Report from Your Congressman

FRANK A. MATHEWS, JR.

Your Congressman in these reports has not given you much information as to the work he has done on the Veterans' Affairs Committee of the House of which he is a member, and the Subcommittee on Compensation and Pensions of which he is the Chairman. Perhaps this has been due to a mistaken reluctance to "blow his own horn," and he supposes that that attitude is a poor one for a public official. Generally speaking, public officials take a great deal of time broadcasting things they have personally done.

On the other hand, your Congressman probably owes it to his constituents to tell them something of his work in this special line. Your Congressman's interest for a quarter of a century has been the welfare and proper treatment of disabled veterans and widows and dependents of the men who gave their lives in the service of their country.

As a result he introduced a number of bills, several of which were reported out favorably by the Committee on Veterans' Affairs. Among these latter bills were H.R. 3748, designed to give a slight increase in the amount paid to widows and orphans of men who died in the service or from service connected disability; H.R. 5588, which, for the first time, would give some additional compensation to disabled veterans based on the number of their dependents; and H.R. 4007, designed to remedy discriminations and discrepancies created in the original so-called amputee-car legislation previously passed.

The increased allowances to widows and orphans of men who died in the service is badly needed, and your Congressman still hopes that before this session is over that bill will be passed.

On May 19, 1948, in a general discussion of veterans legislation on the Floor of the House, your Congressman pointed out that the three bills above mentioned at the highest estimates for the next four years would make a grand total of increases of \$651,000,000, and further pointed out that from authentic figures obtained from the remarks of Honorable Roy Woodruff, of Michigan, under the "Marshall Plan" \$911,000,000 worth of tobacco was to be given away to foreigners, that figure being \$2,500,000 more than the total cost of your Congressman's three bills for the next four years, the theoretical period of the Marshall Plan!

After making this statement, the following remarks appear in the Congressional Record of that date. The Mrs. Rogers referred to is the Honorable Edith Nourse Rogers, Chairman of the Committee on Veterans' Affairs and the Mr. Ramey is the Honorable Homer Ramey, of Ohio, a member of that Committee.

Your Congressman concludes this report by quoting from that record: "Mrs. ROGERS of Massachusetts: The gentleman from Massachusetts is very interested in the statement made by the gentleman from New Jersey (Mr. Mathews), who has so tirelessly worked for years and years for the veterans as well as working tirelessly in our Committee on Veterans' Affairs in going over bills and trying to find the ones that would do the most good. He always searches for facts. I thought that the \$900,000,000 was even for a shorter time than 4 years under the Marshall Plan.

Mr. MATHEWS: That is probably so, but I have given them the benefit of every doubt.

Mrs. ROGERS of Massachusetts: Even that, for tobacco alone, is more than is spent for feeding and clothing our widows and orphans. That is extremely significant. May I say to the gentleman that I have every

Mr. RAMEY: All of us on the Committee share and concur in the judgment of the gentleman from New Jersey, Judge Mathews, and appreciate the devotion of the gentleman from Massachusetts to the welfare of the veterans. But, I want to further say that I realize that the Chairman and all members of the Committee know of the indefatigable work of the gentleman from New Jersey, Judge Mathews. There has not been a bill but what he has sought to get all the facts and give us the benefit of his investigation. We might further say that there is nothing even political about the gentleman from New Jersey, Judge Mathews. He is not a candidate; he is going to do much better at home in free activities, and I be-

Know Your School

High School Cafeteria

From the hour of 11:30 to 1 o'clock, the Palmyra High School Cafeteria is a busy and popular place for the students. Between 350 and 500 students eat in the cafeteria daily, the number varying with the weather and season of the year. The cafeteria serves not only high school students, but also approximately 50 grade students. A complete lunch may be purchased, or a lunch prepared at home may be supplemented with milk or a hot food.

The dining room of the cafeteria is very attractive with its pretty aqua-colored walls and yellow print draperies hanging at the windows. On the walls, there are seven murals depicting school life; these were painted by students of the high school. An electrically heated hand-washer and ice water cooler are located here for the convenience of the students.

