## ELECTION RESULTS

Extremely heavy voting marked the General Election locally as a number of districts polled over 90 per cent of those registered. As has been the custom during recent presidential years, the large Democratic vote in preponderantly Republican communities followed the trend established back in 1932 as the supporters of the Truman ticket cut deeply into usual Republican majorities of off presidential years.

Another factor which apparently hurt the G. O. P. candidates was the apparent dissatisfaction over the recent bridge purchases. This appeared particularly true in the vote for Jones, McCay Church and Snover.

The three Riverton districts went over 3 to 1 for Governor Dewey, but in the five Palmyra polling places the count was Dewey, 1,509; Truman 972. The vote for Hendrickson followed along similar lines.

Howell for the House of Representatives on the Democratic slate defeated Jones in Palmyra, while the latter won by only seven votes in Riverton.

McCay for State Senate and Wells for Assembly, Republican candidates both won locally.

The Republican Freeholder candidates, Frank A. Snover and Leroy Church had their predicted majorities cut materially in the local communities.

Both bond issues were decisively defeated here.

### Local Candidates

The local Republican candidates were without opposition, with the following being elected:

Riverton: Charles Coward and Richard Lippincott elected members of the Borough Council.

Cinnaminson: Robert J. Woods elected member of the Township Committee.

Palmyra: Robert Eastwood, Jr., W. Paul VanSant and B. C. Hornor, elected members of the Borough Council.

## CHILD MOLESTER IS APPREHENDED

Beginning September 4th, and for several weeks thereafter, there were numerous occasions when children were molested near the Riverton School. The police found it a difficult task to locate the offender. Excitement ran high and many people escorted their children to school.

After long investigation the offender was located at a college in another State by Sergeant John J. Robinson, of Riverton, who contacted the Dean of the college. The offender was persuaded to return to Riverton and face charges. He arrived Friday noon and secured the services of a lawyer immediately. Arrangements were made for the parents of two of the children to be present at a trial before Recorder William Bottger in the Riverton police headquarters. The offender plead non vult to a charge of disorderly conduct and appropriate punishment was meted out by Recorder Bottger who also placed the young man in the custody of the Dean of his college. He admitted, through his attorney, that he had been under psychiatric treatment.

The clearing up of this difficult case was entirely due to the persistence of Sgt. Robinson although he possessed only one slim clue on which to pursue the offender. It took many hours of work as well as many disappointments before the desired results became apparent. The officials of Riverton have expressed their gratitude and appreciation to him and the Police Department for their tireless efforts in solving the case.

## HERBERT F. FRASER TO SPEAK AT WESTFIELD MEETING

## RIVERTON PLANNING COMMISSION IS ORGANIZED

By virtue of appointments made by Mayor S. R. Coale, Riverton now has a Planning Commission. The Commission is presently composed of six members and an organizational meeting was held on Thursday evening October 28th in the Borough Council chambers.

Councilman George Becton met with members of the newly formed Commission to discuss Borough affairs and talk over how planning for the future of Riverton might best be started. It was brought out, during the discussion, that the Institute of Local and State Government of the University of Pennsylvania maintains an excellent service available to Municipalities on the subject of "Planning." Arrangements for a visit with a representative from the Institute was considered to be a good "first step."

The Commission members elected Mrs. Carvel Sparks as temporary chairman. The others serving Riverton in the new work are: Mrs. John Lowe, W. W. Chalmers, Huston D. Crippen, Peter O. Sykora and John H. Thompson. The next meeting of the Commission is planned for Thursday, November 11, 1948.

## MAN WITH CRIMINAL RECORD ARRESTED

On Saturday, October 30th, while on patrol duty at 2:00 p.m., Officer Albert Pierce, of Riverton, noticed a suspicious character in the business section of Riverton. He was taken to Riverton police headquarters for questioning and it was found that he had a criminal record. He had been arrested, police state, three times on burglary charges in Philadelphia and was locked up for further investigation.

A trial was held before Recorder William Bottger on Sunday morning and the suspect was sentenced to 30 days in the Burlington County Jail on vagrancy charges.

