## RECTOR RESIGNS



The Rev. John R. Crockett, Rector of Christ Church, Riverton, has accepted a call to become Rector of the Church of the Epiphany, Ventnor City, N. J.

A member of the trustees of the Diocese the Board of Religious Education and director of the priests choir for the Bishop, Father Crockett served the Diocese.

Having also been in charge of the church in Palmyra during the war shortage he became interested in both communities. The Rector offered the Parish House to the community although it was not accepted. Under his leadership, dances were sponsored for the teen-agers, and Christ Church sponsors four scout units.

Both churches were completely renovated and painted and four new heating units installed in the buildings. After the fire in Palmyra, the church was beautifully restored.

Under the Rector's leadership, both parishes reached the height of financial status in their long history and the missionary giving was doubled. The church school tripled in five years.

Christ Church choir is one of the finest in the Diocese, and many excellent musical oratorios under Amos Heacock were presented for the community.

Interested in both the colored and the white people of both communities and the Cinnaminson Home, Father John leaves many friends. He will preach his farewell sermon on the Sunday after Easter.

## Youth Council Drive

The Tri-Boro Youth Council Campaign has organized for its 1949 drive with Roland M. Shoemaker as chairman. The campaign will again take in the six youth organizations of three communities: Boy Scouts, Community Center, Civic Club, Girl Scouts, YMCA and the YWCA.

Each week there will be a report from one or more of these groups on its activities and purposes.

In the last five or six years the Girl Scouts have seen their membership in the three towns grow from about 75 girls to well over 300. From three troops they have swelled to 15, and girls of any race or creed, from age 7 in the Brownie Troops to 15 in the Senior, are members of Girl Scouts. Serving these girls as troop leaders, assistants or committee members are a group of about 100 women, who give all their time voluntarily. The leaders at times work many hours longer than the one hour each week in which their particular troop meets.

The local leaders have helped to build up a fine county leadership club which has been helpful to the most experienced as well as the newest leaders. These leaders are eager to go to camps, conferences etc., in order to become more able in their jobs. Here clearly shown by the ever increasing enrollment of the girls, is an example of what constructive help from interested members of a community can do.

Last year as a result of inadequate support only 58 percent of the money hoped for was collected in the drive. As a result each organization was cut proportionately in their submitted budgets. The Girl Scouts received about \$1.00 per child as their share with which to carry on for the year. This year their membership has increased and without enough money the women who give their time so willingly to help local girls will be greatly handicapped in their work.

Any permanently registered voter who moved WITHIN THE DISTRICT since the General Election, November 2, 1948 and has not notified the County Board of Elections of his change of address may vote in the Primary Election, April 19, 1949 as previously registered upon taking an affidavit giving his new address.

A permanently registered voter who has CHANGED HIS NAME since the General Election, November 2, 1948 and who has not re-registered may vote as previously registered at the Primary Election, April 19, 1949 by signing the signature copy register with both the registered and new name.

Any permanently registered voter who moved WITHIN THE COUNTY after March 10, 1949 may return to the district where he is registered and vote by taking an affidavit giving his new address.

Polls will be open Primary Election Day, April 19, 1949 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

## NEW APARTMENTS PLANNED HERE

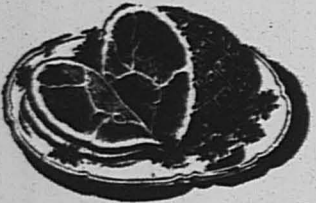

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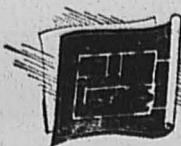

The open discussion on the tentative plans for apartments to be built on the former Dreer Estate, was added to the program in an effort to get an expression of opinion from local residents and to let them know what is contemplated.

The Riverton Planning Commission has been working since the early part of this year to consolidate necessary information, through surveys, for organized planning. A land use map, a business survey, and a transportation survey are now in progress. A survey of the population in general is contemplated in the very near future. In the past few months, the Commission has been actively working with the Riverton Borough Council on considering plans for the development of the former Dreer Estate.

The Riverton Town Meeting in sponsoring this program has extended an invitation not only to the Riverton residents but also to the adjacent communities so that they may be familiar with how Riverton is planning.

"Two hundred patient workers in the forthcoming finance campaign for the Tri-Borough Youth Council are steeling themselves to meet, in good humor and with convincing rebuttal, four stock excuses for not giving much for many years past. There have been the hurdles faced and overcome by collectors for the six organizations involved.

"OBJECTION 1: 'This does not come at a good time' or 'it does not come at the right time.' The objection presupposes that there is a 'good' or a 'right' time if only the promoters would find it. In all the years of such campaigns there has never been a spring, summer, fall or winter campaign—boom times or depression times—that the same objection was not voiced. There never is a 'right' time.

"OBJECTION 2: 'There are too many drives—these organizations should be in the Chest.' This objection presupposes that the labor of making out a check is unduly onerous. The fact is, however, that there are very practical difficulties in the way of combining in one drive the appeals for organizations as dissimilar as those involved in this suggested combination. If the workers, who in the main participate in both, do not complain, the contributors should not too seriously weigh their complaints.

"OBJECTION 3: 'Too much of the money goes out of our towns—is not used for the benefit of our children.' This objection really relates to but two of the six youth organizations and the degree to which it applies to these two is fairly debatable. The Boy Scouts and the YMCA bear the brunt of this criticism.

