## POSSIBLE EXPLOSION AVERTED BY POLICE

On Monday morning of this week a resident of the apartment house at 407 Bank avenue, Riverton, noticed a strong smell of gas emanating from an adjacent apartment, the occupant of which had not been home since Sunday.

As the odor became stronger the resident became alarmed and called Public Service and soon after, the Riverton police. Sergeant John Robinson quickly arrived on the scene and was able to enter the gas-filled apartment to shut off a hot water heater on which the pilot light had gone out. The safety devices evidently failed to function, since the main burner was going strongly. The concentration of gas in the room was very strong.

Since the pilot light on a nearby gas range was still lighted it was believed that a serious explosion would have resulted within a comparatively short time had it not been for the action taken by the person who noticed the escaping gas and the prompt response of Sergeant Robinson.

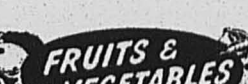

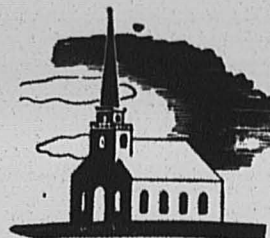

CONGRESSMAN HOWELL

Since my last report, the most controversial item on the House floor was the Armed Service Pay Bill. This bill had a number of good features, but met considerable opposition, mainly because it provided the largest raises both percentage-wise and in amount, to the generals and because it eliminated the family allotment provisions for enlisted men.

It was sent back to Committee by a substantial vote for further consideration. With a few changes it could be made into good legislation which I would be glad to support. It is necessary and proper to provide some additional incentives if we are to attract and retain career men in the services, especially in the lower and middle grades.

I have continued attendance at the

hearings on Federal Aid to Educa-

tion all of this week. The propo-

nents have made a very strong case,

and I am doing all possible to help

in getting an adequate bill before

the House within the next few weeks.

The need is, of course, more desper-

tea 2 qts. ginger ale  
1 doz. lemons 1 cup maraschino  
1 doz. oranges cherries  
Boil sugar and water for 5 minutes. Cool. Add tea, lemon, orange, grape juice and pineapple. Place in refrigerator, cover and let stand for a few hours. Pour over few cubes, add ginger ale and cherries. Slices of orange and pineapple may be used as a garnish. Serves 50.

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The importance of water to the human being is highlighted by the fact that the human body itself is 70 percent water. Water is taken into the body in foods and liquids and is utilized in various ways. All the body cells are bathed in a fluid closely resembling water.

One of the uncanny mysteries of the human body is the manner in which it maintains its water balance. Normally, everyone adjusts his intake of water roughly to his needs. When our intake is excessive, the surplus is taken care of by an increased output, mainly through the kidneys. It is more common for us to have an insufficient water intake than an excess of it. A common expression nowadays when we are short of water, as a result of exercise or prolonged failure to drink any liquids, is that we are "dehydrated."

This means we are conscious of a thirst for water.

As a matter of fact, thirst is one of the great instincts of self-preservation. The sense organs of thirst

are in the mouth and throat and they faithfully reflect the need for water of all the rest of the body.

Of course, every rule has its exception. There are some people who are chronically "water hungry." Their desire for water is far in excess of the actual need. But as a general rule, the sense of thirst is a pretty good barometer of our water balance or lack of it.

Most people don't drink enough water. Generally speaking, the consequences of drinking too little water are much more serious than those of drinking too much.

During the last fifty years, thanks to the combined efforts of medical and engineering officials, the chances of catching a water borne disease have been greatly reduced. Even today, however, most rivers and streams are still polluted by sewage or industrial wastes. Billions of dollars will undoubtedly be spent in the next ten years to construct and operate new sewage disposal plants which will help still further to wipe out water borne diseases.

Typhoid fever, for example, has been steadily declining in this country. A survey of nearly 100 cities shows that typhoid deaths went down from 95 in 1942 to 62 in 1946. Half of the cities in the country reported no typhoid deaths in 1946, but, if all of our knowledge of sanitation were fully applied to the protection of our water supply, typhoid fever would be unheard of.

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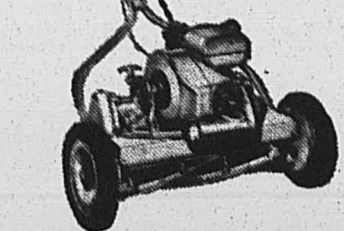

## BRIDGE PROFITS

For the seventh consecutive month, the Twenty-Palmyra and Burlington-Bristol bridges continued to show traffic and revenue gains.