## Statement by Lewis On Bridge Deal

The 1947 legislation is not the issue involved in the recent Burlington County Bridge transaction. That legislation, introduced in the Assembly by Assemblyman McCay, had a good and valid purpose, namely, to enable the county as well as the State to negotiate for the acquisition of the Bridges in question, the condemnation price has been fixed at approximately \$5,300,000. That legislation was supported by me in the Senate where it received a unanimous vote before the bill was signed into law by the Governor.

The real issue, however, is the subsequent secret "transactions" or "deal" resulting in the ultimate purchase of the Bridges at a price of \$12,400,000, through a Commission quickly created by the Board of Freeholders. I had absolutely no knowledge or information whatsoever as to these secret transactions or any of the terms and conditions thereof until after settlement for the purchase of the Bridges had been actually consummated.

The two questions raised by a large number of sincere and honest people in Burlington county are:

(1) Why were the terms and conditions of the final purchase transaction kept secret and not divulged to the public or made known to the State before the settlement was completed?

(2) Why should Burlington county be a party to a "deal" to pay more than the condemnation value of these Bridges?

In my opinion the good name, honor and integrity of Burlington county in dealing with the State and in making purchases of any kind, is worth far more than two bridges and I regret very much to see the county subjected throughout New Jersey and the surrounding States to ridicule and criticism, which naturally follows such secret maneuvers and sub rosa dealings.

## STATEMENT BY BRIDGE COMMISSION

The newly-created Burlington County Bridge Commission has notified the Delaware River Joint Commission that it would cooperate fully with that body in granting permission for construction of a bridge or tunnel across the Delaware at any point south of the Camden-Philadelphia Bridge. The three Commissioners declared that it was "not our understanding that we have any such right" to block development of these specific projects.

In addition the Burlington Commission asked the Joint Commission to follow suit and reduce tolls on the Delaware River Bridge as had been done on the Tacony-Palmyra and Burlington Bristol bridges. This suggestion was urged as a cooperative step toward improvement of growth and traffic facilities for South Jersey, the Seashore and the Lower Delaware River Valley. It declared a free flow of traffic over cheap crossings of the Delaware should be the objective for both Commissions.

The County Commission took action upon obtaining copies of a report and resolution issued by General Manager Joseph K. Costello for the Delaware River Joint Commission dated October 27 stating that the Burlington County Bridge Commission has the right to say that no bridge or other crossing can be built below the Delaware River Bridge as far as Gloucester.

No copies of the report or resolution were said to have been sent to the County Bridge Commission, which was organized October 22 under legislative authority to operate the Tacony-Palmyra and Burlington-Bristol Bridges, purchased by Burlington from private owners.

Col. Howard R. Yocum, of Maple Shade, chairman of the County Commission, said the letter pledging cooperation to the Joint Commission had been issued to correct widespread reports that Burlington County was now in a position to block contemplated bridges or tunnels spanning the Delaware through ownership rights of the Tacony-Palmyra and Burlington-Bristol Bridges. The Commission met Sunday and approved Col. Yocum's statement to Costello as the Joint Commission's managing official.

"It is not our understanding that we have any right," the County Commission said, "but if such is the case, we want you to know that we are willing to cooperate fully with a view to permitting the construction of a bridge or tunnel at any point south of the Camden-Philadelphia bridge."

"We favor the full growth and development of the Port and Cities of Philadelphia and Camden and will cooperate fully in any program necessary to promote such development provided, of course, that such program is not accomplished at the expense of Burlington County. We propose to operate the Tacony-Palmyra and Burlington-Bristol bridges for the joint benefit of the taxpayers of Burlington County and the motoring public."

"We consider it inequitable and unfair that surplus revenues of our bridges should be used to build and operate facilities outside our County which will not be self-supporting. We had legislative authority and acquired these properties in a legitimate business transaction on a willing seller — willing buyer basis. We

own these very profitable bridges and propose to manage them for the benefit of the area and people whom they serve."

This last opinion, it was said, was directed against complaints by New Jersey's Governor Driscoll and Costello that Burlington's outright purchase of the two bridges had interfered with their plans to acquire the properties and divert revenues toward building Delaware River facilities contemplated in the future.