"The great problem of all youth is finding and holding leadership. Good leadership is not self-perpetuating — it grows older, it tires, it assumes other responsibilities, it moves away, it dies. The project languishes and often lapses. The YMCA and the Scouts solve this through the central leadership bridges upon which the complaint is focused. This central leadership bridges the gap, finds new local leaders, helps them in gaining skill, provides the framework of a program, perpetuates the work, keeping it up to a national standard. It has other valuable functions with which those interested are well acquainted — not the least of which is providing work in less fortunate localities and among those not financially able to do it themselves. Some of our money goes to the county organization for worthy work of this kind. Surely we can afford a little for the benefit of the less privileged.

"OBJECTION 4: 'Children in my town did not have all this organization play — they got along all right.' The first part of the statement may

There was only a scattering Democratic vote and all candidates on the ballot were nominated without opposition.

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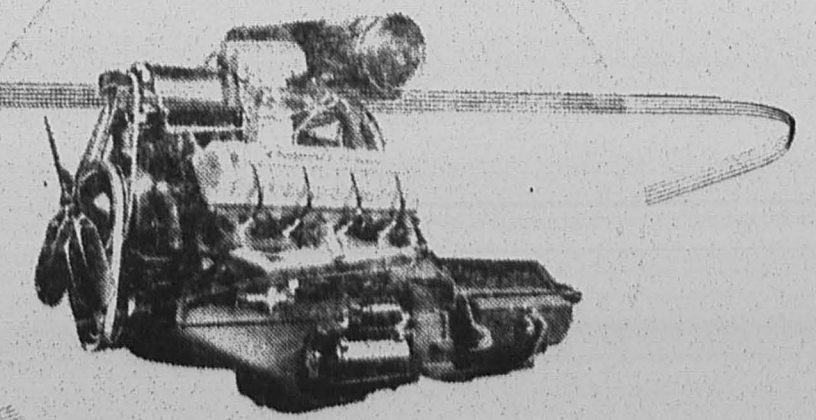

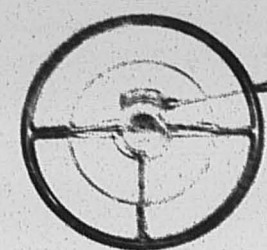

charges of 35 cents monthly for local residence service and an additional charge of 10 cents monthly for a residence extension telephone, both exclusive of tax.

Upward adjustments in business rate services will vary in amounts, depending upon the type of service, amount of equipment and the exchange in which the customer is located.

Certain toll rates for calls within New Jersey are also increased.

The new rates which have been approved by the State Board of Public Utility Commissioners, are de-

signed to produce \$8,305,000 annually in additional revenues. The company in its request for financial relief filed last September had asked for \$16,036,000 annually in additional revenues on services furnished within the state. The company has termed the Board's ruling "inadequate," and stated: "It would be seriously handicapped in meeting its obligation to provide service that will keep pace with the development of New Jersey."

In the local area the new residential rate is \$4.60 for an individual line, \$3.85 for 2-party line, \$3.10 for 4-party and rural lines. Extensions are \$.75 each. Business phones are \$.90 for an individual line and extensions are \$1.20 each. These do not include Federal tax.

In Germany today a new outfit for these children, to replace the rags they wear, will cost 165 marks, or almost their family's total income for three months. Quaker volunteer workers in Germany are now serving people of the lower income level who cannot buy clothing at present prices, even with currency reform.

The need for clothing abroad is increasing every month, according to reports received recently by Mrs. William Kriebel of Riverton. The total Quaker distribution for 1948 consisted of two and one-half million articles of clothing, and two million yards of textiles which were given by American textile manufacturers. AFSC clothing shipments included nearly 25,000 individual clothing kits made up by the Girl Scouts of America.

At present the bulk of Quaker clothing is distributed in Austria, Germany, Japan, Palestine and Poland. All clothing is distributed solely on the basis of need without regard to race, religion, nationality or politics.

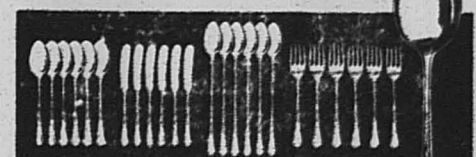

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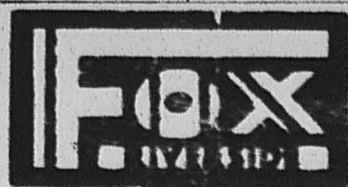

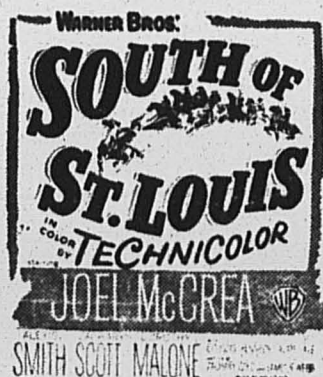

### NEW ROADWAY ON LOCAL BRIDGE

Vehicles today were traveling over a new \$75,000 steel open-grid roadway on the Tacony-Palmyra bridge.

In line with its policy to provide the most modern bridge operation for motorists, the Burlington County Bridge Commission announced the completion of the six-month roadway project.

The project consisted of replacing the former timber and asphalt pavement with a steel open-grid type roadway.

Although acquiring a modern roadway for motorists using the span, the bridge commission did not have to pay any of the costs. The \$75,000 for the project was provided by the former private owners of the span. The private owners had set aside this fund at the time the bridge was sold.

The commission announced the new roadway would provide five important advantages for more efficient operation of the bridge. The new roadway:

- Is fireproof;
- Reduces the weight of the span by approximately 160 tons;
- Provides much less wind resistance due to the open grid;
- Requires less power to open the draw because of lighter weight and
