Report from Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

This week let's take up the first point of the President's speech of November 17th, merely because he took it up first. He had the cart before the horse, because more spending in foreign countries, whether necessary or foolish, makes for more inflation.

That first point was to spend approximately 600 million dollars for food and materials, some of which are to be used in the growing of food to carry several countries over the winter months.

We shall defer discussion of the long range ambitions of the President until a later date, probably during the regular session.

Your Congressman voted for the foreign food relief bill last spring. He even voted against reduction in the amount. He believed that the American people want to help starving people throughout the world to the best of their ability, because we cannot live in safety and prosperity with other peoples in dire need. On the other hand, he believes that we can no more live in safety and prosperity if we waste our own substance trying to feed the entire world from now on, or for some indefinite period.

Your Congressman voted against certain other deceitful and wasteful expenditures of your money, and although his vote was over-riden, it now has been proven that these expenditures were exactly what your Congressman then thought them to be, and have increased the inflation that frightens the President.

The problem is not so simple as just voting away your money. A plan must be formulated and carried out whereby whatever is given will go to the right sources, in the right method, to obtain the right results. This is a most difficult problem, and it is made even more difficult by the policy, or lack of policy, of the Administration in the past.

A look at a bit of the record will demonstrate.

One of the claimed objectives of the whole alleged program of the Administration is to stop Communism.

From January to September of this very year (1947), Communist Russia received from us \$16,100,000 worth of lend lease, \$32,000,000 through U.N.R.R.A. and \$1,900,000 from private sources, or a total of \$49,900,000. During the same period, we exported to Russia \$114,000,000 and imported from her \$59,000,000, or a balance of \$55,000,000 additional in favor of exports to Russia. And the President says within the last few days that we should continue this amiable trade with the Communists, even while he continually asks us to spend billions elsewhere in a "cold war" to stop Communism.

Now, let's take a look at some of the stuff we gave for what we got. In general the commodities we shipped to Russia were food stuffs and textiles; materials and manufactures (\$15,000,000, when we were very short ourselves); machinery and vehicles (\$20,600,000, when you know our own shortages of these), including electric machines, industrial machinery, tractors and parts, motor trucks, busses and chassis, flat cars and merchant vessels.

Now, here is the pay off. Your Congressman tried to get a demonstrated flight of Army planes for the Flying Farmers of New Jersey for an affair at Robbinsville Airport on October 12, 1947, and received a telegram from the Commander at Andrews Field stating that it would be impossible "due to critical fuel shortage." And petroleum products shipped to Russia between January and September of this year amount-

Country Club License

After an all-day hearing last Tuesday, Vice Chancellor Woodruff took under advisement the petition of the Riverton Country Club to set aside an ancient deed restriction concerning the sale of alcoholic beverages on the club property.

The club was granted a license, after due legal steps had been taken, by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission last February, but has never sold such beverages because of the fact that club officials had learned the heirs of former owners considered asking the courts for forfeiture of title if such sale were made.

The club, therefore, requested the court to set aside such restrictions, claiming that alcoholic beverages had been sold since 1932 and that such a situation was common knowledge throughout the community. Joseph Beck Tyler, club attorney, stated that no action had been taken by the defendants until 1947, they having waited 15 years to make their objections known.

Charles M. Richman, Camden attorney, who represented the defendants, questioned Mrs. Elsie Thomas, Route 25, Cinnaminson, who stated emphatically that she did not know that alcoholic beverages had been sold at the club, had no knowledge of a previous application (under different ownership) nor had she read or heard of the various newspaper accounts leading up to granting of the present license.

ed to \$2,800,000! Now there is a report that the Administration wants to put you on gasoline rationing again.

And what did we get from Russia? A half million dollars worth of caviar (sturgeon roe), crab meat, sausage casings, fancy furs, licorice root, diamonds, platinum and platinum products. Fortunately, we did get some manganese ore and chrome ore.

Your Congressman is not against reasonable assistance to war devastated countries, but such assistance must be of such character as to serve the interests of the American people in the long run and not exactly the opposite. What he protests and has been protesting vehemently is the policy which spends your money to support Communism on one hand and fight against it on the other.

Mr. Barclay also requests all collectors to make their reports by the end of this week at the latest.

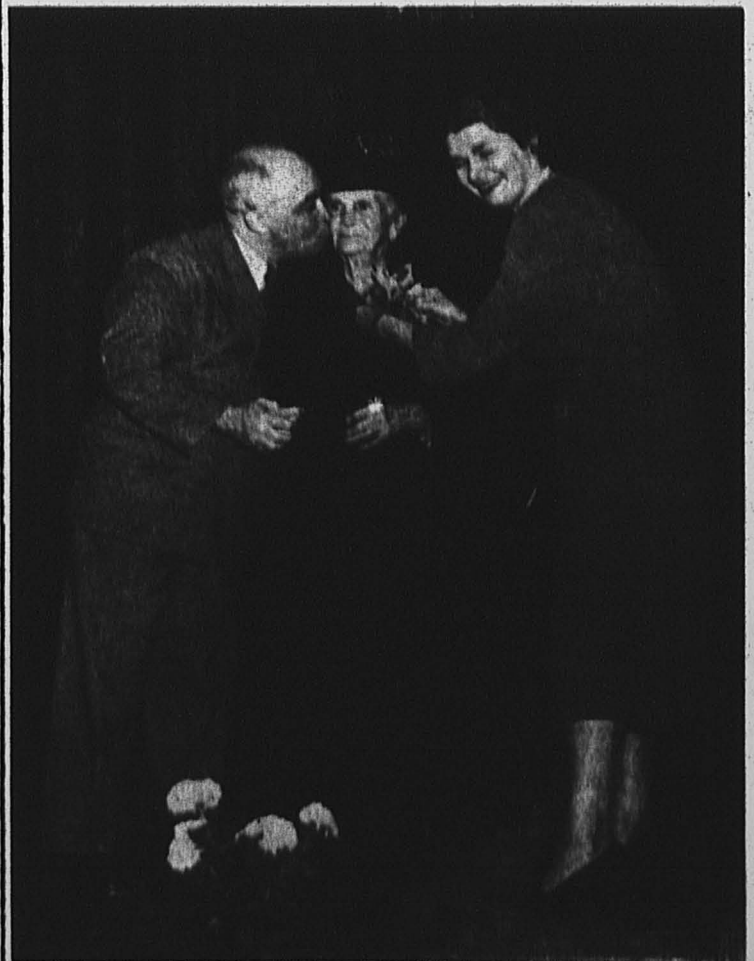

SUNDAY DINNER Suggestions

IF YOU'VE ever pondered the difference between dried, dehydrated and evaporated fruits, don't give the matter further thought. The fact is all three processes achieve the same thing. They simply remove the water from the fruit, but do not affect its nutritional value or basic flavor.

