Democratic Ticket

A foretaste of things to come on the political scene in Burlington county was revealed last week by five leading Democrats who announced their candidacy for political posts.

They are Assemblyman John B. Atkinson, Vincentown dairy farmer, candidate for a full term in the lower house; Franklin L. Tallman of Columbus, also a dairy farmer, candidate for one of two vacancies on the Board of Freeholders; Joseph F. Clauss, chairman of the Riverside Township Committee, candidate for the other Freeholder post; John H. Mustard, Riverton businessman, candidate for County Clerk, and Dr. Kenneth L. Shaver, Florence physician, candidate for County Coroner.

All are endorsed for the April 19 primary by the regular Democratic County organization and will campaign for a place on the ballot as that party's candidates in next November's general election.

Asked to comment on the new Democratic ticket Assemblyman Atkinson said:

"The voters of Burlington County elected four Democrats to office last November — James M. Davis, Jr., to the State Senate, Henry S. Haines and Richard J. Lippincott to the Board of Freeholders and me to the Assembly.

"In voting to sweep out the old Republican machine organization, the men and women of this County proved they want fair, honest and responsible representation in Trenton and Mount Holly.

"With this slate we offer a continuation of that kind of government. Each candidate is the best qualified man available in the County.

"We are going to carry our campaign to the people. We are going to discuss principles, not personalities, and," he concluded, "we are going to tell facts, not fiction."

The Red Cross fund raising campaign started this week. The American Red Cross is now preparing for any major disaster that might strike the Nation.

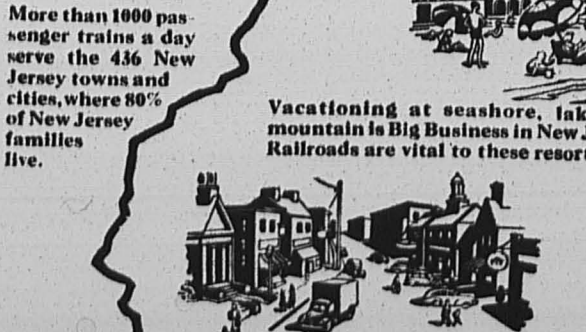

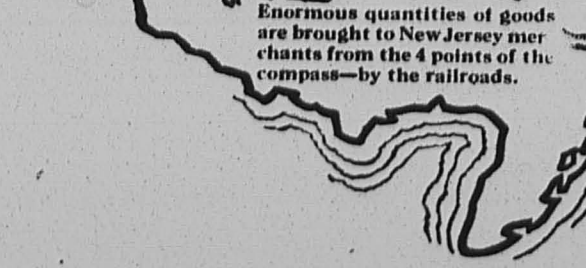

BRIDGE TOLLS AGAIN SHOW INCREASE

Revenues from the Tacony-Palmyra and Burlington-Bristol bridges continued to increase during February, the Burlington County Bridge Commission announced Tuesday.

Fred C. Norcross, Jr., secretary-treasurer of the commission, said revenues from the two spans last month increased \$13,819.91 or 18.91 percent over the same period of 1948. He added that gross receipts taken in during February totaled \$86,896.54. "Traffic increased 34.77 percent," Norcross said, "as a total of 325,690 vehicles used the two bridges during February, bettering by 84,031 the traffic count for the same period last year."

A breakdown of the 28-day report, Norcross disclosed, shows that traffic on the Palmyra span alone increased 35.92 percent.

This represented an increase of 73,402 vehicles. Norcross added, as 277,739 automobiles, trucks and buses traveled over the span last month.

"The Palmyra span revenues showed an increase of 18.27 percent," the bridge commissioner said. "A total of \$73,937.25, or an increase of \$11,425.15, was taken in during February."

During the 28-day period, Norcross continued, vehicles using the Burlington-Bristol bridge totaled 47,951. The traffic count showed an increase of 10,629 vehicles or 28.48 percent, he added.

"Revenues on the Burlington span increased 22.75 percent," Norcross explained, "as \$12,923.29 was taken in during February, topping by \$2,394.76 the gross receipts for the same month last year."

Norcross also reported that from October 23, 1948, to February 28, 1949, during the first 129 days of public ownership, the bridges showed both traffic and revenue increases over the corresponding period a year ago, when the spans were privately owned.

"Since the Bridge Commission assumed operation of the two bridges on October 23, 1948," Norcross said, "the spans showed revenues totaling \$402,172.74. "This is an increase of \$40,373.14 or 11.16 percent over the same period a year ago."

During the 129 days, a total of 1,491,114 vehicles traveled over the two spans, a boost of 600,000 percent over the corresponding period under private ownership.

Norcross broke down the 129-day report as follows:
Tacony-Palmyra bridge: Revenues, \$340,473.25, an increase of \$31,871.55, or 10.33 percent; traffic, 1,262,822 vehicles, an increase of 257,497, or 25.61 percent.

Burlington-Bristol bridge: Revenues, 61,699.49, an increase of \$8,501.59, or 15.98 percent; traffic, 228,292 vehicles, an increase of 41,445 or 22.18 percent.

