## REPORT FROM Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

This will be the last report for the first session of the Eightieth Congress — unless something unforeseen calls us back before January.

We can now appraise the work of this session. In doing so, remember that the great accomplishments were made under most difficult circumstances. It was the first time in many years the Republicans have had control. They had to organize their own Party. Then they had to reorganize the whole Congress under the Reorganization Act passed in 1946. The opposing Party was in the White House and in all the innumerable bureaus and offices of the Executive Department, which makes up by far the greatest part of the Federal government. Every effort, every angle of propaganda, every political and parliamentary trick was invoked to defeat the carrying out of the pledges of the Republican Party.

Those pledges were to pass legislation reasonable and fair to workingmen, whether or not they belonged to unions, to employers and to the public, without damaging unions or the reasonable right to strike; to cut down Federal expenditures; to reduce taxation; to get rid of unnecessary controls brought about by war conditions.

In spite of propaganda to the contrary, the first objective was accomplished. The legislation is not perfect, and nobody claims it is. When defects show up they can and will be remedied. But it is a long step forward.

Federal expenditures have been reduced enormously. The next session will do even more. The President insisted upon 37 billions of your money to spend. He did not get it or anything near it. But he and his henchmen in Congress certainly did their best.

The intense effort by the Congress, particularly the House, to give the people needed and deserved tax reduction is a matter of history. Twice we passed the legislation. Twice the President vetoed it. Twice we almost passed it over his veto. The second time the House succeeded, but the Senate did not. The blame rests squarely upon the President. He is solid on the New Deal spending philosophy.

Innumerable irritating Federal controls due to the war have been eliminated. As an example, one bill repealed almost a thousand such acts. Your Congressman voted for this bill with great joy.

Just the reverse of the Democratic economy drive in 1933, all the present economies were accomplished without reduction in benefits heretofore veterans. In fact, some benefits were added. Our veterans now have more benefits than any veterans of any war of any country at any time in the history of the world.

Your Congressman is proud to have had a small part in this great job.

Personally, he has a few things he would like to tell you about with satisfaction.

Thousands and thousands of bills are introduced into Congress each session. The large majority of them never get out of Committee. Your Congressman introduced 16 bills. Two were almost identical, one being for the purpose of making a slight change in the other. That leaves 15. Five of these were introduced simply by request, which leaves 10 that were his own.

Of these 10 bills, two passed both the House and Senate and will become law upon the President's signature. Two more passed the House

## TRAFFIC DEATHS DROP

Traffic accident fatalities in New Jersey at the end of the first six months were 17 per cent below the deaths in the corresponding months of last year, Motor Vehicle Commissioner Arthur W. Magee reported recently.

This year's total was 285 as against 342 last year, a saving of 57 lives.

While highly pleased with the impressive improvement, Commissioner Magee cautioned that there has been no perceptible change in the leading causes of accidents. He urged that motorists take notice of these leading causes which he said were:

Violated right of way (of motorist and pedestrian)  
Following too closely.  
On wrong side of road.  
Speeding.  
Improper training.

and are now in the Senate. One more was embodied in a bill containing other provisions by the Committee to which it was referred, and this bill failed of passage solely because of the other provisions. That leaves five. Of these, three were reported out of Committee favorably but did not reach the floor of the House, so they still have a chance for action at the next session. Only two of your Congressman's bills did not get out of Committee.

From January 3rd to July 28th, 5,579 letters were signed and sent out by your Congressman. There were 133 roll calls in the House. Your Congressman answered 131 of them. The other two were on the same day, June 16th, when he was away from Washington on official business as a member of the Princeton Bicentennial Commission of Congress. He has not discovered how to be in two places at the same time.

Your Congressman extends his sincere thanks to the editor of this newspaper for the public service he has rendered in giving you these weekly reports. If you think they are valuable, the editor will appreciate hearing so.

So your Congressman takes his turn and says—write your editor!

## REQUEST BY LEWIS

Senator Arthur W. Lewis has invited the people of Burlington County to review the comprehensive report of the constitutional convention's legislative committee, of which he is vice chairman, and to submit any proposals for amendments by Monday, August 11th. The convention will probably meet at New Brunswick on that day to receive amendments.

Debate on the various committee reports is contemplated to begin next Wednesday, Senator Lewis added, with the tentative order as follows: executive, legislative, judicial, Bill of Rights and taxation. The Senator indicated he will report to the people of Burlington County on important phases of other reports from time to time.

"I am anxious that every resident of the County shall know exactly what is being done in New Brunswick," he said. "Further, I want all citizens to feel free to send any criticisms or suggestions to their delegates. Proposed amendments should be forwarded at once, for they are to be submitted at the convention next Monday."

Senator Lewis said that he heartily approves the plan advanced to streamline the function of the Legislature and increase the efficiency of its operations.