Dehydration takes enough water out of some fruits to prevent the growth of molds and fermentation. Furthermore it cuts down the bulk of the fruit, enables the grower to ship more economically, and saves you money, especially when the same fruit in fresh form is out of season.

In the case of sugary fruits like dates, figs, prunes, grapes and apricots, open air or sun drying produces good results. This is a comparatively long process which affects the tissue cells and in, therefore, not desirable for preserving more delicate fruits. The same objections apply to ordinary indoor drying or evaporation.

The A & P Service for Home-Makers points out that dehydrated fruits and vegetables can be almost completely restored to full color and tang by soaking overnight in water. This merely reverses the drying out process. Incidentally, dried fruits are almost certain to have been fully ripe or vine-ripened when harvested. This assures a greater concentration of sugar, minerals and other health-giving qualities. For a delicious Sunday dinner highlighting dried fruits, garnish baked ham with raisin sauce, serve with southern sweet potatoes, prune lettuce and pineapple salad, homemade rolls with peach preserves and for dessert, apricot pie and coffee.

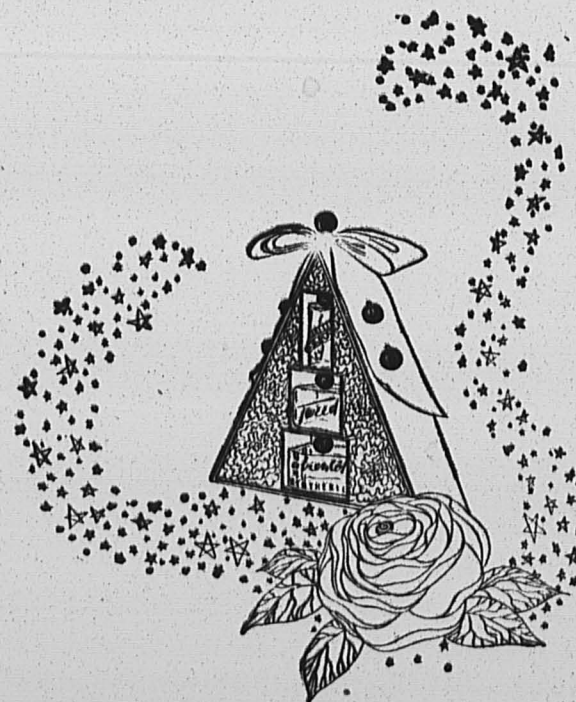

FRANK E. CHAMBERS

Frank E. Chambers, of 601 Lincoln avenue, Palmyra, widely known Burlington County newspaper man, died at 1:25 a.m., Tuesday of last week, in Cooper Hospital, Camden, following an illness of several weeks. He was 56 years of age.

He was president and treasurer of the Burlington County Publishing Co., Inc., publisher of the Riverside Press, The Palmyra News and The Burlington Press at the time of his death. In addition, the firm conducted an extensive job printing business at its plant at 33-35 Hancock street, Riverside.

Mr. Chambers was born at Vincennes, Indiana, and was graduated from Bloomington, Indiana high school. He later attended Indiana University and the University of Pennsylvania.

While attending Indiana University he was a classmate of the late Wendell L. Wilkie, 1940 Republican candidate for president. The late Ernie Pyle, noted war correspondent and author was a student at the university at the same time.

After teaching in Indiana public schools for two years, he decided to make the newspaper business his career and accepted a position on the Bristol (Pa.) Daily Courier.

After a year in Bristol he became a member of the staff of

the Philadelphia Press and went from there to the Evening Telegraph. At the beginning of World War I, he became affiliated with the Philadelphia Evening Ledger and was one of the cable editors on war dispatches.

In 1916 he purchased The Palmyra News from Charles F. Sleeper and continued his work on the Ledger while editing that Burlington county weekly.

He purchased The Riverside Press in 1925 and in 1926 started The Moorestown News. He began publication of The Burlington Press in 1928. Later the business was incorporated as the Burlington County Publishing Company and a few years later The Moorestown News was sold but the firm continued to print it for the new owners until last year.

Mr. Chambers is survived by his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth B. Chambers, a son, F. Wilson, of Hainesport, who is advertising manager of the Riverside Press, three daughters, Mary Constance, Faith Elizabeth and Nelda Lynn, and three brothers, Glen W. Chambers, editor of The Burlington Press, F. Mack Chambers, of Spencer, Indiana, and Verner Chambers, of Springville, Indiana.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon from the Snover

Funeral Home, Palmyra, with interment in Harleigh Mausoleum, Camden. The Rev. W. Neal Raver, Pastor of the Epworth Methodist Church, Palmyra conducted the services.

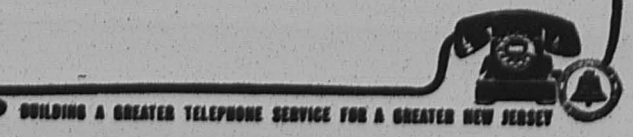

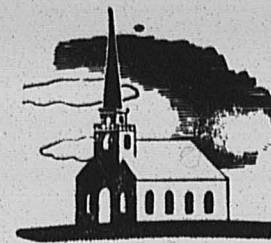

Report from Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

By the time you read this report, the Aid Bill for certain countries in Europe undoubtedly will have been passed by the House. It will be in a different form from that passed by the Senate.

These countries obviously need some relief in the way of food, medical supplies, fertilizers, fuel, etc., and your Congressman believes that the American people want, within reason, and their own capabilities, to relieve suffering which appears to be real. But he hopes that by the time the legislation is finally passed, it will contain amendments correcting errors in previous administrative methods, and that food will get to the people who need it, that they shall know it comes from the people of the United States, and that it is a gift.

Your Congressman does not share the belief expressed by many members of Congress that this is a road block to Communism. He hopes it may help peoples in the relieved countries who want to withstand the floods of Communism to do so. But no one should be misled into believing that the expenditure of whatever amount is appropriated for this relief is a guaranteed stop-Communism panacea.

There is no human being on earth who can say how much money or food or goods will accomplish that result. Despite arguments about the amount we should or can afford to give, there is no human being who can say that \$600,000,000 will do it, or do it for three months, and that \$300,000,000 will not.

Even if it were possible to fix an amount which would accomplish this result under an intelligent policy directed toward that end, the methods pursued by the Administration which has been handling our affairs in the Executive Department for the past 15 years, would make it impossible.

Your Congressman has given you from time to time some of the inconsistent and inconceivable things which have been done by this Administration contrary to its declared policy of stopping Communism. He will give you a few more.