The food is prepared and served by five ladies in the cafeteria. Every year these women must have a medical examination to prevent any transmission of germs. Our head cook, Mrs. Anna Reidenbaker, has worked in the cafeteria for 27 years. Other workers are: Mrs. Elizabeth Meyers, Mrs. Viola Grubb, Mrs. Rose Birchall and Mrs. Edith Webster. Though we are hampered greatly by the lack of working space, sufficient equipment, and storage facilities, we try to serve a variety of food to the students.

The Federal and State governments recognize the fact that the school child needs a good hot lunch, so government financial aid is provided for school lunchrooms. Our cafeteria receives this federal aid which enables us to sell our food at low prices. Under this subsidy plan we serve a platter for 21 cents. For every platter sold, the government reimburses us nine cents. The platter contains a main dish, vegetable or salad, bread, butter, one half-pint of milk, and sometimes a dessert.

Because of the lack of working space and equipment, we can only serve one type of platter each day; sometimes a choice of juice or vegetable is given. By buying a platter, a student can get a good nutritious lunch for 21 cents or for 27 cents when dessert is not included on the platter. These menus are planned with consideration of the likes and dislikes of the school in general.

Milk is a valuable food in our diet; growing children need at least one quart per day. As you have noticed, it plays an important part on our platter. For students who carry their lunches or for those who do not buy a platter, the Federal government subsidizes a milk program which enables us to sell a half-pint of milk for four cents. This plan urges the students to drink more milk, and it is not surprising to see a student buy two or three bottles of milk for himself. We are glad to be able to present such a valuable food as the lowest priced item in our cafeteria. Chocolate milk is not included in this program.

For variety the cafeteria also serves soups, two kinds of salads and sandwiches, three kinds of desserts including home-baked pies and cakes, and ice cream. These prices are slightly higher as no federal subsidy is received; therefore the student pays more for his lunch when he selects the above foods than he would if he selected the platter.

On holidays, appropriate decorations and menus add to the gaiety of the day. If you visit the cafeteria on Halloween, you would find Jack-O-Lanterns around the cafeteria, and witches brew, ghost pudding (continued on ceter page)







ONE OF OUR USELESS MEMBERS

ONCE as dreaded a disease as cancer, still dramatically dangerous, yet nowadays dismissed rather too often as a minor affair—that's the story of appendicitis in a diminutive nutshell!

As recently as 1750, appendicitis was recognized as an independent disease by a young French physician. But not until 1886, did Dr. Reginald Fitz of Boston convince the world that inflammation of the appendix was a local condition that could be cured by removing the diseased appendix. Previously people called it "typhilitis" or "inflammation of the large bowel" and many people died, helplessly and hopelessly, of it.

The appendix is a narrow tubular organ, usually three or four inches in length and a quarter of an inch in diameter, extending downward from the large intestine. It is particularly vulnerable to kinking or blocking. Having no useful function to perform and being poorly supplied with fresh blood, the appendix often becomes a depository for bacteria.

In fact, the tissue of the appendix is quite similar to that of the tonsil, which also is apt to become a focus of infection.

Like a street corner loafer, the appendix often gets in the way of its functioning neighbors, is likely to develop into a dangerous nuisance and even get into criminal trouble.

When the appendix becomes seriously infected and inflamed, the owner of it has acute appendicitis. If this development is not promptly interrupted by appropriate surgery the offending appendix may become gangrenous and eventually rupture—spreading its infection to the sensitive linings of the abdominal cavity.

men. When this happens, the patient has peritonitis, and he's in for a rocky time until the generalized infection can be controlled. Four out of every ten adults are said to have attacks of appendicitis—frequently of a mild nature at one time or another during their lives. It is most common in the ages 10 to 35, although it is no stranger either to the infant or the aged.

Appendicitis seems to be one of the penalties of civilization, for it is relatively rare among savage tribes. There is no sure way to preventing appendicitis, but we can reduce the likelihood of an appendix becoming troublesome by (1) avoiding concentrated foods that tend to constipate us, in favor of bulkier and coarser items; (2) exercising regularly, especially by the quiet old sport of walking; and by (3) avoiding frequent or unprescribed use of laxatives. This last—avoidance of laxatives is especially important.

The symptoms of appendicitis are variable, and it is often difficult to diagnose. But any abdominal pain that lasts more than three or four hours should be treated seriously, and the proprietor of such a tummy should take it promptly to his doctor.





