## MANY ARRESTED

During the past few days over 30 motorists have been arrested on Cinnaminson avenue, in Cinnaminson Township. They have all been charged with careless driving and each has paid a fine and costs amounting to \$8.00.

The arrests are being made to enforce a 20-mile speed limit on the thoroughfare in question and the drive will be continued until the law is thoroughly obeyed. Already there has been a noticeable reduction in the speed at which cars are being driven on that portion of Cinnaminson avenue within Township limits.

About one-third of those arrested are residents of Riverton and Palmyra. The remaining two-thirds are about equally divided between Pennsylvania and New Jersey cars.

In addition to the speed reduction campaign, Cinnaminson police have also been active in enforcing the law regarding passing school buses when taking on or discharging passengers. Several motorists who violated this law during the past few days paid fines and costs amounting to \$13.00 each to Magistrate Cecil A. Bowers, of Cinnaminson.

## Historical Tour

For the first time in the history of Burlington county, 16 of its oldest and most interesting homes will be open for inspection by the public on next Saturday, May 7th, and in addition, no less than five of the oldest meeting houses, all true architectural gems, will also be open.

This spring pilgrimage has been arranged by the Burlington County Historical Society and promises to equal or excel the tours of old homes which have become annual events in Bucks county, Pa., and other South Jersey counties. Already, many who have made plans to take this trip have been astonished to find out that Burlington county's old homes, all dating back to the early 1700's are every bit as attractive and historical as those of other parts of the country.

Tickets entitling visitors to enter any of the houses are \$1.75 each and are on sale at the Mildred Shop, Riverton, and Blane's Drug Store, Palmyra. In addition to the tickets, each party will be given a free route map and folder describing the most interesting features of each of the old buildings.

To the lover of colonial America this will be a rare treat to find so many of these dignified old homes in such a marvelous state of repair and so splendidly furnished.

It is suggested that each party of tourists arrange to leave early in the morning in order to see as many homes as possible and that each party pack a picnic lunch to be eaten at any one of the many attractive wayside spots on the side roads which are included in the trip. For others, box lunches will be available at the Rancocas Exchange which is clearly indicated on the map.

For those who will not be able to travel by private car, a special bus will leave from the corner of East Main street and Chester avenue, Moorestown, at 9:30 a.m. Bus fare is \$1.00 for the round trip.

## BRIDGE REPORT

During their first six months of operation under public ownership, ending April 30, the Tacony-Palmyra and Burlington-Bristol bridges produced revenues of \$626,942.26.

That was disclosed today by Fred C. Norcross, Jr., secretary-treasurer of the Burlington County Bridge Commission which acquired the two bridges from their private owners last October.

"The six-month report shows that revenues increased \$46,947.08, or 8.09 percent, over the same period last year when the bridges were privately-owned, and tolls were higher," Norcross said.

When the commission acquired the spans, it immediately reduced tolls to 25 cents from 30 cents on the Tacony-Palmyra span and from 35 cents on the Burlington-Bristol bridge.

During the six-month period, 2,324,129 vehicles used the two bridges, an increase of 416,891 or 21.86 percent, over the same period a year ago.

"That resulted during the months when traffic is at its lowest point of the year," Norcross said. "With the busier summer and fall seasons approaching, when traffic reaches its peak, greater increases are anticipated."

As in the previous five months under public ownership, Norcross said, revenues and traffic continued to increase on both bridges during April.

Revenues on both bridges during April totaled \$120,905.43, an increase of \$3,700.12, or 3.16 percent over the same period last year," Norcross said. "During the month, 447,930 automobiles, trucks and buses used the two spans, an increase of 65,178, or 17.03 percent."

"The commission attributes increased revenue and traffic to reduction to tolls," Norcross continued. "This was the first dividend paid by the commission in public benefits which is particularly economical to local commuters who use the two bridges daily."

"With the commission's contention proven that revenues and traffic increase as tolls are reduced," he added, "further reductions are being considered. But these must be held in abeyance until pending litigation is settled."

Roll or pat to 1/2" thickness. Cut with floured cutter into tiny heart shapes. Place on greased baking sheet. Bake at 450° F. for 12-15 minutes or until brown. Yields 12-14 tiny biscuits.