Fred C. Norcross, Jr., secretary-treasurer of the Burlington County Bridge Commission, said revenues from the two Delaware river spans totaled \$38,471 during May.

The traffic count on both spans totaled 338,471. This was an increase of 77,499 automobiles, trucks and buses, or 16.08 percent, over the same month a year ago, when the spans were privately owned.

Total revenues earned by the two bridges during their first 221 days under county ownership now amount to \$776,043.97, an increase of \$99,404.73 over the corresponding period of 1948.

"With the heavy summer traffic now starting," Norcross said, "it is expected that revenues will pass the \$1,000,000 mark early in July."

During the seven month period, a total of 2,683,600 vehicles traveled over the two bridges. This was an increase of 494,390 vehicles or 20.69 percent over the same period last year.

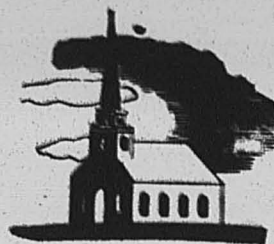

## Berries

Do you remember when the arrival of the "strawberry season" coincided with the closing of school and the beginning of the summer vacation? The season was short and the berries were delicious. Later on the raspberries, blueberries, blackberries, elderberries and gooseberries arrived in the market.

Modern methods of refrigeration and transportation have broken down all the barriers. We may enjoy most of these berries the year around, either in their fresh or frozen state, and they seem doubly delicious.

Fresh, fine, ripe berries should be washed and handled carefully if they are to retain their appearance and flavor. They are best stored in the automatic refrigerator.

Frozen berries should be stored in the frozen foods compartment.

**Blueberry Muffins**  
1/2 cup butter 4 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 cup sugar 1/2 tsp. salt  
2 eggs, well beaten 1 cup blueberries  
2 1/2 cups sifted 1/2 cup milk  
enriched flour

Cream the butter and sugar. Add the eggs. Stir in the flour, baking powder, and salt, sifted together. Add the berries alternately with the milk. Mix well, and bake in greased muffin pans. Bake at 450° F. for 15 minutes. Serve very hot. Yield: 12 muffins.

**Strawberry Shortcake**  
1 qt. strawberries, sliced  
Mix with 1 cup sugar, allow to stand for 2 hours in refrigerator. Serve on biscuit shortcake with plain or whipped cream.

2 cups sifted 2 tsp. shortening  
enriched flour 1/2 cup milk  
4 tsp. baking 1 tsp. salt  
powder 4 tsp. sugar

Sift dry ingredients, cut in shortening. Add milk gradually, making a soft dough. Toss onto slightly floured board, roll out to 1" thickness, cut with biscuit cutter and

bake at 450° F. 15 minutes; or bake in large cake, split in half before using, both halves used crust side down. Two thinner cakes laid one on the other in the same pan can be made. Brush or dot the lower with butter or margarine before placing the second. Yield: 12 2" biscuits or 8" cake.

**Strawberry Refrigerator Cake**  
2 cups straw- 1/2 cup hot water  
berries, cut in 1 tbsp. lemon  
small pieces juice  
1 cup sugar 1/2 tsp. salt  
1 tbsp. gelatine 1/2 cup cream,  
1/2 cup cold whipped  
water 2 egg whites  
Lady fingers

Crush strawberries with sugar. Soak gelatine in cold water, then dissolve in hot water. Add berries, lemon juice, salt. Cool and when mixture begins to thicken, fold in whipped cream and stiffly beaten egg whites. Line a mold with waxed paper. Arrange lady fingers around the sides. Pour a layer of the strawberry mixture in the bottom of the mold. Fill mold alternately with layers of lady fingers and strawberry mixture. Chill approximately 5 hours. Unmold and garnish with whipped cream and whole strawberries. Serves 6 to 8.

**Gooseberry Pie**  
2 cups gooseberries 1/2 cup sugar  
Wash the gooseberries and cook with the sugar until they are soft. Pour into 8" pie pan lined with pastry, cover with crust and bake at 425° F. for 10 minutes. Reduce temperature to 350° F. and bake for 30-35 minutes.

**Plain Pastry**  
2 1/2 cups sifted 1/2 cup vegetable  
enriched flour shortening  
1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. cold water

Blend flour and salt together, cut in shortening until it is the size of small peas. Add water slowly, mixing with fork. Moisten all the flour. Press particles together. Roll dough. Yield: 1-8" double crust pie.