"We are recommending more opportunity for study of bills before they are acted upon," he pointed out. "We are acting to strengthen home rules for counties and municipalities and minimize mandatory legislation. It should be possible for a majority of legislators to bring about a special session, instead of the sole authority for the call resting with the executive."

"It is agreed almost without exception, I think, that the terms and compensation set up for legislators in an earlier century are inadequate today. We are recommending four-year terms for Senators and two-year terms for Assemblymen, to be elected between National elections. We urge that the question of salary be left to legislative enactment rather than constitutional mandate."

"The present prohibition against members of the Legislature accepting appointments while members, would be broadened to bar such appointments during the term for which they were elected. Appointive power of the Legislature to executive and administrative offices would be curtailed."

"Our recommendations to the Legislature for consideration of bills on subjects which we feel should not be made part of the constitution include regulation and curtailment of lobbying, and provision for periodic revision of the statutory law."

Senator Lewis said he will issue a public statement on other sections of the committee report, including the controversial gambling question, after he has completed a study he now is making into all phases of this subject.

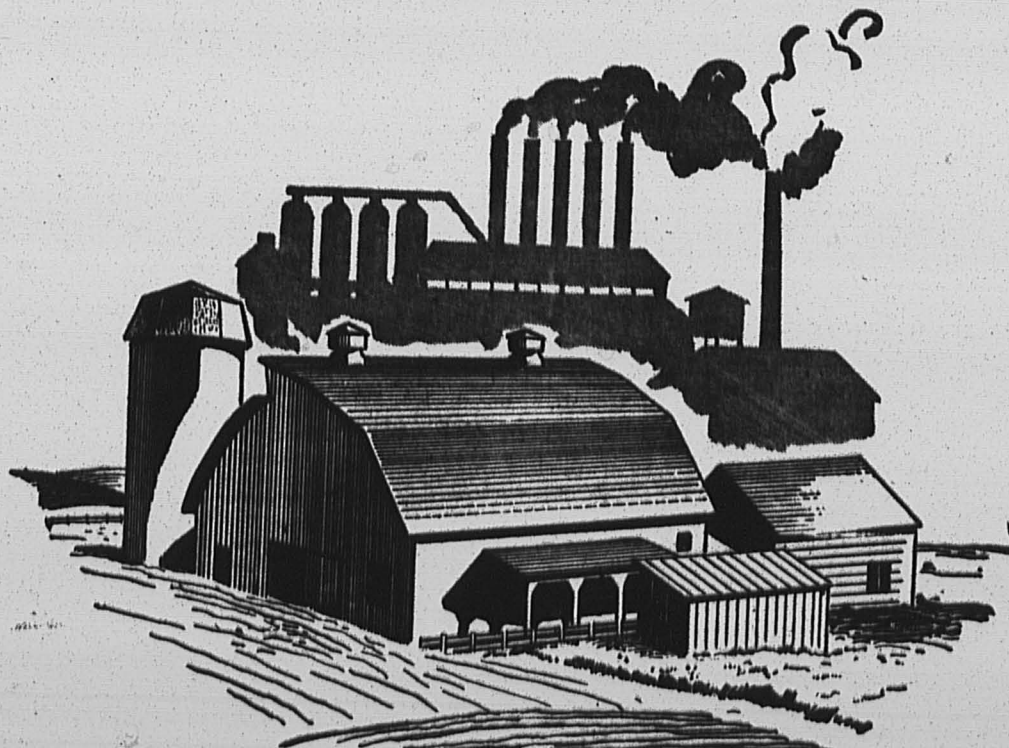

**RESOLUTION NO. 171**  
Regulating Excavations in County Roads or Streets in the County of Burlington and Providing Penalties for the Violation Thereof.

Be it resolved by the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Burlington, as follows:

**SECTION 1:** That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, or corporations, to make any excavation in, or tear up, or in any way make the surface of any improved county road or street in the County of Burlington, or the laying, replacing or repairing of any water, gas or sewer pipe, or for making any drain, laying, telephone conduit, or for any other purpose, without a written permit being first had and obtained from the County Engineer.

**SECTION 2:** The application for such permit shall be made to the said County Engineer in writing, signed by the applicant, specifying the place, kind of excavation and the time required to make said opening and backfill for same.

**SECTION 3:** The applicant shall keep the excavation properly guarded at day and night and shall have lights placed thereon and there maintained throughout the performance of the work, and shall interfere as little as possible with travel along said street or road and no greater part of any street or road shall be opened than shall be allowed by the County Engineer. The backfilling of trenches shall be performed by the party or parties making such opening or openings, in the following manner:

All material returned shall be deposited in layers not exceeding 10 inches in depth, and thoroughly rammed with tamper, approved by the Engineer. No more than one shovelful will be allowed to two rammed shovelfuls of material.

**SECTION 4:** It shall be unlawful for any person to place any stone, earth, ashes, house or other refuse or any other material in or upon any such road or street, so as to interfere with the flow of water along the gutter or gutters of any such road or street.