"The increase in revenues was achieved despite a reduction of tolls on both bridges to 25 cents," Norcross reported. "Previous tolls for the Tacony-Palmyra bridge were 30 cents. Tolls on the Burlington-Bristol span were 35 cents."

"When the restraining order obtained by Freeholders Haines and

Lippincott is lifted," he added, "the Bridge Commission will consider the reduction of commutation rates."

Haines and Lippincott have taken legal action to set aside the purchase of the two Delaware river bridges by Burlington county. A similar suit has been filed by Governor Alfred E. Driscoll.

Other members of the Bridge Commission are Howard R. Vocum, chairman, and Daniel Lichtenhal, vice chairman.

CONGRESSMAN HOWELL REPORTS

On Thursday of this week, I made my first "one minute" speech in connection with my introducing a bill providing some Federal funds for a Labor-Education Extension Service. Briefly this bill would provide some Federal funds to be matched at least 25 percent by the States or institutions or individuals in the States, to set up and carry on a system of education primarily for officials and members of labor unions.

Participating colleges would conduct extension courses in suitable localities, in much the same manner as the Agricultural Extension Service. I believe this service would be of great assistance in promoting better and more intelligent understanding between Labor and Management.

Wednesday I attended a conference in the Senate Caucus Room on the problems of the potato price support program.

It is generally agreed that the reduction to 60 percent of the support price on potatoes was in the public interest. In addition to this, New Jersey was given a very substantial reduction in its acreage allotment, in contrast to many other states. It is this latter point which causes some concern, and I hope the Department of Agriculture which has changed its acreage formula every year can work out a fair basis for treatment of the various states which does not change from year to year, so that a proper cut or increase can be made each year to conform to the estimated needs of the country.

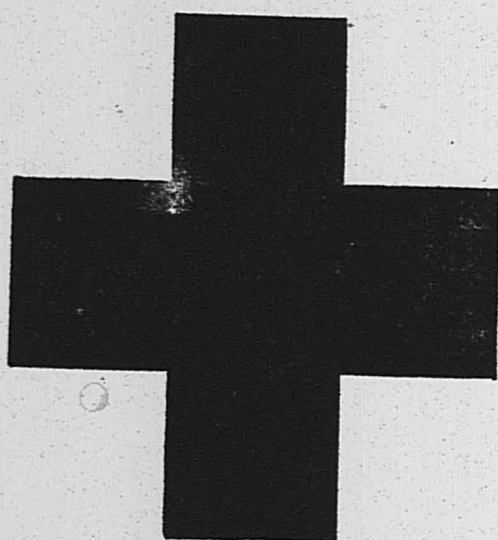

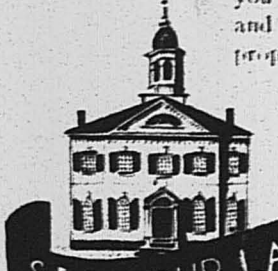

CONTRACTS AWARDED FOR PALMYRA SCHOOL

The Palmyra Board of Education, at a special meeting held Tuesday evening, March 1, awarded contracts to low bidders for the new Elementary School as follows:

General Construction Work: C. & T. Construction Co., of Collingswood, \$140,851.00.
Steel and Iron Work: General Iron Works, Camden, \$8,850.00.
Plumbing Work: Charles H. Knecht, Merchantville, \$11,415.00.
Heating and Ventilating Work: Charles H. Knecht, Merchantville, \$27,069.00.
Electrical Work: Robert Blyth, Trenton, on the base bid of \$8,814.00 plus Alternate No. 5-B for fluorescent fixtures in class rooms of \$1,437.00.

The above items do not include the architect's fees nor equipment. It is planned to move pupil desks from several of the rooms now in use to the new building, thus postponing the purchase of new equipment. The P.T.A. is undertaking the equipping of the cafeteria as its project. The general construction bid includes the installation of table and bench units for the cafeteria.

It is anticipated the work will begin about March 15, and the completion of the project will be realized within 240 days, or approximately next December.

There were 13 bidders for the general construction work; 8 for the steel and iron work; 6 for plumbing; 7 for heating and ventilation; and 5 for the electrical work.
Micklewright and Mountford, architects, have estimated that the cost per cubic foot on the basis of

the low bids will be 87¢ per cu. ft. This is considerably lower than was anticipated and much lower than recently received bids in Philadelphia and in the area surrounding Camden.