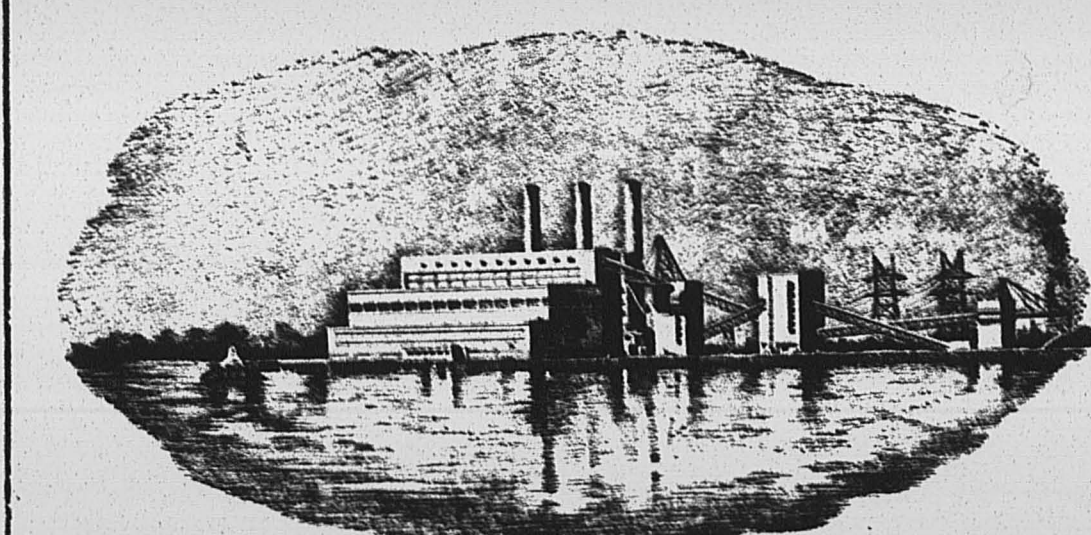

It must be obvious to all informed persons that the Russians have insistently sought, and still are seeking, to exploit any possible crack in the armor of the forces striving to establish a free world, and that to show any hesitancy, or delay in ratifying the North Atlantic Pact is to lend aid and comfort to the Kremlin's efforts to obstruct our endeavors to help build a strong and united Europe.

The decision to postpone Senate action on the treaty and to defer discussion of the arms-aid program could not have come at a worse time, and unless a prompt reversal is made it will seriously weaken our position in the Paris meeting of the Council of Foreign Ministers.

Prompt action on your part can yet repair some of the damage done, and would serve notice to the world that America will not again repeat the tragic blunders we made following the war's end, of letting the Russians gain the erroneous impression that we were vacillating and undetermined to use our great strength in supporting the forces of freedom.

I earnestly appeal to you to use the great influence of your high office to urge the Senate leaders to call up the treaty for immediate debate.

Nothing is more urgent at this time.

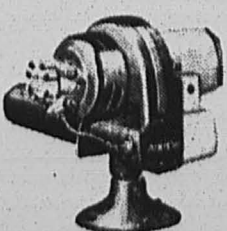

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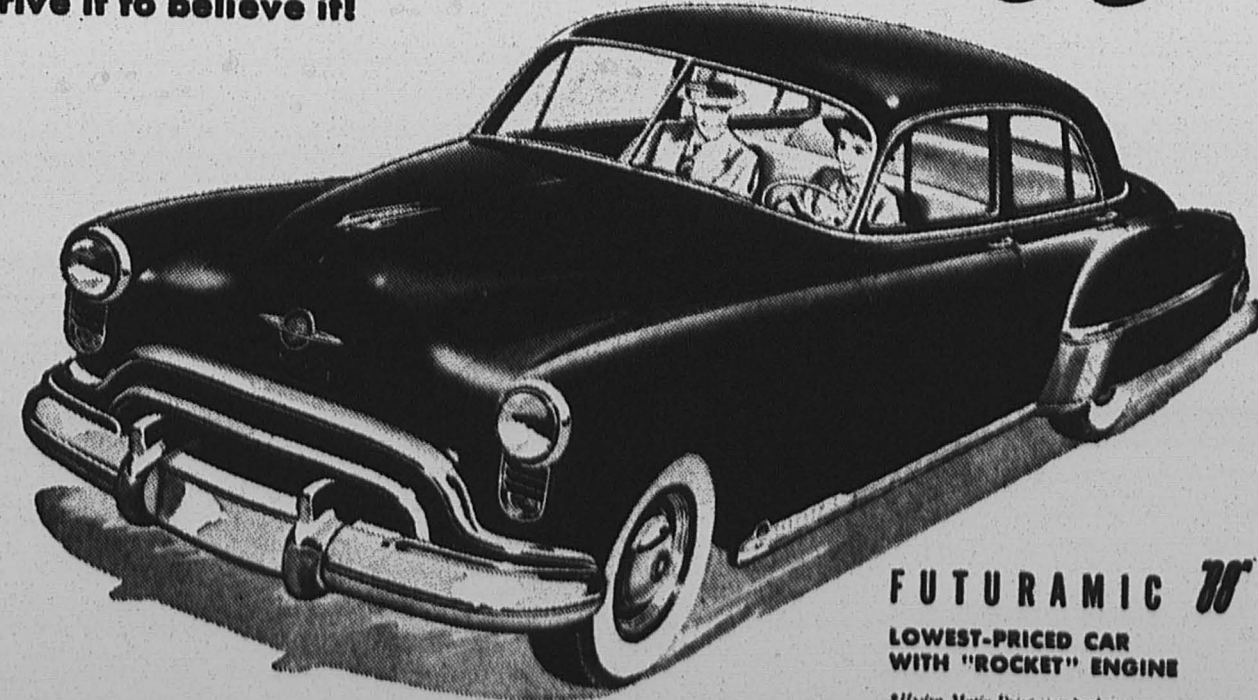

