## RIVERTON BUDGET

At an adjourned meeting of Riverton Borough Council held last Thursday evening, the Local Budget for the Borough was passed on first reading. A detailed account appears elsewhere in this issue of The New Era.

The total expenditures for 1948 will show an increase of approximately 17 cents on the Borough's share of the Local Purpose Tax. Most expenditures for this year remained about the same or a little less than last year and the increase may be attributed mainly to two situations.

First, an item of \$3,000 was inserted in the budget for the contemplated service of trash collection. This cost will amount to 12 cents of the tax rate increase.

The Mayor and Council have advertised for and received bids on trash collection in the Borough as the result of a petition requesting information on the costs and practicality of such a service. The petition was sponsored by the executive committee of Town Meeting and signed by some 350 residents of the Borough.

A joint meeting of committees from Council and the Town Meeting was called and plans formulated for collecting data on costs and types of service. It was decided that if a contract could be secured this would be the best method of assuring specific services at a known cost. Accordingly, the Committee from Borough Council met with Solicitor McCay and bid specifications were drawn up and advertised. Two bids were received, the lowest amounting to \$2,979.00.

The Mayor and Council are desirous of expressions from the taxpayers on this matter of trash collection. To this end a letter is being drafted to send to each taxpayer, acquainting him with details as to costs, scope of service, etc., and asking him to return an enclosed postcard expressing his approval or disapproval. The matter will then be brought up for discussion at the public hearing on the Budget on Thursday evening, February 19th. At that time Council will either retain the item in the Budget or strike it out, according to the expressed wishes of a majority of the taxpayers. Council will greatly appreciate all interest and attention given to this matter.

Second, the remaining five cents of tax rate increase represents a portion of the added cost of the new Police Pension Fund, approved by the voters at the last election, plus an upward adjustment in the basic salaries of Borough employees. Savings effected in other departments have made it possible to absorb a portion of the costs of Police Pension and salary raises, so that the net increase in the tax rate can be kept to the five cent figure.

He pointed to McCay's sterling honesty, experience in municipal and school affairs and splendid record in the House of Assembly, where he is serving on the most important committees.

Mr. D'Amato as captain cordially invites all musicians who play stringed instruments, accordions or saxophones to attend the rehearsals. The band hopes to have about 40 pieces and at present particularly needs violinists, accordionists and saxophonists.

The local band is fortunate in having as its musical director, Francis Schaeffer, of Riverside, talent banjoist, widely known as a teacher and musician.

Raymond Mulliken, local violinist, is serving as secretary for the band and Jackson Ferren as publicity chairman.

## WOODS FUEL COORDINATOR IN CINNAMINSON TOWNSHIP

Maurice Conrow, chairman of the Cinnaminson Township Committee has announced the appointment of Robert J. Woods, 1004 Columbia avenue, as Local Fuel Coordinator to serve with Governor Driscoll's Conservation Committee.

There is a critical fuel oil shortage because the demand is greater than the supply. Jos. L. McLaughlin, State Fuel Coordinator in Trenton, points out that hardship cases can only be assisted through the efforts of a Local Coordinator completely conversant with local conditions.

In cooperation with the State fuel authorities, Mr. Conrow stated that "the next 60 days are vital if we are to spread and share the amount of fuel oil available. Every household burning oil should set his thermostat at no more than 68 degrees for daytime usage, and 60 degrees or lower at night. In this way we can save 15% of our vital supply—If Each Saves a Little, There Will Be Enough for All."

All consumers of domestic and industrial fuel oils are urged to re-convert to their former method of heating wherever this is possible. Such re-conversion will not only save fuels for spreading out in extreme hardship cases, but will assure to the person who has so re-converted that their home will be warm the rest of the season.

Those who are contemplating the installation of new oil consuming equipment are urged to refrain from such action until this critical period has been passed.

## RIVERTON SCHOOL ESTABLISHES HONOR ROLL

An Honor Roll has been established by the Riverton Public School for pupils in grades four to eight inclusive. It is felt that those students doing outstanding scholastic work should receive recognition and it hoped that others will strive more diligently to attain Honor Roll standing.

Starting this week all marks made by each student will be counted toward his average and the first Honor Roll will be announced following the issuing of reports on March 12.

