## BOLD ROGERS TAKE SAFE FROM STORE

Grocery Robbed in Morgan Hall While Owner Watches Restaurant on Second Floor

Some time last Friday evening, presumably about ten o'clock, a safe containing in the neighborhood of \$200 was stolen from the Morgan Stores Company grocery store in Morgan Hall.

A side door near the rear was forced open and the safe was carried out bodily. It is believed it was taken in an automobile to some distant place and opened at leisure.

Several peculiar circumstances surrounded the robbery. In the first place, it is believed to have occurred while the Field Club entertainment was in progress on the second floor of Morgan Hall, with several hundred persons in attendance, and while dozens of cars were parked about the front of the building.

It was about ten o'clock when Officer Rodgers, who was in the police station next door to Morgan Hall, received a call from Riverton railway station reporting that the railroad bridge over the Pensauken Creek was on fire. Rodgers drove down toward the bridge in the township car to verify this report and then returned to the fire house to turn in the alarm.

The officer believes it was during his brief absence from the police station that the robbery took place. Chief Beck was not on duty at that particular time.

Snow began falling at about one o'clock, but by daybreak it was too deep but that it is thought the robbers would have left a trail had the theft occurred in the early hours of the morning.

The door through which entrance was made was not strongly locked and was evidently forced open without the use of tools.

No one at all was found. The association of the robbery with the big snow recalls the effort of three gunmen to rob Williamson's store last winter in the midst of a heavy snowfall. That time, however, the whole gang was captured.

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## QUICK USE FOR NEW PALMYRA AMBULANCE

Woman With Broken Leg First Patient to Ride in Machine which Arrived Saturday

The Palmyra ambulance arrived last Saturday ready for use and was housed in the garage which had been arranged for it next to the fire house.

The ambulance was put into actual service for the first time on Wednesday evening, Mrs. John Sattler, who lives with her husband on Benjamin Lippincott's farm in Cinnaminson Township, fell and broke her leg at Eighth and Bainbridge streets, Philadelphia. She insisted on being taken home and was brought as far as Palmyra by train.

Upon her arrival here the ambulance was called at once and the injured woman was taken to Dr. Bauer, who gave her preliminary treatment. The ambulance then took the patient to her home. Police Chief Morris Beck accompanied by Officer Rodgers, drove the car.

The new machine is handsomely built and well equipped. It was placed on exhibition Thursday evening when the Ambulance Association met at the fire house and the public in general will have an opportunity to see it when the weather improves and it is exhibited in a central location.

The ambulance Association held a meeting at the firehouse Thursday evening at which it was announced that the fire company has donated the use of the building for housing the ambulance as well as the electric current for lighting and also had made a contribution of \$25 to the fund. E. C. Lewis donated the lumber for the flooring and alterations of the building, Harry Kemmerle donated the ton of coal which he won in the firemen's drawing. The electrical wiring was done by Chief of Police Beck who thus temporarily returned to his former trade.

The lunch motor purchased by the Association also has arrived and the drivers are being instructed in the use of it.

**BORDEN'S RESIGNATION DENIED BY EDWARDS**  
Governor Confers With New Jersey Guard Head; Said Resignation Not Considered

TRENTON, Feb. 3.—Governor Edwards yesterday denied a report that General Howard S. Borden had tendered or had offered to tender his resignation as commander of New Jersey Infantry Brigade of the National Guard.

The Governor admitted that he had had a conference with General Borden in Jersey City Wednesday at which conditions in the National Guard were freely discussed, but he declared that the subject of General Borden's resignation had not been considered. It was stated by the Governor that a further conference with General Borden is to be held later this week.

It was stated here last night that even should General Borden resign, the Reorganization Bill would be pressed to passage as a means of restoring the 114th Infantry of Camden and the 113th of Newark to their former status and also to give opportunity for a complete reorganization of the personnel of the two regiments.

Colonel Winfield S. Price, of Camden, into commander of the 114th, yesterday denied emphatically a rumor that he is a candidate to succeed General Borden. Such a rumor, he said, is entirely erroneous and serves to place him in an unenviable light as seeker for advancement.

"My sole purpose in engaging in the controversy over the election of General Borden was," said Colonel Price, "to establish a policy in the reorganization of selections of only fit and experienced men as officers."

**ANOTHER NEWSPAPER MAN IN THE HOUSE OF LORDS**

Mr. Advance Honor Recently Conferred on Henry Dalziel, Owner of London Daily Chronicle, the Pall Mall Gazette and Reynolds' Newspaper, among other journalistic properties, is a reminder that Britain not less than the United States, is a land of opportunity. We think of the rise of a man from poverty and obscurity to the highest eminence as a possibility peculiar to new countries with immense natural resources.

The rise of Dalziel, says the Dearborn Independent, is one of many instances that go to show that in even an old and "worn-out" country of small area and natural resources, democratic institutions open the way for any man of genuine character and ability to carve out a successful career for himself.

Thirty years ago or so, the new newspaper "peer" was a free-lance journalist in London's famous Fleet Street. He made a specialty of reporting radical political meetings in South London and the Strand. That is to say, the assignments he picked were those which the average reporter declined to tackle seriously and understandingly. In the 1890's he became London correspondent for the Scottish Leader, a Glasgow organ which had a short life. The organ, however, utilized his reports and he got into Parliament.

Hearing that the Liberal party managers were in difficulties over the conflicting claims of different aspirants to the vacant Kildare seat, he went to the Scottish Leader, a Glasgow organ which had a short life. The organ, however, utilized his reports and he got into Parliament.

He was the seat and thereafter distinguished himself in the House of Commons as a radical stormy petrel. He remained a radical, resulting in the split between Premier Asquith and Lloyd George, in 1916.

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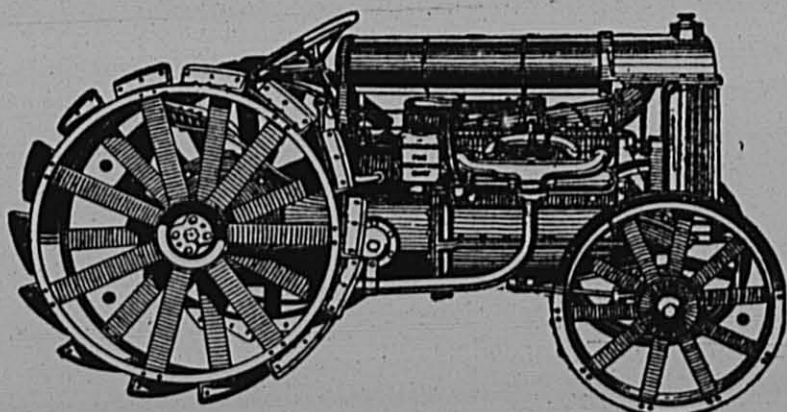

There are twenty-one pension bills pending in the legislature, and these have been characterized as "nothing else than raids upon public treasuries by irresponsible groups of employees," by the legislative committee of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities.