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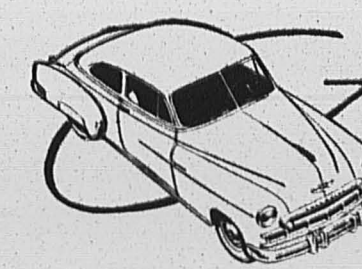
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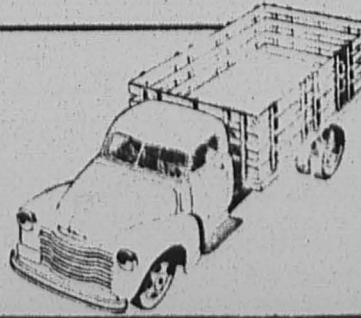

Vegetable Cookery Chart

Vegetables are a most important source of vitamins and minerals. Daily menus for the family should include at least one serving of green or yellow vegetables, one serving of potato or other vegetable, one serving of raw vegetable in salad or sandwiches. The vitamin content of vegetables is elusive and should be preserved in several ways:

1. Be sure to purchase only fresh, crisp vegetables.
2. Store vegetables in crisper of refrigerator as soon as possible after purchase.
3. Cook in vessel with tight-fitting cover, in one inch of boiling water. Green leafy vegetables require no water.
4. Do not overcook or vitamin content will be lost.
5. Do not peel or cut vegetables and let stand before cooking unless placed in refrigerator in covered container without water (except potatoes which are covered with water).
6. Soda added to vegetables during cooking destroys vitamins, softens texture and color is undesirable.

Reserve liquor that is left in cooking vegetables for use in soups, sauces, and gravies.

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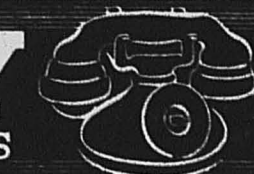
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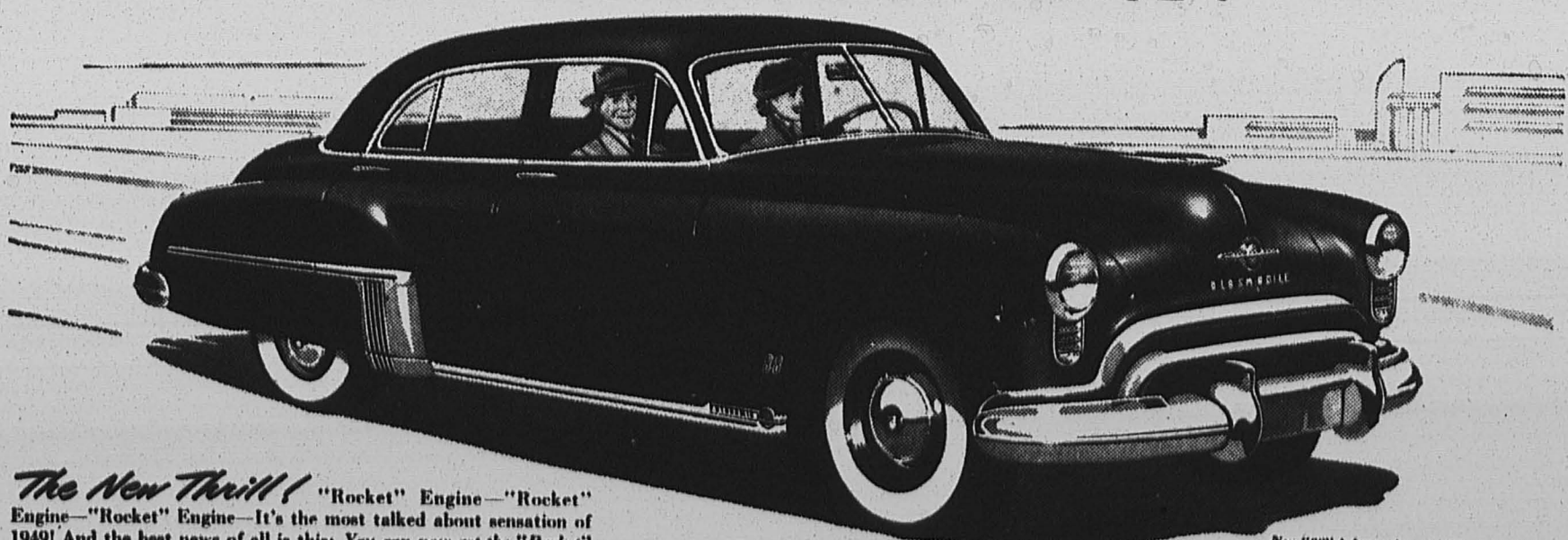
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GET AUTO LICENSES NOW. AVOID LAST MINUTE RUSH

HEAVY DAMAGE IN GARAGE FIRE

Damage estimated at \$50,000 was caused by a fire shortly before 1 p.m. last Saturday when flames completely destroyed the structure occupied by Oliver's Express on the south side of Broad street and Park avenue, Palmyra.

Considerable damage was also caused to the dwelling on the west side of the express building occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Gilbert and Mr. and Mrs. George Chardwick.

The fire was discovered by the watchman, who notified Jack Oliver, head of the express company. He in turn called the Palmyra Fire Company. Although the firemen made a quick run, the entire building was enveloped in flames when they arrived on the scene.

Mr. Oliver stated that a valuable assortment of tools in the building was also a total loss. These were not covered by insurance.

One of the trailers was loaded with 62,000 empty finished cans which were enroute to the R. M. Hollingshead Co., in Camden, to be filled with Glass Wax.

The cause of the fire has not been definitely established.

WELLS STILL A
CANDIDATE FOR