**SECTION 5:** That no permit shall be granted by the County Engineer until the applicant has paid to him the sum of \$50.00 in cash or certified check drawn to the order of the Treasurer of Burlington County, if

opening is to be made in bituminous concrete, bituminous macadam, sheet asphalt, brick or concrete surfaces and \$25.00 if opening is to be made in macadam or gravel road or street treated with bituminous dress, and for opening earth shoulder of road, and for depositing the cost of the work will be deducted as herein prescribed, and the remainder returned to the owner upon completion and acceptance of the work by the County Engineer. The charges will be as follows: The sum of \$10.00 for each opening in any macadam or gravel road or street treated with bituminous dressing, for each opening in any road or street paved with bituminous concrete, bituminous macadam, sheet asphalt, brick or concrete surfaces and for each additional square yard, a charge of \$7.50. In cases where it is found necessary to open only the earth shoulder of any road, the sum of \$5 will be charged for each opening; said opening not to exceed two square yards. For each additional square yard, \$5.00 will be charged. Said fee shall cover the cost for making the necessary repairs to the road surface by the Supervisor of Roads.

When it is deemed unnecessary by the County Engineer to excavate by breaking the surface of the road and the result can be obtained by driving pipes under the road, the same deposit must be made but no extra charge will be deducted from the deposit.

No excavation or driving under the road will be allowed to be done in sheet asphalt, bituminous concrete, bituminous macadam, brick or concrete surfaces except in the presence of the County Engineer or his authorized agent. Expenses for this inspection will be deducted from the amount deposited, in addition to the amount chargeable per square yard.

**SECTION 6:** Any person or persons, or corporations, who shall violate any of the provisions of this resolution he and the same are hereby fined, and this resolution shall become effective immediately after publication as provided by law.

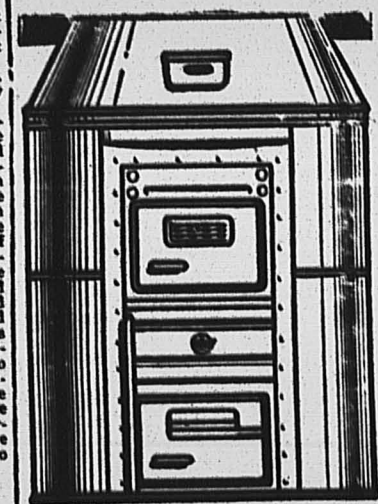

## MUCH BUILDING IN CINNAMINSON

At the meeting of the Cinnaminson Township Committee held on Tuesday night of this week, William F. Kennard, building inspector, reported that permits had been issued for 10 projects during the past month, the total amount of construction being \$17,775. He also stated that construction during the first seven months of the current year amounted to \$183,775.

A report was received from U. S. Army Engineers office which stated that repairs to the dikes in East Riverton and grading low areas would cost about \$2,200. The Township will endeavor to secure Federal flood control funds to finance the work. The bad condition in that section of the community has existed for several years since the dikes have been broken.

A special meeting of the committee will be held Tuesday night to act on a proposed ordinance regarding curbing certain sections of Warrenton and Park avenues. The matter of the need for a plumbing code and sanitary inspector was discussed at length and action taken toward solution of this problem.

The question of zoning, especially along Route 25, was considered and will be discussed more fully in the near future.

At the regular August meeting of the Board of Education the following resignations were received: Meyer Millman, commercial teacher, resigned to accept a position in Baldwin High School on Long Island; George M. Dare, head of the commercial department, resigned to accept the position as High School Principal at Bordentown. Mrs. Jeanette U. Line, recently elected Girl's Physical Education teacher, resigned because of ill health.

To fill the existing vacancies the following persons were elected: Miss Margaret A. Haines, Palmyra, graduate of Trenton State Teachers College, taught last year at Oaklyn Junior High School, to fill one of the two vacancies in the commercial department. Miss Cathleen A. Winkler, of Camden, who taught the last two years in Woodbury, was elected to the full-time kindergarten position. Miss Winkler is a graduate of the Ilman Carter Kindergarten School of the University of Pennsylvania and of Glassboro State Teachers College.

For the third section of kindergarten Mrs. Lillian C. Griffenburgh of Palmyra, was appointed. Mrs. Griffenburgh taught in the Palmyra kindergarten for eight years and in Upper Darby for one year.

## BRaille WRITER

On display in the window of Tony's Beauty Salon on Broad Street in Palmyra, is a new Braille Pocket Braille Writer. The distributor of this machine is a major project of the Palmyra-Riverton Lions Club's Blind Aid Program.