Dear Senator Hendrickson:

I am attaching, herewith, a copy of a letter I have just sent to the President, urging that he use his influence with the Administration leaders to rescind the decision to give priority in the Senate to revision of the Taft-Hartley Act, over consideration of the North Atlantic Pact. There is nothing in any way inimical to the real permanent interests of the individual workers, and it is appalling to me that the President has chosen to put revision of this law ahead of debate on a treaty which is of vital importance to the peace of the world.

It is my sincere conviction that the

very great majority of our citizens do not wish any major change made in the Taft-Hartley Law at all.

The recent vote on the Wood Bill was certainly indicative of the general feeling of the Congress and I am sure it is representative of the opinion of our people.

The Taft-Hartley Law was enacted in response to an overwhelming demand of public opinion.

The report of the Congressional Joint Committee indicated that the use of the injunctive processes provided for in the law have, in several national emergency disputes when it was necessary for the President to employ the powers given the Chief Executive, successfully demonstrated the wisdom of these provisions designed to protect the citizens of the nation from the irresponsible actions of a minority in the labor movement.

This law has been of great value to the labor movement in helping to expose and remove from positions of power many of the Communists who were not interested in improving the standards of living and working conditions of union members but in creating a breakdown of our democratic free enterprise economy.

We are presently in a very critical period of adjustment in our economy that requires the maximum of stability in our labor relations and it would be a tragedy, not only for this country, but all the world, if the Congress of the United States did anything in any degree that would imperil our industrial strength at this time.

One of the most important contributions that the Congress could make to strengthen our economy at this time would be to relieve the people and business from some of the burden of taxation which is tending to discourage expansion and investment which is needed to keep the economy on an even keel.

The Hoover Bi-Partisan Commission have pointed the way to a potential saving in the operation of

the government of three to four billions of dollars and it would seem to any sensible person that these potential savings would be realized promptly, so that the tax payers can be relieved of part of the terrific taxation they are now subject to.

I have taken the liberty of writing you to this effect as I feel so strongly that if we do the right thing we can keep this nation of ours strong so that we shall have solid prosperity in this country and be able to exert a strong influence in the world for the maintenance of a peaceful, free, democratic way of life.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Unemployment insurance claimants, especially those with appeals pending, were advised today by the Division of Employment Security to continue reporting at their local New Jersey State Employment Service office for all weeks which benefits are claimed.

Director Harold G. Hoffman said that many individuals, upon receiving an unfavorable determination by the Chief of Benefits on their claim, file an appeal and then stop reporting although they continue to be unemployed. Hoffman emphasized that if an appellate body of the Employment Security Division finds a claimant eligible in all other respects he cannot be paid benefits if he has failed to fulfill the reporting requirements for the weeks in question.

Pointing out that claimant-appellants should continue reporting after they have covered the maximum number of compensable weeks, Hoffman said the Board of Review and Appeals Tribunal often find that in early periods of unemployment claimants fail to seek work or restrict their availability unreasonably. However, later in the period of unemployment they meet the "availability for work" requirements of the statute. Unless they have continued to report to the local offices, they cannot be found eligible for these subsequent periods.