On June 5th, 1947, after the Greek-Turkish Loan, the Senate ratified a Treaty of Peace with Italy which contained the following clause in Article 74 Section 1:

"1. Italy shall pay the Soviet Union reparation in the amount of \$100,000,000 during a period of 7 years from the coming into force of the present Treaty. Deliveries from current production shall not be made during the first 2 years."

It also provides that this reparation shall be made from sources among which is "A share of the Italian factory and tool equipment designed for the manufacture of war material, which is not required by the permitted military establishments, which is not readily susceptible of conversion to civilian purposes, and which will be removed from Italy pursuant to Article 67 of the present Treaty."

And the Third Deficiency Act of 1946, 79th Congress, appropriated five and one half million dollars for the liquidation of lend lease program, which had been terminated by the President as of September 2nd, 1945, and providing "that the amount named herein shall not be available for expenditure incident to the shipment abroad of any commodities after December 31, 1946."

Following the approval of this Act, officials of the government solicited and obtained funds from interested foreign governments which they sought to use through special accounts established with

such funds, for expenses incident to making shipments of commodities after the stopping date fixed by Congress, but the Comptroller General held this to be contrary to the intent of Congress and refused to countersign the warrant for such expenditures.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINNAMINSON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON, N. J., THOROUGHLY LICENSING, FOR THE PURPOSE OF RAISING REVENUE, OF CERTAIN BUSINESSES, COMMERCIAL ENTERPRISES, AND PLACES OF BUSINESS, FIXING THE AMOUNTS OF THE LICENSE FEES TO BE PAID AND REGULATING THE ISSUE AND OPERATION OF SUCH LICENSES, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE TERMS AND PROVISIONS THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Township Committee of the Township of Cinnaminson in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

SECTION 1: That hereafter no person, co-partnership or corporation shall engage in or conduct, within the limits of the said Township, any business or commercial enterprise heretofore in this Section mentioned or indicated, or occupy or use for such purpose any establishment, building, structure, premises, or place within the municipal limits, without first obtaining from the said Township a license in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Ordinance and paying to the said Township, in advance, the full amount of the license fee or fees herein specified, namely:

1. Billiard and pool room: license fee per year \$100.00.
2. Bowling alley equipped with not more than ten alleys: license fee per year \$100.00, and an additional sum of \$10.00 per year for each alley on the premises in excess of ten.
3. Dance hall regularly operated for public use: license fee per year \$150.00.
4. Furnishing space (not at a trailer camp) for the location of trailer or trailers to be occupied as living quarters: license fee (after first ten days followed by initial location of trailer) \$50.00 per trailer per year.
5. Hiring out of riding horses: license fee per year \$100.00.
6. Ice-hauling rink: license fee per year \$150.00.
7. Junk yard other than motor vehicle junk yard: license fee per year \$100.00.
8. Motel containing not more than five rooms: license fee per year \$10.00, and an additional sum of \$5.00 per year for every such room on the premises in excess of five.
9. Motor vehicle junk yard, other than motor vehicle junk yard subject to license by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles: license fee per year \$250.00.
10. Moving picture theatre, other than out-door moving picture theatre: license fee per year \$100.00.
11. Out-door moving picture theatre: license fee per year \$250.00.
12. Riding academy: license fee per year \$100.00.
13. Roller-skating rink: license fee per year \$100.00.
14. Taxicab: license fee per year \$10.00 per cab.
15. Trailer camp: license fee per year \$250.00.
16. Tourist camp equipped with not more than five cabins: license fee per year \$10.00, and an additional sum of \$5.00 per year for each cabin on the premises in excess of five.
17. Tourist home containing not more than five bedrooms used for the accommodation of guests: license fee per year \$10.00, and an additional sum of \$5.00 per year for every such room on the premises in excess of five.
18. Traveling amusement carnival operating under contract with a local volunteer fire company or other local non-profit organization: license fee per day \$5.00.
19. Traveling amusement carnival not operating under contract with a local non-profit organization: license fee per day \$50.00.
20. Traveling circus: license fee per day \$100.00.
21. Used-car lot having capacity for more than five cars: license fee per year \$200.00.

SECTION 2: That each of the foregoing license classifications including the business or commercial enterprise denoted or implied by the classification, and also the establishment, building, structure, premises or place in or at which the business or commercial enterprise is engaged in or conducted.

SECTION 3: That the Township Clerk of the said Township be and he is hereby authorized to issue, in the name of the said Township, and to sign, all licenses provided for in this Ordinance, and to receive, for the account of the said Township, the respective license fees therefor; that every such license shall be valid only until the date of expiration, and to indicate the date of expiration, shall designate the person, co-partnership or corporation to whom or to which such license is issued, shall describe the business or commercial enterprise covered thereby, and shall designate the particular establishment, building, structure, premises or place to which the license applies; and that such licenses shall not be assignable or transferable without the prior written consent of the said Township authorized by the Township Committee.

SECTION 4: That all licenses authorized by this Ordinance are for the purpose of raising revenue for the use of the said Township, that all license fees shall be payable in advance and in full and shall not be pro-rated, and that all license fees received hereunder by the Township Clerk shall be paid over by him forthwith to the Township Treasurer, who shall keep a separate account thereof and shall deposit all such license fees in the name and for the account of the Township in such depository as shall have been designated by the Township Committee; provided, however, that the Township Clerk shall keep a record of the essential details of all licenses that shall be issued.

SECTION 5: That each and every license issued under the authority of this Ordinance shall describe or designate any establishment, building, structure, premises or place shall as all times be prominently displayed at or near the entrance thereto; and that each and every person, co-partnership or corporation holding a license issued under the authority of this Ordinance shall exhibit such license from time to time, for inspection, upon the request of the Township Clerk of the said Township or upon the request of any police officer thereof.

SECTION 6: That no person shall aid or abet, or act as proprietor, manager, employee, clerk or otherwise, in or about the conduct of any business or commercial enterprise, or in the use of any establishment, building, structure, premises or place, for which a license is required under the terms of this Ordinance and for which a proper license shall not be in effect, in accordance with the terms and provisions hereof.

SECTION 7: That any license issued under the authority of this Ordinance may be revoked and annulled by the Township Committee of the said Township, after

hearing, upon notice, in the event that the person, co-partnership or corporation to whom or to which such license shall have been issued (a) shall engage in or permit any unlawful conduct in or about the establishment, building, structure, premises, or place to which such license applies, or (b) shall conduct the business or commercial enterprise for which such license shall have been issued, or (c) shall permit the establishment, building, structure, premises or place to which such license applies to be or become, wholly or in part, unsanitary or unsafe for persons lawfully entering and making use of the same or any part thereof.

