## CLUB PIER REPAIRED

For nearly 100 year's raging nor'easters and blazing suns; irresistible floods and grinding icepacks have wrought their damage to the pier of the Riverton Yacht Club—and day in and day out, relentlessly, Old Fahter Delaware has nibbled away at the pillings. Slowly, the big wharf has crumbled, shown recent signs of collapse. Because of the war, materials were impossible to obtain—and more lately, both materials and labor have been so high that the cost of the necessary repairs was beyond the Yacht Club treasury.

But last weekend, far away in Valhalla Bay where the wind is always right and the tide is always helpful, there was a stir and excitement as the yachtsmen of earlier days heard "something's happening at Riverton." And how they must have nodded to one another; how they must have been thrilled to see that the old spirit of the Riverton Club was still alive.

For Saturday and Sunday, June 28th and 29th, will be red letter days for many a year to come in the history of Riverton boating. After finding out that the most urgent repairs to the Wharf would cost in the vicinity of \$2,500.00, the Club members decided to do something about it themselves.

Somebody found out where a concrete mixer could be borrowed; some one else was able to obtain some forms; a third agreed to lend some wheelbarrows, and thus the necessary equipment was brought together from here...there...and everywhere. And there came, too, the members of the Club—as their new folder which describes the Club, says "from boyhood to graybeard"—giving their time to their Club. Then the concrete mixer began its chugging roar and for hours, these loyal members shoveled sand and gravel, heaved loaded bags of cement, pushed heavy wheel barrows. Still other crews set the cement, became carpentry crews, put down new decking—and far into the night, up 'til midnight, they worked. As some dropped out, new arrivals came to shed their dignity and most of their clothes, and took their turn on the job. The "Sailbags" (the ladies auxiliary) went to work feeding their menfolk coffee and sandwiches—and the work never stopped until all were exhausted. But on Sunday, back they came to take up where they had left off—and far into the afternoon they worked, making sure that their club pier—Riverton's Big Wharf—would be safe and secure for the coming generation of Yachtsmen who are now training to take over the Riverton tradition of where there's a boat, a breeze and a boy today, there'll be far healthier and happier man tomorrow. To name one who worked would be a slight to the seventy or eighty others who pitched in—and to leave out the name of one would be unfair. That's why this salute is nameless; its why their rejoicing today up there on Valhalla Bay where the wind is always right and the tide is always helpful—and that's why, on this Fourth of July, the Riverton Yacht Club will be ready and eager to welcome from other Clubs as they arrive come and entertain the visiting sail to take part in Riverton's traditional Fourth of July Celebration.

It all proves that where everybody works, everybody benefits—and that the old Riverton spirit that on land, as on water, the sailor who won't be beat, can't be beat—still lives.

The Riverton Board of Education announces the election of Frank E. Groff of Havertown, Pa., as principal of its grade school for the 1947-1948 term. Mr. Groff will work under the supervision and direction of Dr. John B. Geissinger, supervising principal of the Palmyra Public Schools, who was recently invited to assume supervision of the Riverton School in addition to his duties at Palmyra.

Mr. Groff is 33 years of age, married, and has two children. He is a graduate of the Tredyffrin-Easttown High School, of West Chester State Teachers College, and of the University of Pennsylvania where he received a Master's degree in Educational Administration in 1939. He has since been taking graduate work at Temple toward his doctor's degree.

His experience in education includes teaching elementary grades in Malvern, Pa., where he also was in charge of physical education, baseball, and basketball in a small grade school. Later he moved to Collingdale, Pa.

From 1937 to 1941 he taught arithmetic and coached baseball, track, and basketball at Abington Junior High School. He moved on to Lower Merion Junior High School in 1941 where he has been employed ever since as teacher of arithmetic and faculty manager of athletics.

Mr. Groff served in the U. S. Navy from 1942 to 1946 where he attained the rank of Lieut. Commander.

## REPORT FROM

Your Congressman  
FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

Veterans will be interested to know that the House of Representatives has passed several bills with respect to government insurance which have assisted in reinstatement and continuance, two bills strengthening veterans preference in Civil Service, a bill increasing the pensions of Spanish American War and Civil War Veterans and bill containing incidental provisions beneficial to veterans.