The writer is a speed writer weighing but eighteen ounces, and capable of recording dictation at the rate of 40 words per minute. It is so compact that it will slip into a man's coat pocket or can be carried without difficulty in a woman's purse. Invented by Dr. Alfred E. Banks of San Diego, who labored for twelve years in perfecting his machine, the writer promises to be indispensable to every blind person and is hailed as the greatest advancement for blind persons since the invention of the Braille system.

Dr. Banks has turned his invention over to the San Diego Lions Club for distribution with the stipulation that the machine would be sold through individual Lions Clubs at a cost that every blind person could afford—the cost to any one blind person not to exceed more than \$5.00. The writer is manufactured by the International Business Machine Corporation, and through the co-operation of Thomas J. Watson, president of International Business Machine Corporation, the first one thousand machines made will be distributed free to Veterans of World War II as the company's own contribution.

The estimated price of the machine is \$18.00 which will necessitate a \$18.00 underwriting by the Lions Club concerned on each machine sold. This is, therefore, one of the reasons for the establishment of a Blind Aid Fund by the Tri-Borough Lions Club, to which many citizens of the communities contributed so generously in the drive for funds last spring.

Distribution of the writer will be handled exclusively through Lions Clubs and any blind person wishing to procure one of these machines may do so by contacting Charles W. Bartholomew of 704 Washington avenue, Palmyra, chairman of the Blind Aid Committee, or any Lions Club member.

## NATIONAL BLOOD PROGRAM OF AMERICAN RED CROSS

The great values of blood transfusions in the saving of lives have long been known. Transfusions were given to a limited extent in World War I for combating hemorrhage and shock in the American Expeditionary Forces. The knowledge of the use of blood then available was by no means comparable to that which exists today about the miracle of blood.

Between the World Wars a number of notable contributions were made to collection, preservation and administration of blood were discovered. Diseases became revealed. Discovery that plasma could be dried to a powder and dissolved in water when needed was in itself a great advance because of the ease with which it could be stored, transported and used in emergencies wherever they might occur.

In World War II our Government called upon the American Red Cross as the logical agency to procure the blood that proved to be one of the foremost life savers of the war. No greater opportunity was ever afforded than that of supplying the needs, badly needed, blood. This wartime program was a spectacular success. A great factor in its success was the spirit engendered by the Red Cross in the hearts and minds of the people of this country; a spirit that moved them to give freely of themselves so that the sick and wounded of their Armed Forces might survive. Thousands live today because of the people everywhere.

## BIDS RECEIVED FOR APARTMENT HOUSE

At a special meeting of Riverton Borough Council on Thursday night of last week, bids were received for the proposed apartment house which is to be built under the State Veterans Emergency Housing Act.

The lowest estimate was somewhat over the amount available for the project and further consideration of the matter was necessary before a contract could be awarded. This will probably be settled at the meeting of the governing body to be held this (Thursday) evening.

According to the bids submitted the project can be completed in 115 days after the awarding of the contract.

## About the Constitution

Arthur W. Lewis, State Senator from Burlington county, said he would urge the constitutional convention to protect the proposed new charter from "starting off under the handicap of public disrepute" which he said is inevitable if the present provision for requiring assessments at true value is retained.

"Any system of taxation that seeks to impose a rate of 5 1/2% upon property yielding less is both unfair and impractical and must be changed," said the Senator, delegate from Burlington County.

"The present insistence upon true value penalties home owners and investors alike. It seems to me the height of absurdity to say that local tax rates in New Jersey—the state wide average is \$5.65—must be applied against the full value of real and personal property when rare indeed is the property that yields such a return.

"To keep such an unreasonable, outdated provision in the new constitution seems like subjecting it to conditions that are bound to break down confidence in the fundamental law of the State. It is starting off under the handicap of public disrepute, because people know the true value requirement is not uniformly applied.

"Yet the constitution provides in effect that assessment for tax purposes not only on homes and other real estate but furnishings and other personal property such as stocks, bonds, securities, and investments generally must be taxed at full value. With local tax rates ranging anywhere from \$3.00 to \$12.00, compliance with such a constitutional provision would mean property may be taxable at several times its maximum yield. That should be outright confiscation. To say that the legislature shall remedy the situation is meaningless as the legislature has not seen fit to do so in the past, what assurance is there that a remedy from that source is forthcoming in the future.

"We know as a matter of fact that the constitutional mandate is not followed. Therefore, its effect is immediately to make assessors violators of the constitution, and to virtually exempt from taxation a large tax potential of personality because it is ridiculous to follow the constitution's fetish for true value all of which results in some property not being taxed at all, and imposing a back-breaking burden upon real estate, which often is assessed at full worth.