To attain Honor Roll standing pupils must have a minimum of three A's in the major subjects which are English grammar, reading and literature, spelling, social studies and arithmetic. In addition no other grade below B in the other major subjects.

The second qualification is that the student may have no grades below C in any of the remaining subjects during the report period.

The third qualification is that the pupil must be better than average in school citizenship and conduct.

## MAYOR APPOINTS FUEL COORDINATOR IN RIVERTON

At a meeting of Borough Council held last Thursday, Mayor S. R. Coale appointed Daniel M. Clifton, Borough Clerk, to serve as Fuel Coordinator for Riverton. This action came as a result of a request from State authorities asking that municipalities in the State set up a central office to handle emergency cases during the present fuel shortage.

As Fuel Coordinator, Mr. Clifton will cooperate with fuel supply operators serving the residents of Riverton. When a situation arises where a fuel oil supplier has no oil to supply to a resident of Riverton and the oil in the resident's storage tank is running dangerously low, the supplier may apply to Mr. Clifton for an emergency oil allotment of 100 gallons, to be taken from the State oil pool, for his customer. Upon prompt investigation of the case, Mr. Clifton may approve the application. All local fuel oil distributors have been notified of Mr. Clifton's appointment. Residents dealing with out of town companies may find it helpful to acquaint their suppliers with this information.

## Know Your Schools

"The School Elections"

February 10 is the day for school elections in most of the communities in the State of New Jersey. On this day voters will pass judgment on proposed budgets and will elect members of boards of education.

Voters in Palmyra will be called upon to vote on a total budget of \$242,171.97 and to select from a field of four candidates three members of the Board of Education, to serve for the next three years. Riverton voters will consider a budget of \$69,670 and will also elect three persons to serve on the Board of Education for the next three years. Six candidates have presented their respective qualifications to the Riverton voters.

One of the most important privileges of citizenship in our democratic way of life is the right to vote. It is more than a privilege; it is a responsibility. Every citizen should vote at every election, regardless of the issue to be decided or the offices to be filled.

The one function of government which most intimately touches the lives of every citizen, regardless of age, wealth, or family, is public education. A community is only as good as its schools. Real estate values depend on the quality of the schools; business is affected by the education and culture of the people in the community; the entire social and civic life of the community centers about its schools.

Yet, last year only 26 people in Riverton and 163 in Palmyra cast their ballots for members of their Boards of Education and approved the expenditure of more than a quarter of a million dollars for education in the two towns.

This column has been resumed at the request of numerous friends of the schools who desire more information about the various problems of public education in this community. Such matters as increased salaries for teachers, improved building facilities, revised courses of study, improved teaching methods, and increased state aid for public education must be dealt with in the months to come. Readers of this column will be given information from time to time which may help in the formulation of opinions and in the evaluation of the progress of "Your Schools."

Meanwhile, may we urge you to come to the polls next Tuesday (in Palmyra between the hours of 5 and 9, and in Riverton and Cinnaminson from 7 to 9), and vote for the proposed budget and for the candidates of your choice. These persons will be part of the board of directors in the company in which you are stockholders. We know that we can count on you.