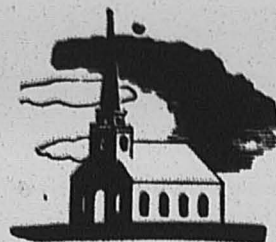

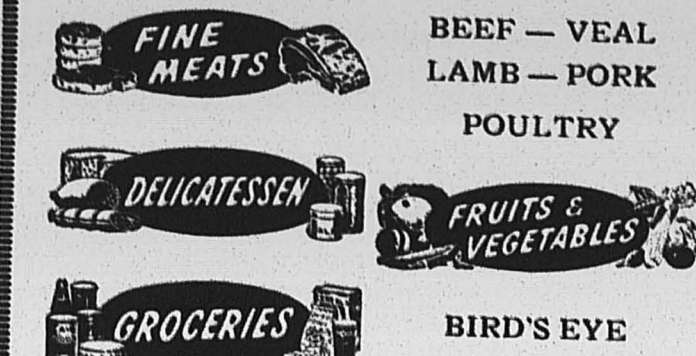

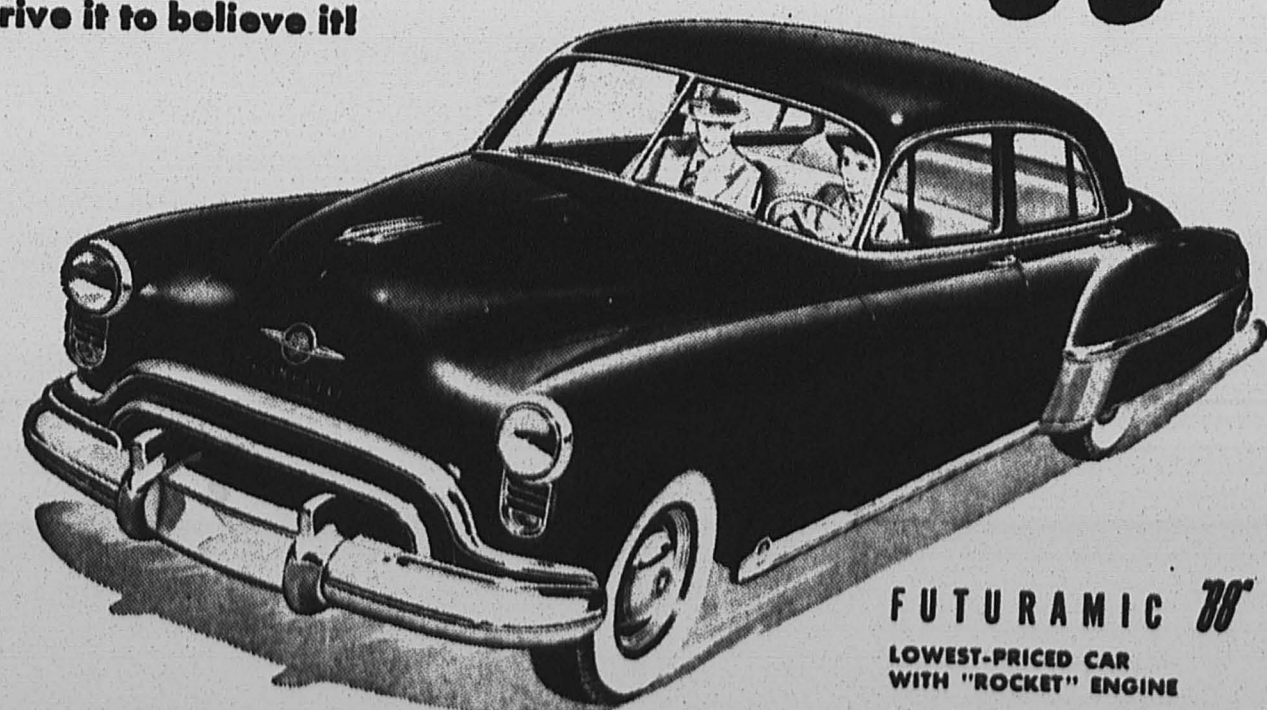

Make Your Christmas Gifts Now

Many homemakers are preparing for Christmas now by making jams and jellies to be given to their friends at Christmas. Home-made preserves attractively wrapped make an acceptable gift any time of year. Why not take some to your week-end hostess?

Summer fruits and berries make delicious jellies. If you have been making jelly for years you will have your own favorite method, or you may prefer using commercial pectins and the newer short boil method. Which ever method you use, always remember to follow directions, carefully and measure accurately.