"As a result of all this, the individual family, whether owner or tenant, is compelled to bear disproportionate share of the local tax cost. Thus we find 80% of the cost of local government in New Jersey borne by real estate, against a national average of 60%, while the per capita average property tax on New Jersey residents is \$80.00 compared to a national figure of \$40.00. "I would like to see the taxation committee report favorably upon the proposal to eliminate true value as a tax criterion, as suggested by such groups as the Princeton Surveys, the New Jersey Association of Real

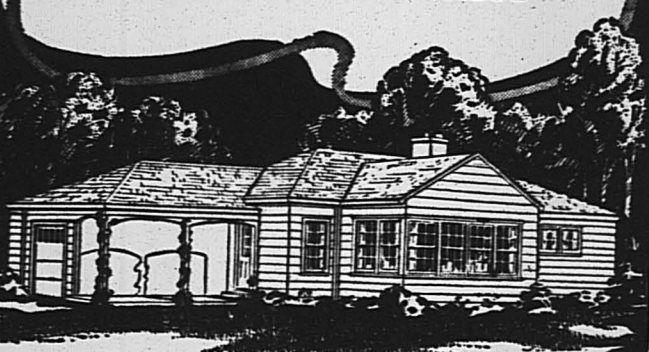

SQUASH, says Webster's dictionary, is the act of crushing some substance to a pulp, the sudden fall of a soft body, a game played with a racket and ball, or a large yellow fruit growing on a vine.

Summer squash, a vitamin and mineral filled vegetable native to the gourd family, comes in 77 varieties and 14 different types. A cook with an eye for squash can select from this array any color, size or shape she wants. They run in size from a few ounces to over a hundred pounds for the kind used in canning; colors range from white to orange and in shape they run from pan-cake style to elongated growths with twisted necks.

According to the A & P Service for Home-Makers, the summer types, technically known as Zucchini, in excellent when fried, boiled and covered with a tasty sauce, or baked Italian-style and served with a garish of tomatoes and grated cheese. The crooknecked or vegetable marrow type of squash is most welcome at the table when mashed, and its delicate flavor is given an added touch by a careful dash of seasoning.

Winter squash, as a rule, is larger in size and firmer in flesh. It is serviceable all through the winter and, if taken before the frost has touched it, will keep well in a warm dry place. Its food value is also high as it contains many carbohydrates and a large percentage of protein.

It is from this branch of the squash family that we receive the filling for our delicious pies. To add an extra touch of flavor to a delicious Sunday dinner, try baked yellow squash with roast beef, green beans, sweet corn on the cob, a crisp vegetable salad, and for dessert, chilled watermelon slices and a beverage.

## Plan Wiring System For Adequacy With Future Requirements in Mind

Planning a farm wiring system which will meet requirements necessary for the efficient and economical operation of electrical production equipment today—and tomorrow—should not be difficult provided certain basic principles are followed. According to the recently issued Handbook of Farmstead Wiring Design, a properly wired farmstead



must (1) have a service entrance of correct size; enough circuits, each with the proper wire size; heavy-duty circuits for range, water heater and larger motors, and sufficient outlets and switches. (2) be designed so that it can be expanded easily and economically to take care of currently

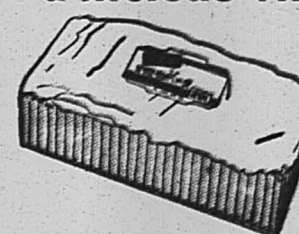

## STANDARD OIL NOT TO INCREASE PRICES

Mr. Gordon D. Donald, Division Sales Manager of New Jersey, for the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, in response to questions, said today: "In the past few weeks a number of other oil companies in this area have increased the prices of their products, but Standard of New Jersey has not increased prices to either our dealers or consumers. This situation has resulted in some confusion on the part of the public regarding the 'hold-the-line' policy of my Company. To clarify the situation, I should like to quote from a statement recently made by R. N. Keppel, Vice President in charge of Marketing, in which he said: 'My Company has not increased prices in the areas where other oil com-

panies have recently announced price increases and we are continuing to maintain the hold-the-line price policy announced by us on July 24."

In the policy referred to, it was stated, "Standard Oil Company of New Jersey believes so strongly that further increases in the price of crude oil or products under present conditions are not in the best interests of either the oil industry or the public, that it is following the general policy of not increasing prices unless such increases will tend to maintain or bring out additional supplies."

Mr. Donald said, "The Standard Oil Company of New Jersey has not increased the price of gasoline to retail dealers or commercial consumers, nor has it increased the price of fuel oil to household customers. In short, it has not increased any prices since July 24." He pointed out that, "Our Company does not establish the retail price of gasoline at the service station pump, but this price is set by the independent dealers who sell our products to the public."

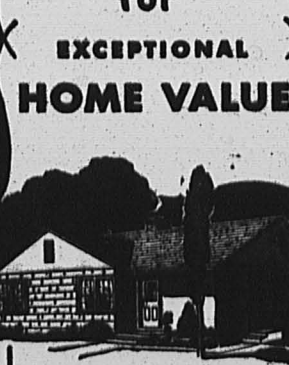

## SUNDAY DINNER Suggestions

According to the A & P Service for Home-Makers, one of the greatest assets to be added to any summertime meal is a dessert made from fine fresh fruit.