The statement pointed out that it was Burlington's understanding the Joint Commission has no authority to buy or build any bridges, "and we know of no other public body in a position to do likewise." The County Commissioners went on to say that if such a body is created in the future it will have Burlington's full cooperation, subject only to the above-stated restrictions.

In urging that the Joint Commission follow Burlington's action by reducing tolls on the Camden-Philadelphia bridge, the County Commission had this to say:

"We have already reduced tolls on our bridges and expect to effect further reductions in the future. We hope that you too may soon be able to reduce further the tolls on the Camden-Philadelphia bridge, which would seem to be possible in view of your current revenues."

"A free flow of traffic over cheap crossings of the Delaware River will promote the growth and development of all South Jersey. If both Commissions can continue to reduce tolls and improve their facilities and approaches, and if additional self-liquidating, non-profit crossings can be provided where needed, much will be accomplished to assure the prosperity of the Lower Delaware River Valley and our Seashore resorts."

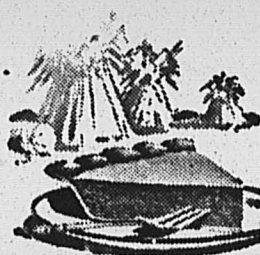

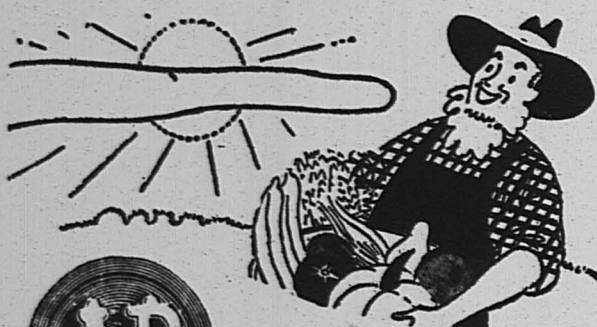

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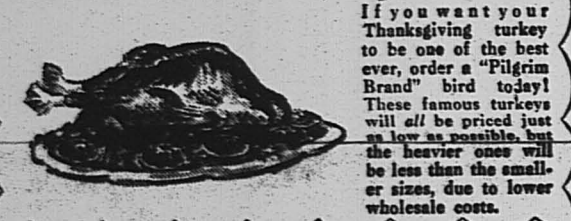

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## ANNUAL REPORT OF FAMILY SERVICE COUNCIL SECRETARY

The annual report of Mrs. Eleanor S. Smith, Executive Secretary of the Family Service Council of Riverton and Cinnaminson is as follows.

"Once again we bring you a report of the previous year. First of all a few statistics: number of families contacted 60; number of individuals contacted 245; visits paid 698; office interviews, letters, telephone calls, etc., 2,194, making a total of 2,892.

"Of our 60 families, 10 have needed financial assistance; only 2 families, however, have needed help for more than two months. Two others have needed assistance once, the other 6 were helped in times of illness.

"The employment level is still high and there seems to be a general feeling of greater financial security in the community. After January 1st of next year, unemployment insurance is being extended to many workers to cover illness so that if employment continues generally we may have still fewer applicants for relief. It must be remembered, however, that ours is a country town and a farming community, and that, so far, a large section of our workers is not covered by some of these benefits.

"How then do we spend our time and money? The low income families among our clients are especially hard hit by the high cost of necessary food and clothing, and hardly a week passes without money being spent to supplement their incomes for urgently needed sweaters, shoes, bedding, milk, etc. Our good friends of the Needlework Guild were most generous in their contribution of clothing and a check for shoes and we wish to take this opportunity publicly to thank them for their kindness. We have given away almost 800 articles of clothing, and, in addition, purchased 26 new articles which were badly needed by school children. Money also has been spent to help defray medical expenses from time to time. One of our families has recently been increased by a 13th child—the doctor has not yet been paid for the delivery of the 11th and 12th babies. The father, a farm laborer, is almost desperate. Here supplemental help is needed.

"Others of our friends in the community have donated mattresses, bed springs, sheets, and many articles of clothing. These we have tried to use wisely and know they have been gratefully received. Our Clothing Committee, Mrs. Cannon and Mrs. Robbins, has been most helpful and we believe the clothes closet has never been in better shape.