If a fruit is to be made into jelly it must have two essential ingredients—pectin and acid. These ingredients decrease as the fruit ripens. Therefore to be sure your jelly will be firm and perfect, make the pectin test:

Mix 1 tsp. cooked fruit juice, 1 tsp. sugar and 1/2 tsp. Epsom salts, stirring until salt dissolves. Let stand for 20 minutes. If a solid mass forms, the juice will make a satisfactory jelly.

Or cook 1/4 cup juice with 3 tsp. sugar in a small pan to see if it will jelly.

If you are using apricots, blackberries, blueberries, cherries, peaches, pears or strawberries plan to combine them cup for cup with apple juice or use a commercial pectin according to directions for perfect results.

To make Jelly:

Wash and drain only sound fruit, using a mixture of slightly under-ripe and ripe fruit. Remove hulls, stems, blossom ends. Add required amount of water. Crush fruit.

The following fruits should be covered with water and boiled gently until soft:

Apple Gooseberry

Crabapple Quince

For each quart of the following

fruit use 1/4 cup water and simmer until soft:

Blackberry Elderberry

Blueberry (sour) Grape

Current Plum (sour)

Raspberry

Pour pulp and juice into jelly bag and several thicknesses of cheese-cloth rinsed in warm water.

Hang bag and allow juice to drip. Do not squeeze bag or jelly will be cloudy.

Cook not more than 8 cups of drained juices in a kettle that will hold double that amount. Allow 3/4 cup sugar for each cup of juice of the following fruits: apple, apricot, blackberry, blueberry, cherry, elderberry, peach, pear and strawberry.

Allow 1 cup sugar for each cup of cranberry, gooseberry juice. Crab apple, currant, plum, quince, raspberry will require 1/2 to 1 cup sugar according to sweetness of the fruit.

After sugar is added to the juice, stir until dissolved. Boil rapidly until jelly test is reached.

To test for jelliness point dip spoon into the boiling syrup and allow syrup to drop from side of spoon. When jelliness point is reached the drops will flow together and sheet from the spoon. Thermometers are helpful when cooking jelly but the sheet test should also be used because the jelliness point is not always the same. The range of temperature at which the fruit or jelliness point is from 220-224°F. When jelliness point has been reached the jelly is done.

Remove from heat at once and skim foam from jelly.

Use jelly glasses which have been washed in warm water and sterilized 20 minutes. Pour jelly into hot glasses to within 1/2" of top. Do not spill jelly on inside rim of glass.

Melt paraffin over hot water and pour 1/2" layer over jelly. Turn the glass so the paraffin will spread evenly and touch the sides. When jelly is cold add another layer of paraffin to insure sealing. Cover with metal or paper tops and store in cool, dry place.

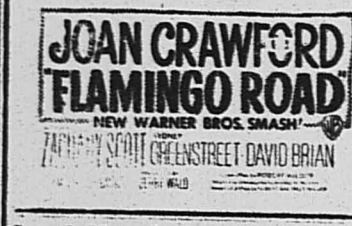

**SUNDAY DINNER Suggestions**

IN THE constant search for something new with which to surprise her family and bring out those complete she so enjoys, the average homemaker is liable to overlook some of the older, more substantial recipes hidden away in her cook book.

For that reason the A & P Service for Home-Makers suggests casserole of lamb chops be featured on this Sunday's dinner table. The many flavorful ingredients used in preparing this dish will help make it popular with the entire family.

First trim the chops neatly, removing every bit of fat and skin. In the bottom of the casserole, put a layer of pared and shredded tomatoes. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, a little sugar and a teaspoonful of onion juice. Lay three or four chops on the tomatoes, season with salt and pepper. Around them arrange small pellets of parboiled potatoes. Add a dozen or so mushrooms, fresh or canned. Now add another layer of tomatoes, season as before, then add more chops, potatoes and mushrooms. Top layer of casserole should be of tomatoes. Pour in a generous cupful of stock, bouillon or consommé. Cover and cook steadily for two hours.

When the meat is tender, pour off the gravy carefully, and thicken with browned flour. Add juice of half a lemon and a teaspoonful of kitchen bouquet. Pour over the casserole's contents, place back in oven for three minutes and serve directly from casserole.

Your family's favorite pie, perhaps a lemon and an appropriate beverage, will make this a meal which you will soon be asked to repeat.