Here's a summertime pie filling which should satisfy the family sweet tooth. Red cherries, fresh strawberries, a dash of rhubarb, juicy sections of orange and a trace of lemon. Bake in a light fluffy crust and top with smooth chilled whipped cream.

Why not try floating island? Make it with a chilled custard base teamed up with sliced fresh peaches. On top, more sliced peaches and whipped cream.

A real party ending for a summertime meal is peach upside down cake. The knack involved in making this cake is the proper pouring over full-flavored peach halves, centered with red cherries, well mixed butter-cake batter. After baking, cut the cake into squares and serve on dessert plates.

Not to be neglected in any menu of summertime desserts, and a real menu highlight, is fruit-flavored ice cream. For best results when making fruit-flavored ice cream, grind the fruit well before adding it to the custard base, and then allow the mixture to stand for several hours until the fruit flavor is fully blended. Slow freezing is desirable too in order that the ice cream may have a much desired, creamy texture.

For a delicious hot weather Sunday dinner, try pieces of crisp fried chicken with potato salad, allied tomatoes, celery stalks, and on the side a big pitcher of iced tea topped up with a dash of lemon juice and a sprig of mint. For dessert, what could be finer than homemade fresh peach ice cream?

## LIONS AID BLIND

Vincent J. Varsaci, of 320 Walnut street, Delanco, became the first blind veteran in South Jersey to receive one of the new Braille Pocket Writers. Through the auspices of the Palmyra-Riverton Lions Club, "Jim" Varsaci, a veteran of the 88th Division, who lost his sight as a result of a mine explosion in Italy, was the recipient of the Braille Writer at a ceremony held at the Lions Club's weekly dinner meeting last Thursday evening.

The presentation was made by Charles Bartholomew chairman of the Lions Club Blind Aid Committee. The writer was obtained through the efforts of William Cooper, the Club's secretary, and is one of a thousand to be given free to blind veterans through the co-operation of the International Business Machines Company in the Lions Clubs program to supply the Braille Writer to the blind at a cost so low as to make them available to all who have need for or want the machine.

Mr. Varsaci spoke briefly upon the Army's Rehabilitation Program for blind veterans now being conducted at New Britain, Connecticut, where veterans are taught to read Braille and to adjust themselves to their handicap.

The Lions Club had as its speaker for this occasion Joe Perry of Pennsauken. Mr. Perry, blind since birth, and recent recipient of a Braille Writer himself, demonstrated its use and outlined its advantages and importance to the blind. The speaker gave a brief history of the Braille now in use, the cumbersome Braille Slate (now rendered obsolete by the new Braille Writer), and the printing of books for the blind.

Mr. Perry is at present a student at the University of Pennsylvania, where he is taking the five year Visual Handicap Course, in contemplation of a Masters Degree and future work in placement service for the blind.

Mr. John Burhoe, of Seymour, Connecticut, brother of the groom served as best man and Mrs. John M. Burhoe was matron of honor for the bride.

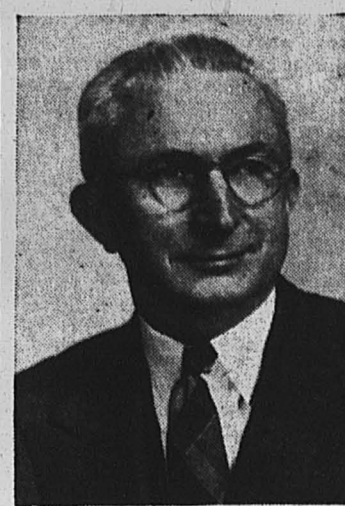

Last Saturday evening Riverton police received four calls almost simultaneously reporting that a riot was in progress on Main street near the library.

Sergeant John Robinson and Officer Ray Bowers responded and found a lively fight in progress between several men. Upon sighting the officers, four of the contenders immediately jumped into a car and drove south on Main street, despite orders to halt and two shots fired by Robinson into the air.

The occasion resulted in this salute and stopped to take appropriate measures, whereupon the hurlers departed in haste toward Riverton. ### POLICE DEPT. PRAISED

The following are the contents of a letter addressed to the editor and signed by Edward W. Curtis, Jr., 308 Main street, Riverton:

"The subject of this might be 'Peaches at \$1.00 each' but more properly has to do with our Riverton Police Department.

"Riverton police, headed by Sgt. Robinson and assisted by Officer Bowers put the bite on four frisky lads from Philadelphia who were looking over peach orchards hereabouts last Saturday night. They apparently liked Taylor's Orchard and were taking on cargo when interrupted by voices from another automobile politely inviting them to desist. The reply was a barrage of very hard and green peaches and a run for the open road, on which they were immediately pursued. However they continued the assault from the rumble seat inflicting injury on one of the men in the pursuing car—a gashed chin that required four stitches to close. This could have been very serious as his passengers consisted of two men, their wives and three children. Had a good shot found the driver it could have resulted in the car going off the road.