"Christmas season claims a share of time and effort of our community. Gifts from church classes, a girls' sorority, committees from the Riverton Porch Club and the Palmyra Woman's Club (Evening Section), Westfield First Day School, and many of our Board members and friends have helped brighten the season for over 90 of our friends and neighbors. This means much work but it is most rewarding.

"Problems with young people entered into 29 — almost half of the families interviewed. As there is no single cause for these problems so also there is no single cure. We have worked with the schools, nurses, doctors and ministers, as well as the parents on these problems. There have been encouraging results in better health and steady school attendance among at least 20 of our children whose previous records were exceptionally poor. Difficult behavior problems in adults and children alike have been explained to the parents and helped at the Mental Hygiene Clinic.

"We have given short talks on our work before the Porch Club and the Riverton League of Women Voters, and we have worked with the Planning Committee of the Burlington County Welfare Council in helping

to secure the services of a psychiatrist at the Evergreen Park and the Welfare Home. We have worked also with the East Riverton Civic Center in getting a speaker for one of their meetings to discuss problems of recreation among our colored friends and neighbors.

"We note an increasing number of short contact cases in which no relief is needed, those which vary from two interviews, to possibly 8 or 10. Because of the increase in this type of work, I should like here to speak of the importance of what is often called the counseling process. It is more than an interview—getting information or giving advice. It is an effort to help our clients better to understand their own problems, to see what in their special situation is important for them, so that by their own efforts they can achieve satisfaction and success and as soon as possible be independent of us. Each one of us like to solve our own problems and we are more able to do so if we can see our problems objectively.

Other accomplishments of the year were: helping with two adoption cases which have turned out successfully; assisting a family to get a child from the State Board for boarding, a child which they hope eventually to adopt; assisting the Red Cross in providing for a large family burned out. During the oil shortage last winter, our office was headquarters for special oil allotments. Mrs. Durgin worked over time on these problems. A report of our work would not be complete without expressing gratitude to her for her able handling of the many office problems. As a client's first interview may be with her, her sympathetic handling of often difficult situations help immensely in our subsequent work with them.

Finally, a word about the future. The confidential and often intangible nature of our work has been immensely helped by the sympathy and

The board of directors of the Riverton Free Library Association has planned a social evening for Tuesday, November 30, in the Riverton Porch Club to which residents of the three local communities are invited to attend.

The feature of the evening will be the showing of colored pictures of Switzerland taken by Victor Ritschard, of Riverton, on his trip to that country during the past summer.

The program will start at 8 p.m. No admission will be charged but there will be a silver offering the proceeds of which go toward library expenditures.

## Bridge Suit Deplored

The two recently-elected Democratic freeholders — Richard J. Lippincott and Henry S. Haines — were warned that they were setting a bad example of public service for the taxpayers by their legal attempts to set aside the county's purchase of Tacony-Palmyra and Burlington-Bristol bridges.

This warning came on Tuesday from Daniel E. Lichtenthal, former county prosecutor and Democratic member of the Burlington County Bridge Commission, after the commission revealed that in a brief three-week period of operation the two bridges had returned a profit of \$73,836.32 for the county to service the bridge debt and lay aside the remainder for the county's treasury.

Lippincott and Haines came under their fellow-Democrat's fire when this brief but profitable operation of the county-owned spans was temporarily terminated as a result of the freeholders' filing suit asking for custodial receivership to prevent the county from operating the properties.

"I regret," Lichtenthal said at the Commission meeting, "that the new Burlington County Freeholders are continuing with the prosecution of the suit seeking to set aside the purchase of the Tacony-Palmyra and the Burlington-Bristol bridges by Burlington county. I hope they will realize that they are not starting out to serve the best interests of the county by attempting to deprive the county of the substantial income that can be realized from the operation of the bridges by the county."

"The continuation of the litigation of this nature may serve to throw up a cloud on the question of Burlington county's right to the bridges. It has affected the motoring public and is jeopardizing the ultimate benefit to the taxpayer of Burlington county through the large reserve fund which can be built up by the operation of the bridges in the behalf of the County of Burlington."

