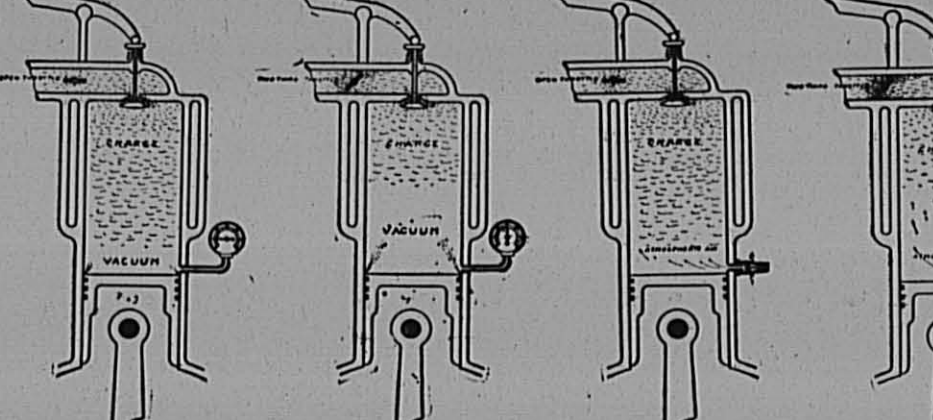


Fig. 1. Vacuum Created at the end of the Intake Stroke is the cause of most motor troubles.

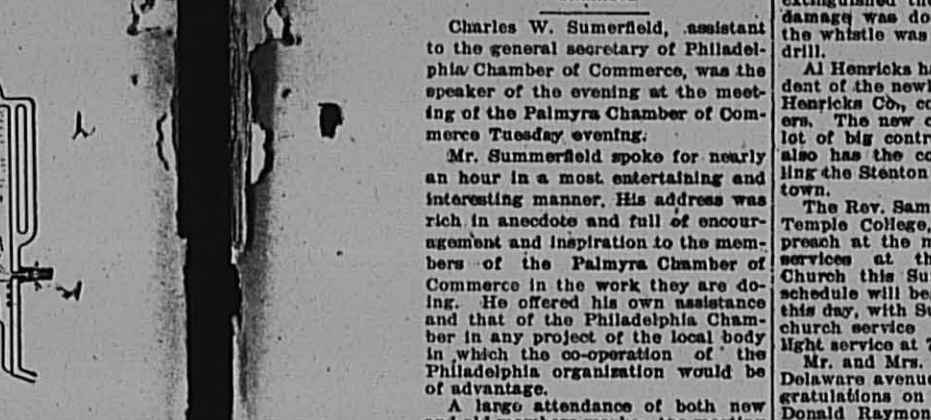


Fig. 2. Vacuum Prevented at the end of the Intake Stroke Improves power, performance and economy.

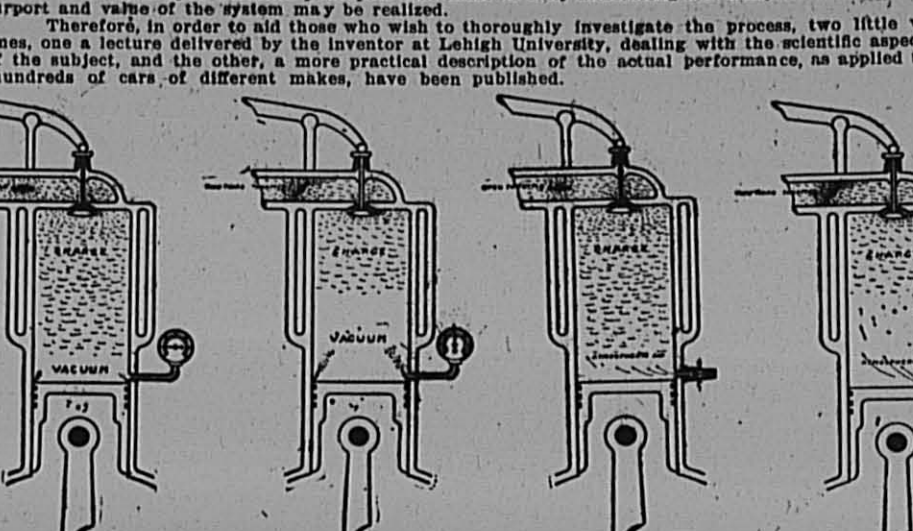


Fig. 1. Vacuum Created at the end of the Intake Stroke is the cause of most motor troubles.

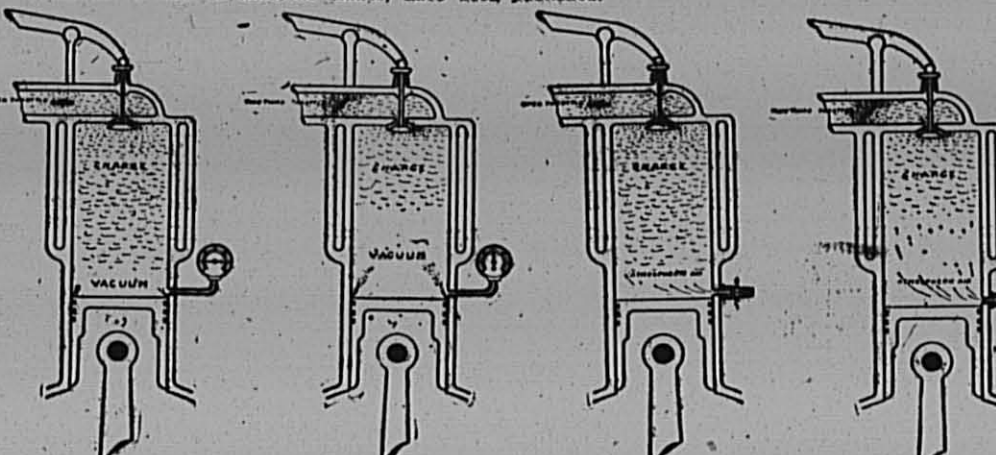


Fig. 1. Vacuum Created at the end of the Intake Stroke is the cause of most motor troubles.

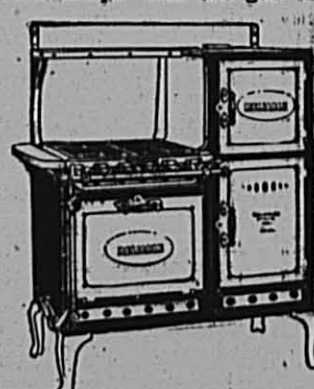

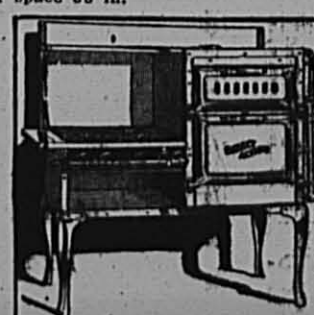