## Building Discussed

Oren Thomas, member of the Camden Rotary Club and a registered architect, was the speaker at last Thursday's meeting of the local Rotary Club, and his topic concerned the present day housing situation.

Mr. Thomas pointed out it is true that housing costs increased materially, but in looking over the statistics they clearly show that some housing prices have increased over 1939 by 77% while in other types of construction, such as industrial work, prices have increased only 44%.

The reason for this differential is the demand that has been created for small type homes. In addition to the demand for homes, the antiquated building codes have contributed in part to high cost of building. Homes are still more or less custom made. They have not been streamlined on a production basis such as other industries and, consequently more men are needed which will ultimately raise the price.

Mr. Thomas felt very strongly that more research on home building was needed. He pointed out that architectural design had not changed much in the past 50 years on most of the residential type homes. There are three reasons for this: architectural backwardness, lack of research, people themselves.

By and large the people do pick the type of house they want, which is not like the articles which are mass produced such as refrigerators, automobiles, etc., where the buying public has little to say about the type of design they receive. People also have a certain sentimentality toward homes, which tends to increase prices. Mr. Thomas pointed out that less than 15% of the homes today are supervised by architects, and in this respect both the architects and the public are to blame.

Certain predictions were made by Mr. Thomas on homes in the future and these, in brief, are: homes in the future, for the most part, will face north without regard to the position it faces on the lot; homes will be placed back farther on the lot to get away from street noise. The south side of the house will probably be all glass; two-story houses will probably disappear; the porch or its equivalent will probably come back, and there will be a terrific advance in prefabrication as well as radiant wall heating.

They handle traffic excellently, are always courteous and co-operative. "This was a grand display of how our P. D. functions. We had a good audience, but it is too bad the Mayor and Borough Council missed it. "Congratulations to Chief Gootee and all his men."

**BE IT ORDAINED** by the Township Committee of The Township of Cinnaminson in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

