costs because of these shortages, due partly to vast shipments abroad and the constantly rising level of wages, reflected again in the price of materials. This has made it difficult, if not impossible, for a veteran to obtain a good home at a reasonable price.

If the Administration has learned nothing by this experience, I do hope that the people of the United States and particularly the veterans will have learned something by it.







REPORT FROM Your Congressman FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

The House has passed two bills strengthening veterans preference in the Federal Civil Service. One provides for confirming veteran's preference to those who are veterans in the commonly accepted sense of the word, and was necessary by reason of a recent decision of the U. S. District Court in the District of Columbia, extending these privileges to persons not usually regarded as veterans.

The other bill provides that when a veteran in the Civil Service has been downgraded, dismissed or otherwise in his judgment treated unfairly under the Veterans' Preference Act, and has appealed to the Civil Service Commission, as he has now a right to do, if the Civil Service Commission sustains the veteran, its findings and recommendations shall be binding upon the agency of the government by which he is employed, and that agency is compelled to carry out the findings and recommendations.

Heretofore the agencies have ignored the findings and recommendations when they wanted to, according to their own interpretation of the existing law. This last provision should greatly strengthen the protection of veterans in Civil Service. The House of Representatives has before it at the present time, a bill of extraordinarily broad provisions which purportedly will sell America to the rest of the world through a rejuvenated "Voice of America," the exchange with other nations of information and students and professors in college. Like much other legislation, the objects to be accomplished are good, but the provisions of the bill, our dangerous foreign policy, together with presently existing world conditions, makes the bill unwise at the present time, in the opinion of your Congressman and many others. In speaking upon this bill, your Congressman pointed out that it provides not to exceed \$10 per day for subsistence for foreign students brought to our own universities, or \$300 per month, when we are giving our own veterans only \$65 per month, or a ratio of 5 to 1 in favor of foreigners. This means that any one foreigner would be considered equal to 5 good American veterans. It means further, the admission of more foreign students, when our own veterans are finding difficulty in getting into our own overcrowded universities. And it means the expenditure of much money which should go for the benefit of our own veterans. This is certainly not the time for such legislation, sound as the idea might be at another time and under different circumstances.