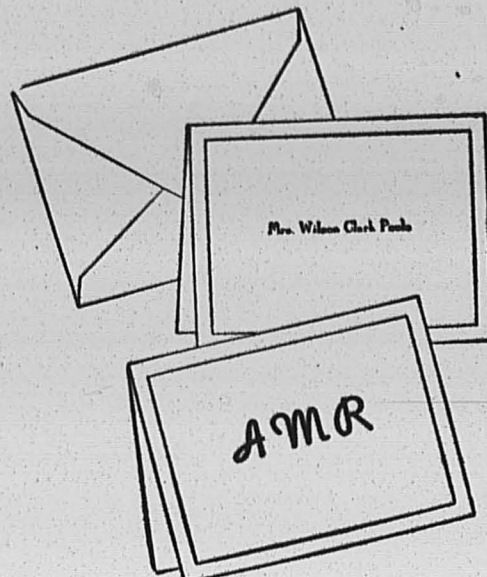

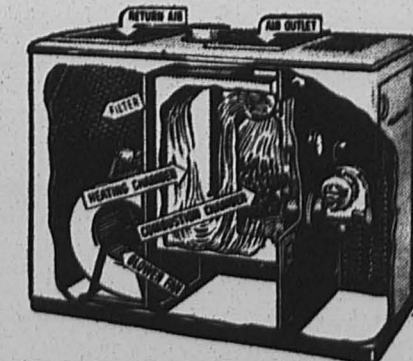

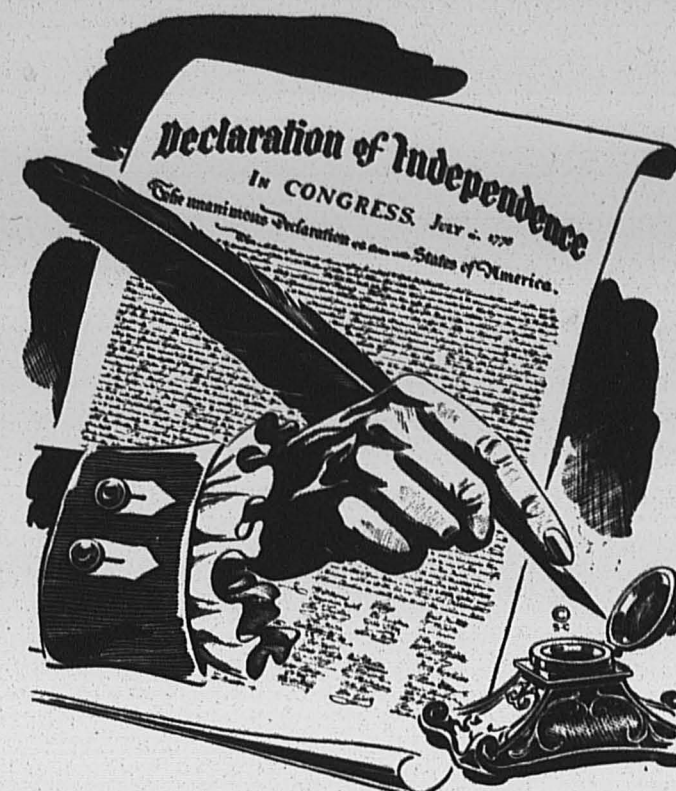

STATE EXTENDS  
VETERAN LOAN  
PRIVILEGES

New Jersey veterans who have been in business over 18 months are now eligible for State-guaranteed loans to permit expansion or provide additional working capital. Commissioner Charles R. Erdman, Jr., of the Department of Conservation and Economic Development announced today.

The change in the loan provisions followed a meeting of the advisory council for the Division of Veterans Services, where the Veterans Loan Authority is administered.

In the past, Erdman explained, a veteran who had been established in business 18 months or more was not eligible for a State-guaranteed loan. Under the new ruling, effective immediately, a veteran who has established or re-established himself in business, agriculture or a profession is not restricted by time limitations. He may apply at his local bank or

lending institution for a State-guaranteed loan up to a maximum of \$5,000. The money is to be used in the business for the purchase of inventory, stock, equipment, or for additional working capital. After the bank has approved the loan application, it is forwarded to the Veterans Loan Authority in the Department of Conservation and Economic Development where it is guaranteed or insured.

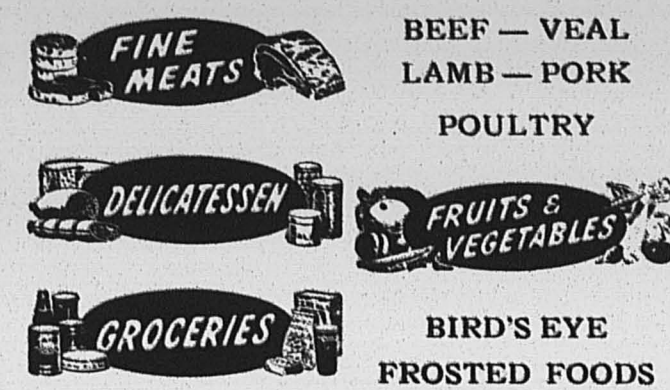
Although six years is allowed the veteran to repay his loan, a considerable number have repaid in full and many others make payments far in advance of due dates, Commissioner Erdman reports.

