ORDINANCE TO ENFORCE CLEARING WALKS OF SNOW

Copy of Ordinance, No. 30

An Ordinance to enforce the re-
moval of snow, ice and dirt from
the sidewalks and gutters of the
streets and highways of the Town-
ship of Palmyra, by the owners or
occupants of the premises fronting
thereon.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the
Township Committee of the Town-
ship of Palmyra, in the county of
Burlington, that the owners or oc-
cupants of every dwelling house,
store, other buildings or lots of
ground in the township of Palmyra,
shall within the first twelve hours
after every fall of snow or hail or
after the formation of any ice upon
the sidewalks and in the gutters,
cause the same to be removed en-
tirely from off the sidewalks, and
to the breadth of one foot out of the
gutter, opposite such dwelling
house, store, building and lot of
ground.

Section 2. And be it further or-
dained that in case the gutter op-
posite to any dwelling house, store or
other building or lot or lots of
ground in the Township of Palmyra
shall at any time become obstructed
with snow, ice, dirt or anything
whatever, the owner or occupants
of such house, store, building or lot
shall cause the said gutter to be
cleaned out, to the width of two
feet so that the water shall run free-
ly along the same.

Section 3. And be it further or-
dained that the penalty for every
neglect and failure to comply with
any of the provisions of this ordi-
nance shall be the sum of five dol-
lars to be recovered in the manner
provided by law.