SECTION 8: That any person or corporation that shall violate any of the terms or provisions of this Ordinance or that shall commit or do any act or thing in this Ordinance prohibited or that shall fail, neglect or refuse to do any act or thing required by this Ordinance to be done shall, upon conviction thereof before any judicial officer authorized to hear and determine the matter, forfeit and pay such fine, not exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), as shall be imposed by the judicial officer before whom such person or corporation shall be tried and convicted; or, in the discretion of such judicial officer, such person or corporation shall be imprisoned for not more than thirty days, or both fine and imprisonment not exceeding the respective maximum limits hereinbefore fixed.

SECTION 9: That this Ordinance shall take effect upon the expiration of five days next after its final passage and adoption and publication in the manner prescribed by law.

ROUND apples soon may be making square meals if food scientists progress much further in their search for new uses for this fruit. Food uses for the huge 1946 apple crop almost put to shame the most packer's boast that he uses everything from a pig except the squeal. Among new uses are improved jam, jelly, apple butter, elder, apple juice, peaches for jelly making, and apple syrup for flavoring. It is predicted that from this wide realm of new apple by-products will come such wonders as apple ice cream, apple essence for flavoring and even a new insect spray.

Varieties most plentiful in the 124 million bushel crop vary in popularity and usage according to region, says the A & P Service for Home-Makers. The Delicious, Jonathan and the Golden Delicious are varieties that shine in the fruit dish, but when it comes to cooking or use in salads, the wise cook would select the McIntosh, Baldwin and Rhode Island or Northwest Greenings. These are the ones that make the best sauce, turnovers, pie, baked cake, cobblers and dumplings.

Among new recipes for using the versatile apple is apple meringue pie which is made from a base of apple sauce and nutmeg, baked in a pastry shell topped with meringue made from egg whites and confectioners' sugar.

When baking apples, try filling the centers with sugar and raisins or sections of orange peel to add a slightly tart taste and garnish with a touch of hard sauce, whipped cream or marshmallow.

For a delicious Sunday dinner, try roast loin of pork with apple sauce, mashed potatoes, brown gravy, mixed carrots and peas, home made biscuits, and for dessert, a deep-dish apple pie and coffee.

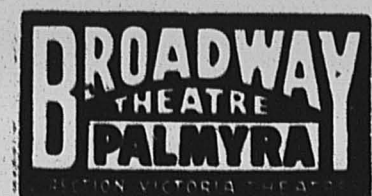

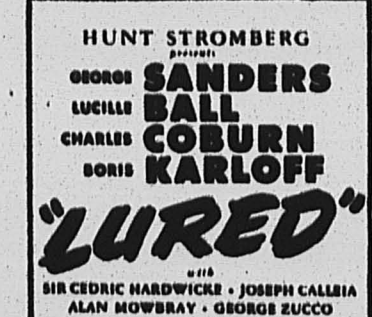

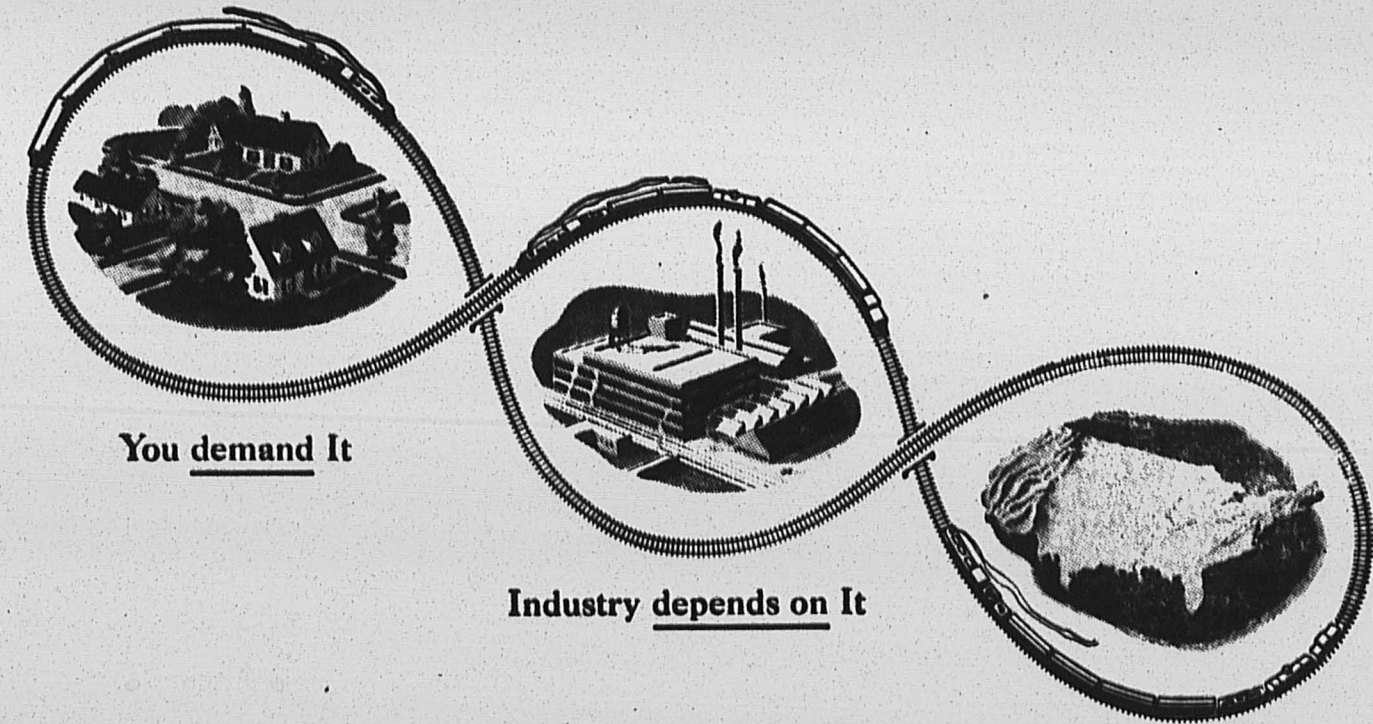

WARTIME-QUALIFIED AVIATION CADETS MAY BE REINSTATED

Wartime-qualified Aviation Cadets who hope for pilot training with the Air Force were ended by the curtailment of the Aviation Cadet Program in 1944-45, may be reinstated, S/Sgt. Joseph Bonner, local U. S. Army and U. S. Air Forces Recruiting Non-Commissioned Officer, said today.

The United States Air Force estimates that there are approximately 35,000 young men who had qualified for Aviation Cadet pilot training during the war who were either awaiting assignment to or actually undergoing flying instruction when the program was curtailed in 1944 and 1945 because of the successful progress of the war, he said.