Savory Chicken on Heart Biscuits

1/2 cup butter or 1 cup canned or cooked peas  
1/2 cup enriched 1 cup diced, cooked celery  
1/2 tsp. paprika 2 tsp. capers (if desired)  
2 cups hot milk 1 pint milk  
1 cup diced 1 recipe biscuit chicken dough

Melt butter or margarine, add flour and seasonings and cook until bubbly. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly. Cook until thickened. Combine chicken with peas, celery, and capers. Add to sauce. Heat well. Serve between halves of heart biscuits.

Ham and Noodle Casserole

1/2 lb. raw ham 1 pkg. (8 oz.)  
1/2 lb. sharp 1 cup mushrooms  
cheese 1 cup tomato  
diced green 1 cup tomato  
pepper soup

Put ham and cheese through food chopper. Mix all ingredients together and bake in a two quart casserole at 325° F. for one hour. Serves 8-10.

Combine ingredients in a jar, cover tightly and shake thoroughly. Yield: 1 cup

Angel Cake with Whipped Cream and Strawberries

Angel Cake  
1 cup sifted cake 1/2 cups sugar  
flour 1 tsp. vanilla  
1 1/2 cup egg 1/2 cup almond  
whites 1/2 cup salt  
1 tsp. cream of tartar

Sift flour three times. Beat egg whites and salt until foamy. Sprinkle on cream of tartar, beat until stiff but not dry. Sift sugar and sprinkle 1/2 cup over mixture, fold in gently but thoroughly. Continue until all sugar is used. Fold in vanilla and almond flavorings. Sift 1/2 cup flour over mixture; fold in lightly. Continue until all flour is used. Pour into ungreased tube pan. Bake at 325° F. 55-60 minutes. Let cake hang upside down in pan until thoroughly cool.

Frosting

1 1/2 cups heavy 2 cups fresh  
cream strawberries  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Whip cream with vanilla and pile on top and sides of cake. Pipe strawberries in center hole and garnish sides with some which have not been hulled.

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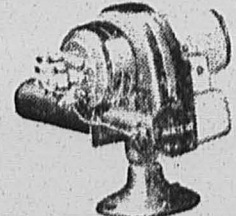

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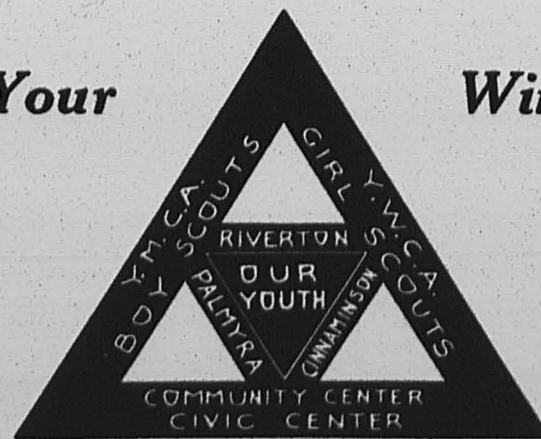

## Sidewalks Needed

At the meeting of the Cinnaminson Township Committee held on Tuesday night of this week a report was made of the recent survey made by committee members regarding the need for sidewalks on the west side of Cinnaminson avenue in the Township.

The Committee is working on plans by which such an undertaking could be financed and expects to have some information available within two weeks.

## ZURBRUGG ENLARGING NURSERY FOR NEWBORN

The Nursery at Zurbrugg Memorial Hospital is being enlarged and alterations will be completed within a few days. The alterations are being made in order to accommodate additional babies and also make possible the institution of a modern "individual bassinets" technique.

The nursery, when completed, will accommodate eighteen newborn babies plus a three-bassinets suspect nursery for babies that may need temporary special care. In addition, two incubators are always ready for premature infants.

The Nursery Name Necklace is used as baby identification. The surname is spelled out in letter beads and necklaces sealed on the infant's neck before leaving the delivery room. In addition the baby's foot print and mother's finger print are made a part of the hospital's permanent records.

With the exception of the Operating Suite, the entire second floor of the Hospital will be used for mothers and newborn infants. There are eight semi-private beds, two private rooms and six ward beds. In the year 1948 a total of 492 mothers were delivered, nine of them having twins. Patients are treated from all throughout the county, as well as Moorestown, Mt. Holly, and some few from Camden county and Philadelphia.

## Memorial Poppies

Memorial poppies which the people of Palmyra, Riverton and Cinnaminson will wear in honor of the war dead on Poppy Day, Saturday, May 28th, have been received by Frederick M. Rodgers Post 156 of the American Legion Auxiliary. The ship came from Lyons Hospital, where the little red flowers were made by disabled veterans of both world wars working under supervision of the New Jersey Department of the Auxiliary.