## THE PEOPLE'S COLUMN

25 June 1949

To the Editor  
The New Era  
Riverton, New Jersey

Dear Sir:

Much of the legislation proposed in the present Congress would, if enacted into law, alter the character of our government in a manner which would ultimately destroy the economic and political freedom of our citizens.

In a recent address, ex-Secretary James F. Byrnes sounded a sober warning of the dangers inherent in many of the measures proposed by the Administration forces.

Two weeks ago I wrote to each of the 14 Congressmen from New Jersey stating my opinion on several of the more important issues.

I am attaching a copy of one of these letters which I would be glad to have you publish in The New Era with the thought that other interested citizens may also wish to record their opinions with their representatives in Washington.

I am firmly convinced that the majority of our people want LESS government control, not more, LESS taxes and more economy.

The force of public opinion will secure these ends if it is made known through individual appeals to our representatives.

Dear Mr. Thomas:

There are many serious problems confronting the present Congress. Some of these issues are of most vital importance to our nation, and to the world.

Because I believe that the representative republican form of government provided by our constitution is essential to the preservation of the liberty and independence of the individual, I am strongly opposed to much of the legislation which has been proposed in this present Congress.

We do not want to become creatures of a paternalistic all-powerful state. We want to remain independent members of a free republic.

The power to tax is the power to destroy.

Taxes today have reached a point that is dangerously close to the limit which a free economy can stand. If we lose our economic freedom, our political freedom will vanish with it.

The Hoover Bi-Partisan Commission has pointed the way to savings of 3 to 4 billions of dollars. It would be inexcusable for Congress not to make sure that these potential savings are realized with-out delay.

The money saved should be used to reduce the public debt and to reduce taxes.

The health standard of the United States is the highest of any major nation of the world. This is the result of the free practice of medicine. Surely it would be folly to throw overboard a system that has served us so well for any government dominated system of medicine.

We are presently in a period of adjustment in our economy that requires the maximum of stability in our labor relations.

The Taft-Hartley Act which was passed by the overwhelming demand of our citizens that they, and the individual members of the unions be protected from the irresponsible actions of a minority in the labor movement, should not be repealed.

I am firmly convinced that the vast majority of the citizens of the country do not want this law repealed or even modified in any of its major provisions. The injunctive processes must be retained. Plant seizure must be legal fiction unworthy of consideration of persons of integrity.

The votes on the Wood bill before it was sent back to the committee

was ample demonstration that our representatives are conscious of their responsibilities to our citizens, and would not of themselves modify the Taft-Hartley Law.

We must not again, and particularly at this critical time, suffer the irretrievable losses and hardships which resulted from the arbitrary and irresponsible strikes of the last few years before the Taft-Hartley Law was enacted.

Nothing would do more to restore confidence in our people, and prevent this present adjustment from becoming a serious depression, than for the Congress to implement the government reorganization plan, use these savings for reduction of the debt and of taxes and then adjourn.

We have too much government. We have too much taxes.

Reduce both and we will prosper.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINCINNATION IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON FURTHER AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CINCINNATION IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON FIXING AND DETERMINING THE SALARIES, WAGES OR OTHER COMPENSATION OF ALL OFFICERS, APPOINTMENT AND EMPLOYEES OF THE SAID TOWNSHIP"

BE IT ORDAINED by the township Committee of the Township of Cincinnati in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey:

SECTION 1: That an Ordinance of the said Township entitled "An Ordinance of the Township of Cincinnati in the County of Burlington Fixing and Determining the Salaries, Wages or Other Compensation of all Officers, Appointment and Employees of the said Township," adopted June 12, 1946, and thereafter amended by Ordinances of the said Township adopted March 26, 1946, September 24, 1946, January 19, 1947, and March 9, 1948, respectively, be and the same is hereby further amended so that Section 11 of said Ordinance shall hereafter read as follows:

POLICE OFFICERS

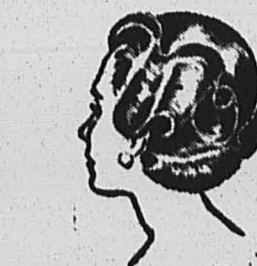