The acceleration of the Aviation Cadet Pilot Training Program to a total of 3,000 Aviation Cadets during 1948 will make it possible for the Air Force to fulfill its obligation to many of these men who volunteered during the war. Men in this special category, S/Sgt. Bonner said, may be reinstated merely by passing the required physical examination, if they are unmarried, between 20 and 26½ years old and have had two or more years of satisfactory college study.

Candidates for Aviation Cadet training must be between 20 and 26½ years old, unmarried, and have at least one-half of the credits leading to a degree at an accredited college or university, or be able to pass an examination measuring the equivalent, and be of excellent character.

Report from Your
Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

On Thursday, December 11th, the
House passed the so-called "interim"
aid bill for certain foreign countries,
with numerous amendments, and an
authorization of appropriation of \$7-
000,000 less than the bill passed by
the Senate. The two bills will now
go to conference.

The word "interim" naturally indi-
cates further aid. While there was
considerable debate in the House
concerning even the present bill, it
is to be anticipated that there will
be considerably more over future
aid, particularly if the Administra-
tion attempts to put over anything
like what is called the Marshall
Plan.

In his remarks supporting the
present bill, with amendments, your
Congressman stated "There are as
many different reasons urged for
passing this bill as for amending and
changing it. We have been asked to
pass it through human kindness,
trembling fear, thankfulness, shame,
duty, self sacrifice, self interest, and
absolute necessity. The bill is ad-
vocated as a humanitarian act, as an
aid in stopping Communism, as an
out and out war measure."

"I cannot vote for it on the basis
of a measure to keep us out of war,
because, particularly if followed up
by this vast money-goods offensive,
it would not only fail in that pur-
pose, but would be more likely to
get us into war."

"I do not share the apparent inter-
national theory that the United
States has sinned against the other
nations of the world by being more
successful, prosperous and fortunate
than they, and that our atonement
for this sin must be to drag our-
selves down to whatever low level
up to which we can drag them so
that we may all be equally badly
off."

"Because of the fact that, despite
the statements on the Floor of this
House that a vote for H. R. 4604 is
in no way a commitment to any fur-
ther action or plan, other statements
have been made that this bill is
nothing but the first step in some
long range program, I feel it to be
absolutely necessary, Mr. Chairman,
for me to make these remarks, and
to state emphatically that my vote
for this bill is by no stretch of any-
body's imagination to be construed
as such a commitment. If I vote
for this bill, it will be for this bill
alone."

"And I further announce unequi-
vocally I am voting for it solely as
a means to relieve some of the suf-
fering in the aided nations, and in
the hope that it will help them to
again become self supporting; and
in no way as a war measure—either
to keep us out of or get us into any
war with anybody at any time.

"And I shall try to remember,
Mr. Chairman, that the abject fear
of not squandering enough of our
wealth to save that which we have
already spent should not overcome
a calm and courageous consideration
of whether to write off the existing
loss, rather than completely destroy
the vitality of our nation, so that it
cannot successfully meet the su-
preme test we have impoverished
ourselves to avoid without having
avoided it."

Your Congressman has been
named several times by the com-
mittee of an editor of one of the
papers in his district, that the editor
does not understand your Congress-
man's reasoning or voting. There
are a few people who may disagree
with it, but he is the only one who
cannot understand it. It is quite
simple. Your Congressman believes
that the American people must be

assisted nations who are desperately
in need with food and a few other
means to help rehabilitate themselves
insofar as we can do so without in-
juring our own economy. For that
reason, he voted for the foreign re-
lief bill passed in the early part
of the year (even voting against reduc-
tion in its amount) and the present
bill. By the same token, he voted
against the British loans and Greek-
Turkish loans, so-called because they
were not relief measures at all. The
British transaction was a complete
gift of \$3,750,000,000 of the American
taxpayers money to be spent in any
way and for any purpose the British
saw fit. How they spent it will be
shown by your Congressman in sub-
sequent reports.

Greece was included in the first
foreign relief bill referred to, and
the \$300,000,000 allocated to her out
of the \$400,000,000 under the Greek-
Turkish "loan" bill was for entirely
different purposes, which, if carried
out will build numerous permanent
installations in Greece that could be
taken over by Russia in 48 hours
according to one of the highest mili-
tary authorities in the country. The
\$100,000,000 allocated to Turkey was
admittedly wholly for military aid
and assistance, under the doubtful
Truman Doctrine of stopping Com-
munism in outposts thousands of
miles away, with American dollars,
and inviting not only future loss but
future trouble.

Your Congressman has his own
definite ideas of what should be done
in the future with regard to Euro-
pean relief, and will give them to
you in subsequent reports.

are subject to a 20 per cent bonus.
Council expects to make a statement
regarding police wages in Riverton
as compared with those in nearby
communities.

Councilman Charles Coward re-
ported that the budget for the new
apartment house had been approved
by the State. This was originally
submitted for approval on October 6.
Councilman S. Robinson Cole
stated that the police radio would
be in operation this week. The
system is on a cooperative plan with
Palmyra.

For emergency police calls, Riv-
erton residents are asked to call Riv-
erton 9-0191. Local officials feel that
the new system will be a great im-
provement in speeding up calls at
any hour of the day or night.

NEW PHASE OF PUBLIC SCHOOL EDUCATION

New Jersey has set up a five year program which Mr. Riley feels will have fourfold benefits. It will move available trained help for merchants; it will create interested competent sales people with enhanced opportunity for promotion; it will widen the field of school influence and it will give the general public more courteous, understanding and efficient service.

Mr. Riley told of the Federal and State programs for distributive education which has as its purpose training for the betterment of all relationships with the public with particular emphasis on those of salesmanship, into which field of effort 60% of all high school graduates gravitate. The program was begun by the Federal Government in 1937, and is operating under the George Barden Act of 1946, under a budget of five or six million dollars with \$55,000 allocated to New Jersey.

The program operates in four ways: the cooperative program by which part-time employment is combined with school training of high school pupils; the training of employables out of school, and the executive or managerial training of employed sales persons.

Courses include among other subjects, elementary principles of salesmanship, store English, business be-

havior, and principles of retailing.

SECTION 1. The compensation of the COLLECTOR - TREASURER - SEARCH CLERK shall be an annual salary of Four hundred dollars (\$400.00) payable quarterly, with an allowance of Four hundred dollars (\$400.00) annually for extra Clerk hire, payable monthly.

SECTION 2. The compensation of the BOROUGH CLERK - BUILDING INSPECTOR shall be an annual salary of Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) payable quarterly.

SECTION 3. The compensation of the BOROUGH ASSESSOR shall be an annual salary of Six hundred dollars (\$600.00) payable quarterly.