Making these flowers has provided interesting employment for veterans at the hospital all during the winter and spring months. It has helped keep their hands and minds busy, relieving them of long hours of tedium and contributing to their recovery.

Poppies making has given these veterans the encouraging experience of being able to earn money again, often after many months of idleness. They are paid by the Auxiliary for each poppy they make and are able to earn helpful amounts during the poppy-making season.

Much of the money is sent home by the veterans to help support their wives and children, who often have a difficult time when the veterans require hospitalization and are unable to work for long periods. It gives the veterans a decided lift in morale when they are able to send something to their families.

Those without dependents use the money to create a nest egg for themselves against the day when they leave the hospitals and endeavor to re-establish themselves in life.

The poppies are fashioned by hand, veterans working in their beds, in wheel chairs or in occupational therapy shops. Materials are provided by the Auxiliary and the finished products collected regularly by Auxiliary workers. The flowers are made of crepe paper in replica of the little wild poppies of France and Flanders, which grew on the battlefields and cemeteries of the two world wars.

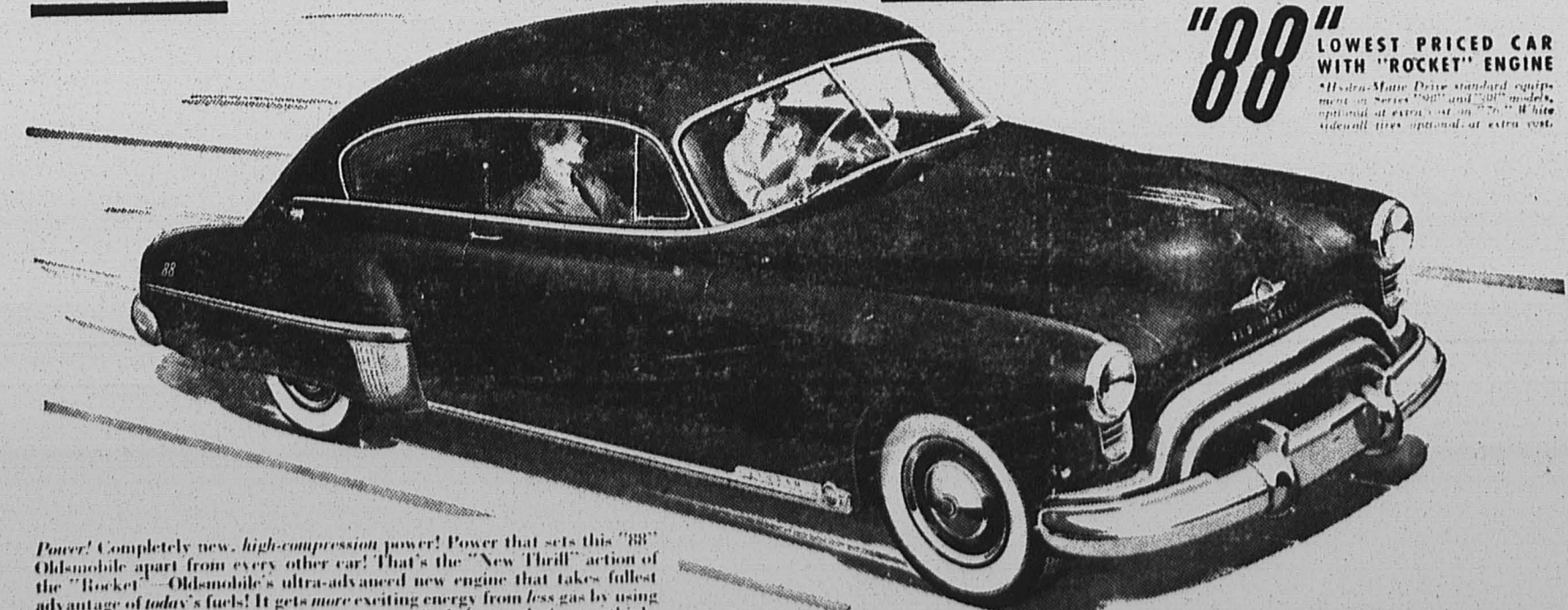

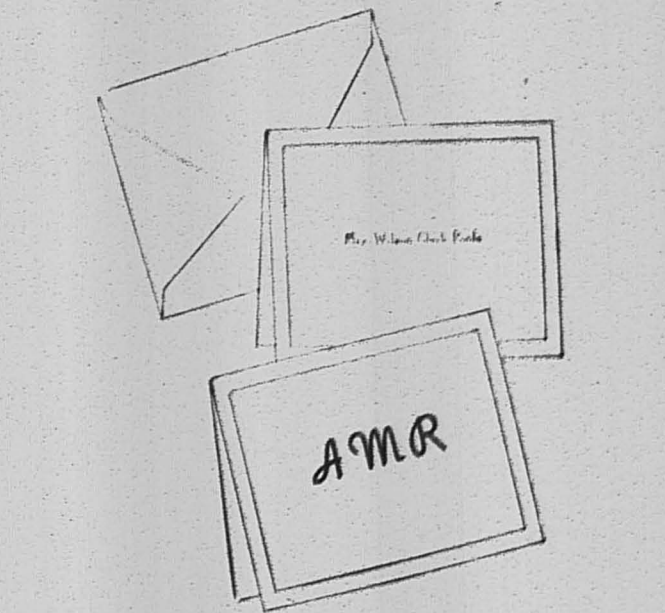

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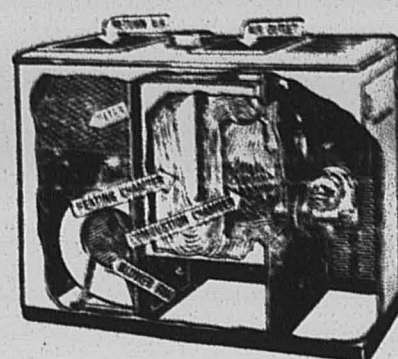

This year Mr. Dimond coached basketball and baseball, taking his basketball team to the semifinals of the Group II tournament where the team lost by one point. Mr. Dimond will retain his position as head of the Physical Education department. No decision was reached as to his successor as coach of the two sports.

Miss McWilliams is a senior at Ursinus College and has a fine record in scholarship and in athletics.

Prior to the first quarter payments in lieu of taxes, which were held up because of the restraining order, Mayor Charles V. Dickinson, of Palmyra, said his community faced a sharp increase in its tax rate if the commission was prohibited from making the payments.