The Veterans Affairs Committee of the House has reported favorably a bill to raise the ceilings for veterans engaged in on-the-job training, one to increase allowances for married veterans with children where the veteran is going to school or college under the G. I. Bill of Rights, one to eliminate discrepancies and discriminations resulting from the legislation passed last year to give automobiles to certain amputees, one to include veterans of Indian Wars with Spanish American and Civil War veterans covered in the Act referred to above, and one covering presumption of service connection of certain chronic diseases and tropical diseases, the latter class being new as a result of service in the tropics in World War II.

Hearings have been held on bills for statutory award or percentage ratings in tuberculosis cases and on bills to raise income limitations in certain classes of dependency allowances. Hearings are now in progress on increased compensation for the Gold Star Widows and their children, increased pensions for peace-time veterans and for the right of a veteran to appeal to the courts from decisions by the Administrator of Veterans Affairs. All these hearings have been and are being held by the Sub-committee on Compensation and Pensions, of which your Congressman is Chairman.

War is Waste!

The Philadelphia office of the War Assets Administration announced on June 18th that more than \$20,000,000 worth of surplus property would be listed for sale during the week beginning on that date. You can buy tents, and paulins originally costing the taxpayers \$750,000.00, 5,000 welding rods, 85,000 of electrodes, a bucket type conveyor, four 3-wheel gas towing tractors and one hundred 4-wheel push-type warehouse hand trucks. You can also buy a nice 12 gasoline locomotive or 5 Diesel engines.

If they appeal to you, you can get 71 amphibious ducks and fence them in with 5,115 feet of woven galvanized chain link fence. Or rather you could have gotten this fence before June 17th, only somebody bought it for \$1,381.05. If you need something to wear, you can buy cotton herringbone twill OD and fatigue green jackets, OD trousers and wool serge OD suits, overcoats, high neck sweaters and summer flying suits, but you will lose out on 6 railroad cars which were brought by somebody else and on which the government took the miraculously small loss of \$1,250.00.

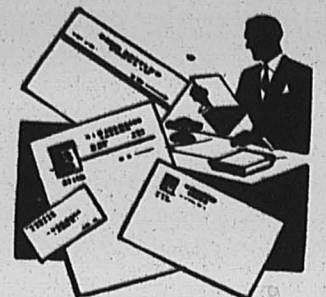

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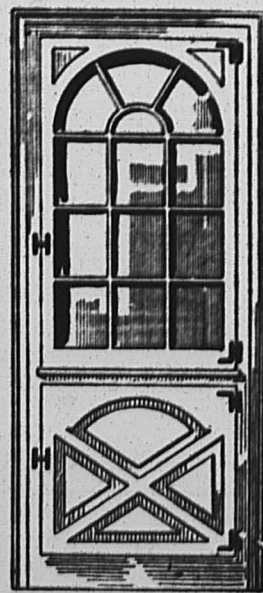
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To Telephone Users  
in New Jersey

On January 6 we asked the Board of Public Utility Commissioners of New Jersey to approve a general increase in telephone rates. This was the first such request in twenty-one years, and no provision was included in the application for a general wage increase.

On the basis of wage increases granted to members of two of the unions and offered to the others, the Company estimates the cost of such wage increases in 1947 at \$6,000,000 annually. This adjustment is necessary so that telephone wages will continue to compare favorably with wages paid in other industries in New Jersey.

To meet the higher payroll and other costs, we have found it necessary to ask for an additional increase in telephone rates. These revised rates would add 16% annually to the gross revenues present rates produce, compared with the 12% increase requested in our original application.

Without higher rates for service, it is estimated that this Company's earnings in 1947 on the \$181,000,000 net telephone investment would be less than one per cent and possibly might show a net loss. The additional revenue we seek is necessary to assure sound operation of the business and is in the interest of all telephone users.