Friends of the family, said Singer suffered from a stomach ailment. Police said no note was found to explain Singer's action.

SUNDAY DINNER

Suggestions

For a Sunday dinner dish that is delightfully different, the A & P Service for Home-Makers suggests savory egg-aroni, topped with juicy, red tomatoes or golden cheese. This recipe will serve four. Cut four hard-boiled eggs into quarters. Make a white sauce with two tablespoons of melted fat, two tablespoons of flour and one and two-thirds cups of milk, added slowly. Cook this, stirring constantly, until it is thickened.

Then add to the sauce one teaspoon of minced onion, one-half tablespoon of horseradish, one and one-half cups of cooked macaroni and salt and pepper. Stir into this the egg and pour into a greased baking dish.

Cut two large, ripe tomatoes into quarters and press into the macaroni mixture, leaving the skin surfaces up. Sprinkle over this one-half cup of fine bread crumbs that have been sprinkled liberally with melted butter. Bake 20 to 30 minutes, or until tomatoes are tender in a moderate oven (350° F.). Serve hot.

Pieces of canned tomatoes may be used in place of the fresh vegetable. In this case, make the sauce with the juice of the tomatoes instead of milk.

If you like, omit the tomatoes and substitute cheese. Mix one-half cup of grated or finely-chopped cheese with the bread crumbs and sprinkle over the top after the dish has been in the oven about 15 to 16 minutes.

Round out the meal with chilled grapefruit or orange juice, banana, apple and raisin salad and dessert.







LARGE APARTMENT NOT FAVORED

At the meeting of Riverton Borough Council held on Thursday night of last week the governing body decided not to amend the zoning ordinance to allow the construction of a 150-unit apartment house on the former Dreer property, Broad and Fulton streets.

Council had been advised that the present owners had been approached by an out-of-town firm with an offer to purchase a portion of the tract if such a development could be approved. The project would have F.H.A. financing.

A limited survey made by Council revealed that many city citizens were in favor of small apartments, but felt that a 150-home unit would not be suitable for a community of the size of Riverton.

Other important factors considered were the cost of new utilities such as streets, lights and sewers, together with the school situation. Dewees F. Showell, president of the Riverton Board of Education stated that the maximum number of additional pupils that could be accommodated (allowing for normal expansion) would probably be not over 60. Any appreciable increase over that figure would necessitate the construction of new buildings, with a consequent burden to the taxpayers.

The governing body emphatically approves new construction, the Borough, but does not feel that such a large unit would be advantageous to Riverton.

George W. Luce, Sr., speaking before his fellow Rotarians last week in celebration of Flag Day, gave an inspirational address outlining what the flag should symbolize for the citizens of this nation. Herbert Bleam introduced Mr. Luce.

The great body of us have the power, said Mr. Luce, to offset completely the influence of the comparative few who would rob us of the heritage for which our flag stands. Exercise of that power is a duty of our citizenship if we would preserve that individual freedom we so often take for granted.

What accounts for our history of prosperity? Why are we favored above other peoples? What made it possible for us twice within a generation to serve as the "arsenal of democracy"? What impetus led us from the primitive life of our forebears to leadership in the development of science and the arts? Are we a superior people? Do we have harder? Do we have greater natural resources?

The answer to these questions, said Mr. Luce, lies in the concept of freedom which we have held since earliest Colonial days — a concept which has motivated us in every line of human endeavor to higher degrees of attainment. Its essence is responsibility of the individual. This is the rich prize which we have held and which we must guard.

In keeping our educational processes abreast of our Country's needs, we must inculcate our youth with the ideals upon which it was founded so that they may relate the problems they meet in life to these fundamentals.

Democracy is defined as government directly by the people collectively. A republic, however, is a representative democracy — that is, the sovereignty is in the people, but the administration is by their elected representatives. Ours is a republic. That is the system upon which our greatness has been built. That is the system which is an outgrowth of the Christian doctrine of the individual freedom of man. That is the system for which our flag stands.

Ten generations are looking down on us to whom this torch of freedom has been passed. Ours is the task of working together with God's help so that our freedom and our leadership of the world in its quest of peace may be maintained.




Finals of the tournament, part of the local Celebration of the Fourth, will take place on the Riverton Park courts if resurfacing is completed in time.