## ASK CHANGE IN TIME OF RIVERSIDE FOOTBALL GAME

The Palmyra Board of Education recently received a petition with 100 names urging reconsideration of the Board's action in setting the time of the annual Thanksgiving Day football game with Riverside at 1 p.m. rather than the traditional morning time. The Board expressed its appreciation at the interest shown in the matter. The Palmyra Ministerial Association had appeared in a body at the March meeting of the Board to request that the game be played in the afternoon instead of the morning. The request was considered in the March meeting but no decision was reached. At the April meeting by a majority vote of the entire membership of the Board it was decided that the game would be scheduled for 1 p.m. and the Ministerial Association was so notified. After a lengthy discussion it appeared that the Board was of the same opinion and no action was taken on the petition on Tuesday night.

## Bridge Payments Held Up by Court Action

The Burlington County Bridge Commission may not be permitted to make payments in lieu of taxes, now due to the borough of Palmyra and Burlington City.

Howard R. Yocum, commission chairman, today said that a restraining order, which has frozen the commission's funds, has prohibited the payment of interest on the bridge bonds.

"The commission's bonds now are legally in default," Yocum explained. "According to the commission's agreement with its bondholders, payments in lieu of taxes cannot be made while that default exists."

The restraining order, referred to by Yocum, was obtained by Freeholders Richard J. Lippincott and Henry S. Haines, who filed suit to have the Tacony-Palmyra and Burlington-Bristol bridges removed from county ownership.

"The Haines-Lippincott suit places the commission in a peculiar position," Yocum said. "Bridge revenues already total nearly \$700,000—almost \$50,000 more than anticipated. We have ample surplus to meet our bond obligations and make payments in lieu of taxes to Burlington City and Palmyra. But the commission is unable to meet those payments because of the Haines-Lippincott action."

When the two bridges were acquired by the bridge commission, a public body, they became exempt from all federal, state and local taxes. The commission, however, voluntarily agreed to make payments in lieu of taxes to the two communities, Yocum explained, so they would not suffer loss of tax revenue, collected when the bridges were privately owned.

Second quarter payments in lieu of taxes, now overdue, amount to \$8,112.50 for Palmyra and \$1,325.00 for Burlington City. First quarter payments were made before the bonds were in default. Annual payments total \$32,450 for Palmyra and \$5,250 for Burlington.