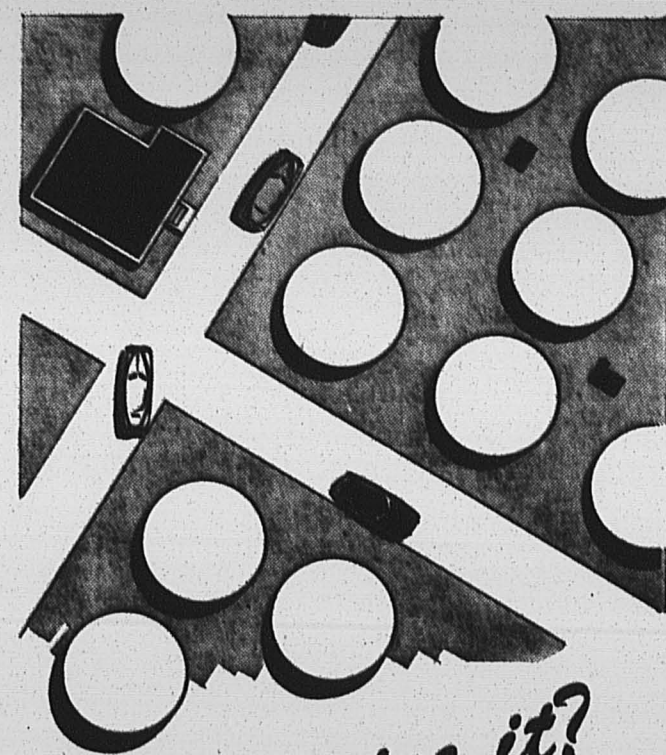

## EVERT A CANDIDATE FOR RE-ELECTION

Although salaries and tuition rates have advanced, the Board has adopted a budget for the school year 1948-49 calling for approximately \$5,000 LESS to be raised by taxation. Mr. Evert, a resident of Riverton for fourteen years, is father of two children in the Riverton School.

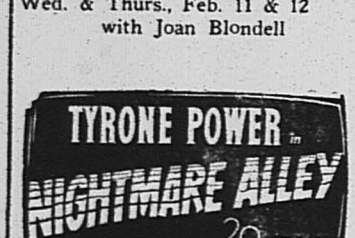

## "THE YOUNG NEGRO"

"The Young Negro in the American Picture" was the theme of a talk which held the interested attention of the local Rotary Club last week when the Rev. Arthur W. Jones, pastor of the Zion Baptist Church of Philadelphia, was the guest speaker.

## RIVERTON SCHOOL

Marking System

The present system of marking  
children in our school is one which  
is approved and used by the major-  
ity of elementary and high schools  
in the country. Our school now,  
does not believe in or use the mass  
promotion system but has levels of  
minimum requirements which must  
be attained in major subjects before  
the child can successfully attempt  
the subject at a higher grade level.  
The major subjects are arithmetic,  
English, reading, spelling, history  
and geography.

The standards, used by the teach-  
ers in establishing the course of  
study and subject matter, essentials,  
are set forth by the State Depart-  
ment of Education. Standards used  
for the marking of students are  
based on the achievement in that  
subject at that grade level. Individ-  
ual differences are taken into con-  
sideration in the assigning of class-  
work and the grading of the work  
accomplished.

The mark on the report card of

a pupil indicates his achievement in  
the particular subject for that six  
weeks marking period. If he is do-  
ing average work, getting the major  
portion of his assignments correct he  
will earn a C. Those doing better  
than just learning the minimum es-  
sentials will earn a B, and the out-

The grade of E indicates failure in  
that subject for that report period.  
The school definitely recommends a  
conference between the parents and  
teacher in this case for the reasons  
may be numerous.

The present marking system in  
use in Riverton is comparable with  
other schools in this section of the  
country and the standards such that  
a pupil transferring from our system  
will fit into the same grade and be

doing approximately the same level  
of classwork in any modern school  
system in this locality.

A mile or so above the Tacony-Palmyra Bridge on the Jersey side of the Delaware, the pier of the Riverton Yacht Club juts out into the river, long a landmark to navigators of the upper river. Organized in 1865, and now one of the oldest of America's yacht clubs, the Riverton organization has been a mecca for local youth for generations — old timers say they can never remember a time in the Club's history when another generation of local youth, both boys and girls, have not been learning the art of sailing from others who, in turn, had received their earliest instructions on local waters.

However, in the last few years "something new has been added" to the Club's program of educating local boys in handling boats — it's the Riverton Sea Scout Ship No. 1, of the Burlington County Council, Boy Scouts of America — and far from being theoretical sailors, these boys receive their training the hard way through practical experience.

Organized under the auspices of the Riverton Yacht Club in 1945 with Thompson W. Coe as Skipper and Bernard Coe as mate, The Riverton Sea Scout organization now has enrolled thirteen of the local boys, most of whom came up through the Scouting organization by way of the Riverton Troop 50 also of the Burlington County Council. Active members at the present time are Robert Gary, Robert Lundstedt, John Carhart, Robert Farrow, Michael Crowell, John Werner, Donald Garwood, Guyver Seither, Marter Carhart, Jeffrey Thompson, Robert Stewart, Richard Wilder and Royal Farrow. And so strong is the appeal of this Sea Scout unit to its members that while several of them are now in college, they maintain an active membership in the Ship.