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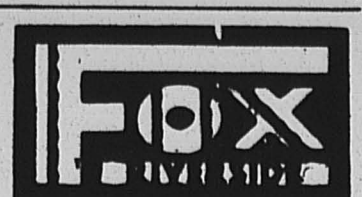

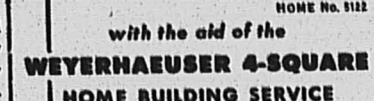

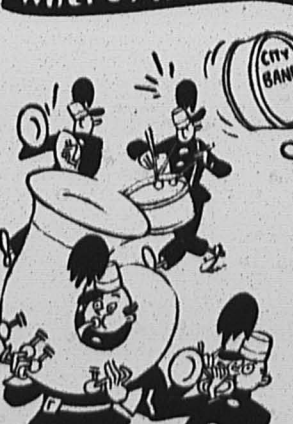

## STATEMENT BY FAUNCE

The following statement was issued this week by Benjamin Paul Faunce, Sheriff of Burlington county: "It is very odd that such a subject as washing cars at the jail garage should come up at a time like this when it has been the practice for years—long before I was Sheriff of Burlington county. The odd part of it is that the water at the garage (which is used for washing cars) does not come through the jail meter but is connected with the county clerk's office, which had a very low water rent for the quarter. As yet, I have not had any notification, verbal or otherwise, on the subject. The only information I have is what I have read in the newspapers."

"It only stands to reason that the jail should use quite a quantity of water because we average around 40 prisoners at a time and it is the ruling of the jail that they must keep themselves clean with showers or baths. They also wash all their own personal clothes, blankets, sheets and towels. The jail is equipped with a modern electric washer for this purpose."

The other buildings have no need to use water in quantities 24 hours a day and seven days a week. Also

PLANS APPROVED  
FOR APARTMENTS

If there is no delay in present plans, work will be started on a six-unit apartment house for veterans on or about August 15, at Third and Main street, Riverton, according to an announcement made by Riverton Borough Council on Monday night of this week. The structure will cost about \$45,000 and it is hoped to have the building ready for occupancy within 90 days after construction is actually under way.

The building is being erected as a part of the State Emergency Housing program with New Jersey furnishing \$21,540 of the cost. The remainder will be financed by a guaranteed first mortgage to be taken by the Cinnaminson Bank and Trust Company. The Borough will furnish the lot, which it already owns, grading and connection to utilities.

The project will be self-supporting and the rental of each apartment has been established at \$55 per month.

The plans, prepared by the architect, Frank M. Bates Associates, of Bristol, Pa., were approved by Council this week, subject to certain changes in accordance with regulations of the N. J. Tenement House Commission. They have already been approved by the N. J. Department of Economic Development.

The building will be two-storied, semi-fireproof, with brick walls or brick veneer. There will be three apartments on each floor, consisting of two bedrooms, living room, kitchenette and bath. The structure will have an unusually attractive appearance and the interior arrangements have been worked out with great care.

The building will have a frontage of 66 feet on Main street and 63 feet on Third street and, in the opinion of Council, will be a great asset to the community.

The actual operation of the apartment will be conducted by a Housing Committee appointed by Mayor Nathan Lane and approved by Council Monday night. This committee is as follows: David F. Gould, chairman; Charles H. Yost and David O. Smith. Applications have been prepared for prospective renters and these will be considered by the committee.

It is to be expected that more veterans will apply that there are apartments available and this will necessitate a careful perusal of all the facts before any rentals are made.

At the end of five years the State will withdraw from participation in the project, at which time action will be taken regarding its sale.

The notice to bidders is published elsewhere in this week's issue of The New Era. Proposals will be opened by Council Thursday evening, August 7, at 8 o'clock.

REPORT FROM  
Your Congressman  
FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

Figures have now been made public showing that since the end of the shooting in this last war, the United States has contributed in one way or another nearly 20 billions of dollars to the supposed rehabilitation of the rest of the world. Anybody who studies conditions as they exist today will have difficulty in coming to the conclusion that successful rehabilitation is necessarily in direct proportion to the amount of money spent by the United States.

That the Republican Party, at least, is beginning to realize this, is demonstrated by the fact that a commission is being created to study the whole situation to determine what is actually needed by Europe in her rehabilitation, if used properly, and how much of it can we afford to contribute without putting ourselves in the condition where we will need rehabilitation.

Immediately after Pearl Harbor, your Congressman (who was not your Congressman then) stuck his neck out so far as to predict that Admiral Kimmel and General Short would never be tried by court martial. The fact that they were not tried during the war was explained to the public as a necessary measure for national safety, but after the war stopped, nobody had any explanation.

The grounds for the reason may be found in the testimony taken by the Joint Committee which investigated the Pearl Harbor incident.