As the commission closed out the bridge operation business prior to obeying the court order they revealed that though they had reduced tolls five cents on each of the bridges, the three week period had showed a marked increase in traffic and tolls over a similar period a year ago. The traffic was up 7.86 per cent and revenue advanced 3.61 on the Tacony-Palmyra span alone, it was announced by Leo A. Schaeffer, assistant general manager of the span.

The Sacred Heart P.T.A. will hold a Christmas Bazaar in the school on Tuesday, December 7, starting at 2 p.m., and continuing during the afternoon and evening. Mrs. Ralph Dages and Mrs. Christopher Davis will also be a booth where cakes may be purchased for Christmas gifts. There will also be a booth where cakes may be purchased and another for the sale of soft drinks, ice cream and hot dogs. The various grade mothers will have charge of the booths.

The P.T.A. feels that the sale will afford many local residents the opportunity to do their Christmas shopping early.

## The Bridge Situation

The legal aspects of the Burlington county bridge transaction become more complicated as the days go by. The latest developments are as follows:

The Appellate Division of the Superior Court stayed authority of a custodial receiver (appointed last week) and returned control of the bridges to the Burlington County Bridge Commission. The court set December 13 as the date for hearing the bridge commission's appeal on restraints placed against its actions in operating the bridges (ordered by another court on November 4).

A suit was filed in Federal Court at Trenton on behalf of former stockholders of the Tacony-Palmyra Bridge charging fraud and violation of the Securities Exchange Act in the sale and seeking to recover profits of more than \$3,459,000 alleged to have accrued to the promoters during the transactions.

This suit was begun by State Senator Arthur W. Lewis, counsel for Dr. Charles S. Mills, of Riverton and Harry B. Williams, of Palmyra, both stockholders of the Tacony-Palmyra Bridge Co.

With the control of the custodial receiver held in abeyance it is reported that the reduction in toll charge will again be in force. Thus in a period of three weeks tolls have been reduced, increased and reduced again. In the same space of time the bridge commissioners have also been in control, out of control and back in charge of operations.

Attorney General VanRiper made public his report and recommendations on Sunday. This followed his extensive investigation into the facts concerning the sale of the two bridges.

In this report it was recommended that the State start two suits against the bridge deal.

One suit would be to rescind the sale of the two Delaware River toll bridges to the Burlington County Bridge Commission by the Burlington-Bristol Bridge Co.

The other would be to recover the profits—estimated by Van Riper at \$2,000,000—from Clifford R. Powell, Burlington County Republican leader; T. R. Hanft, Philadelphia bridge painting contractor; Tutill Ketcham, Chicago investment banking firm partner; and their nine fellow stockholders in the Burlington-Bristol Bridge Co.

Upon receipt of Van Riper's 29-page report, Governor Driscoll announced that the proceedings it recommends "will be instituted promptly." Driscoll added that he will mobilize all the state's legal prosecution forces to set aside the entire transaction and will tell the attorney general to move immediately in the courts to get action.

She was a practical nurse in this section for more than 30 years and formerly conducted a Maternity Home on Main street, Riverton.

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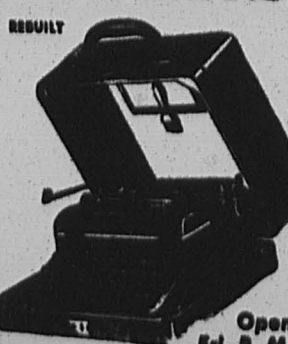

## LICENSES REVOKED

Because they drove before reaching the minimum age of 17 years

required of New Jersey licensed operators. 67 youths have been placed on the prohibitory list during the first 10 months of the year. Motor Vehicle Commissioner Arthur W. Magee announced this week.

These young people are not permanently banned from taking driver's test, Mr. Magee said. Instead of taking the test on his 17th birthday, the offender must wait out the same period he drove between the time of his apprehension and his 17th birthday. In other words, if a youth drove a motor vehicle on his 16th birthday, he cannot apply for a driver's permit until his 18th anniversary.

Commissioner Magee's report showed 899 license revocations for drunken driving, 26 less than during the comparable ten months of last year. Total revocations this year have been 11,858 as against 11,784.