The highlight of the Organization's year is the Riverton Ship's annual cruise each summer down the Delaware, through the canal and into Chesapeake Bay with Annapolis as the main point of attraction although the cruise, which takes a week, includes several other stopovers, and so popular are the Riverton boys in several of these towns that their annual visit is anticipated from year to year always with a cordial invitation from the Chesapeake Bay towns to "be sure to come back next year." This cruise has been taken regularly in the Ship's 26 foot motor surfboat with overnight camping at chosen spots on the shores of the Bay.

Together with the Yacht Club, the Riverton Sea Scouts sponsors an annual series of sailing races for its members, most of whom own their own "Dusters" — a fleet of 14 foot type racing craft which is designed to put more square feet of sail in the air, in proportion to its size, than any other similar sized sail boat. The 1945 series was won by Don Garwood, the 1946 contest went to Guy Seither and in 1947, first place went to Bob Gary. Many other members of the unit also own "Dusters" which they have made themselves, and this skilled craftsmanship is another part of the unit's training program for local youth.

The Ship also owns a Ranger aircraft engine which is continuously torn down and rebuilt as part of the program of instruction in the operation and maintenance of internal combustion engines. The unit is of active assistance to the Yacht Club in doing patrol work and emergency duty during the boating season, and a special emergency roundup is in effect day and night for any service the Sea Scouts can render to the local police or fire departments in the event of an accident.

Winter meetings are held in the community house maintained by the local Presbyterian Church while the summer meetings are held at the Yacht Club aboard the "TRIBORO"

The film was prepared with the cooperation of the United States Department of Public Health. Beautifully photographed the film tells a forceful story of the one hundred million dollar annual loss in the United States due to water pollution. It illustrates the dangers of pollution to our fish and wild life, our city water supply systems, our recreational facilities, and our public health. Proper sewerage treatment — the method of preventing this pollution is emphasized.

Mr. Hearsman, an authority on sewerage disposal problems, is well known throughout the Eastern Coast for his impressive talks on water purification. Having worked with many of the surrounding communities on this problem, Mr. Hearsman is well acquainted with the local problems. Many Riverton residents have heard Mr. Hearsman and have highly recommended his presentation as one that is interesting and informative.

"The problem," said Mr. Hearsman, "is not a simple one. It requires the whole hearted support and understanding of the people it will help. We are happy to place the information that has been gathered by the General Electric Company, over the past years, before the people of Riverton."

## SCOUT JAMBOREE

Nearly forty thousand scouts from 36 countries assembled in France last year for their sixth international jamboree. Local Rotarians last week enjoyed an account of three participants from the United States — David Fullerton and Victor Hallman, Eagle Scouts from Moorestown and Deputy Regional Executive Paul Handel of the Boy Scouts of America. Mr. Handel was introduced by Captain James Ryan.

The American contingent was assembled at Camp Kilmer, New Jersey, where they were indoctrinated for their contact with boys from other lands. The nine day trip over an Army transport was an outstanding experience for the boys. Sightseeing in Holland, Belgium and France followed.

The American boys were camped in four separate sub-camps among similar contingents of other nations where every effort was made to have them fraternize. The conduct of the great encampment was integrated by a council of leaders from each of the sixteen sub-camps.

Two outstanding events marked respectively the opening and closing of the jamboree. At the opening a fire, kindled from the 1937 jamboree in Holland, was brought to the great arena. From it the leader for each nation lighted a torch which they brought to the leaders of the sub-camps who in turn lit torches of other leaders of the troops of the nations in their camps. And finally each boy had his torch lighted. There followed a pageant in which the episodes of the previous jamboree were enacted.

At the conclusion of the jamboree the entire group surrounded a gas inflated ball fifty feet in diameter painted to show the world continents. This ball was raised and passed around the great circle so that every one of the forty thousand there could touch and aid in its passage. In this dramatic symbolism every boy was made to feel that he had a share in upholding the world.

Mr. Handel had on exhibition thirty-five pages of mounted insignia of Scout troops from over the world. Trading of insignia and like souvenirs was an activity of great interest at the jamboree.

## STATE TREASURER SPEAKS AT ROTARY CLUB

Robert C. Hendrickson, State Treasurer, brought the local Rotary Club last week a thought provoking picture of conditions in Europe gained from his army experience and subsequent trip abroad as observer.