The July 4th, 1947 issue of the Chicago Herald Tribune carried the news that the limitation for court martial charges against these two officers, even though the time was extended by Congress, had expired that week. It is interesting that hardly anybody paid any attention to this fact.

War is waste. On July 9th, the War Assets Administration office in Philadelphia announced that more than 460,000 pairs of mens cotton shorts and 82,000 Marine Corps fatigue jackets were included in a 2 million dollar auction sale to be held on July 17th. The sale also included truck tires, garbage cans, signal flags, pennants, iron and brass pipe fittings and one lone nylon towing rope. Likewise, the announcement showed that there was 3 million dollars worth of machine tools available for purchasing.

A government owned plant acquired at a cost of \$3,600,000 was offered for sale, but nobody was interested. Another plant and equipment originally costing the government \$1,288,222 received offers of \$150,000 for the land and buildings and \$60,000 for the machinery and equipment. Another bid was \$100,000 each for the real estate and the equipment. These are just a few of the current items.

Mrs. Mary B. Laird, 111 E. Main street, Maple Shade, Music Supervisor at Palmyra Public Schools, is attending Fred Waring's Music Workshop at Shawnee-on-Deleware, Pennsylvania, this week.

Five hundred men and women who direct college, high school, church, industrial and radio music and who represent every state in this country, Canada and China are attending the Workshop this summer. They watch Fred Waring and his famed Pennsylvanians broadcast six coast-to-coast radio shows a week and observe rehearsal techniques. They learn broadcasting and microphone techniques, the nationally accepted Waring Choral techniques, and receive instruction in programming, music reading and arranging.

## BID REJECTED

At a special meeting of the Riverton Borough Council held on Monday of this week only one bid was received for work on Eighth street and South Broad street. This was rejected and the governing body is considering plans for re-advertisement.

The work consists of excavation and surface treatment with bituminous material.

## MORE KILLED SATURDAY

The five-day week has changed the traffic accident picture. Saturday has superseded Sunday as the most dangerous day on the highways, according to Keystone Automobile Club, which points to a record of 40 per cent more deaths on Saturdays last year than on the average day, with Sunday in second place for the first time.

Since the "short week" has been adopted rather generally throughout the country, Russell C. Heimert, Manager of the Camden Division of the Club, emphasized, more motorists are free to travel on Saturdays and in consequence the longer weekend runs up a high mortality toll. The Club official urged all drivers to exercise the utmost care in weekend travel.

Figures compiled nationally show that the Saturday death toll last year was 6850, or 20.2 per cent of all highway fatalities. Injuries on Saturday totaled 231,760, an increase of 25 per cent above the average day.