SECTION 4. The compensation of the SUPERINTENDENT OF HIGHWAYS - MEMORIAL PARK shall be an annual salary of Eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) payable monthly as follows: HIGHWAYS One hundred twenty dollars (\$120.00), MEMORIAL PARK Thirty dollars (\$30.00), retroactive as of July 1, 1947.

SECTION 5. The compensation of the BOARD OF HEALTH INSPECTOR shall be an annual salary of Two hundred twenty-five dollars (\$225.00) payable monthly, retroactive as of July 1, 1947.

SECTION 6. The compensation of the MARSHALLS shall be an annual salary of Sixteen hundred twenty dollars (\$1,620.00) for the first year of service; Seventeen hundred forty dollars (\$1,740.00) second year of service; Eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800.00) after three years of service, payable monthly; retroactive as of July 1, 1947.

SECTION 7. The compensation of the RECORDER shall be an annual salary of One hundred sixty dollars (\$160.00) payable monthly, retroactive as of July 1, 1947.

SECTION 8. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 9. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and adoption, approval and publication as required by Law.

SUNDAY DINNER Suggestions

SOUPS are as versatile a course as can be found in the whole range of foods. There seems to be no limit to the variety of ingredients which can be used in the making of soup for they run the gamut from meat and fish to poultry and vegetables. Various combinations of these basic foods mingle their most pleasing qualities to make soups that serve as appetizers or soups with enough richness and body to be the main stay of a meal. Soups with their natural flavors add zest and warmth to cold-weather meals and are just as welcome and nutritious when included on summer menus, says the A & P Service for Home-Makers. Consommés, purées and multiple combinations, with or without meat, provide good cooks with a range of choices, whether they produce the soup in their own kitchen or rather it from the grocery shelves. Soups may be roughly divided into two types in the first group belong soups always made from meat stock—bouillions, consommés and broths. In the second group belong the cream soups, bisques, chowders and vegetable soups. As an appetizer, most cooks prefer the stock soups, while for added nourishment, the cream soups are found to be the best. In soup many of the valuable nutrients which would otherwise be thrown out are saved for the good of the entire family. The addition of canned soup will often serve to improve the flavor of home-made soup, and this handy grocer's item should not be overlooked in the making of stew and gravies. For Sunday dinner, serve a clear soup for a first course followed by baked ham, candied sweet potatoes, string beans, cauliflower with creamed sauce, pumpkin pie for dessert and coffee.

Report from Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

This will be the final report from
your Congressman for the extra
session.

At the request of your Congress-
man, the Department of Commerce
has furnished a statement from offi-
cials of the British Government
showing the expenditure of \$3,350,-
000,000 of the so called British
"loan" of \$3,750,000,000. 25% of the
amount was spent for food; 28% for
raw materials, including oil, many
of which materials, and particularly
oil, are in short supply here; 7% for
ships; 10% for tobacco; 4% for films;
15% for machinery (and we are now
in very short supply of many kinds
of machinery) and 15% was used to
pay for the obligation of Great Brit-
ain to maintain her own zone in Ger-
many.

There you are, folks.

Preceding the Greek-Turkish loan,
Greece was furnished material
through UNRRA. In the Philadel-
phia Inquirer of October 8th, 1947,
there appeared a news item from
Athens, Greece by a reporter named
E. R. Nordner, which began with
these words: "I have just seen a
sight that would bring tears of rage
to the eyes of the most hardened
American taxpayer. It was acres
and acres, pile on pile, of expensive
UNRRA machinery and tools burst-
ing out of weather-beaten boxes on
docks and in storage areas near Pir-
aeus harbor." This machinery was
specified as consisting of Interna-
tional Harvester light tractors, road
graders, fire pumps, well rigs, mar-
ine Diesel engines and "mounds of
other equipment scarce all over the
world."

There were also, according to the
reporter, piles of rusting pipe, wire
matting, steel sheets, bars and plates,
some of them in boxes which had
been there so long identification was
washed off and nobody knew what
they contained, but on labels which
the reporter could read, he saw saw-
mills, plows, plow shares, anvils and
blacksmith tools, and budding and
pruning shears. Some of these boxes,
the reporter said, crumbled away
in his hands as he touched them. I
quote again from the report: "Sure-
ly, I thought, this is one of the great
scandals of modern times. Ameri-
cans are asked to eat less and sacri-
fice more, when here and all over
the world are millions of dollars
worth of vital equipment which in-
different Europeans won't even move
from their docks."

The reporter said that more of this
stuff had been moved inland to get
it out of sight of visiting Congress-
men. He further stated there were
great refrigerators, plants, lathes,
planes, transformers and spare parts
for no one knows what.

Yes, the taxpayers of the United
States, paid for 75% of this material.

In the Washington Post of De-
cember 15, 1947, there was a news
item from Athens showing an appal-
ling spoilage of food stuffs given to
Greece under the Greek-Turkish
"loan" and the Foreign Relief Bill of
last year, which was estimated at
\$4,500,000, within the past five
months because of failure to distri-
bute these food stuffs. Among the
spoiled and spoiling food were
cheese, canned milk, sugar, powder-
ed milk, vegetables, codfish, herring,
and canned goods. The report
said that more than 100,000 pounds
of sugar were spoiled.

This news item further stated:
"The American mission to aid
Greece reported that 75 million dol-
lars worth of supplies and equipment
shipped in by the United Nations
Relief and Rehabilitation Adminis-
tration and other agencies were lying
undistributed and idle on docks
and in warehouses."

so rapidly through the structure that
flames were roaring from all the
windows and doors upon the re-
sponse of the East Riverton Fire
Company. Fortunately, the occu-
pants were able to escape before the
dwelling became enveloped by the
fire.

Faced with sub-freezing weather
and a high wind the firemen fought
the blaze under extremely adverse
conditions but were able to prevent
its spread to other nearby buildings.
The Delaware Company fire fight-
ers, aided by three pieces of appa-
ratus and a large crew from Riv-
erton, used four lines of water in ex-
tinguishing the fire.

The building is almost a complete
loss and all the furniture was con-
sumed.

NEW PHONE RATES

New Jersey Bell Telephone Com-
pany, December 23, announced the
filing of the new rates for telephone
service that will go into effect Janu-
ary 1. The company announced at
the same time a complete moderniza-
tion and simplification of the 22-
year-old telephone rate structure.

The company had asked an in-
crease of \$16,152,000 in telephone
rates for intrastate service, to meet
higher costs. The Board of Public
Utility Commissioners authorized an
increase of \$10,515,000, the first gen-
eral increase since 1925.

The new rates fall into eight
groups, according to the number of
telephones which can be reached in
the local calling area. The groups
range from less than 2,000 telephones
in the first group, to 160,000 and over
in group eight.