After seeing at close range the incomparable job done by this country in providing prodigious quantities of all kinds of material during the war, Mr. Hendrickson said it was shocking to see the disorganization overseas that followed. This he felt was due to the failure of those in high places at Washington, London and Moscow to place human before political considerations.

In this he felt the pattern of history was closely followed. Political claims create the barriers that arise between people — often foment misunderstandings and destroy good relations. "Why," he asked, "must we have destruction and ruin before we start to do the thing which must be done?"

Mr. Hendrickson feels that General Lucius Clay has recovered much that was lost in Germany during the past two years. But he was critical of congressional committees, who went back to constituents releases which were intended wholly for their political advantage. And he was critical, too, of the insincerity of agreements made by those in high places — agreements which could not be carried out and which

brought the Russians into Berlin and Vienna and turned Austria over to them. Appealing for careful selection of political candidates, Mr. Hendrickson warned that we may have had our last chance to fumble. We must re-appraise our responsibilities, study issues, investigate men, demand integrity and courage not merely brilliance and oratory. We must find men who can and will rise above partisanship — men who will give unselfish service in keeping with the privilege of their trust.

**MILITARY TRAINING NOT ADVOCATED**

Agreement that a strong Army, Navy and Air Force are necessary in our postwar world is rather general, but opinion on both the value and desirability of compulsory military training is sharply divided. Speaking for the opposition Shaun Copithorne, of Moorestown, presented a thought provoking discussion to the Rotary Club last week. Mr. Copithorne was introduced by Robert W. Morrison, Chairman of the Club's International Service Committee.

Discussing first the provisions of the bills, the speaker called attention to the lack of provision for physical rejects, the subservency of the civilian advisory committee to the military, the unprecedented authority of the President, the inevitable integration of our colleges in a government system and the opportunity for totalitarian steps which it invites.

"Too few people understand HR 4278 which has been resting in the Rules Committee of the House, but they are proponents seek to bring on the floor," said Mr. Copithorne. He detailed analysis raised questions among all who held open minds on the subject.

Probably the most disturbing question raised in the minds of those honestly seeking light on the subject was whether or not any real security would be gained to offset the enormous expense—and whether or not more useful uses of that money could not be made in the interest of peace.

In this connection Mr. Copithorne advanced a number of arguments: That UMT is not necessary to supplement our current military strength within the period of future usefulness of such training. That the mobilization and retraining would require time that will not be available in event of sudden attack nor would more than a relatively few be useful in airborne atomic war.

That peace time conscription has never in two World Wars prevented attack or provided immunity. That the cost of UMT, variously estimated at 3 to 5 billion dollars, will produce no consumer goods but by withdrawing young workers will decrease the supply, give impetus to inflation, and weaken our resources to put Europe on its feet.

## A & P HEAD SAYS COMPANY WILL FOLLOW TREND

John A. Hartford, president of A & P Food Stores, says that A & P food prices will follow the market trend and that any reductions in the price of food to the company will be passed along to consumers.

Taking cognizance of the recent commodity changes, Mr. Hartford said: "Frankly, it is impossible for anyone to predict future retail food prices without knowing whether the current break in commodity markets is temporary or the beginning of a general trend."

"Grocers do not control the prices

they must pay for food. They can lower retail prices only to the extent to which they buy wisely, keep their own costs and profits down and pass along savings resulting from lower wholesale prices to their customers."

"The current price reductions announced by A & P are in line with a traditional A & P policy of promptly reflecting in our retail prices any reduction in the cost of food to us."

"In a rising market, however, it has been our policy not to raise our retail prices until the supply of the commodity bought at the lower price is exhausted. This policy is designed to give the customer a break in both cases."

"We are food merchants, not food speculators, and we do not attempt to build up great stores of food when the market is low in anticipation of higher prices. We go into the market daily to buy sufficient food to meet our immediate needs and we base our retail price on the whole-sale cost plus a fixed mark-up. The mark-up averages less than 15 cents in out of each customer's dollar. In our case it covers rent, salary, ad-

vertising, light, heat, trucking, and all our other costs of doing business, as well as our small profit."

"It is safe to predict, therefore, that A & P prices will pretty generally follow the market trend, and that any further reduction of the price of food to us, or in our costs of doing business, will promptly result in lower prices in our stores."