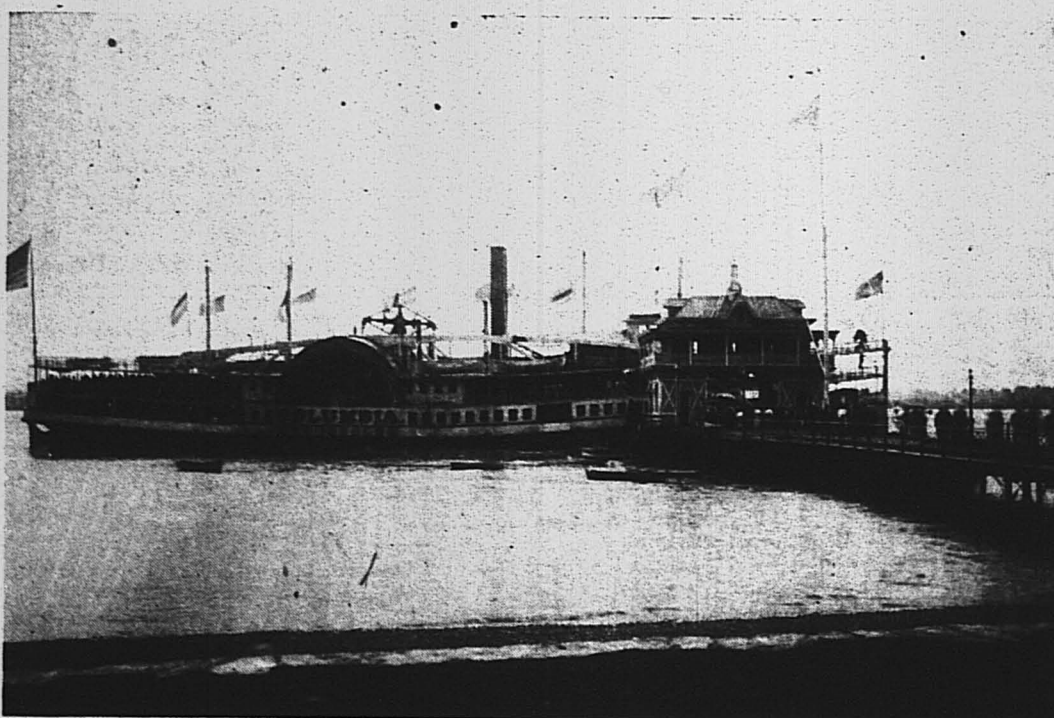

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## CARS FOR AMPUTES

The bill just passed by the Senate, S. 1391, remedies discrepancies which were created by legislation passed last year providing automobiles for certain amputees, according to Representative Frank A. Mathews, Jr. (R., N. J.).

Representative Mathews said that he hopes sincerely the House will take action on the Senate Bill inasmuch as no action has yet been taken by the bill introduced by him, H. R. 4007.

"Although the Senate bill does not include any veterans except those of World War II, which mine included," said Representative Mathews, "I am very happy to note that otherwise it is identical in wording with the bill I introduced and the preparation of which was given very careful consideration by me and the other Members of the Subcommittee on Compensations and Pensions. It was reported out favorably by the Veterans Affairs Committee."

Representative Mathews said he felt sorry that all veterans were not included in the Senate bill but hopes

that at least World War II veterans will be able to receive the benefits of the Act.

Both the bills in the House and Senate extend the furnishing of automobiles to a few more amputees than were included in last year's legislation, and also to blind and paralyzed veterans.

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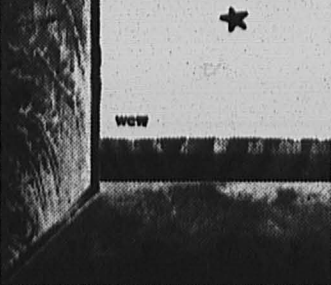

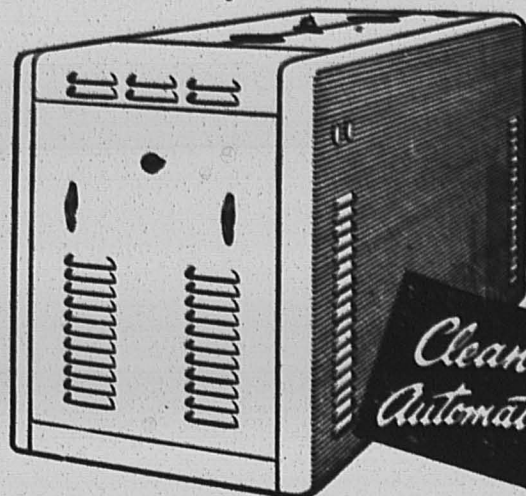

## REPORT FROM

Your Congressman  
FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

As this report is being prepared Congress is in the last few days of the present session. Several important bills have been passed since the last report of your Congressman, among which were the so-called Loyalty Bill and the Armed Forces Unification Bill. The former may not be passed by the Senate, but the conference report on the latter was passed by the House a few hours before this was written.

The Armed Forces Unification measure is designed to carry out several things your Congressman campaigned on when he first ran in the fall of 1945. If this bill becomes law, as it probably will, and is properly administered, it will do at least three necessary things, which your Congressman then advocated and had been advocating for sometime past. It will promote overall strategy planning, procurement and intelligence.

War is Waste. The War Assets Administration office in Philadelphia announced on July 3rd that electronics costing \$509,000 sold for about \$9,000.

One hour and a half before this report was written, your Congressman after some arduous work, was successful in having passed by the House, a bill which is important to both Pennsylvania and New Jersey, and he is hopeful that the bill will pass the Senate before the session closes. It is a bill granting the consent of Congress to an extension of the jurisdiction of the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission, south from its present limitation just north of the stone railroad bridge at Trenton, to the Burlington Mercer County line, if extended across the river, and also gives additional powers to the Commission to build bridges, rehabilitate old ones, acquire necessary approaches on both sides of the river, and do many things highly beneficial to the growing traffic across the Delaware River between the great States of New Jersey and Pennsylvania. The legislation was introduced as the result of a compact entered into by Governor Driscoll of New Jersey and Governor Duff of Pennsylvania, pursuant to legislative authority granted by the legislatures of both states.