All 5 cent toll charges will be elim-
inated in the new rate structure be-
tween New Jersey points where such
toll charges now apply, creating a
wide-range local calling area for all
telephone users, including for the
first time four-party and rural cus-
tomers. Removing the 5 cent toll
charge recognizes, the company said,
that modern business and social in-
terests extend over much greater dis-
tances as a result of improved trans-
portation and communication facili-
ties in the last two decades.

The company said the effect of the
rate increase on individual customers
will vary greatly depending upon the
amount of equipment used, and the
exchanges in which customers are
located. Increase will be propor-
tionately greater where population
and telephone growth have been
large since present rates were estab-
lished 22 years ago. In such areas
the old rates no longer reflect the
larger number of telephones that can
be reached without a toll charge.

For example, in 1925 there were
only 1,500 telephones in the Riverton
exchange area. In 1947, with the
1925 rates still in effect, approxi-
mately 3,000 telephones can be reach-
ed by telephone users in the area
who do not now have extended area
service. Under the new rates all
telephone users in the Riverton ex-
change area will be able to call 17,-
000 telephones without a toll charge.

Charges for some toll calls within
the State beyond the new enlarged
calling areas will be increased under
the new schedule by 5 cents for
many calls up to 45 miles and 10
cents for some calls over 45 miles.
Rates for toll calls to points outside
the State will not be affected.

including the Federal Tax follow:

MORE BUSES ASKED

Acting on the dissatisfaction ex-
pressed by the Riverton people at the
December Town Meeting in en-
suing transportation facilities, the
Town Meeting Executive Committee
has requested Public Service Inter-
state Transportation Company to in-
crease the number of buses and the
quality of service, or have their peti-
tion for increased fare rates opposed.

In a letter to Public Service, the
Town Meeting Executive Committee
emphasized that in accordance with
New Jersey Law, they are obligated
to furnish "safe, adequate, and
proper service"; that the problem of
inadequate transportation is not just
a local complaint but affects all the
communities with commuters on this
route (9); and that increased fare
rates are not justified until service
is improved. Adequate service was
defined as "not only new buses but
an increased number until everyone
commuting can sit and not stand to
their destination."

The letter stated that unless prop-
erly assured by the first of 1948,
through action or some other certain
manner, that better transportation
will be provided, the petition now be-
fore the Public Utility Commission
for fare increase will be opposed
and adjoining communities will be
urged to join in opposing it.

Other communities have already
openly opposed the fare rate increase
proposed, and several have author-
ized an official from the town to be
present at the hearing to be held in
Newark, New Jersey, on January 12.
Publicity.

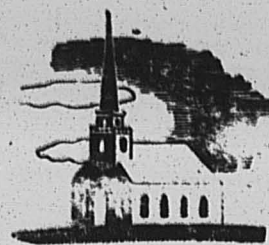

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINNAMINSON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON AUTHORIZING THE LICENSING FOR THE PURPOSE OF RAISING REVENUE OF CERTAIN BUSINESSES, COMMERCIAL ENTERPRISES, AND PLACES OF BUSINESS; FIXING THE AMOUNTS OF THE LICENSE FEES TO BE PAID; AND REGULATING THE ISSUE AND OPERATION OF SUCH LICENSES; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE TERMS AND PROVISIONS THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Township Committee of the Township of Cinnaminson in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

SECTION 1: That hereafter no person, partnership or corporation shall engage in or conduct, within the limits of the said Township, any business or commercial enterprise, hereinafter in this Section mentioned or indicated, or occupy or use for such purpose any building, structure, premises or place within the municipal limits, without first obtaining from the said Township a license in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Ordinance and paying to the said Township, in advance, the full fee for such term, fee or fees herein specified, namely:

1. Billiard and (or) pool room: license fee per year \$100.00.
2. Bowling alley equipped with not more than ten alleys: license fee per year \$100.00, and an additional sum of \$10.00 per year for each alley on the premises in excess of ten.
3. Dance hall regularly operated for public use: license fee per year \$100.00.

4. Furnishing space (not at a trailer camp) for the lodging of transient persons to be occupied as living quarters: license fee after first ten days following initial location of trailer: \$20.00 per trailer per year.
5. Hiding out or riding horses: license fee per year \$100.00.

6. Ice-skating rink: license fee per year \$100.00.
7. Junk yard other than motor vehicle junk yard: license fee per year \$100.00.

8. Motel containing not more than five rooms available for guests: license fee per year \$10.00, and an additional sum of \$5.00 per year for every such room on the premises in excess of five.

9. Motor vehicle junk yard, other than motor vehicle junk yard subject to license by the Commission of Motor Vehicles: license fee per year \$250.00.

10. Moving-picture theatre, other than outdoor moving-picture theatre: license fee per year \$100.00.
11. Outdoor moving-picture theatre: license fee per year \$250.00.

12. Riding academy: license fee per year \$100.00.
13. Roller-skating rink: license fee per year \$100.00.

14. Taxicab: license fee per year \$10.00 per cab.
15. Trailer camp: license fee per year \$250.00.

16. Tourist camp equipped with not more than five cabins: license fee per year \$10.00, and an additional sum of \$5.00 per year for each cabin on the premises in excess of five.
17. Tourist home containing not more than five bedrooms used for the accommodation of guests: license fee per year \$10.00, and an additional sum of \$5.00 per year for every such room on the premises in excess of five.

18. Traveling amusement carnival operating under contract with a local volunteer fire company or other local non-profit organization: license fee per day \$5.00.
19. Traveling amusement carnival not operating under contract with a local non-profit organization: license fee per day \$30.00.

20. Traveling circus: license fee per day \$100.00.
21. Used-car lot having capacity for more than five cars: license fee per year \$200.00.

SECTION 2: That each of the foregoing license classifications includes the business or commercial enterprise denoted or implied by its classification, and also the establishment, building, structure, premises or place in or at which the business or commercial enterprise is engaged in or conducted.

SECTION 3: That the Township Clerk of the said Township be and he is hereby authorized to issue, in the name of the said Township, and to sign, all licenses provided for in this Ordinance, and to receive, for the account of the said Township, the respective license fees therefor; that every such license shall be serially numbered, shall bear the date of issue and indicate the date of expiration, shall designate the person, partnership or corporation to whom or to which such license is issued, shall describe the business or commercial enterprise covered thereby, and shall designate the particular establishment, building, structure, premises or place to which the license applies; and that such licenses shall not be assignable or transferable without the prior written consent of the said Township authorized by the Township Committee.

SECTION 4: That all licenses authorized by this Ordinance are for the purpose of raising revenue for the use of the said Township, that all license fees shall be payable in advance and in full and shall not be pro-rated, and that all license fees received hereunder by the Township Clerk shall be paid over by him forthwith to the Township Treasurer, who shall keep a separate account thereof and shall deposit all such license fees in the name and for the account of the Township in such depository as shall have been designated by the Township Committee; provided, however, that the Township Clerk shall keep a record of the essential details of all licenses that shall be issued.