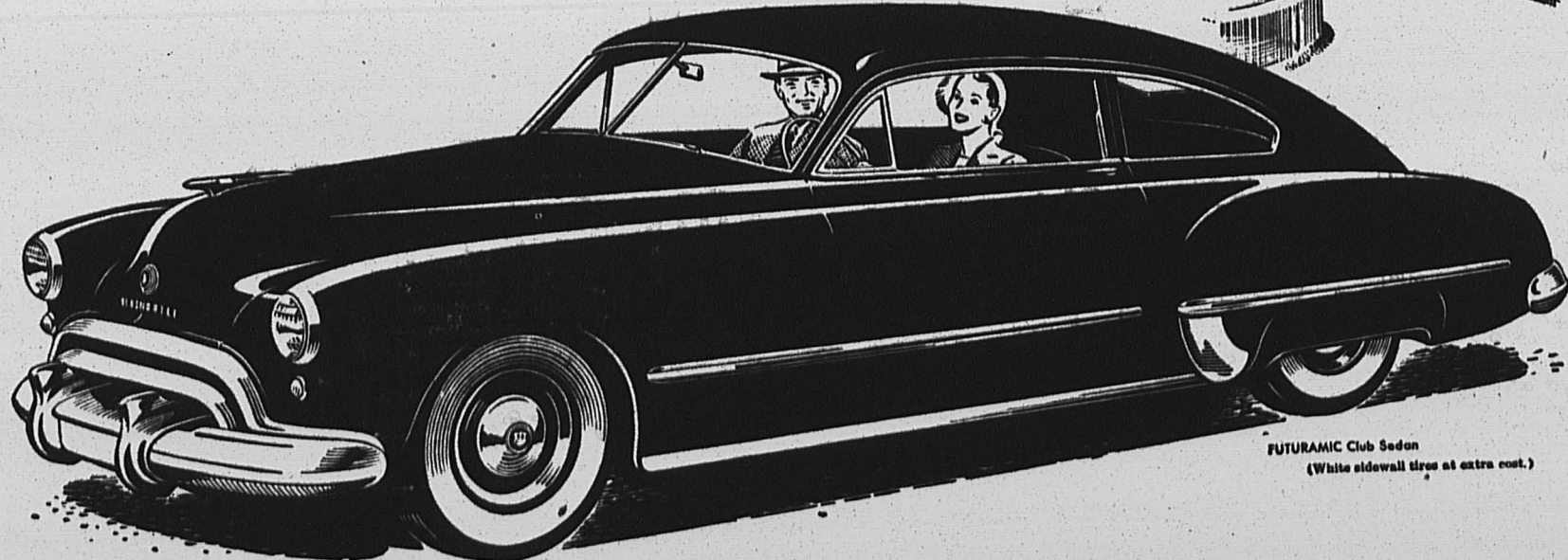

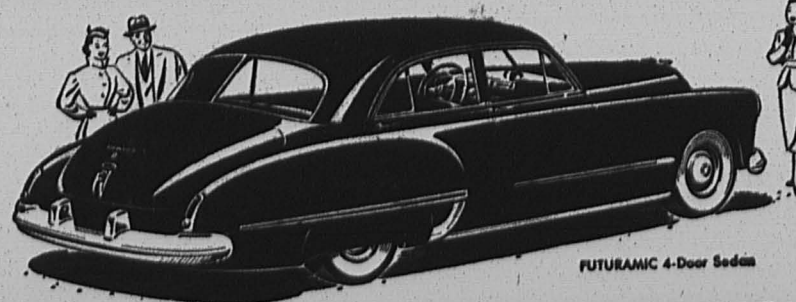

## Report from Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

By the time you read this report you will know that your Congressman has decided not to run for reelection. I am deeply appreciative of the support of all my good friends in the District who have voted and worked for me in the past and of the kind things they have said and done. I heartily thank everyone.

Although my reports to you have heretofore been written in the third person I will make this one personal. The reasons for my decision are partly embodied in a letter made public yesterday from me to Major General Clifford R. Powell, Chairman, Executive Committee, United Republicans of Burlington County, Mount Holly, New Jersey, part of which I quote:

"Since I have been a member of the House of Representatives I have stood and voted for what I believed to be right, Republican and American. I have unflinchingly served the people of the District in their personal problems, particularly the veterans. From conferences with you I understand the Republican Party in New Jersey desires to become more 'liberal,' and that my forthright attitude seriously jeopardizes, in certain segments of the District, my re-election this year. Naturally, I rely on these representations. A Republican victory is of paramount importance. Dissension injures its chances. There has been too much dissension already. I do not wish to add to it, from personal pride or any other reason. And you know I have no personal political ambitions. So the only decision possible for me is not to be a candidate for re-election."