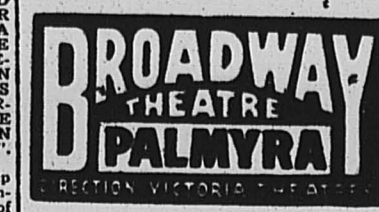

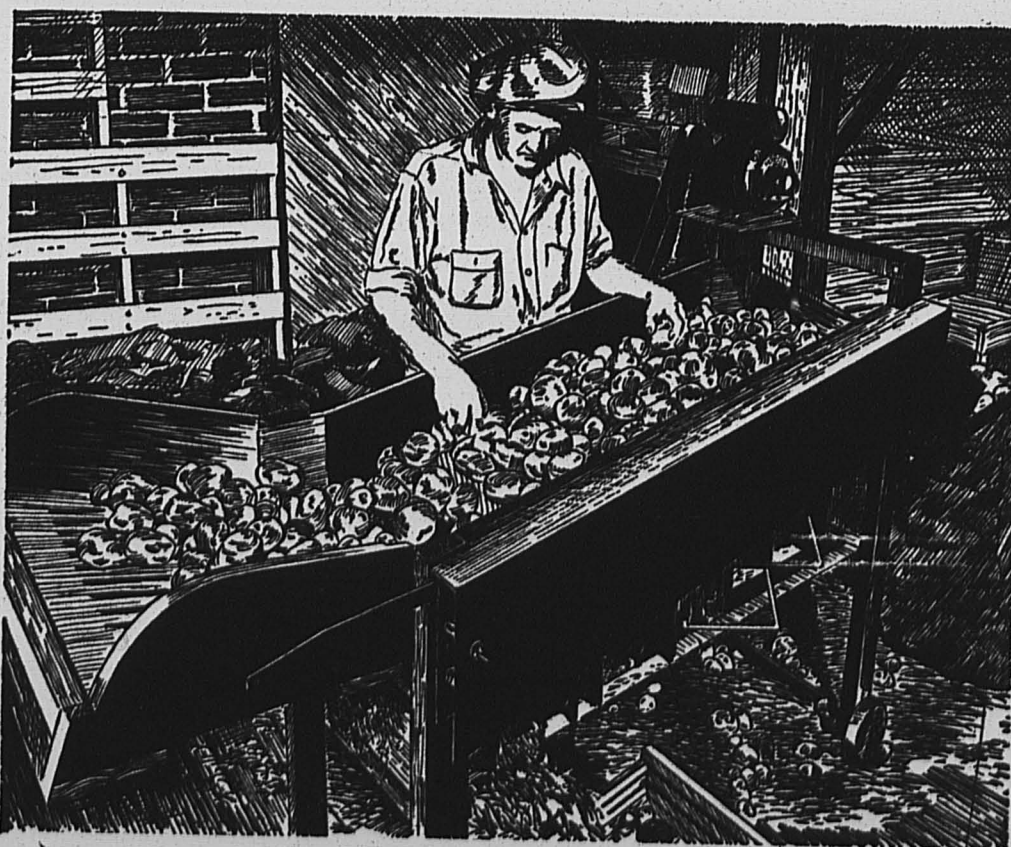

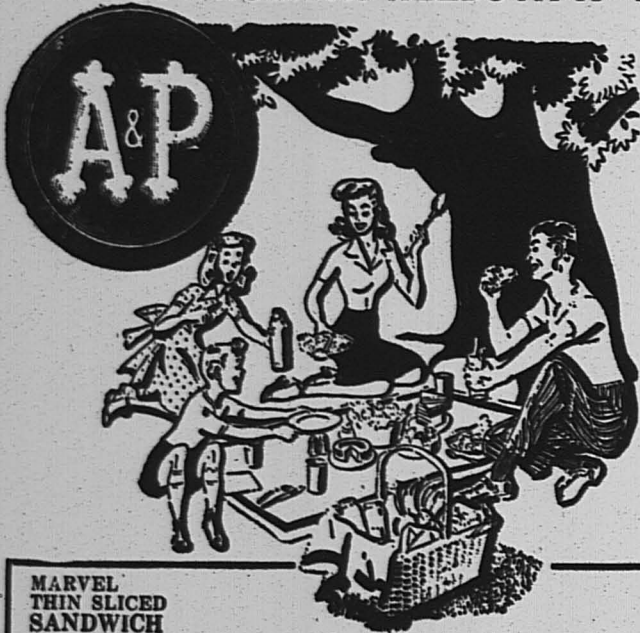

SUNDAY DINNER  
Suggestions

TURKEY, once enjoyed only at Thanksgiving, has now won a year-round place on the nation's dinner table. There is no longer any season of the year when the birds are unavailable, both Toms and hens being found in good supply at the present time, reasonably priced.

As American as baseball, turkeys were running wild when the Pilgrims arrived on these shores. They became a feature of the first Thanksgiving dinner and have since become a symbol of that day.

According to the A & P Service for Home-Makers, the present day turkey, much improved by generations of scientific breeding, rates among the seven basic foods because of its nutritive value.

When selecting a turkey, judge the size by the number of people to be served, measure on a pound for each person per meal.

There is only a slight difference in taste between Tom and hen turkeys, most people favoring the Tom. There is, however, a big difference in weight. Toms usually tipping the scales at better than 15 pounds, while hens run from 8 to 15 pounds.

When roasting a gobble weighing 14 pounds or less, take about three and one half hours to do the job, at an oven heat of 325 degrees.

Most people roast a turkey, but this is by no means the only way to prepare it. Old gobbles are best when braised, and young birds are delicious if broiled or pan-fried like chicken. The meat of the turkey is delicious when used in salads and when sliced cold it rates at the top of the list as a mainstay for hot-weather meals.

Roast stuffed turkey, mashed potatoes, fresh sweet corn on the cob and lima beans topped off by a fresh fruit dessert and a beverage, make an excellent Sunday dinner.

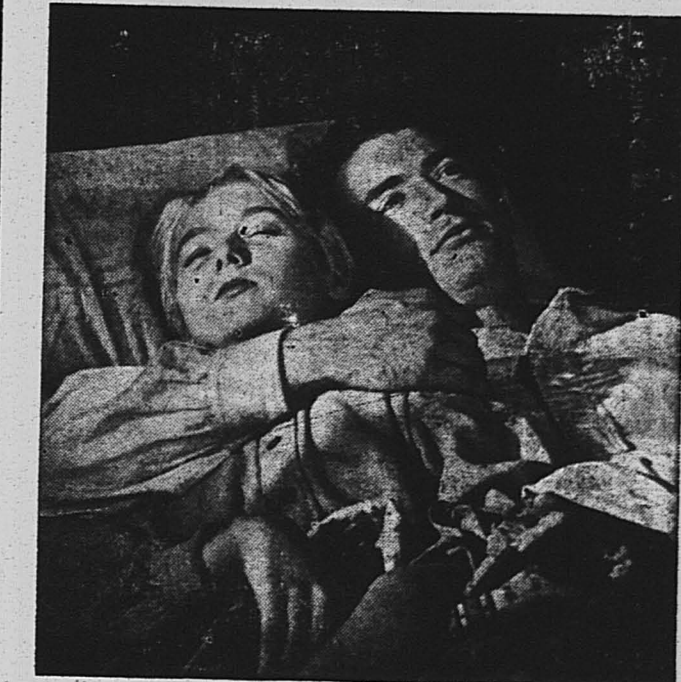

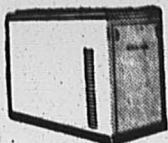