SECTION 5: That each and every license issued under the authority of this Ordinance shall describe or designate any establishment, building, structure, premises or place shall at all times be prominently displayed at or near the entrance thereto; and that each and every person, partnership or corporation holding a license issued under the authority of this Ordinance shall exhibit such license from time to time, for inspection, upon the request of the Township Clerk of the said Township or upon the request of any police officer thereof.

SECTION 6: That no person shall aid or assist, or act as proprietor, manager, employee, clerk or otherwise, in or about the conduct of any business or commercial enterprise, or in the use of any establishment, building, structure, premises or place, for which a license is required under the terms of this Ordinance and for which a proper license shall not have been issued, and be in effect in accordance with the terms and provisions hereof.

SECTION 7: That any license issued under the authority of this Ordinance may be revoked and annulled by the Township Committee of the said Township, after

hearing, upon notice, in the event that the person, partnership or corporation to whom or to which such license has been issued (a) shall engage in or permit any unlawful conduct in, on or about the establishment, building, structure, premises or place to which such license applies, or (b) shall conduct the business or commercial enterprise for which such license shall have been issued, or shall use or occupy, or permit to be used or occupied, the establishment, building, structure, premises or place to which such license applies in such manner as to create any public or private nuisance, and/or (c) shall permit the establishment, building, structure, premises or place to which such license applies to be or become, wholly or in part, unsanitary or unsafe for persons lawfully entering and making use of the same or any part thereof.

SECTION 8: That any person or corporation that shall violate any of the terms or provisions of this Ordinance or that shall commit or do any act or thing in this Ordinance prohibited or that shall fail, neglect or refuse to do any act or thing required by this Ordinance to be done shall, upon conviction thereof before a judicial officer authorized to hear and determine the matter, forfeit and pay such fine, not exceeding the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), as shall be imposed by the judicial officer before whom such person or corporation shall be tried and convicted; or, in the discretion of such judicial officer (if the party so tried and convicted be a natural person), shall be imprisoned in the Township Jail for such term, not exceeding ninety days, as shall be imposed by such judicial officer; provided, however, that such judicial officer shall have power, in his discretion, to impose both fine and imprisonment not exceeding the respective maximum limits hereinbefore fixed.

SECTION 9: That this Ordinance shall take effect upon the expiration of five days next after its final passage and adoption and publication in the manner prescribed by law.

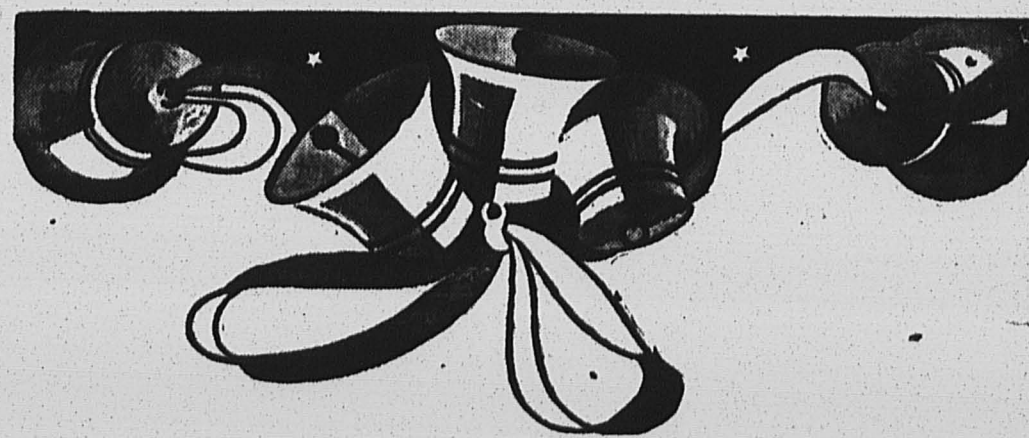

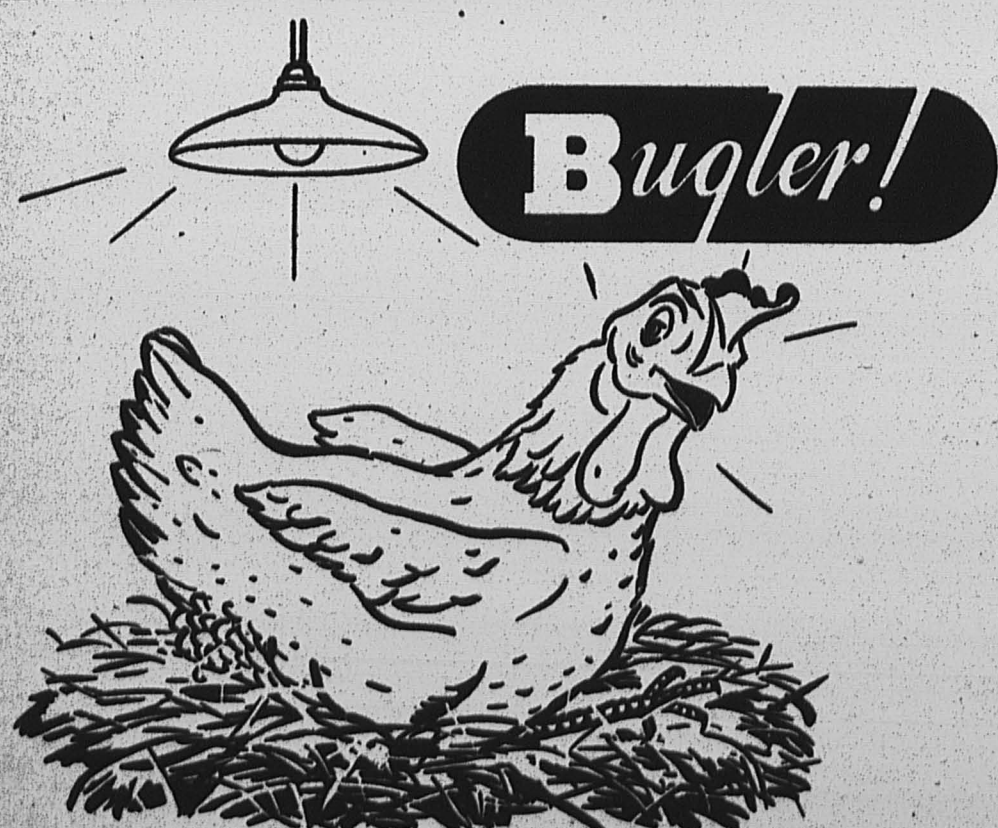