Of course, there are other considerations, among which, is my financial obligation to my family. Having no business or other independent income, I have to depend upon what is paid to me as a Congressman to support both a family of five people at home and pay my living expenses in Washington, plus carfare back and forth to see my family for a few hours and constituents who cannot afford to come to Washington, and all the donations and other incidental expenses that go with the position. I first refused to consider being a candidate for Congress at all on the ground that I could not afford it. Other conditions then existing influenced me to do so in spite of this.

From the personal selfish standpoint I am very happy that my decision had to be what it was, but if those conditions had not existed I would have been willing to run for another term in view of the fact that this is a Presidential year and the election of a Republican Congressman who actually stands for Republican principles seems to me to be of great importance to the Nation and to the Fourth Congressional District of New Jersey.

## BLIND AID STAMPS

One of the most important of the many services rendered this community by the Lions Club of Palmyra and Riverton is its Sight Conservation and Blind Aid Program.

In furtherance of this endeavor, a fund has been set up and during the past year numerous needy school children have been given eye examinations. When necessary, glasses are purchased from this Sight Conservation and Blind Aid Fund. Oculists and Optometrists, in the spirit of the cause, have on occasion donated their services. ## SPEAKS TO ROTARIANS ABOUT ABRAHAM LINCOLN

"The character of Abraham Lincoln is typified by one of his own comments on his life: 'I have always plucked the thistle and planted a flower wherever a flower will grow.' It was this outstanding quality of Lincoln, said Russell F. Bush, speaking before the Rotary Club last week, that so endeared him in the hearts of men. Mr. Bush, widely known authority on the life of Lincoln, was introduced by Herbert Bleam.

Mr. Bush skirted the better known facts of the life of the Great Emancipator to paint vividly the lesser known circumstances which contributed so much to the building of his character. He traced these from Lincoln's childhood to his passing in a manner which held the absorbed attention of his audience, covering particularly the period in Springfield where he met and married Mary Todd and where he earned the sobriquet of Honest Abe.

While much can and has been said of the trial Lincoln endured at the hands of Mary Todd, it was her faith in him — her aspirations for him — which was the driving force that carried him to the White House.

Twenty years before he reached there, in defending her decision to marry him, she said, "I love him and some day he will be President." Lincoln's devotion to his stepmother was a reflection of the love she held for him. Near the end of her life she said: "I can say what few mothers can say — Abe never did or said an unkind thing to me." He never forgot the encouragement she gave him throughout his youth and young manhood. Mr. Bush visualized with great clarity that tragic period between March 4, 1861, when Lincoln assumed the burden of the Presidency and April 15, 1865, when his presentation of tragedy was realized.

## Know Your Schools

Palmyra High School

Palmyra High School is approved and accredited by the state of New Jersey and by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Approval by the State Department of Education permits a high school to operate. Approval by the Middle States Association indicates that the standards of the school are equal to or above those required for admission to the colleges which are members of the organization.

Palmyra High School has been approved by the Middle States Association since 1930. In 1942 a favorable report of the evaluating committee extended the accreditation of the high school and subsequent reports submitted by the school have resulted in continued accreditation.

At present 133 graduates of Palmyra High School are enrolled in college. Drexel has the largest number of Palmyra High School graduates, 14; 11 are at Rutgers; 8 at the University of Pennsylvania; 7 at Gettysburg; 6 each at the College of South Jersey and at Dickinson; 5 are studying at Temple and 4 at the University of Michigan. Three Palmyra High School graduates are studying in each of the following colleges: Johns Hopkins, Lehigh, Muhlenberg, North Carolina, Cornell, New Mexico, A. & M., and Illinois College; while 2 each are enrolled in Annapolis, Maryland, Pennsylvania College of Industrial Art, Villanova, University of New Mexico, Wayneburg, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, New Jersey College for Women, Philadelphia College of Pharmacy, Cedar Crest, Farmingdale, and Glenboro. Twenty-eight other graduates of the High School are now studying in as many different colleges and universities as widely separated as the University of Maine, Syracuse, Wilson and Penn State.