As chairman of the Subcommittee on Compensation and Pensions of the Veterans Affairs Committee, your Congressman was successful in having reported favorably by the full Committee on Veterans Affairs, a half dozen bills for the benefit of disabled veterans and their dependents. One of these bills, liberalizing findings of service connection for tropical diseases, has been passed by the House. Should any of the bills fail of passage by Both Houses because of conditions existing at the end of a session, your Congressman has hopes that they can be passed at the next session.

## RESOLUTION NO. 171

Regulating Excavations in County Roads or Streets in the County of Burlington and Providing Penalties for the Violation Thereof.

Be it resolved by the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Burlington, as follows:

SECTION 1: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, or corporations, to make any excavation in, or upon, or in any way impair the surface of any improved county road or street in the County of Burlington, for the laying, replacing or repairing of any water, gas or sewer pipe, conduits or for the laying or replacing, repairing or changing of any track or tracks any trolley or for any other purpose, without a written permit being first had and obtained from the County Engineer.

SECTION 2: The application for such permit shall be made to the said County Engineer in writing, signed by the applicant, specifying the place, kind of excavation and the time required to make said opening and backfill for same.

SECTION 3: The applicant shall keep the excavation properly guarded at day and night and shall have lights placed thereon and there maintained throughout the performance of the work, and shall interfere with the travel of the road and shall be liable for the cost of the excavation and the cost of the backfilling of the excavation shall be performed by the party or parties making such opening or openings, in the following manner:

All material returned shall be deposited in layers not exceeding 10 inches in depth, and thoroughly compacted with tamper approved by the Engineer. No more than one excavation shall be made in the same place, and the material shall be deposited in a separate pile, kept clean and separated from other excavations, for use in replacing the roadway. The trench shall be filled, level and flush with the finished grade of the road adjacent to the opening.

SECTION 4: It shall be unlawful for any person to place any stone, earth, ash, boards, tile or other pipe or any other material in or upon any such road or street, so as to interfere with the flow of water along the gutter or gutters of any such road or street.

SECTION 5: That no permit shall be granted by the County Engineer until the applicant has paid to him the sum of \$50.00 in cash or certified check drawn to the order of the Treasurer of Burlington County, if

opening is to be made in bituminous concrete, bituminous macadam, sheet asphalt, brick or concrete surfaces and \$25.00 if opening is to be made in macadam or gravel road or street treated with bituminous dressing and for opening earth shoulder of road, from which deposit the cost of the work will be deducted as herein prescribed, and the remainder refunded to the owner upon completion and acceptance of the work by the County Engineer. The charges will be as follows: The sum of \$10.00 for each opening in any macadam or gravel road or street treated with bituminous dressing, for each additional square yard, \$2.50. \$15.00 for each opening in any road or street paved with bituminous concrete, bituminous macadam, sheet asphalt, brick or concrete surfaces and for each additional square yard, a charge of \$7.50. In cases where it is found necessary to open the earth shoulder of any road, the sum of \$5 will be charged for each opening; said opening not to exceed two square yards. For each additional square yard, \$1.00 will be charged. Said fee shall cover the cost for making the necessary repairs to the road surface by the Supervisor of Roads.

When it is deemed unnecessary by the County Engineer to excavate by breaking the surface of the road and the result can be obtained by driving pipes under the road, the same deposit must be made but no extra charge will be deducted from the deposit.

No excavation or driving under the road will be allowed to be done in sheet asphalt, bituminous concrete, bituminous macadam, brick or concrete surfaces except in the presence of the County Engineer or his authorized agent. Expenses for this inspection will be deducted from the amount deposited in addition to the amount chargeable per square yard.

SECTION 6: Any person or persons, or corporations, who shall violate any of the provisions of this resolution, shall be subject to imprisonment in the County Jail for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days or by a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200.00), or both.

SECTION 7: All resolutions or parts or resolutions inconsistent with the provisions of this resolution be and the same are hereby repealed, and this resolution shall become effective immediately after publication as provided by law.