This very large enrollment of Palmyra graduates indicates that the college-preparatory courses offered in the High School prepare students for admission to practically any college in the east and middle west. Report cards received at the end of each semester from these colleges indicate that many Palmyra graduates are honor students and that with a very few exceptions all are doing good work.

Not only does Palmyra High School prepare for college entrance with a total of 2 academic courses, 1 college-preparatory Agriculture course, and a pre-nursing course, but it offers 3 commercial courses, Social Science, and Vocational Agriculture courses. These courses are designed to meet the needs of students of different levels of ability and of different interests and needs.

In June 1947, 178 students were graduated from Palmyra High School. Twenty-eight of these girls and boys, 16% of the class, are now enrolled in college, business school, or nursing school; 121 or 68%, are employed; 56 students are working in offices, 15 in distributive occupations; 33 in trades and industry; 2 in farming; 3 in home-making; and 12 in miscellaneous jobs. Ten boys comprising 6% of the class are in the service, and 19 are unaccounted for.

## TRASH COLLECTION NOT APPROVED

There will be no municipal trash collection in Riverton during the current year. This matter was decided at a meeting of Riverton Borough Council last Thursday evening when the supporters of the measure allowed it to pass into oblivion without a single voice being raised in its favor.

As Council pointed out in a letter to all property owners, the only possible way that trash and ashes could be collected was from the curb, since a performance bond for rear door collection could not be secured. Home owners were asked to signify their opinion on this question and 648 letters were sent out. The return cards showed that 99 were in favor of curb collection, while 154 were opposed. Over 100 signified their intention of attending the Thursday meeting.

Despite this survey, only about 75 attended the session and the few who spoke were all against the proposition.

As a result, the \$3,000 item in the 1948 budget was eliminated. To cover the cost of advertising for bids and other expenses the administrative account was increased \$200. This change will necessitate a further budget hearing. It has been scheduled for Thursday, March 11.

Since there were no objections to the budget as approved on first reading, it will probably be adopted March 11, with the changes as mentioned in the foregoing.

The Mayor and Council expressed their gratitude for the splendid interest and cooperation the residents of Riverton always give when they are called upon to help with the problems of local government.

## FIRE CAUSES DEATH OF LOCAL RESIDENT

William R. Rodenbaugh, 73, died in a fire that wrecked his bedroom located on the second floor of a dwelling at 625 Pennsylvania avenue, Palmyra, shortly after noon on Tuesday of this week.

Rodenbaugh, a cripple for several years is believed to have dropped a lighted match which set fire to the furnishings of the room and suffocated him before help could be called. Coroner Donald Belton, of Moorestown, stated that death was caused by suffocation, although the body was badly burned.

Mrs. Mary Rodenbaugh, the sister-in-law of the deceased and a young nephew were eating lunch in a room on the first floor when they heard noises above. Upon opening the door of the room occupied by Mr. Rodenbaugh they were met by a sheet of flames which prevented them entering. Neighbors were also unable to get into the room itself before the quick arrival of the Palmyra Fire Department.

The fire was soon extinguished, being confined to the bedroom, but Mr. Rodenbaugh was beyond aid.

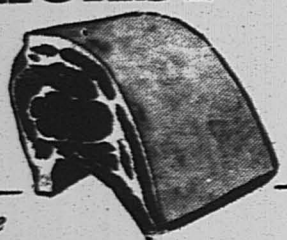

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINNAMINSON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON, NEW JERSEY, AMENDING AN ORDINANCE OF THE SAID TOWNSHIP ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINNAMINSON IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON, NEW JERSEY, FIXING AND DETERMINING THE SALARIES, WAGES OR OTHER COMPENSATION OF ALL OFFICERS, APPOINTEES AND EMPLOYEES OF THE SAID TOWNSHIP."**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Township Committee of the Township of Cinnaminson, in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

SECTION 1: That an Ordinance of the Township of Cinnaminson in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey, adopted June 12, 1945, and thereafter amended by Ordinance of the said Township adopted March 26, 1946, September 24, 1946, and February 18, 1947, respectively, be and the same is hereby further amended, as follows:
